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1,625 May Lose Voting Privileges

December is checkup month for voter registrations, and City Clerk D.W. Schipper said today that Holland has 1,625 persons who have not voted in the last two years.

Notices are being sent to these people this week informing them of the suspension and possible cancellation.

The voter, if still residing in the city, has 30 days to reply by signing and returning a portion of the notice to the clerk's office asking that his registration be continued. If a reply is not received in 30 days or if the notice is undeliverable, the registration is cancelled.

It then becomes necessary for the person to re-register at the clerk's office if he wishes to maintain voting privileges in future elections.

Schipper urged persons to return cards promptly to insure voting in the school millage election Jan. 10, 1967.

Under the present law, it is possible to retain voting privileges without ever voting merely by signing, and returning the card notice each time it is received.

Schipper said there are instances in the city where persons have been registered since 1932 and have voted only two or three times in the last 34 years.

\$15,420 Sought In Damage Suit

GRAND HAVEN — William Roeters and his wife Rena, who own property in Zeeland and Blendon townships, Ottawa county, Tuesday started suit against Charles F. Smith & Sons, Inc., contractors, in Ottawa Circuit Court.

The Roeters seek \$15,420 damages and claim that the firm damaged a house on their property last summer while it was engaged in constructing the multi-million dollar Lake Michigan water pipe line through Ottawa county for the city of Wyoming, Mich.

The plaintiffs claim that commencing Jan. 1, 1966, defendant constructed the line along New Holland St. in the right-of-way adjacent to the Roeters property in the two townships.

Permission was given to use the land but damages are being sought for damage to a house owned by the couple. Large pieces of equipment were placed on the property, plaintiffs claim, and the house was damaged. The house was formerly rented by the Roeters couple but they claim in the spring of 1966 it became completely untenantable because of the damage.

State Approves Ottawa School Reorganization

Dale Mossburg, Holland's representative on the Ottawa County School District Reorganization committee which studied school reorganization for well over a year, received word today that the state reorganization committee has approved the Ottawa county plan which was resubmitted Oct. 27.

The news came in a letter dated Nov. 14 from Ira Polley, state superintendent of public instruction and chairman of the state reorganization committee. Copies of the letter were forwarded to county members by Jennie Kaufman, chairman of the Ottawa county committee. The state committee had taken the action Nov. 10.

Mossburg explained that the reorganization plan calls for Federal and Harrington districts to be annexed to Holland school district. The only unchanged districts in the county are West Ottawa and Grand Haven. Consequently these two districts would not participate in a county vote to be set at least 90 days from Nov. 10.

In this public vote, all affected school districts in the county would vote on the same day in a simple yes-no vote on adopting or rejecting the county plan.

Mossburg felt there would be some public informational meetings before such an election is called.

Meat Case Hearing Held

GRAND RAPIDS (UPI) — Municipal Judge Louis E. Simhauser Wednesday resumed a hearing for the Holland Meat Co. and its owners, who are accused of processing meat not properly inspected.

The Holland Meat Co. also doing business as the Ottawa Sausage Co. is Holland, has been indicted by Circuit Judge Stuart Hoffius' one man grand jury in the widespread meat scandal charging that diseased animals or animals killed in accidents were not fit for human consumption.

Theodore Everse, president of the company, and his son, Lyle, are charged as co-conspirators to violate state agricultural laws.

More than a dozen other defendants and several firms are included in the series of indictments by the one-man grand jury, which is still in operation.

The charges stemmed from a series of raids by Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley Sept. 12. Kelley and other authorities charged the meat was processed in a Rockford plant and distributed to various sources.

The Holland Meat Co. hearing started Tuesday. Judge Simhauser said after the hearing was completed he would study the transcript before making a decision.

