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Hope Campaign Reaches \$29,327

Business and professional leaders of Holland and Zeeland have contributed \$29,327.98 to Hope College, it was announced today by Clarence J. Becker and Robert Den Herder, community fund chairmen for the annual Holland and Zeeland Community Fund Programs.

Becker announced that 108 gifts or pledges totaling \$25,722.98 were given by the Holland community. Zeeland chairman Den Herder announced receipt of 13 gifts totaling \$4,605.00 to date.

Hugh De Pree, chairman of Hope College's Planning and Development Committee, noted that 52 of the 121 gifts received were given by donors who did not support the college in last year's fund program.

President Vander Werf praised Becker and Den Herder for their effective chairmanship of the Community Program and thanked all the workers for their dedication to Hope's role in higher education.

The report indicates that two-thirds of the calls have already been made by community leaders to business and professional men in the two areas, and 50 more gifts are expected to be reported to the development office during the remainder of the month.

The funds, which are used to defray increased operational costs of the college, help significantly to keep the tuition and fees in line with that paid by the historic student body that attends Hope.

Winter Tax Bills Mailed In Holland

Holland winter tax bills were mailed Monday afternoon, and most include slight increases, according to City Assessor Alwin De Haan.

The bills include general county taxes, intermediate school district taxes and special education taxes for Ottawa and Allegan Counties and special assessments for Holland.

Some residents in Hamilton, New Groningen and Federal school districts will also receive school tax bills. Residents in the Holland school district pay school taxes in the summer.

The total rate for taxes in Ottawa County this year is \$8.67 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. This is an increase of 11 cents over last year's rates.

Residents in Allegan County will pay a total of \$12.60 or \$12.53 depending on whether they live in the Holland or Hamilton school district. The two districts are located in different intermediate school districts, and therefore have different tax rates.

Allegan County tax rates are increased \$1.77 this year mainly because of a \$1.08 sinking fund approved by Allegan County voters last summer.

The total levy to be collected for Ottawa County is \$525,674.80. The total for Allegan County is \$99,582.82.

Holland Voters Okay Schools, Swimming Pool

Three new elementary school buildings and an indoor swimming pool were assured for Holland today, following a special school election Tuesday in which all four propositions submitted carried with fairly comfortable margins.

12 Permits For Building Filed Here

A total of 4,673 voters went to the polls in an election in which the turnout was regarded as moderate. In all, there are 11,765 registered in Holland school district. There is no breakdown on property owners, but experience has shown that in elections involving bonding programs, about 80 per cent of the voters turning out are property owners.

Proposition I, calling for a \$1 million bond issue to replace the old sections of Van Raalte and Longfellow schools and build a new Maplewood school, carried 2,678 to 1,851.

Proposition II, calling for a \$500,000 bond issue to build an indoor swimming pool at the southwest corner of 22nd St. and Maple Ave., carried 2,467 to 2,053. The swimming pool will be operated by the Board of Education with advisement of a Board of Control, representing all schools.

Proposition III, calling for a quarter-mill for three years to finance pool operations, carried 2,468 to 2,038.

Proposition IV which consolidates school district indebtedness carried 2,572 to 1,772. In recent school district annexations, new districts entering the Holland system had retained their own debt while local residents retained its high school debt. Tuesday's action puts all residents of the district on the same school tax levy.

To be effective, both second and third propositions on swimming pool bonds and operational millage were required to carry. School Supt. Donald L. Ihrman said today that architects will proceed with working plans on schools and pool and the board would be consulting attorneys on the sale of bonds. The board expects to let bids on schools in the spring.

Township Tax Bills Mailed

About 5,800 tax bills for property owners in Holland township were in the mail Monday, according to Glenn Van Rhee, treasurer of Holland township.

The total levy this year is \$965,340.62, compared with \$834,829.95 last year. Total assessed valuation in the township is \$14,783,000. The state equalized valuation is \$34,866,746.

Township residents receive one tax bill a year, covering county, township and school taxes, plus special assessments where they apply.

Most of the township lies in the West Ottawa school district. The tax vote for these property owners is \$67.57 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, compared with \$65.02 last year.

Parts of the township lie in four other school districts. The tax rate for Federal district is \$44.22 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, compared with \$41.87 last year. Tax rate in New Groningen district is \$47.87, compared with \$44.20 last year.

Tax rate for that part of the township in Zeeland school district is \$58.47, compared with \$53.24 last year. Rate for East Holland is \$43.87, or 10 cents over the 1964 rate of \$43.77.

Payment dates are Dec. 10 through Feb. 15 at the township office at 373 North 120th Ave. Week day hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday hours are 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. After Feb. 15, a penalty will be added.

Treasurer Van Rhee suggests that dog owners obtain dog licenses at the same time they pay taxes. These licenses are available Dec. 10 and later.

Re-elected directors were Dr. Laverne Van Kley and Cecil Terpstra while Al Westenbroek was elected a director. Terms are for three years.

