Richmond Bridge Again Used by Auto Traffic

NEW RICHMOND — Traffic is using the Richmond Bridge over the Kalamazoo River again after repairs to the 420-foot span were completed. The Allegan County Road Commission replaced some of the wood decking and some steel beams found to be rusted. The 10-day job cost about \$4,000.

A new bridge about a half mile to the west on 38th St. is expected to be under construction next spring pending acquisition or right of way and Coast Guard approval. The old Richmond bridge will continue in use after the new span is completed.

275 Known VD Cases In Ottawa

A small but appreciative crowd was on hand in Civic Center Tuesday night to hear a panel of local physicians discuss the VD problem, its causes and treatment.

Perhaps most startling to the audience was the fact that in Ottawa County alone as of Friday, Nov. 17, there have been 275 reported cases thus far in 1972 whereas there were only 215 cases of venereal disease reported in all of 1971, according to Dr. Paul Christenson, Ottawa County Medical Health Officer. Christenson indicated that the year's total number of cases is projected to be 310.

All of the panelists agreed that the common statistic of nine unreported cases for every reported case of VD was quite accurate. This would realistically indicate somewhere around 2,700 cases in Ottawa County alone this year, Dr. Christenson pointed out.

Panel moderator Dr. Robert Weeldreyer introduced the panelists and their portions of the program. Dr. Christenson led off with the statistical information followed by Dr. Donald Edeane who spoke of VD in the female. Dr. Jack Derks dealt with VD in the male while Dr. Vernon Boersma talked of congenital VD in babies infected by the diseased mother.

Only the two most common forms of VD, gonorrhea and syphilis, were discussed. It was pointed out that gonorrhea is now the second most contagious disease in the United States ranking second only to the common cold. Also noted was that gonorrhea is 20 times more prevalent than syphilis.

A number of questions were submitted to the audience dealing with effects and treatment of the diseases.

The meeting was sponsored by the Ottawa County Medical Society. A similar meeting is being held in Grand Haven Tuesday night, Nov. 28.

Driver Injured In Two-Car Crash

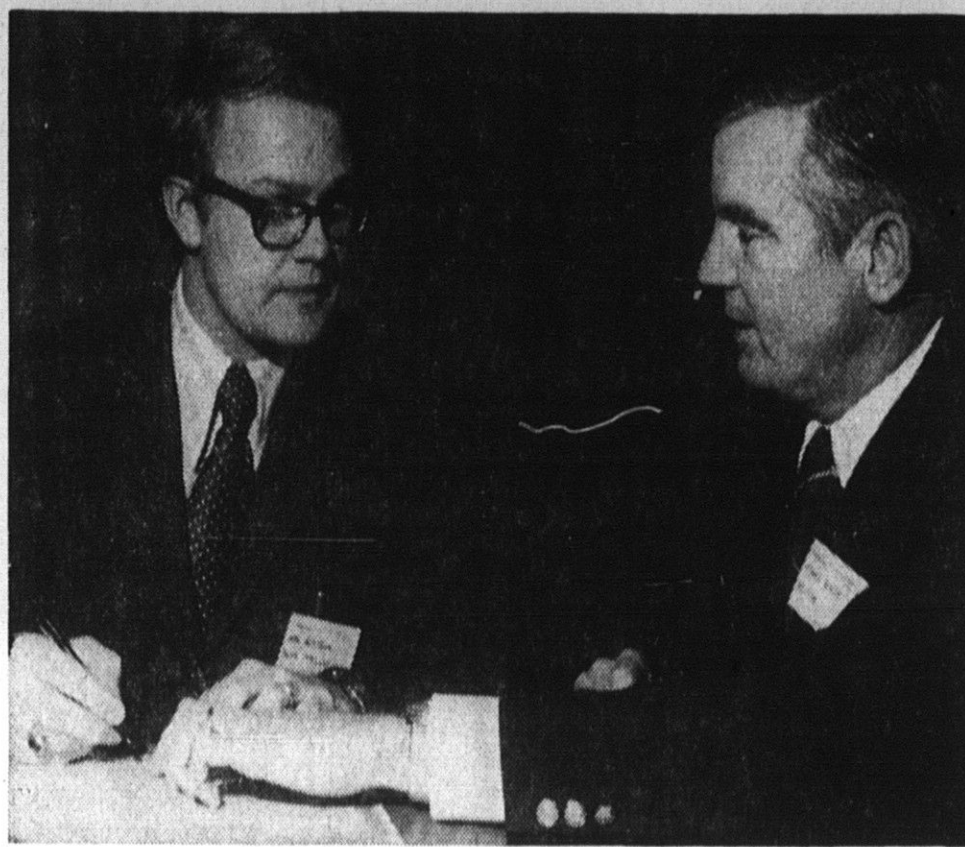

Hope Debaters Wins 7 in 12 In State Tourney

The Hope College debate squad won seven of 12 debates and received several speaking awards while competing in the Michigan Intercollegiate Speech League tournament at Ferris State College.

The affirmative team of Mike Cooper, a junior from Hersey, and Vicki Ten Haken, a senior from Birmamwood, Wis., were undefeated, beating teams from Ferris, the University of Detroit and Central Michigan University. They received "superior" certificates with Cooper being ranked the sixth best speaker in the tournament which was comprised of 100 contestants.

The negative team of Rudy Broekhuis, a sophomore from Holland, and Charles Gossett, a senior from Cherry Hill, N.J., won two of three debates defeating teams from the University of Michigan and Western Michigan University while losing to a squad from St. Clair Community College.

Another affirmative team of Sue Smith, a sophomore from Kalamazoo, and Kris Brundige, a freshman from Three Rivers, won two of three debates. They defeated teams from Ferris and Kellogg Community College but lost to the University of Detroit.

A negative team of Geraldine Tensen, a freshman from Ravenna, and Tom Doerr, a freshman from Dover, N.J., was winless in three matches.

The debaters were accompanied by Peter Schakel, associate professor of English, and Chad Busk, a former member of the debate team.

Office Fire Damage Set At \$80,000

GRAND RAPIDS (UPI) — A fire Thursday in a suite of doctor's offices on the seventh floor of the Michigan Towers Doctors Office Complex here caused an estimated \$80,000 damages, city fire officials said today.

The fire, which started about 5:14 p.m. and brought under control some two hours later, occurred in offices used by Dr. Frederick A. Doornbos.

Fire dispatcher Paul Burch said no one was injured in the blaze but that Doornbos had "to come through a wall of flame to get out of his office."

The fire was believed to have started when a nurse dropped a gallon jug of Benzene, a solvent, and called a janitor to clean it up with a vacuum. Burch said a spark from the vacuum ignited and the flames spread through the carpeted office.

"I understand the man who worked the vacuum got the hair on his arm singed but did not require hospitalization," Burch said.

Authorities said damage to the building was \$50,000 and \$30,000 to contents.

Residents, Workers
Commended in Putting
Goal at 101 Per Cent

The Greater Holland United Fund with an eight per cent increase in its goal over last year went over the top Monday.

Campaign chairman Don Hann said preliminary reports showed pledges and contributions were \$224,207 or 101 per cent of the \$221,636 goal.