Two Injured In M-45 Crash

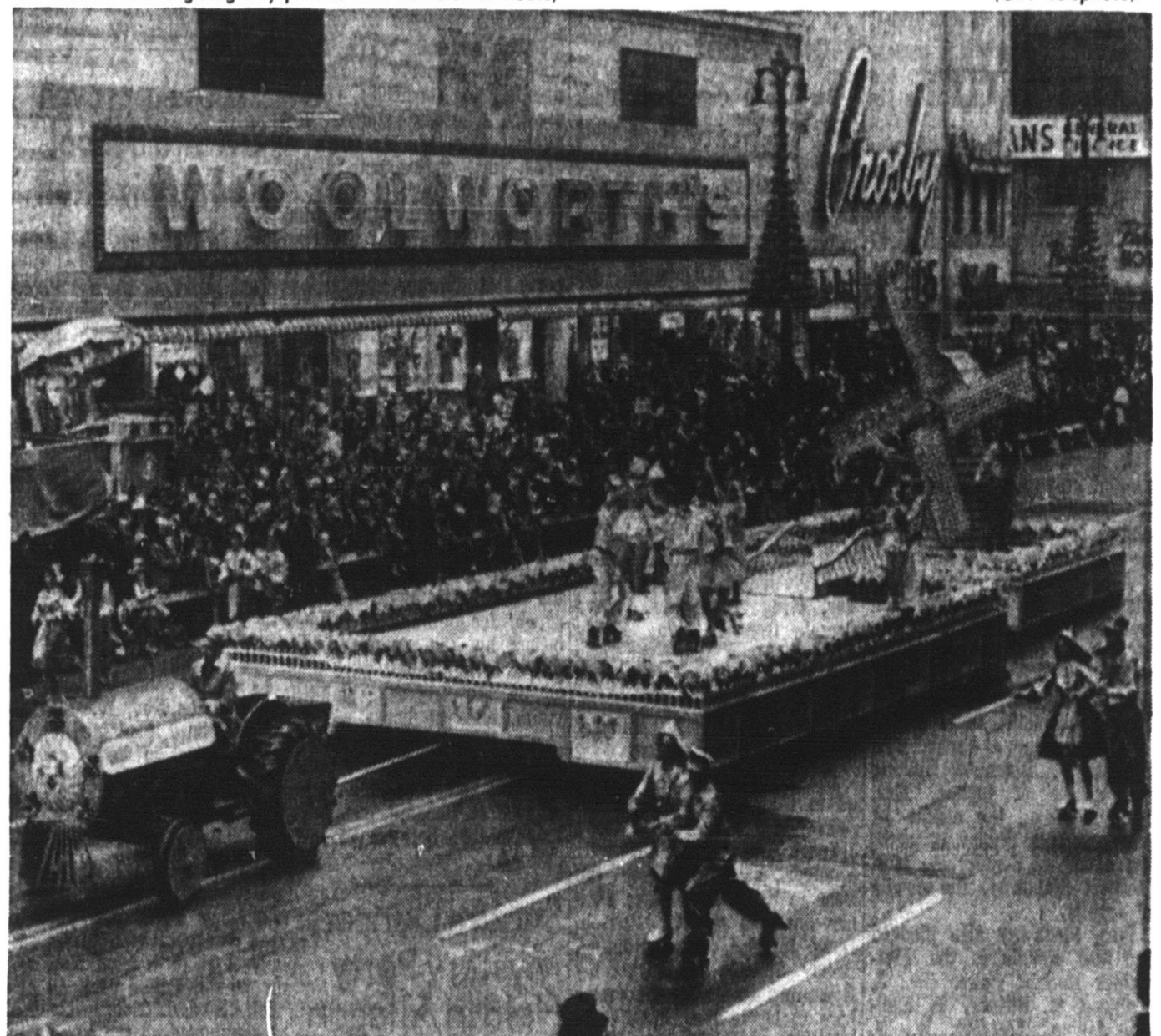

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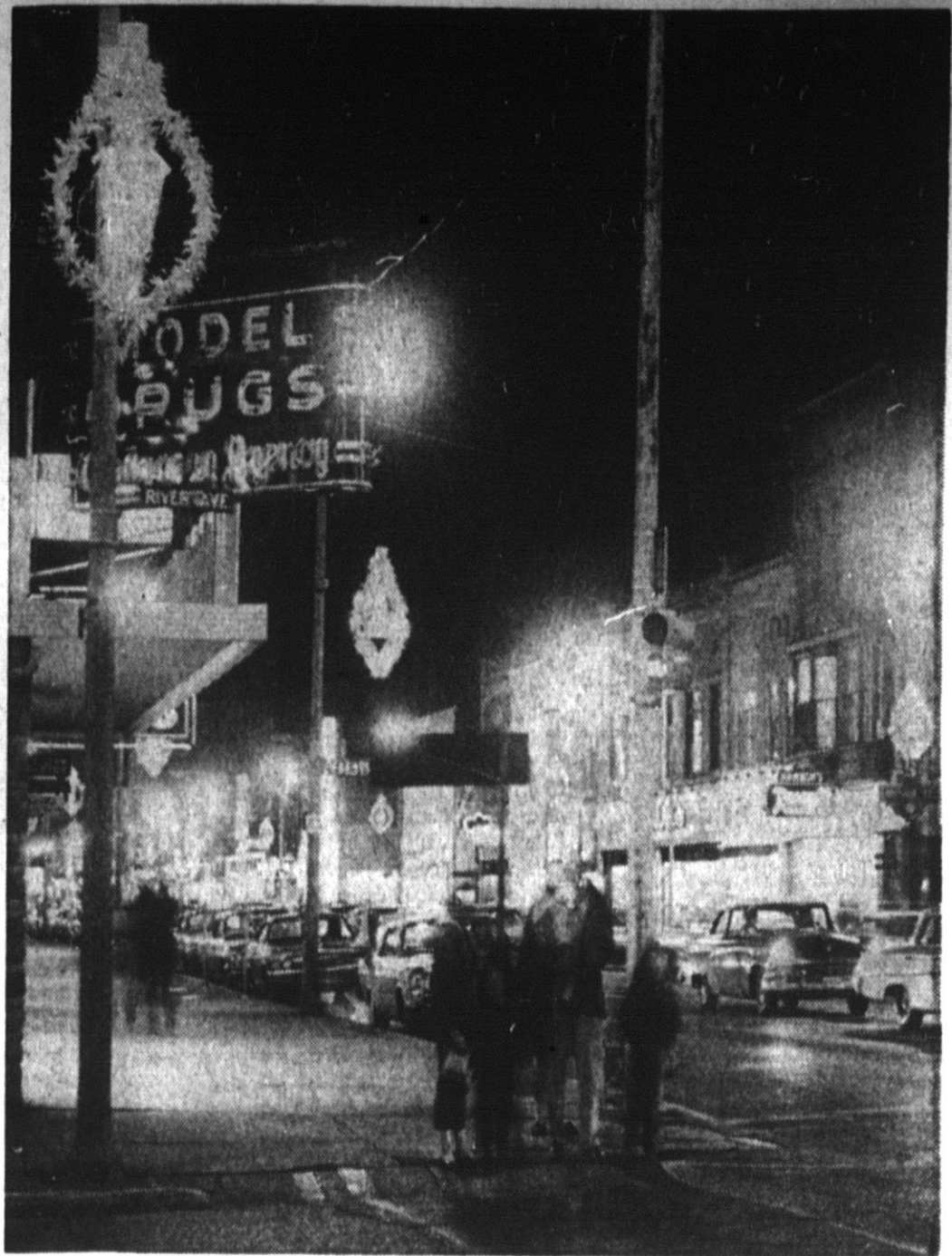

Sunday School Lesson

Prophecies of Peace
Isaiah 11:1-9

In December we begin to look forward to Christmas. Merchants are already reminding us of that event. This lesson turns our hearts and minds to a prophecy regarding the coming of the Messiah through whom world peace will eventually come.

I. The Old Testament foretold the coming of Christ. The Bible tells us three facts about Christ—first that He will come, then that He has come, and lastly that He will come again. Isaiah says more about Christ than any other writer of the Old Testament. "And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots." In chapter 10, Isaiah tells about the coming destruction of Jerusalem and likens it to a forest that is consumed by a single conflagration—it would be like a forest which was burned down. However in that desolate country the prophet sees a dry stump which will produce a branch—that branch is Christ.

Christ was to come from the Davidic line. Jesse was the father of David. Who was called to the kingdom. In the time of Isaiah David's line was disappearing. The prospects for David's house looked dim. The prophet pointed to the future and said that it would be glorious. Why? Because the Messiah would come from David's family and bring honor to it. This prophecy has been fulfilled. Jesus is worshipped and adored the world over.

II. Jesus is the ideal ruler. "And the Spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord" so spoke Isaiah. Man has shown himself unfit to rule. The prophet portrays the coming Ruler whose intellectual and practical and religious qualities are ideal. All the finest qualities which we like to see in a ruler are found in Jesus. The prophet says that the Christ will do that which is right towards men and besides show loyalty to God. Every virtue which the prophet mentions was fulfilled in Jesus.

III. Christ is the giver of lasting peace. Isaiah portrays a time for which millions are longing. How did the prophet get the idea which our lesson gives us? God gave it to him. Only through Christ will the world enjoy peace. Some day the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea."