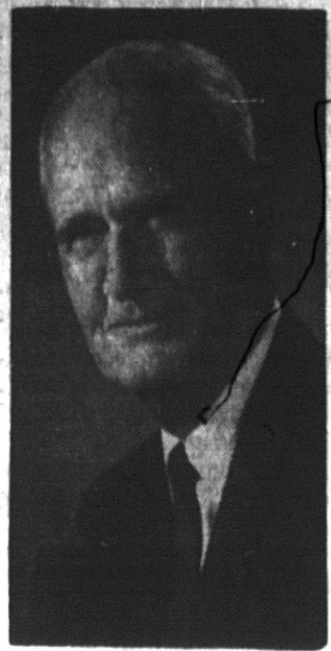

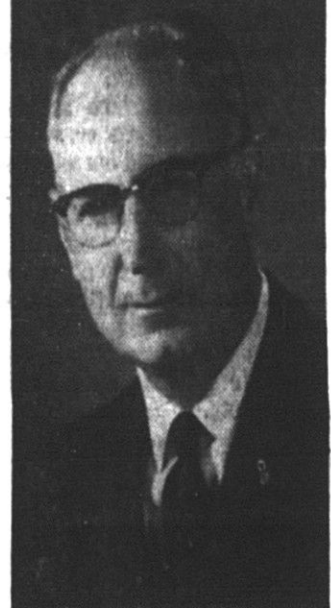
The approaching retirement of two top executive officers of Peoples State Bank of Holland was announced today as well as promotions of two others to succeed them.

of the board, and Clarence Jalving, president, are retiring, effective Dec. 31. The two have served the bank in their present positions for 12 years and have been the two top executive directors of the bank for 33 years. They will retain their financial interests in the bank and continue as members of the board.

Clarence Klaasen has been promoted to chairman of the board and L.C. Dalman to president. Klaasen joined the bank in 1931 as assistant cashier, later was promoted to assistant vice president and in 1953 was named a vice president and director. He also is a vice president of Home Furnace Co.

Dalman, who started his banking career in 1931, came to the bank here from Muskegon in 1933 as an assistant cashier. He also was promoted to assistant vice president and then was named a vice president and director in 1953. He also is a member of the board of directors of Slick Craft Boat Co.

Tinhoft and Jalving have been associated with the bank since 1932 when Tinhoft became chairman of the depositors committee and Jalving was named receiver. They were instrumental in reorganizing the bank in 1933 when Tinhoft became its first president and Jalving was named vice president and cashier.

Under their direction the bank has shown steady and consistent growth with its resources having increased from \$824,327.81 to \$26,978,570.18.

The present continuing branch expansion program of the bank was developed under their guidance. The northside branch was opened in 1960 and the Ninth St. drive-in branch last May. A southside branch is nearing completion.

Tinhoft is a trustee of the Greater Holland Community Foundation. He served 20 years as a trustee of the Pine Rest Christian Hospital at Cutlerville and for six years was a member of the board of trustees of Calvin College in Grand Rapids. Set Hearing For Hoffman

ALLEGAN — Leo Hoffman, a court-appointed lawyer who refused to defend a lawyer seeking a new trial, will appear in Circuit Court to answer contempt charges Jan. 12.

Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith Monday set the date for the precedent-setting hearing which will be watched with interest by attorneys across the state and nation.

Hoffman was appointed to represent Ernest B. Sandefur, 47, who had appealed a 20-year sentence for second degree murder in the slaying of his son, Clayton, in 1962.

After studying the case, Hoffman refused to defend Sandefur, indicating the defendant was not entitled to another trial. He said "If my action is contrary to requirements of the state bar, let someone complain and we can test it."

Smith appointed Lester J. Tooman to represent Sandefur and ordered a hearing on contempt charges against Hoffman.

In his official report to the court, Hoffman said he had carefully reviewed Sandefur's case and could find "no reason or ground to file a motion for a new trial or take an appeal."

Sandefur sought a new trial under "quickie justice" act of the Michigan constitution. Hoffman said Sandefur had been properly advised of his constitutional rights when he voluntarily entered a plea of guilty, the decree was properly determined by the court and the sentence was proper.

"At the time," Hoffman said "there might well be cases in which an accused has been denied his constitutional rights or otherwise has grounds for a new trial, but I can see no reason for further burdening the taxpayers with the cost of such proceedings in every case," he said.

ZEELAND — Michigan servicemen in Viet Nam will each find a can of Dutch Chocolate Metreel when they open packages prepared by the Michigan Christmas in Viet Nam Committee.

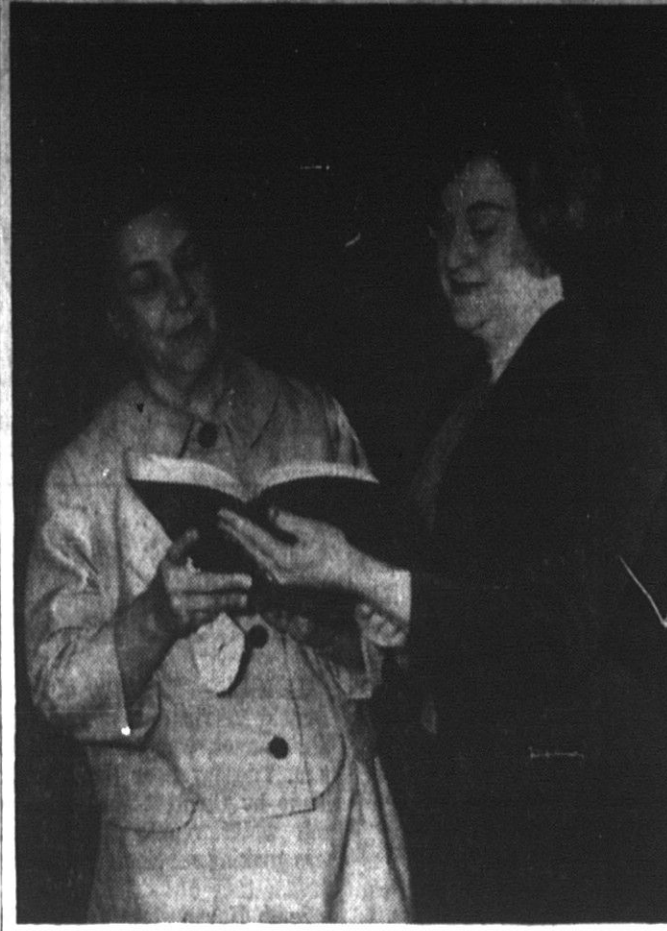

Finance Talk Heard by Club

A talk on state financing was given by Frederick Hilbert to the members of the Holland Exchange Club at Monday's luncheon meeting. He was introduced to the club by Exchangeite Arthur Wich. Mr. Hilbert is one of the few men in our state that is working in the finance department.