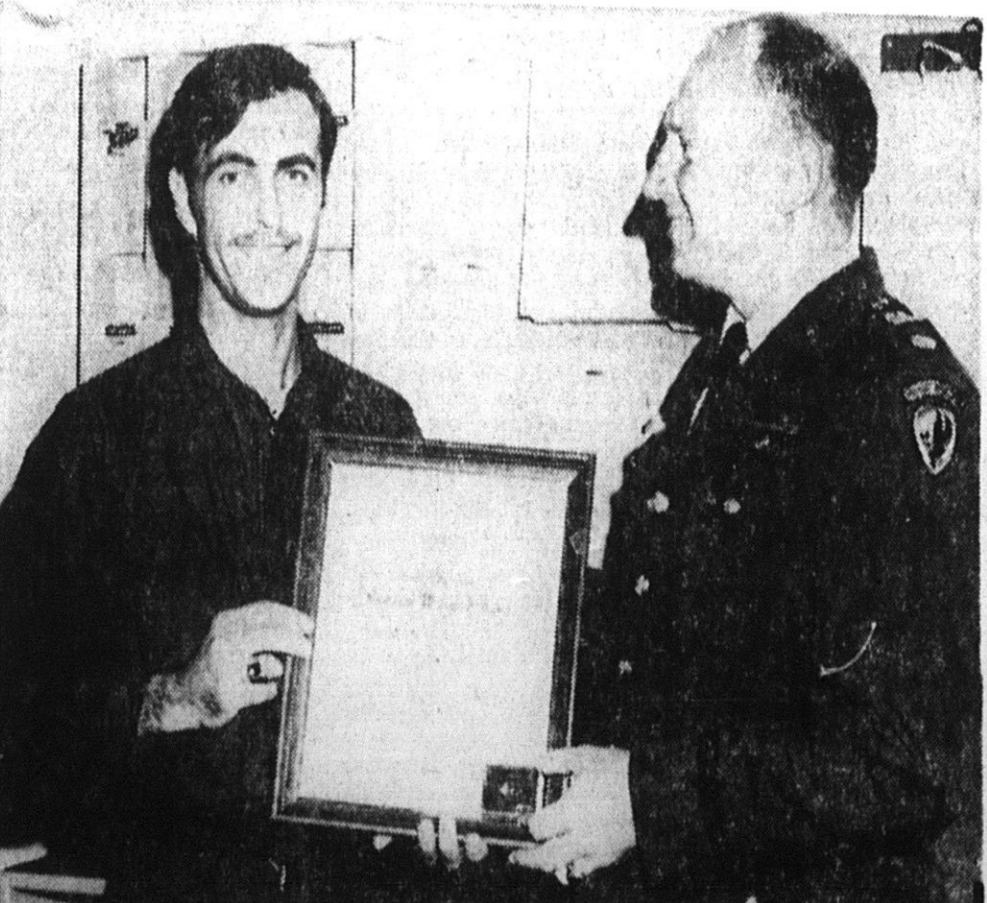

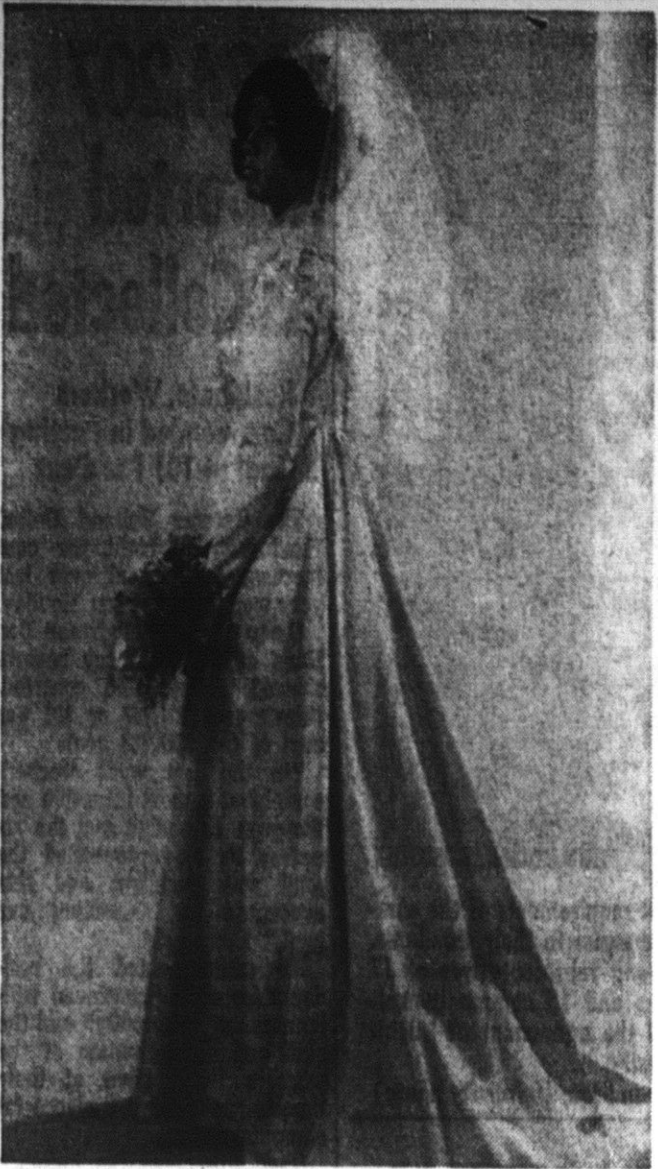

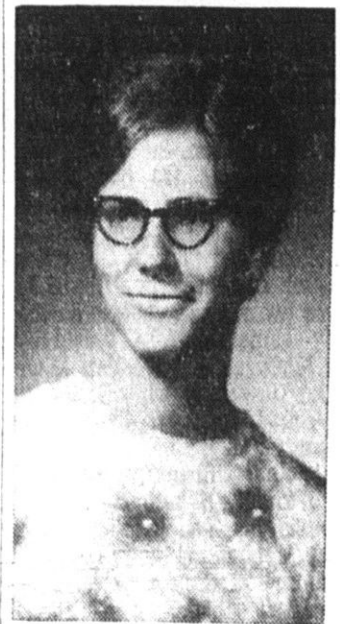

Langtry Book Provides Fascinating Program

An unusually large crowd gathered in the Woman's Literary Clubhouse Tuesday afternoon for Mrs. Edward Donovan's review of the book, "Because I Loved Him," by Noel B. Gerson on the life and loves of Lillie Langtry, a famous beauty and actress, an iconoclast who wilfully smashed traditions in the Victorian era.

Growing up in a minister's household with six brothers, Lillie felt the only way to escape boredom on the Isle of Jersey in the English channel was to marry and that she did. She fell in love with a yacht and married the owner in 1874 when she was 20.

Mrs. Donovan gave the review her own dimension of humor, commenting on the mode of living in those days, how Lillie was always circumspet in her early days as a PB (professional beauty) and her associations with people of high rank including the Prince of Wales, later to become Edward VII. She became known as Jersey Lily when the artist John Everett Millais painted her holding a crimson lily from her native Jersey.