Today we stress knowledge, but our knowledge does not gain us peace. We need to know the Lord and his ways. In these days churches are pushing the social gospel and are dabbling in politics more and more. May the churches realize the need of preaching the gospel of the cross through which peace comes between God and man and man and man.

Seminar on State Poets Proves Interesting

Michigan has a rich heritage in poetry, but this avenue of the arts is generally lost in this state's educational and economic pictures. Mrs. Jerome Counihan said at a literature seminar on "Michigan Poets" Tuesday afternoon in the Woman's Literary Club. About 25 club members gathered about the fireplace in the club library for the discussion.

Poetry was not encouraged in Michigan's early colonial days and Dutch colonists were given to literature, not poetry. Mrs. Counihan said. Nevertheless, there is a fair representation of poems about the colonists, the pioneers, the Indians and the French and British, she said.

"Michigan had its share of sentimental poets in the 1870's, and the sentimental poems of Julia A. Moore about the simple things of life were loved by the people of that day but not taken seriously by writers of stature like Mark Twain. A contemporary of Julia Moore was Will Carleton whose tear jerker 'Over the Hill to the Poor House' is well known today."

Mrs. Counihan read "Over the Hill to the Poor House" with a great deal of feeling and for good measure treated the group to a lesser known sequel "Over the Hill From the Poor House" in which the heartless mother was rescued from this dire plight by a jailbird son and returned to the original cottage.

Michigan cannot claim Carl Sandburg although this famous writer lived in this state several years. His poem on "The

Sins of Kalamazoo" applies not only to Kalamazoo but all of America, particularly the mid-west, Mrs. Counihan explained.

Michigan poetry in recent years stems mostly from Ann Arbor and the University of Michigan, and Mrs. Counihan cited examples of contemporary writing including a poem by Carrow De Vries, a native of Overisel, now of Wayne county.

Michigan's most distinguished poet was Theodore Roethke of Saginaw, a 1954 Pulitzer prize winner who died in August, 1963, at the age of 58. Roethke was never acclaimed in his home state, but Mrs. Counihan said arrangements are being made for some kind of memorial for him. Roethke's poems are deceptively simple but he could express the mental processes of the mind in an earthy but spiritual manner, Mrs. Counihan said.

Earlier, 55 members of the club gathered in the tea room for a luncheon. Bridge followed for those not attending the literature seminar.

Tax Bills Set in Park Township

Park township tax bills totaling \$536,758.29 will be in the mail Thursday, Park Township Treasurer Harvey Tinholt said today.

The total is an increase of \$72,894.88 over the 1965 levy. Part of the increase is due to a rise in state equalized valuation from \$16,610,095 to \$17,880,003.

Millage rates for county, intermediate school district and special education are unchanged. The tax rate for Harrington school district rose from \$35.50 per \$1,000 assessed valuation to \$36.70, and the West Ottawa district rose from \$45.80 to \$51.50. The township rate increased from \$2 to \$4.21.

An increase in allocation from 8.5496 mills to 9.09 mills, state equalized value, accounts for the higher rate in the Harrington district. West Ottawa voters approved special operating millage of 9.50 mills, an increase of 3 mills over 1965, but the debt retirement levy dropped from 6.5 mills to 6.1 mills, resulting in a net increase of 2.6 mills for 1966, based on state equalized value.

Total rate in Park township for residents in Harrington district is \$50.88 per \$1,000 and for West Ottawa \$65.68.

Tax collections will start Dec. 12, and payments may be made at the township office at 1464 Ottawa Beach Rd. Mondays through Fridays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Saturday schedule lists Feb. 4 and Feb. 11 from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. One collection will be made at the South Side fire station in Virginia Park Saturday, Jan. 7, from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Since all records will be in the township office, no collections will be made at the home of the treasurer as heretofore.

Persons making tax payments may apply for dog licenses at the same time.

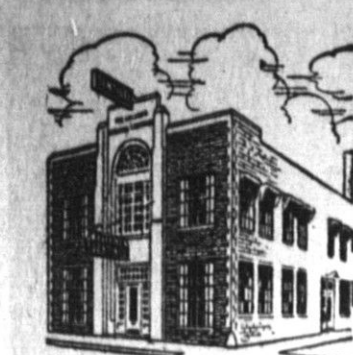

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CANHAM'S RIGHT

One of the most highly regarded men in modern journalism is Erwin D. Canham, editor of The Christian Science Monitor. Addressing the Economic Club of Detroit recently following the national elections, he said: "The Republicans regained a measure of morale and the Democrats learned some lessons." He then proceeded to list a number of unhealthy aspects of the election, of which one was the forecasting of results before polls closed. In this, we believe he was entirely correct.