The speaker said that only a few projects managed by the state are responsible for most of the money paid out by it. Those departments are the highway department, mental health, welfare, secondary education, and higher education.

The funds spent by the highway department are earmarked and have no regular separate appropriations. Michigan has been in the mental health work since 1859 when the first unit for that purpose was erected in Kalamazoo. The work has grown so fast that the state now spends more for this than for any other project. The welfare department is a much newer enterprise but the load is increasing at a rapid rate.

Mr. Hilbert said that there are provisions for handing out money to departments that might be called open-end operations. These call for certain sums of money which, if inadequate, may be increased. Of these the secondary education department is the most open end. The biggest item here is transportation. Higher education is requiring more funds since more people go on to college and more stay in school.

The speaker emphasized that a great proportion of state expenses are collected in some form of a tax and are handed back to the people. Of the money used by the state 62 per cent comes from the sales tax. There are 37 states in the Union with an income tax. Since needs are growing the tax load will increase.

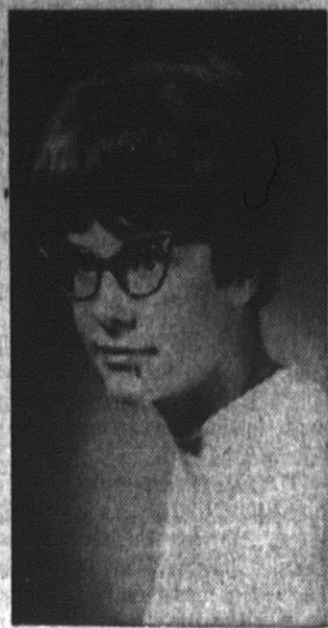

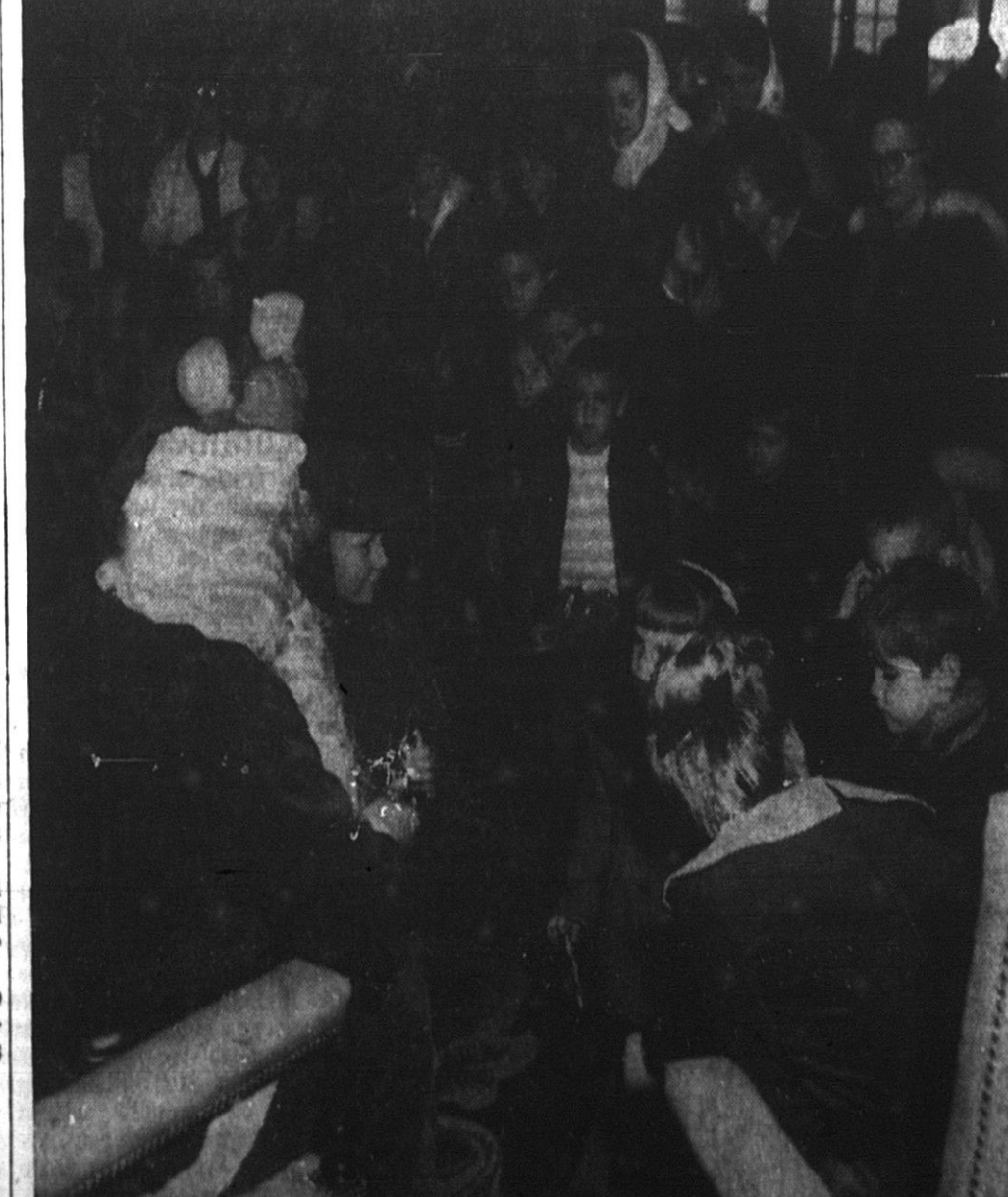

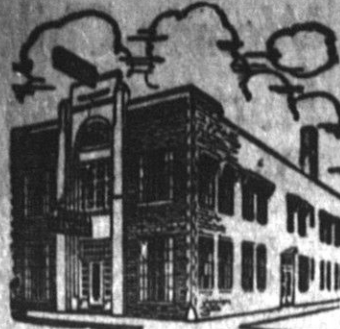

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 12
Joshua
2 Kings 22:1-2; 23:1-5, 25
By C. P. Dame
Young people are much in the public eye today. This lesson tells about a young man who early in life sought the Lord and served Him all through his life. His example is worth following.

I. Doing the right pays in the long run. The more you read about young Josiah, the more you will appreciate him, therefore read, 2 Kings 21, through 23:30 and 2 Chronicles 34, 35.

His father Amon was killed by a conspiracy. Both his father and grandfather, Manasseh, did evil in God's sight. Manasseh was converted late in life, too late to undo his evil deeds. When eight years old Josiah began to reign, most likely under charge of his mother, Jedidah, who turned his mind to God. At the age of 16 he began to seek God. "And he did that which was right in the sight of God, and walked in all the way of David his father," which was praiseworthy.

II. People are still losing the Bible. The temple needed repair and therefore king Josiah ordered it done. While doing this the book of the law of God was found. Perhaps the five books of Moses or a part of Deuteronomy was discovered.

God's Book had gotten lost in God's House! This still happens. In some church buildings the Bible is not seen any more. And the preacher's messages deal with poverty, ecumenicity, church union and kindred subjects and the people no longer hear about salvation.