Lillie's marriage deteriorated as she moved into higher circles, became the leading style setter and was showered with gifts and jewelry. The scandal broke when Lillie at a ball given by Lord Randolph Churchill dropped a piece of ice down the Prince of Wales' collar. Dropped by society, Lillie was offered a stage role, but she returned to Jersey and gave birth to a daughter before taking stage offers.

Launching her career in 1881 as Kate Hardcastle in "She Stoops to Conquer," Lillie Langtry went on to become one of the most famous actresses of all time, touring Europe and America and commanding huge sums of money. She was the first woman to endorse soap for a commercial.

Her associations with the great and near great, her talent as an actress and her beauty made her household words. It was a chance remark on shipboard to Somerset Maugham that supplied the title to the book. She told him the most celebrated man in two hemispheres was Fred Gebhard. Why, asked Maugham in surprise, was Gebhard so famous? "Because I loved him," Lillie said.

But she did not marry Geb-

hard although she became an American citizen in order to divorce Langtry. Perhaps she was concerned for the welfare of her daughter and feared what Langtry might do. Gebhard married another and Lillie at 46 eventually married Hugo de Bathe, then 27. It was not a happy marriage but after the death of Hugo's father, Lillie became Lady de Bathe.

The marriage of Lillie's daughter to a high born man led to a rift with her daughter because Lillie's famous and infamous actress was not accepted by high society. They were reunited in later life when Lillie had four grandchildren.

Throughout her life, Lillie heeded the advice of Gladstone never, never to defend herself on any charges in the newspapers. When she died Feb. 12, 1929, at 75, an editorial in the New York Herald-Tribune said it all, "An era has come to an end."

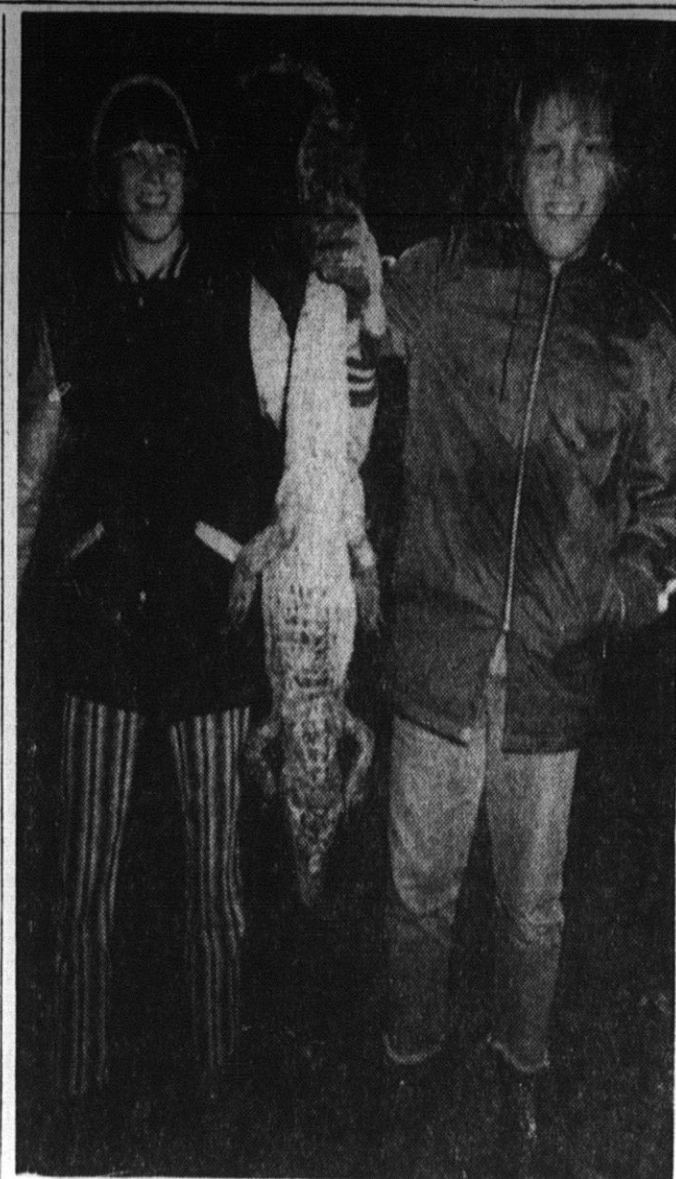

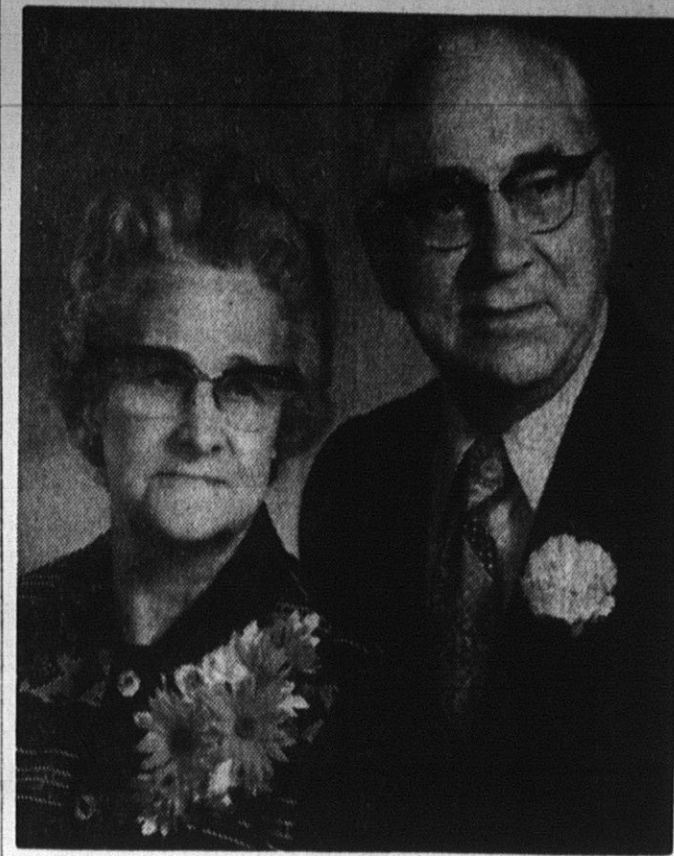

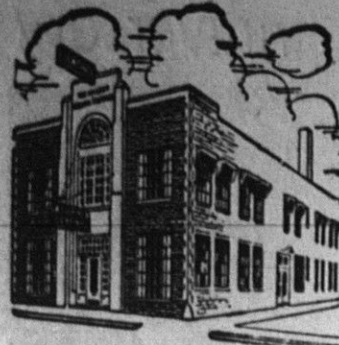

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HOW THE POLLS HAVE CHANGED

Political polling has come a long ways over the past few decades. Many persons still on the voting lists remember well the time when pollsters seeking to predict electoral outcomes were not taken very seriously, and with rather good reason. By now the polls, using scientific sampling techniques, can boast of the remarkable accuracy of their forecasts.

Dr. George Gallup describes the Gallup Poll's final pre-election survey this year as "the most accurate in the history of nationwide polling in the United States." He tells us that the forecast was within 0.2 percentage points of the actual outcome in the presidential race.

That strikes us as, quite simply, an amazing improvement on performance in the early days of polling. As to what the purpose of it all is, what value other than satisfaction of curiosity there is in knowing about how things are going a few days ahead of the voting, that is another matter.