In the first place, in their haste to score a scoop before competing networks, most of the networks with their varying types of computers did predict the outcome of the elections before the polls had closed. We pass by for the moment the fact that in a number of races there were a number of wrong predictions. But the fact of the prediction being made at all will undoubtedly influence the voting under two types of persons. First, there will be those who figure "What's the use?" — the race is already decided. This may well discourage voter participation and thwart the efforts of those conscientious citizens who are working diligently to get out the vote, a quite commendable goal. Then, in the second place, there may be other types of persons who may be disposed to change their vote on the band-wagon psychology theory of wanting to be with the winner. Granted, the ideal voter will be neither of these types. But we must take human nature as we find it, and recognize that these actions may occur.

Sooner or later the differential in time zone will have to be reckoned with, and the sooner it is, the better. This does constitute a problem which cries for a remedy. As a bare minimum, we would suggest no reports of results from any part of the country be made until the polls have closed. We believe the tv media should keep to its reportorial function. To report results prematurely, i.e., prior to closing time, results in effect in editorializing, however unwittingly it may be done. Yet this editorializing is what for the most part the medium purports to avoid. What do our readers think?

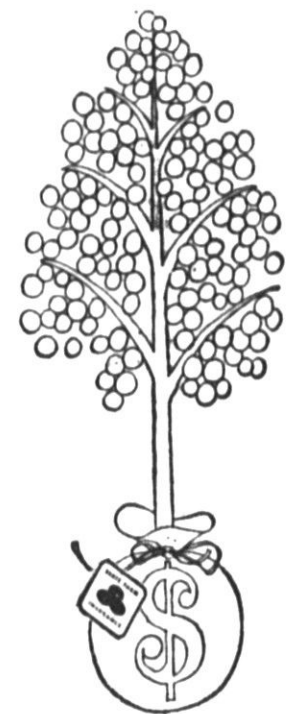

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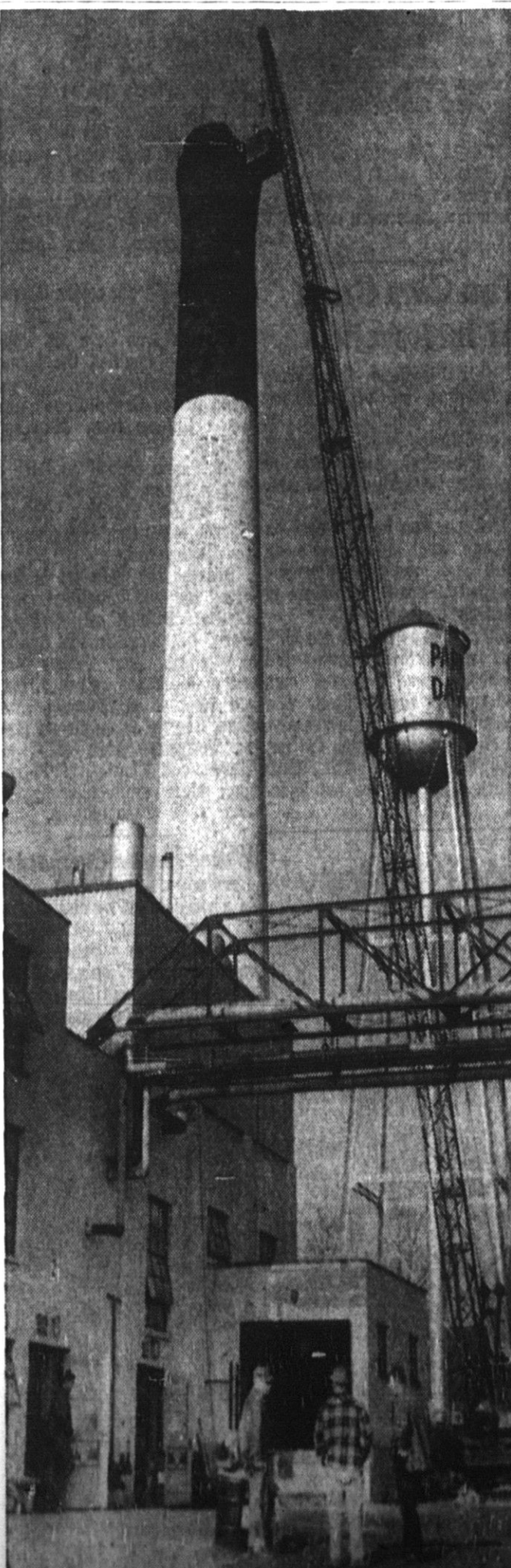