Upon hearing what had happened the king was shocked and got in touch with the prophetic Huldah and gathered together the spiritual leaders and the people. At this gathering the king read the book and the people promised to keep God's law "with all their heart and souls." This was a fine, noteworthy resolution to take.

III. Church reforms are always in order. The king told the priests to clean out God's House. Evidently they had failed. The priests took out "all the vessels that were made for Baal and for the grove, and for all the host of heaven" and they were burned. The worship of the sun which was the Assyrian religion had also found a place in the Temple.

Think of the apostasy of those times—Baal worship, and sun worship were carried on by God's people. These foreign religions had their own priests and they lost their positions. After the king had cleaned out the temple he pushed his reforms to the country shores. This reformation was the result of the king's loyalty to God. The Bible praises this king highly for his whole-hearted devotion to his God.

One leader who has had a conversion experience and who has committed himself completely to God can do great things for Him. Today there is a great need of leaders of the type of Josiah—they are needed in the state and in the church, leaders who turn to God's Word and tell people what God wants done.

Dutch Set School Mark Of 113 Points

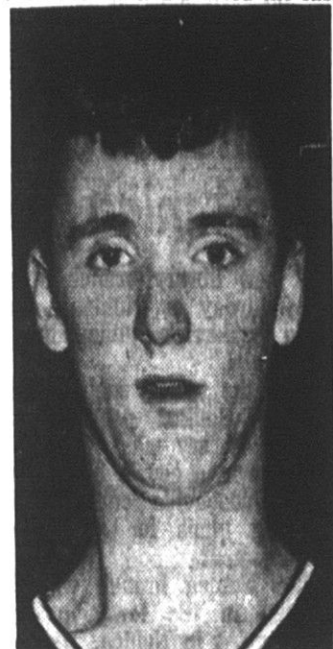
WYOMING — Mike Lawson scored 41 points here Friday night in leading Holland High's basketball team to a record-breaking 113-73 trouncing of Godwin before 1,500 fans in the Godwin fieldhouse.

Lawson enjoyed his greatest basketball night. The 6'10" giant was a Gulliver on the floor against the Wolverines, who didn't have a man over six feet.

And Lawson, following Coach Don Piersma's game plan, made the most of it. The Dutch first succeeded in breaking the expected Godwin press and got the ball to Lawson.

They also were able to use Lawson's size on the defensive boards and he got the fast break in motion. This combination put the Dutch in front 31-18 at the quarter and it was strictly no contest after that.

Holland didn't run a set pattern in the game. They just got the rebound and started the fast

The big senior made tips, a couple of rebound jumps and even two driving layups. In all he sank 18 baskets.

Lawson made six baskets in the first quarter and added seven more two-pointers in the second period. He also had a free throw for 27 points at intermission as Holland led 63-46.

On the boards he snagged eight rebounds in the first quarter, five defensively and five in the second period, two defensively. He was rested with 1:04 in the first period and played all but 17 seconds of the second period.

But he picked up his third and fourth fouls with only 2:10 gone in the third period after scoring the first 12 points of the period and sat out the rest of the quarter. Holland's third period lead was 92-61.