NO ELECTRICITY—NO CLEAN-UP

An article in a trade magazine, with the somewhat dubious title of "A 'Garbage Dump' That Doesn't Smell," tells of the nation's first compost plant — an odorless, pollution-proof, nuisance-free garbage disposal unit. It was opened in 1966 as a modern "garbage dump." It was designed to convert 100 tons of rubbish to compost or soil conditioner daily.

The plant is a five-story facility utilizing conveyor belts to process and digest the raw garbage, combining bacterial action, grinding and heat, and two weeks of curing to produce the compost, which was sold as weak fertilizer and mulch. The plant was built with private capital; and, by the time the "bugs" were worked out of it, it cost more than \$2 million.

The point of the story is that the grinding mechanism and other machinery in this modern garbage dump are powered by some 44 electric motors. The motors depend upon electric energy from the local power company. As the years pass, pollution control and environmental preservation are destined to be among the heaviest consumers of electric power.

In plain English, there could be no clean-up job, no modern garbage dumps without electric energy. Passing one set of laws to clean up the environment and another set of laws obstructing electric power development, is like entering a man in a foot race — and cutting off a leg at the starting line.

What Kind of Peace?

Micah 4:1-4; Matthew 24:6-8; James 4:1-3

The word "peace" is found on placards, car bumpers, newspapers and magazines and yet wars and conflicts are common. When will peace come? Will it ever come? We do not know when, but we do know it will come in the future because God wills it.

I. Cod plans a peaceful world. Three passages of Scripture comprise the lesson text and we will look at them one at a time. Micah, one of the minor prophets ministered from 740 to 690 B. C. Isaiah and Hosea were his contemporaries. Micah and Isaiah preached in the south, while Amos and Hosea were in the north. At that time, Assyria was making conquests, having overrun Syria and Israel and threatening Judah. It was in that warlike age the prophet spoke of a warless world. God spoke through Micah.

Micah 3 closes with a sad note, but chapter 4 hopefully points to a great future. This future will be characterized by the worship of God, the complete rule of God, the response of the people to the teaching of God and a time of peace in which the weapons of war will be transferred into instruments of peace. This peace will not come through education or science but through obedience to God.

II. Jesus will come again to this world. One day Jesus was walking with His disciples from the temple to its building to the Mount of Olives. When the disciples said something about the buildings, Jesus said that not one stone would be left upon the other. As the group sat on the slope of the mountain, the disciples asked Jesus about the future and He gave them some facts. Wars, earthquakes and famines would come and the love of many would grow cold but the Lord assured them saying that "he who endures to the end will be saved." Jesus will come in person. Some believe the end of the world is drawing near and Jesus will judge mankind.

III. People bring about wars. James, in his epistle which he wrote about the year 60 A. D., told about the conflicts which existed in the early church, not about national conflicts. The causes of personal and national conflicts are the same human passions, and covetousness is one of them. The disagreements in families, in business, in labor and in politics spring from the human heart. World peace will come when God's new humanity is here, living under the control of God's Spirit.

Peace in the heart comes about through faith in Jesus as Saviour and Lord. Do you have this peace which is a heavenly gift?

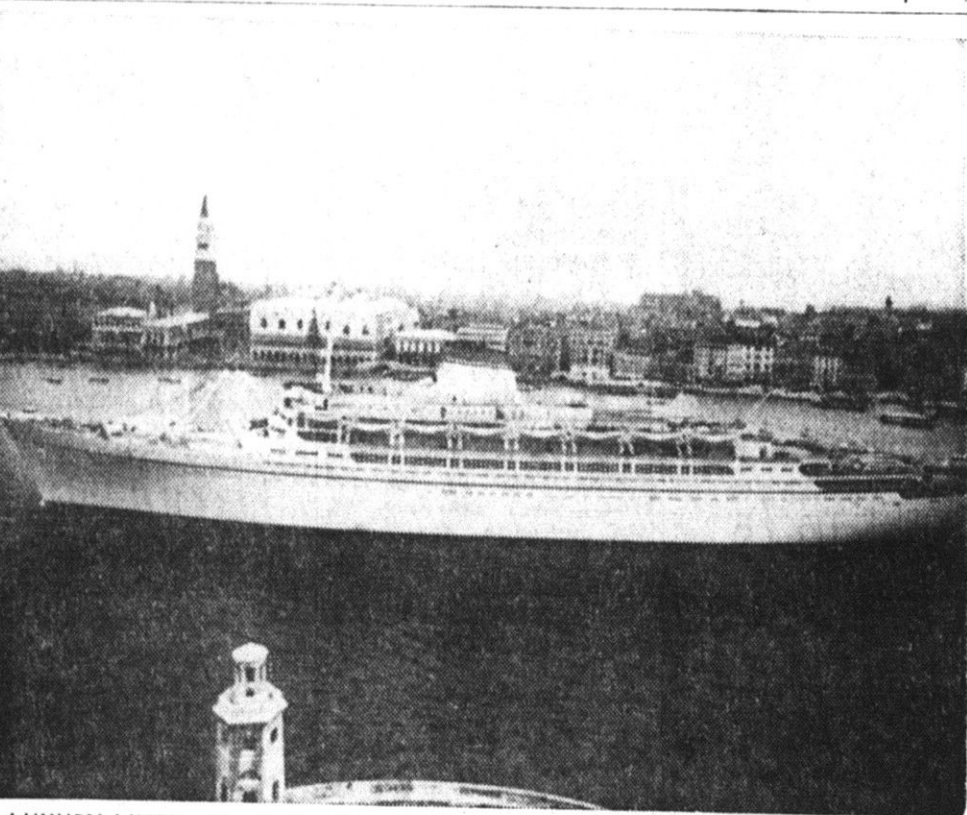

England, Greece Added To Hope Summer School

Leisurely transatlantic travel to the Mediterranean on Italian luxury liners will be only one of the innovations included in plans for study and tour programs announced by Dr. Paul G. Fried, Hope College director of International Education.

Next summer, students wishing to travel and study in Europe will have a wide choice of options on when, where, how and how long they wish to travel or study.

For the first time Hope will offer academic work both in England and Greece. Students interested in contemporary English drama will be able to earn three semester hours of credit in a course which will be taught by Dr. John Hollenbach of the Hope English faculty, in London. Those wishing to devote time to the study of Greek Civilization will be able to earn three semester hours of credit in the course offered by Dr. Wilson Strand of the Hope history faculty in Greece.

The group going to England will fly from New York, May 30. On arrival in London students will be met by Dr. and Mrs. Hollenbach who will be in England during the spring semester. While in England students will see eight to ten plays in London, Stratford, and a provincial theater, and they will have opportunities for weekend travel into the English countryside. Housing will be in a resident hotel or inn. Reading and discussion of plays, backstage visits, conversations with directors and actors are included in the plans for this program which is scheduled in London June 22.