Maroons Run Past Unity For 81-56 Win in Opener

Lappinga And DeNooyer Top Game Scoring

Holland Christian opened its 1966-67 basketball season on something of a more pleasant note than it closed the '65-'66 campaign.

Coach Art Tuls' Maroons literally ran past game, but outclassed, Hudsonville Unity Christian, 81 to 56, Friday night before a capacity crowd of more than 2,500 in the Civic Center.

Last winter, the Maroons posted a 7-12 mark (worst for the school in 15 years) and dropped their district tournament opener to Zeeland, 59-54, in one of the major upsets of the season.

With all but one starter returning this season, Christian showed Friday night that it will have to be reckoned with, as the Maroons boast good size and an effective fast-break attack.

Senior forward John Lappinga scored 17 of his game-high 22 points in the first 12 minutes of play to pace the Maroons to a 39-31 halftime advantage.

Junior guard Bob DeNooyer then took over, scoring 16 of his 21 points in the final three frames and eight of them during a rally which saw Holland Christian jump off to a 54-36 lead after the narrow halftime margin.

Unity fought gamely, and shot at a torrid pace during the first half, but coach Andy TenHarmel's Crusaders were victimized by their own mistakes.

Unity committed 15 ball control errors in the first half and managed to launch just 27 shots. They hit on 14 of them however for a fine 51.9 per cent figure from the floor.

Forwards Bob Van Koeveering and Rich Coy paced Unity's scoring with 15 and 14 points, respectively.

Unity cooled off in the second half, making just eight of 26 field goal tries, while Christian got its fast-break attack in gear, scoring four baskets on breaks and getting four more as a direct result of the fast-moving attack.

After Ross Peuler hit a free throw to open the second-half scoring for Unity, the Maroons ripped off 15 points to Unity's four in the next five minutes to take a comfortable 54-36 advantage into the final 10 minutes of the game.

Christian finished the evening with a good 47-2 connecting on 34 per cent, of its 24 shots from the floor, but just 13 of 28 free throws for a none-to-spectacular 46.4 mark.

Unity shot just 53 times, hitting 22 for a creditable 41.5 per cent and canned 12 of 19 free throws for 63.2 per cent. The Maroons' aggressive defense forced the Crusaders into a total of 24 ball control errors, while Christian committed 13 miscues.

The board work of center Bob Van Langevelde, forward Don Hulst and Lappinga and the steady play of Van Langevelde and DeNooyer should make Christian tough to beat this season. The return to full strength of injured guard Lloyd Doezman is expected to bolster the Maroons' attack.

Unity also had one its worst seasons last year (5-14), but also should be improved this season when the newcomers gain enough experience, as Van Koeveering is the only returning starter.