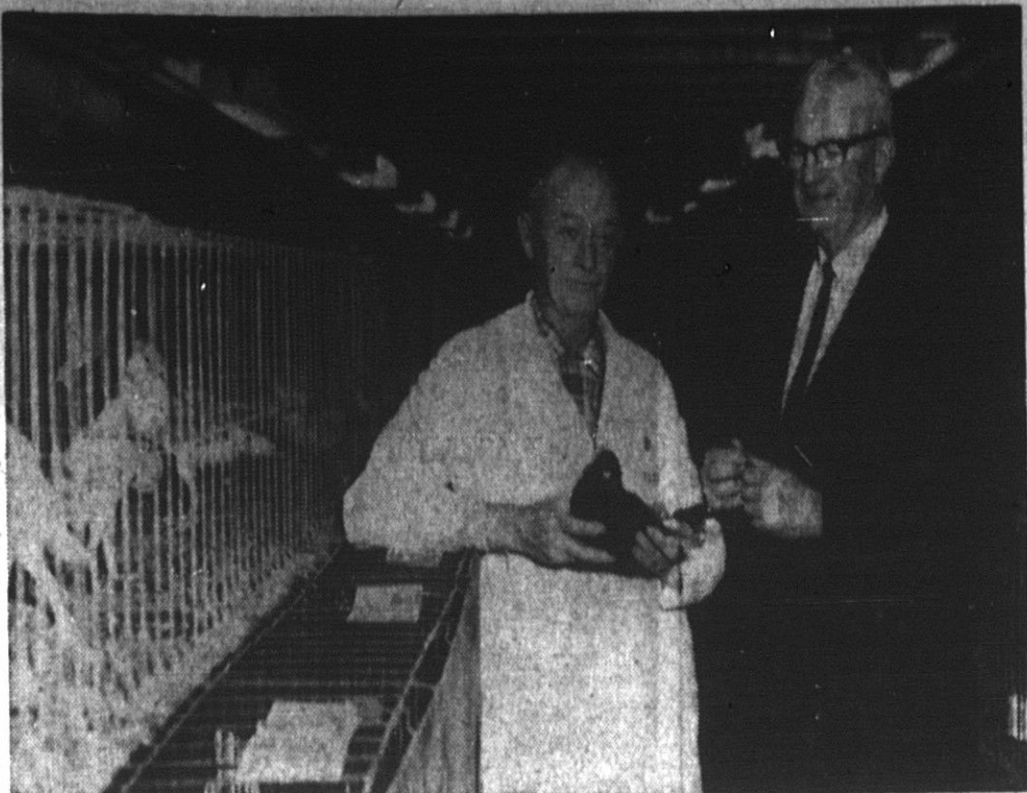

One of the strong suits of Hope's performance was its shooting. The Flying Dutchmen fired 75 times and hit 38 for a fine 51 per cent. Many of the baskets were made off the fast break as the winners showed what their primary offense will be again this year.

Four of the Flying Dutchmen hit in double figures, led by Captain Clare Van Wieren with 25. Don Kronmeyer, who hit five baskets in the final ten minutes including the Hope go-ahead basket with 6:11 to play, had 22.

Floyd Brady, strong on the boards in the second half, picked up 17 points while Carl Walters added 16, mostly on jumpers.

Roy Anker, who joined Brady and Van Wieren on the boards, scored nine points and was credited with six of Hope's 17 defensive rebounds in the first half.

The winners grabbed 20 defensive rebounds in the second half and Brady had nine and Van Wieren seven. Hope had a total of 48 rebounds and Concordia got 31.

Hope used a match up zone defense and a man for man throughout the game, favoring the zone more of the time. After Concordia had taken a 43-42 halftime lead, the Flying Dutchmen opened the second half with nine straight points to take a 51-43 lead.

But Concordia battled back, led by sub guard Bob Castons' five jump shots, and tied the score, 64-64. With 7:18 left, the Cougars took their last lead, 72-69. The game had been tied ten times and one point had separated the teams 11 times, with the lead changing hands four times.

Kronmeyer's jumper at 6:11 put Hope in front. They never again trailed, enjoying margins of one to nine (89-80) the rest of the game.

Maroons Drop East, 67-52 For 1st Win

EAST GRAND RAPIDS—Holland Christian's basketball squad made aggressiveness pay off here Friday night as the Maroons notched its opening win of the season by stopping East Grand Rapids, 67-52 before 1,600 fans in the Pioneer gym.

Christian's win was triggered by an effective all court press and was anchored by some rugged backboard work on the part of the Maroon forward wall. Coach Art Tuls' spirited quintet was an improved outfit over the squad which lost its opener last week as some of the untested sophomores and juniors came through in fine style. However, the only two seniors on the starting five, Jack Berghoef and Les Hulst, led the way with some fine outcourt shooting and great rebounding.

Despite sitting out part of the game with four fouls, Berghoef led all rebounders with 13 besides playing a good floor game and collecting 10 points. Hulst had the best night of his career as he shattered the East zone defense from the outside to collect 24 points on 10 baskets and four charity tosses.

Sophomore Steve Busbouse followed in rebounding with eight just ahead of junior Ken Vander Kamp who pulled off six. In addition, Vander Kamp collected 13 points in his first game as a starter. Tuls also got fine floor games from John Lappenga and Don Hulst, both juniors and soph Lloyd Doezman.

Christians' all court press and variety of defenses caused the Maroons no end of trouble. Besides setting up several interceptions, the Maroon press forced many ball handling violations on the Maroons. Tuls kept the losers off balance all night long with his defenses which featured a zone and a man to man.

Although East was as big as the Maroons, only 6'3" center Ron Kutchinski and forward Scott Ralston, also at 6'3", gave the winners any contest on the boards. Kutchinski performs well out of the pivot slot and notched 15 points, one point less than Tim Conway, a hard driving guard. Both Ralston and Chuck Hiemstra fouled out midway in the last half.

Tuls continued his practice of shuttling in substitutes developing as many of the underclassmen as possible. All showed improvement over the opening game.

The first quarter was a nip and tuck affair with the score being deadlocked five times. East then started to hit from out to take a 14-10 bulge and later upped it to 16-11 at the quarter. Hulst and Berghoef led the Maroons with four points apiece while Conway had seven for East.