Students enrolled in the Greek Civilization program will sail from New York on May 31 on the SS Colombo with Dr. and Mrs. Strand who spent the

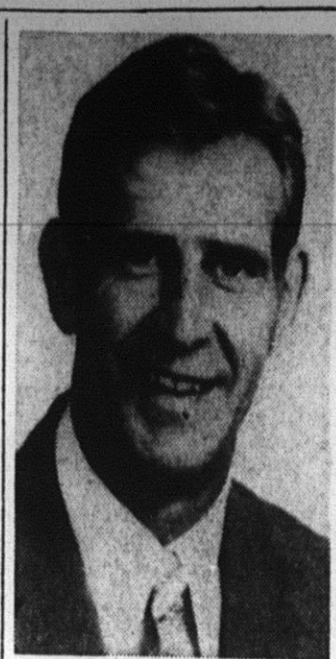
academic year 1971-72 in Athens. En route to Greece they will briefly stop in Portugal, Spain and Italy and they will use the 11-day crossing to prepare for their Greek experience. After short periods of residential study in Athens and on the island of Poros students will travel by bus and boat to a number of Greek islands and gain a firsthand impression of Mycenaean and Minoan civilizations. Visits to Knossos, Phaistos and other historic sights are included in plans for this program which will end in Athens.

Concurrently with these new academic programs in England and Greece Hope will also continue to offer the traditional non-credit travel program. Those who want to combine aspects of a leisurely Mediterranean cruise with a brief West European study tour, will sail with Dr. Paul Fried from New York on the Italian Line ship SS Raphaelo June 8. One day each on the islands of Madeira and Malta, as well as shore visits to Naples, Pompeii, Rome, Genoa, Florence and Pisa are included in the cruise program. Students will leave the ship in Cannes and will proceed from there by bus through southern Liechtenstein and Austria on their way to Vienna.

As usual, there will also be an opportunity for students to come directly to Vienna on their own for the academic session if they are not interested in the preliminary study or travel programs.

The Hope Vienna Summer School, now in its 18th year, will run from July 2 to Aug. 10. Courses in art history, music literature, European literature, and Austrian history will be offered in English. All students will also take part in German conversation classes. Courses in intermediate German and in sociology will be added to the schedule if there is enough student interest in them.

Mrs. C. Lethen Shows Collection Of Shaving Mugs

The Jane Steketee Chapter of Quilters met Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Charles A. Lethen of Lake Shore Rd. in Douglas.

Mrs. Lethen collects scuttle mugs or shaving mugs which resemble coal scuttles. The history of scuttle mugs is the history of the beard. The Indians shaved with tomahawks, woodsmen used axes, while sailors used sharpened whalebones.

Later on soap was introduced to aid in the removal of whiskers. Something was needed to hold the soap and the hot water to mix with the soap so the shaving mug came into existence. In the 1830s the first shaving mugs made their appearance. The safety razor, accompanied by brushless shaving cream or stick soap, spelled the end of the shaving mug.

In the gay 90s England, Germany and Austria shipped many mugs to the United States. Many of the European mugs were sent undecorated, and American artists painted the name, number, or depicted the occupation of the mug's owner. Occupational mugs were more expensive then, and they are still more valuable today.

In the barbershops, where a shave cost 10 cents and a haircut 15, it was considered a status symbol for a man to have his own personal mug. It was also more hygienic, as it helped prevent "barber's itch."

Mrs. Lethen presented her collection. Shaving mugs, from the simple open type to the most complicated with removable tops and handles which could be switched for the left-handed, are represented in the collection. The mugs came in many different shapes, sizes, and colors. This helps to make them fun to collect.

Mrs. Lethen has scuttle mugs in the form of a dolphin, a monkey, a swan, a shell, a clown, a witch and many other shapes. Many of the mugs were found in countries with a British background by the Lethens as they traveled about the world, and so serve as souvenirs as well as collectables. Although the mugs are still used in some countries, they are becoming increasingly rare.

Science Center Gets New Name

Peales Don Hard Hats for Tour

"It probably is the first time that a science building has been named for a minister and his wife, but I have always regarded Christianity as a science in that if you follow a precise formula, you are likely to get an equivalent reaction."

So said Dr. Norman Vincent Peale of the Marble Collegiate Reformed Church of New York City at a press conference at Hope College Monday when it was announced that the new Academic Science Center is being named for the Peales.

The Peales were introduced by Hugh De Pree, chairman of the Hope College board of trustees. Mrs. Peale has been a board member for five years.

"If you experiment with faith and the Christian way of life you can be assured of a predictable and satisfactory result," Dr. Peale said.

Mrs. Peale emphasized that she and her husband have always operated as a team, putting herself usually in the background, but in Holland, Mich., the roles are reversed, and on this occasion Dr. Peale comes as "my husband."

The Peales have been associated with the Reformed Church in America since they left the Methodist Church for Marble Collegiate Church in 1932, and Mrs. Peale's special interest in the local college

dates back to that time. She said many people are concerned in sending their children to smaller colleges which put greater emphasis on values, and Hope College and others like it face a whole new era.

Both Dr. and Mrs. Peale previously were awarded honorary degrees by the college.

Earlier, they were presented with hard hats, (yellow for Mrs. Peale and white for her husband) and toured the Academic Science Center hereafter known as the Peale Science Center.

At breakfast this morning with President Gordon J. Van Wylen as host, functions of the new center were explained to the Peales. Participating were Barry L. Werkman, business manager and director of campus planning; Dr. Norman J. Norton, chairman of the Department of Biology; Dr. David Klein, chairman of the Department of Chemistry; Dr. J. Cotter Tharin, chairman of the Department of Geology, and Dr. David G. Myers, chairman of the Department of Psychology.

When the current science building was erected on East 10th St. in the early 1940's, it contained 17,000 feet and had a faculty of six and a total enrollment of 550. The new science center has 55,000 square feet, and a faculty of 26 for 2,124 students.