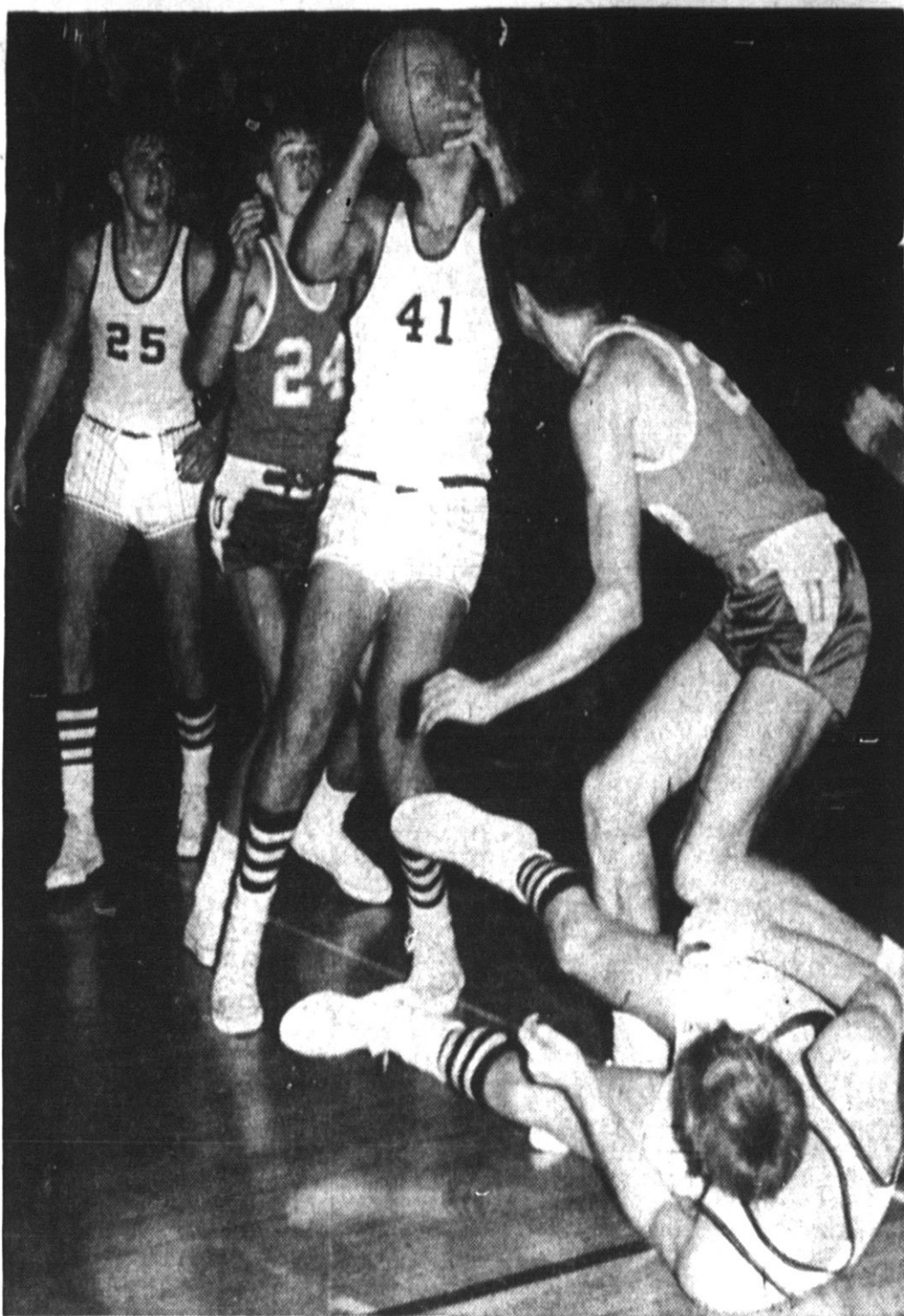

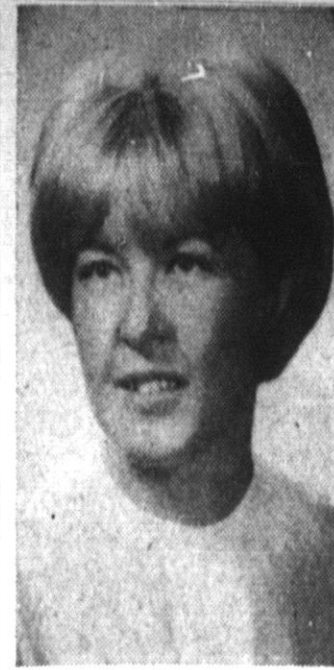
Heart Attack Fatal For Ottawa Resident

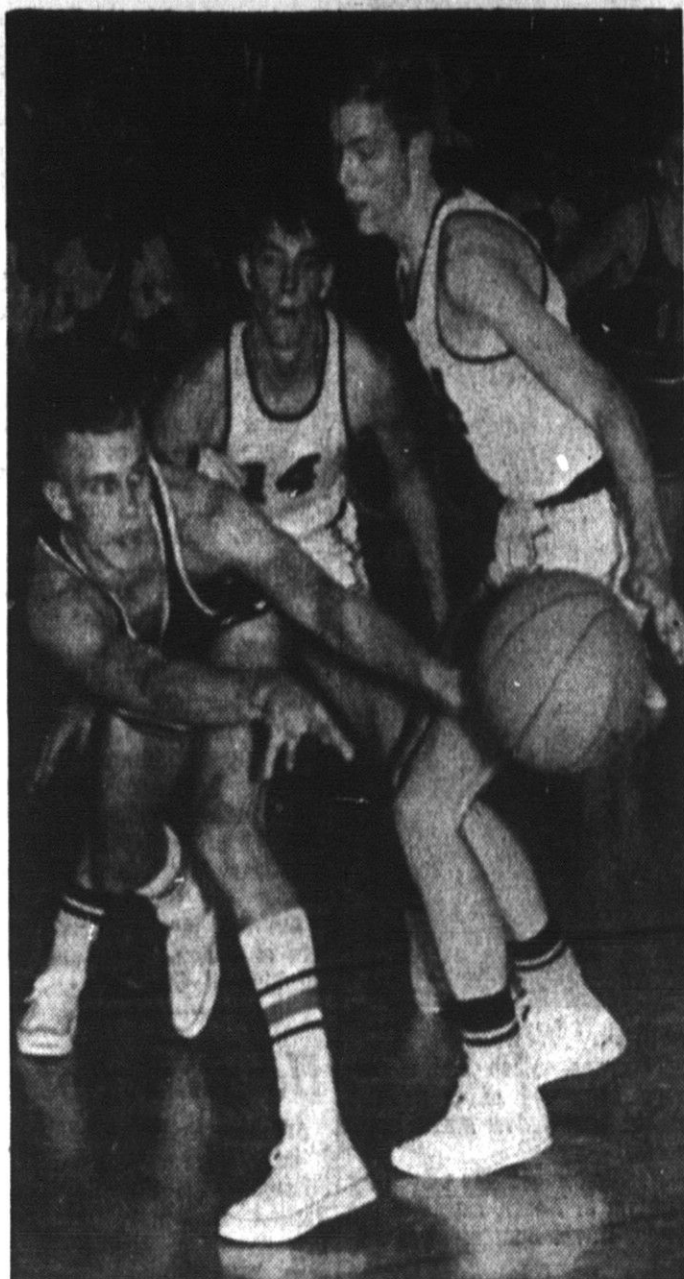

GRAND RAIDS — Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills ripped off the game's last 10 points to sew up a 61-48 non-league basketball victory over Holland High in the Central Christian gym Saturday night.

Holland coach Don Piersma was pleased with his team's opening-game performance and the Dutch weren't out of contention until the final minute of play.

Piersma said, "I was satisfied with our play, until the final four minutes." It was during those four minutes that Ottawa's defending City League champions scored 10 points, while shutting out the Dutch.

Holland led for the first 10 minutes (12-9 after a quarter and 18-11 1:50 into the second period) despite making just two first-quarter field goals.

Ottawa Hills moved out to a 20-18 advantage midway through the second quarter and took a slim 27-26 halftime lead after the Dutch rallied for a brief 24-21 lead two minutes earlier.

Holland took a quick 33-31 lead after the intermission and led until the final minute of the third period. The game's leading scorer, Ottawa forward Otis Smith, connected on a pair of free throws, then rebounded in an errant shot with 04 in the period to give the Indians a 41-39 margin they never relinquished.