It was a similar pattern in the opening minutes of the second quarter with East clinging to a 22-19 lead at the 5:08 mark.

Four Maroon substitutes entered at this point and managed to give the winners a 27-25 edge with 2:55 left. With the count knotted at 29-29 with 1:13 remaining, the Christian starters reentered the game and shoved the Maroons into a 34-29 bulge, an advantage which they never lost.

Led by Hulst and Vander Kamp, Holland upped the count to 40-29 at the 4:29 mark of the third period. A jittery East squad couldn't find the range and blew several easy layups. Conway managed the only East basket of the quarter as Christian outscored the Maroons 15-8 in the stanza to take a 49-37 lead into the last quarter.

East narrowed the count to 49-41 at the start of the last period but never got any closer as Christian maintained sizeable leads for the remainder of the tilt. Christian's biggest bulge was 17 points late in the game.

Christian hit for 28-79 from the field for 35 per cent but only converted 11-24 from the free throw lane. East collected on 12-25 charity tosses.

Christian travels to Zeeland on Tuesday while East takes on Detroit Schafer in Cobo Hall in Detroit tonight.

Views From The Campus

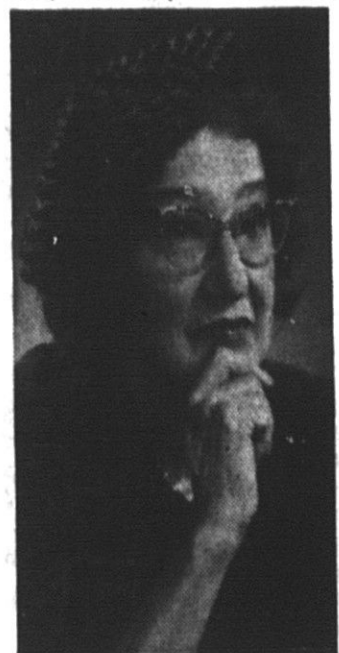

What is most interesting to a dedicated teacher? Education, of course. It represents to me a key to open the way, to the way of life one wants to live.

Perhaps many young students do not know, as yet, what they wish to do and become. However, when they do make that

decision they will have, through their basic instruction, or should I say, education, only to go on from there to some special field of their choice.

I am most grateful that the government is becoming keenly aware of this important phase of life and is willing to do more than it already has been doing toward helping the youth of this country, and other countries as well.

Having travelled a great deal in Latin American countries, I have seen that the lack of education facilities and the resulting illiteracy were the biggest handicaps to greater progress in those countries. I talked to many young people who knew what they wanted to do and, as I found out later, had excellent ability in many fields—mechanical, nursing, managerial—but who, not knowing how to read or write had to be content with menial and very difficult jobs, just to earn a bare living wage.

I have been asked about schools and universities in Europe. Well, studies are taken far more seriously there. The relationship between teachers and students is more formal, but just as friendly as I find it here in this country.

The study of languages is given great importance in all European countries, especially English as a second language. I teach French, Spanish, and German, and I am trying to make my students understand that a knowledge of foreign languages is most essential to break down barriers and to make for a better understanding among nations, which is something we must achieve.

Many opportunities are offered students these days to study and travel abroad. I am very much in favor of this because the actual experience of living in foreign countries will help to create mutual friendship and understanding.

I hear comments these days that the young people are terrible. I find them terrific. I have enough confidence in them to hope that they will take advantage of the wonderful opportunities this great country has to offer.

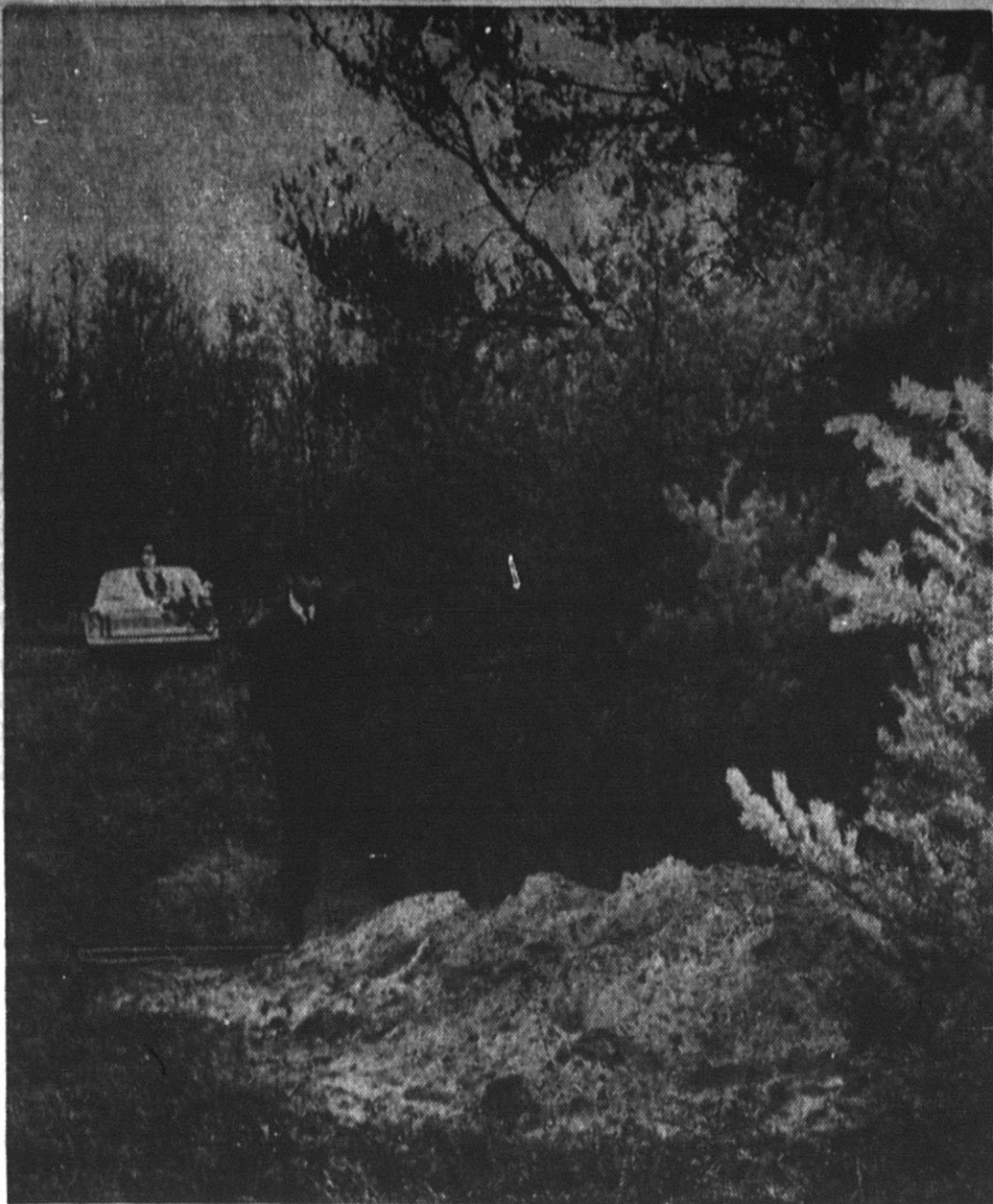
We are living in a fast changing world. This should please young people, who have little patience, and it should eliminate any feelings of frustration youth does experience, which is sometimes difficult for us to understand.