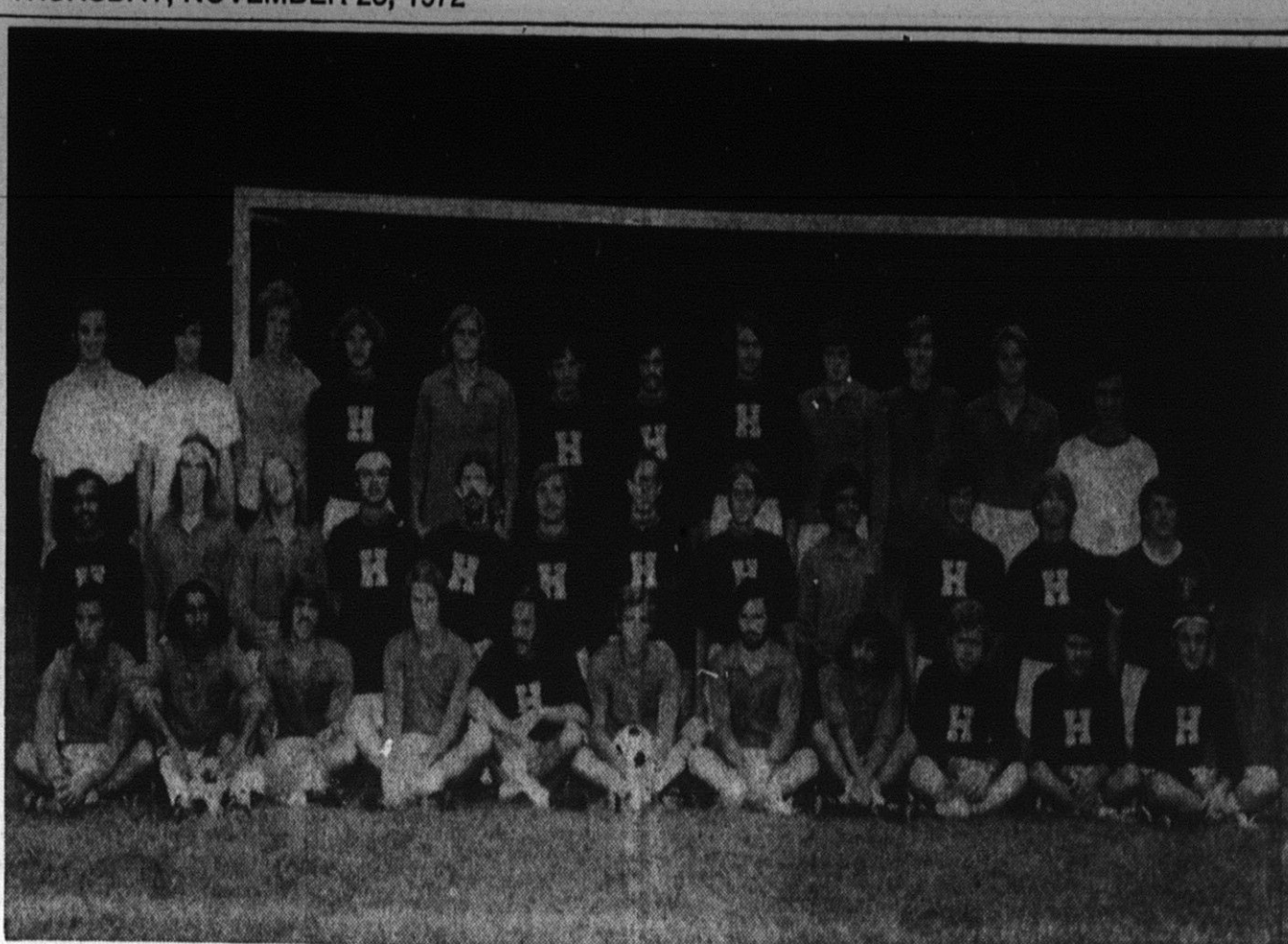

Students Renovate New Residential Center

Members of the Hope College Omega Phi Sorority and Alpha Phi Omega Fraternity volunteered over 100 hours on Saturday, Nov. 18, to clean and paint part of the new Ottawa County Mental Health Residential Center, located at the former West Side Christian School in Holland.

Dr. Floyd Westendorp, Psychiatrist Director, and other members of the Ottawa County Mental Health staff explained the purpose of the facility to neighbors in the 20th and Cleveland area at an open meeting in late October. They said it will become a temporary home for up to 12 men and women from Ottawa County with adjustment problems severe enough to require a special living situation. They pointed out that the average stay at the Center will be about 60 to 90 days.

Professional Mental Health staff, along with trained community volunteers, will be on duty with the residents twenty-four hours a day. Residents will be expected to take an active part in therapeutic programs, both within the Center and throughout the local community.

James McDowall, Center Director, is convinced that Ottawa County people will benefit greatly from the local residents, while county taxpayers will save part of the cost per day for each county patient at the State Hospital.

Dr. Ken Vander Woude, Staff Psychologist, directs the Creative Living Program, based at the Residential Center. Participants meet at least three times weekly for four-hour sessions planned to help them rediscover their personal resources. Creative Living participants enroll through the Mental Health Outpatient Clinic and need not be residents of the Center.

The Hope College volunteers scraped and painted four former classrooms which are being converted into sleeping quarters for residents and into recreational and activities rooms for mental health programs. They also painted the ceiling of the hallway which runs the entire length of the building. Miss Whitehouse of Omega Phi and Mrs. Spitzley of Mental Health Services organized the day's work.

Many other community people have volunteered a considerable amount of service, also. The programs still need a great many items, for example: beds, tables, chairs and dressers for sleeping quarters; rugs, lamps, and wall hangings for the lounge; ironing boards,

dishwasher and utensils for housekeeping; recreational supplies; a complete range of art and craft materials, and many other similar things. Such items as well as much volunteer time, are badly needed. Persons willing to become involved or donate items to the programs are urged to call Community Mental Health Services immediately.

The north wing of the Center houses the offices of the Spanish-Speaking outreach staff, and directors of volunteer, mental retardation, and education programs of Mental Health Services.

The Rev. Ronald Beyer of Christ Memorial Reformed Church offered invocation. An American flag and one of the State of Michigan were raised on poles in front of the plaza facing Eighth St. by honor guards from the Holland Police Department and the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department.