Holland was held scoreless for the final four minutes, forty seconds of the game as Ottawa padded its lead with a basket by Smith and eight free throws.

Junior guard Dan Shinabarger led Holland with 17 points, on five baskets and seven of 10 free throws, while John Thomas, senior forward, was the only other Dutch player in double figures with 11 points.

Center Steve Jacobusse contributed six points as did the other starters, guard Jim Fortney and forward Roger Jones, and Jacobusse led Holland with nine rebounds.

The Dutch were outbounded, 41-36, as sub center Percel Singleton took game honors with 13, Steve McCreary hauled down 11 and Smith 10.

Smith led all scorers with 18 points, Singleton added 17 (including nine of 14 free throws) and guard Ernest Cryer contributed 13 for coach Bob Hendrickson's Indians.

Piersma said he was pleased with the play of guards Shinabarger and Fortney in setting up the plays in the new Dutch offense which has no real pivot man.

The Dutch connected on 15 of 43 shots from the floor, Ottawa on 20 of 52. Holland hit 18 of 28 free throws, the Indians 21 of 35.

Holland committed 22 ball control errors, Ottawa 19 in the loosely played first game for both teams.

Holland will begin its Valley Coast Conference season Friday night at Mona Shores and won't play at home until Friday, Dec. 9 (against Grand Haven).