I have a vast admiration for the young men and women, twenty-five years old and older, are doing and accomplishing, and I wish them "Bonnie Chance."

I have lived and taught in different parts of the United States, though never this far west. I thoroughly enjoy my work at Hope College, a college which, although it is a hundred years old, has a young and progressive spirit and is offering its students all they could possibly wish to gain from an college.

Allegan Seeks Identity Of Slain Teenaged Girl

HAMILTON — The Allegan County Sheriff's department today is faced with a murder mystery.

The identity of the victim is unknown. The identity of the slayer or slayers is unknown. The time of the murder is unknown. How the victim was slain is unknown.

What is known is this:

The victim was a white female. She was 17 to 18 years old. She was killed sometime within the last two years.

The girl was dumped face down into a shallow grave, underneath a pine tree, approximately two miles southwest of Hamilton.

The killer or killers may have returned a few days before Thanksgiving Day this year on Nov. 22. On that date two Holland hunters found a freshly dug hole. On top of the over-turned dirt was a white nylon slip. Piled atop the slip were several bones.

Allegan County Detective Clayton St. John said the hunters apparently found the partially opened grave within five hours after it had been dug up. St. John said it had rained earlier Nov. 22. The hunters found the bones late in the afternoon. The bones and dirt were not wet indicating they had been dug up after the rain stopped.

The bones were sent to experts at the University of Michigan who said the girl had been buried sometime within the last two years.

The condition of some of the broken and sawed bones indicated the victim had met with a violent death. The skull and several other bones are missing.

In addition to the bones found by the hunters additional digging by St. John uncovered leg and foot bones.

The position of the bones and other facts showed that the bones had not been reburied at this site but the victim had been placed in the grave under 18 inches of dirt a few feet from a towering pine tree.

The grave site is a desolate area criss-crossed by narrow winding dirt roads.

The grave was in back of a pine tree 90 feet from one of these roads. Rusting tin cans and bottles nearby indicated the area had frequently been used as a dumping ground.

St. John said the slip, thus far, is the only solid clue they have which might lead to the identity of the girl. He described the slip as white, expensive with four rows of lace at the bottom. A few scraps of wool and some metal clips and hooks were the only other items found.

Allegan authorities asked residents to contact them if they have any information on a missing teenage girl within the last two years.

Deputies admitted the killer had quite a head start on them. But the file on the girl's murder will remain open until closed. There is no statue of limitation on murder in Michigan.

Deputies Investigate Breakin at Area Home

Mrs. Alice Underhill reported to Ottawa sheriff's deputies Thursday that some one apparently broke into her home at 16806 Crosswell St. between 4 and 8 p.m. Thursday.

Deputies said the home was entered through the front door, and left through a door at the rear of the house which can only be opened from the inside. The lock on a tool chest was pryed open, and some tools may have been taken.

Rare Orchid in Blossom At Morlock Residence

A rare orchid known as the Ordonta Glosson is now in blossom at the Edward Morlock home, 141 West 19th St.

Interested persons are invited to call at the Morlock home to view the rare plant which comes from Guadalupe, South America.

Mrs. Morlock said that the blossom, colored in chartreuse and mahogany, has the resemblance of a tiny doll in the center.

Policemen Scare Church Prowler

Holland police reported Friday that they apparently scared away a prowler inside of Trinity Reformed Church, 495 Central Ave., about 3:30 a.m. Friday.

Police had been watching the church after it was reported that a set of keys to the church, the parsonage and the minister's car had been taken from a pocket of the Rev. Gordon Van Oostenburg's topcoat at the church about 10:30 p.m. Thursday.

Police found a rear door of the church unlocked about 3:30 a.m., and were searching the building when they heard a door slam. The door had been locked previously, but was found unlocked when it was checked a second time by the patrolmen. Police also found several drawers open in the study of the church.