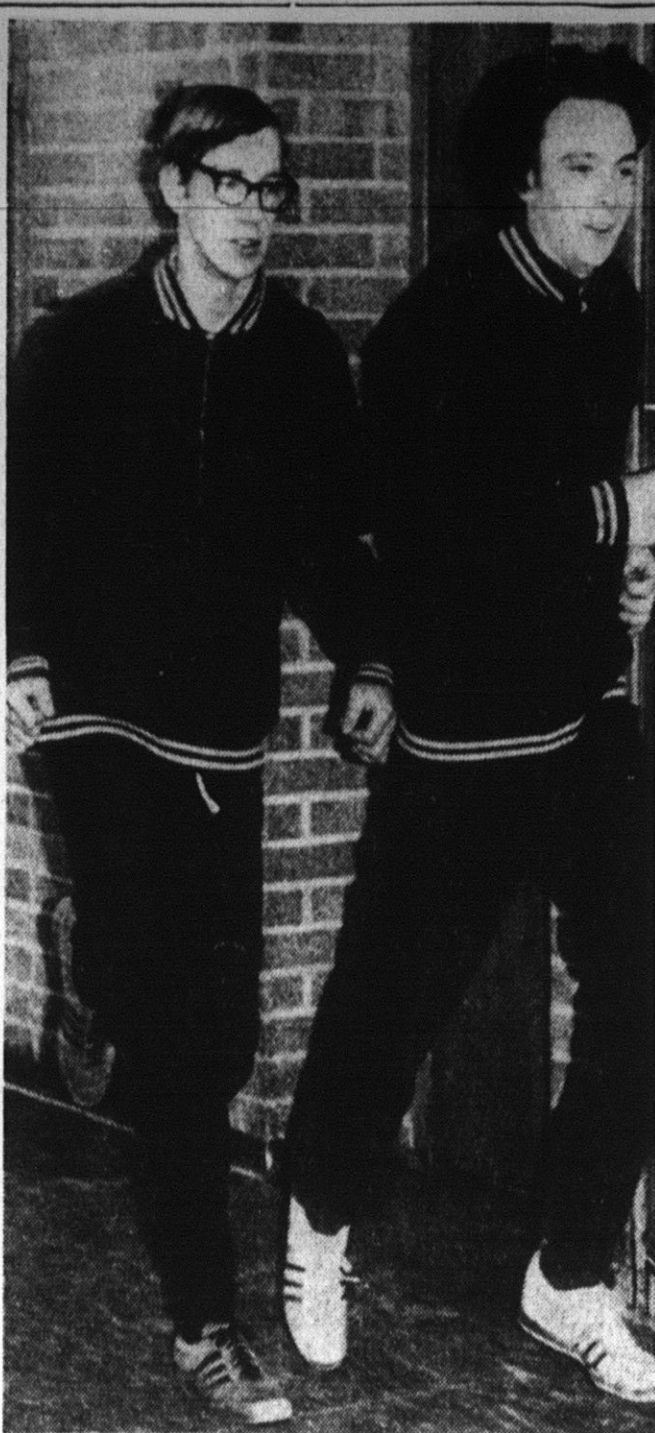

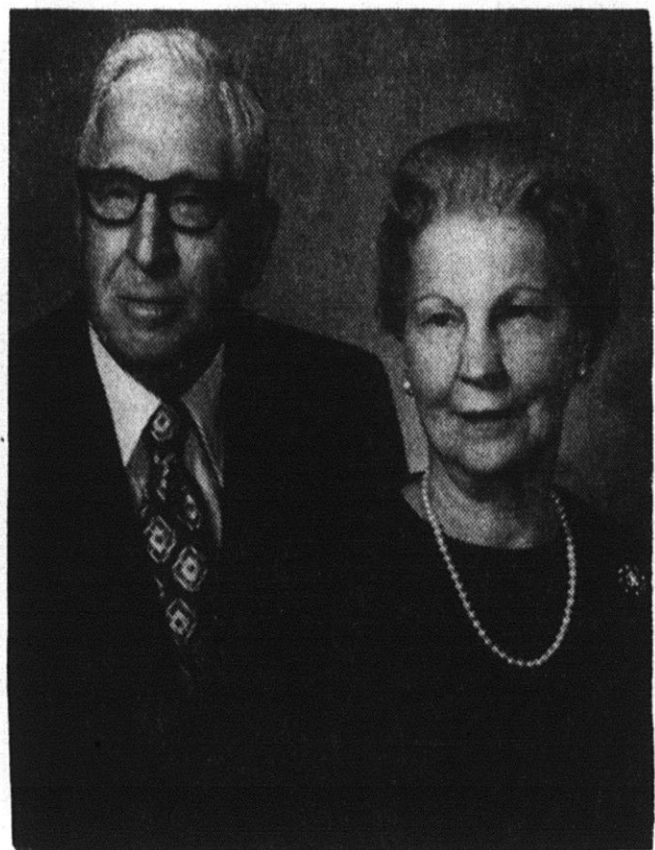

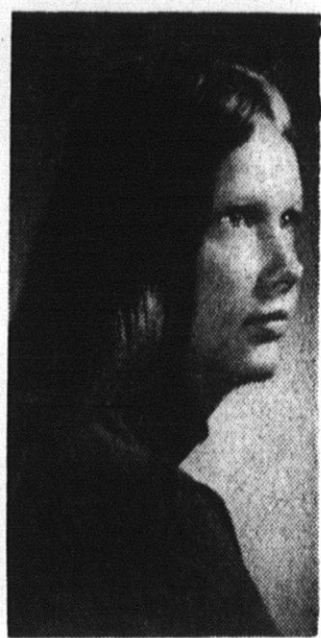

ALBION—To a lot of people's surprise, the Flying Dutchmen of Hope College were picked to finish sixth at the Fifth Annual MIAA Press Day here Thursday.

Olivet College, the league's champs for the past two seasons, were again picked by the coaches as the team to beat in the basketball race this winter.

Calvin College was supposed to finish second, according to the coaches with Albion, a close third.

Alma and Kalamazoo were ranked fourth and fifth with only Adrian coming in behind the Dutchmen.

As the season is about to unfold, the Comets of Coach Gary Morrison hold the second longest winning streak in the nation with 22 straight victories. Only John Wooden's UCLA national champion have a longer winning streak.

"I'm glad that the coaches picked us to win," said Morrison. "It's better than being picked to come in last, like they use to."

"It looks to me that everyone in the league has improved themselves except us," continued Morrison. "If we remain hungry enough, we could take all the marbles again but if we don't it's going to be a wide open race."

The Comets graduated some outstanding players in Mike Maciasz, Rick Clack and Jeff Paradise but have two good ones returning in John Martin and Bill Newhouse.

They also have a huge 6'10" freshman prospect in Fred Livingston from River Rouge. "We all know if he was that good, that some major colleges would have grabbed him," Morrison told the press. "We're just hoping he develops into a fine ball player."

Coach Russ DeVette of Hope faces a major rebuilding task after losing four of his five leading scorers from last year's 11-11 team, including the school's second all-time leading point-getter Dan Shinnabarger.

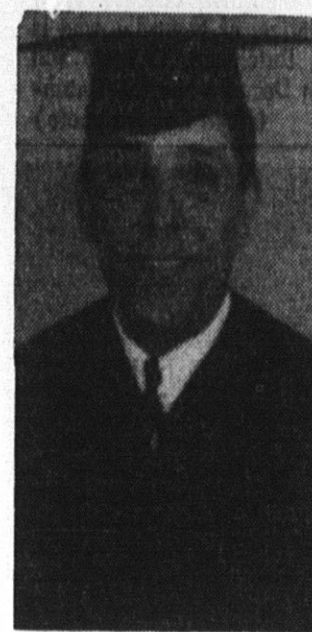

Burial will be in Riverside cemetery here.