Police were unable to find the prowler.

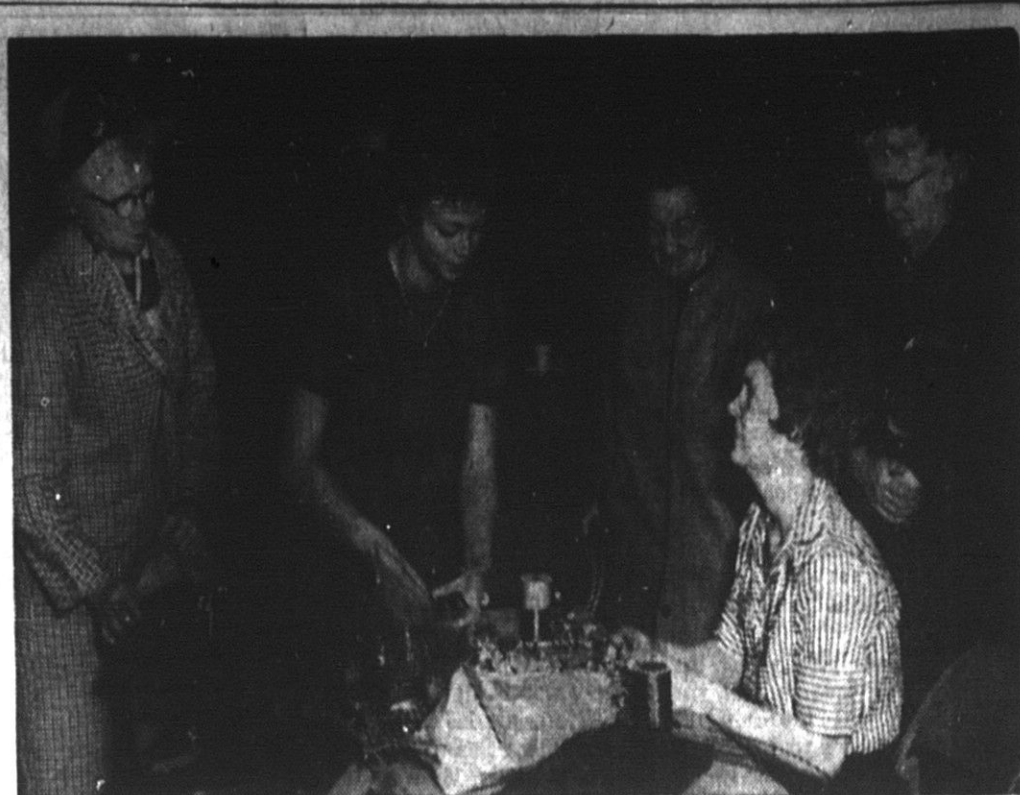

Coast Guard Fete Slated For Overhaul

GRAND HAVEN — Plans for a major reorganization of the U. S. Coast Guard anniversary festival committee of Grand Haven are in the making and will be presented to the committee Jan. 18. Chairman C. K. Bugielski reported this week.

Bugielski, "Mr. Coast Guard" in the Tri-Cities and chairman of the parade committee, hinted at such a move at a meeting this week, attended by Finance Chairman Virgil Quebbeman, James Bottje, an aide to Bugielski, and William Herbst, retired Coast Guard group commander at Ludington and now a resident of Grand Haven. Herbst is now a festival committee advisor. Former Mayor Glenn Eaton of Grand Haven is City Council's agent on the committee and is preparing the reorganization.

Eaton has prepared a proposed plan, calling for a solid organization of the committee, which will include a publicity committee, and will handle the festivals, starting in 1966.

The finance chairman reviewed the finances of the committee and reported that following the 1965 festival the committee wound up more than \$4,000 "in the red." Quebbeman estimated that three-fourths of the deficit was the result of a sub-standard carnival at the waterfront during the 1965 festival. "Last year," he said, "we grossed a total of \$17,000 from the carnival. This year the figure dropped down to \$7,000."

Bugielski reported the reason for the drop was due to two factors, in his opinion. The carnival was too small and inferior, and competition on the festival weekend in August from the county fair at Holland.

Bugielski stated that he has already sent a letter to Clifford Steketee, manager of the county fair at Holland, asking for cooperation in avoiding future conflicts. He said that the local festival must be held during the week of Aug. 4, under the Armed Forces Act. "Since the dates are set nationally," he said, "they cannot be changed."

Swelink's "Est-ce, Mars?" performed by Mr. Tallis was a tribute to one of the greatest of the Dutch composers and was warmly received by the audience. Campra's "Jubilate Deo" was then presented by the choir with just the right amount of French elegance.

The entire ensemble closed the program with a performance of another work rarely heard in these parts — a piece based on the Latin hymn "Jesu, Redemptor omnium" by the Italian composer Bencini.

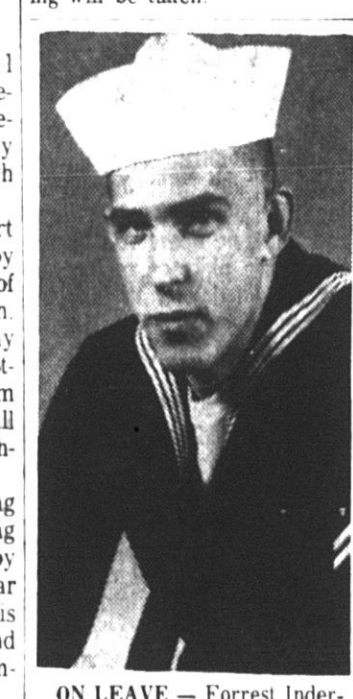