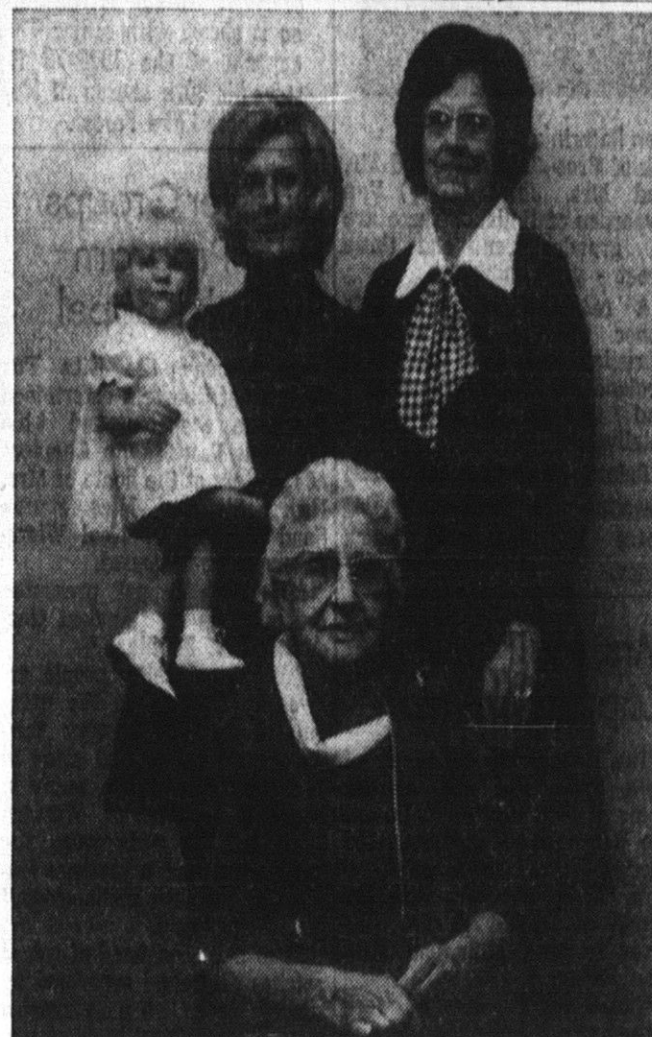

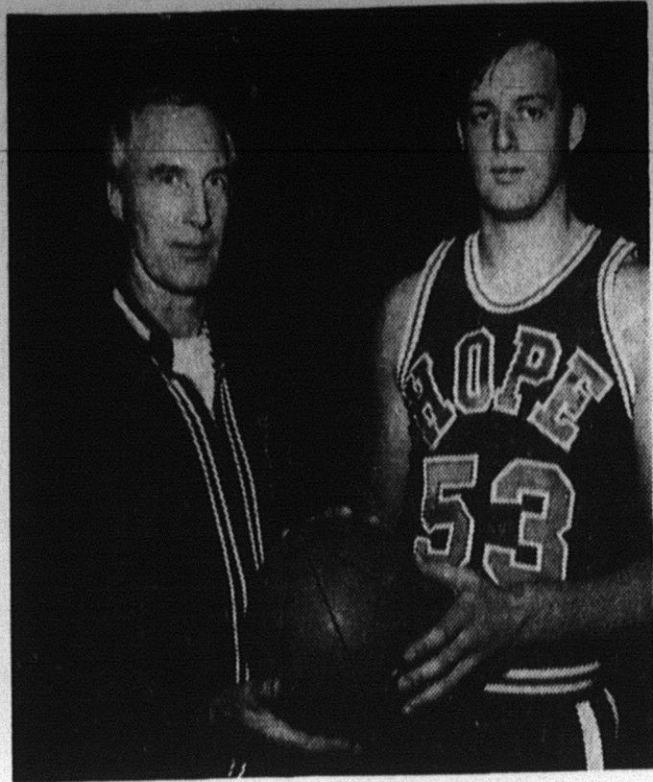

Quester Groups Hear Program By Ruth Keppel

On Monday the Etta Fox Chapter of Questers entertained the Jane Stiektee and the Christine Van Raalte Chapters of Questers at the home of Mrs. Henry Steffens. Miss Emma Sand and Mrs. C. Neal Wiersma were co-hostesses.

Miss Ruth Keppel presented the program on "Ancient Garden Beds of Michigan."

"When the white people arrived in Michigan, in the early part of the 19th century they were surprised to find some 30 of these Garden Beds, many in our own locality of Western Michigan. The beds were the most novel and mysterious features of northern archaeology," Miss Keppel said.

"The beds consisted of raised patches of ground separated by sunken paths. They varied from five to 26 feet in width and 20 to 100 feet in length. The tough sod of the prairie had preserved the outline."

"Michigan's early historian, Henry Schoolcraft, tells us the Garden Beds and not the Indian Mounds are the antiquarian monuments of this state. Garden Beds were found mainly in the valleys of the Grand River and the St. Joseph, where the land was most fertile," she said.

"One of three beds was situated in the city of Kalamazoo where the club house now stands and was wheel shaped, with spokes running out from an inner to a second circular ridge. The largest one covering 120 acres was near Three Rivers in St. Joseph County."

"J. Fenimore Cooper, who wrote his book 'Oak Openings' while living in Plainwell, tells of a place near Kalamazoo called 'Prairie Round,' the locality of one of the historic Garden Beds. He calls the County of St. Joseph the 'Gardens of America.'"

"It is regrettable that these great wonders of our state the Garden Beds could not have been preserved as a monument of an early race of Americans but instead our forefathers replaced them to make room for their farms," she concluded.

Miss Keppel's article appeared in a book published by the National Garden Clubs entitled "Pioneer American Gardens."

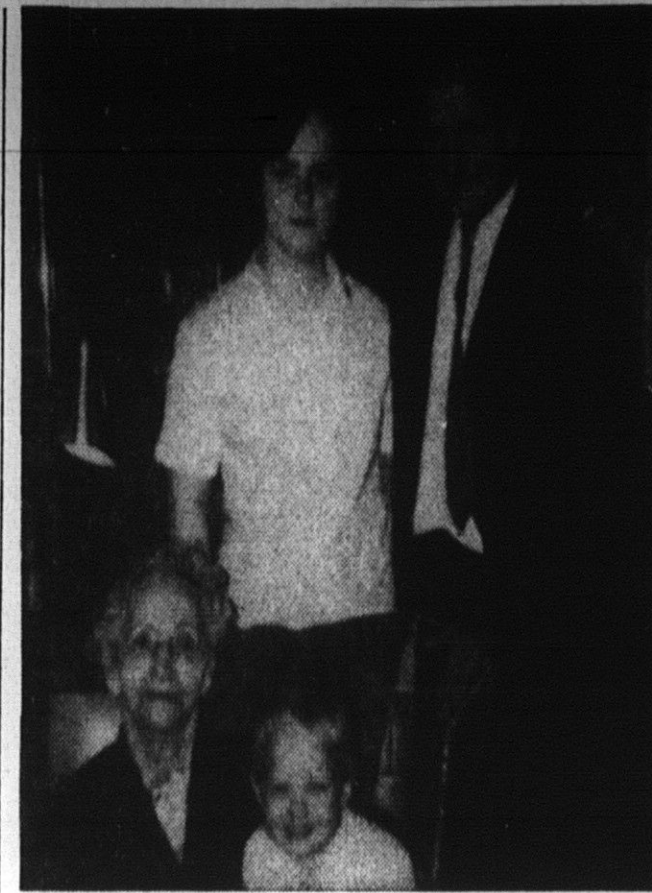

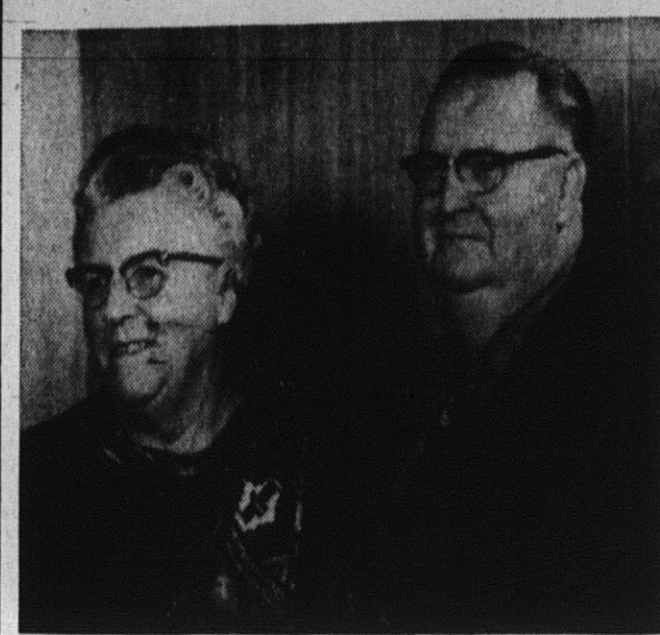
