Overnight Snow Set At 2.5 Inches

Shoreline Coated By
Frozen Spray; Snow
Leaves Roads Slippery

The first snow storm of the season, accompanied by strong winds, whipped off Lake Michigan Sunday, dumping 2½ inches of snow by 11 a.m. Monday and sending overnight lows in Holland to 14 degrees.

Winds sent sheets of spray against the Lake Michigan shoreline, covering trees, buildings and debris with coats of ice.

The snow created hazardous driving conditions and deputies in Allegan county reported a ten-car pileup along the U. S. 131 expressway between Martin and Plainwell. Ottawa county deputies said traffic was backed up along M-45 in the hilly area near Grand Valley State College.

At Holland Harbor, the 530-foot limestone carrier Rogers City waited out the storm at Brewer's City Coal Dock where she unloaded about 10,000 tons of lime and limestone. The Coast Guard reported 40 knot winds Sunday.

Near Macatawa, a long-time resident reported the worst shoreline destruction he can remember. George Nobel said winds washed up an old concrete walk 16 feet wide which was as much as 14 feet into the ground.

A camper was blown from the back of a pickup truck along I-196 in Allegan county's Lake-town township at 3:20 p.m. Sunday. The driver, Ardanne Baber of Berrien County, was not reported injured.

Holland police closed Kollen Park to traffic Sunday at 2:20 p.m. after winds washed waves over the seawall. A car operated by Jerry Mc Alpine, 16, of 432 West 32nd St., was forced into a fence and light pole by the winds. He was not injured.

A metal light pole, four inches in diameter, was blown down at a service station near Washington Ave. and 32nd St.

Ottawa county deputies said they investigated at least 19 traffic accidents this morning. Allegan deputies said they had at least ten accidents while Holland police reported three.

Ottawa GOP Hears Durant At Convention

GRAND HAVEN—A plea for party unity was made by Richard Durant, Republican chairman of Michigan's 14th Congressional district in Detroit area, at a convention of Ottawa county Republicans Thursday night in the county building.

Durant, presently a junior in law school, also spoke at Hope College earlier in the day.

Republicans should be proud of working together and save their fighting for opposing parties, he said, adding that the Republican party is the only one that offers any hope of retaining the age-old issue of liberty. "There are no values unless there are free men," he said.


Asked about a third party headed by Sen. Robert Huber who was unsuccessful for the nomination of U.S. senator, Durant hoped no third party would be formed since this could only cut into the Republican party.

County GOP Chairman Joel Verplank presided. Thirty-one persons were named to the county Republican committee. These persons serve with the Republican members of the county Board of Commissioners, together with defeated GOP candidates, and the elected county officials to form a committee of 62. Within 30 days this committee must name officers of the county executive committee.

Board Mulls Trainable Center Plans

GRAND HAVEN — Schematic drawings for a trainable center for Ottawa Area Intermediate school district are presently being drawn and first drawings will be completed in December, Supt. Roger Troupe told the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Thursday.

Working plans should be ready by March or early April, and bids will be let sometime thereafter, Troupe said. The center would accommodate 120 to 150 students who presently are in six scattered locations. Special board meetings may be called in January or February to plan transfer of personnel and equipment as the new program is initiated.

The board discussed effects of Proposal C in the Nov. 3 election, and decided no changes in procedures would be initiated until directives are forthcoming from the state.

A film on the Flint skills center was shown with emphasis on occupational training qualifying high school students for the world of work. After one year of operation, there is a long waiting list of students. Most students spend a half day in high school and a half day in the skills center. The board hopes to have updated information by January for consideration whether to revive another vote on a vocational - technical school for this area.

Enrollment figures revealed a total K-12 enrollment at 37,841, an increase of 369 over last year. Other figures showed a decrease of 220 students in non-public schools and an increase of 589 in public schools.



J.H. Boone Dies at 87 In Rest Home

ST. LOUIS, Mich. — John H. Boone, 87, of Ithaca, a native of Holland died early Saturday at a local rest home.

He was the grandson of P.F. Pfantstiel, friend and benefactor of Dr. A. C. Van Raalte in Arnhem, The Netherlands, who later came to Holland from New York City at Dr. Van Raalte's request to help finance the floundering Holland colony after its first season and early disasters.

His father, Hermanus Boone owned the Holland Hotel Building, site of the present Warm Friend Hotel and a three-story building containing a bank and the post office, across the street from the hotel, as well as building the first cottage at Macatawa Park.

The Boones were horse fanciers and owned several champion trotting horses at the time of President McKinley.

John H. was one of the early developers of home sites on Lake Michigan and maintained a summer home on a large tract north of Riley St. on Lakeshore Dr. He also helped develop Eagle Crest, north of Ottawa Beach and also was interested in Clearwater Beach, north of Port Sheldon. He purchased the house on North Shore Drive owned by former Vice President Charles Dawes and Rufus Dawes, who had spent summers there for many years.

For the past several years he had lived in Ithaca. Surviving are his wife, Bernice Russell Boone of Ithaca, a son, Harold W. Boone of Washington, D. C., who also maintains a home in Holland and several nieces and nephews.

Three Injured In Crash of 2 Cars

ZEELAND — Three persons were injured in a two-car collision at 56th Ave. and Port Sheldon St. at 6:37 a.m. Tuesday.

Treated at Zeeland Community hospital for head lacerations and released were Bernard Rinkema, 48, of 8460 112th Ave., West Olive, a passenger in the car driven by Edward Driesenga, 24, of route 2, Holland, and David Syswera, 18, of 5363 22nd Ave., Hudsonville, driver of the other car.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said the Driesenga auto was eastbound on Port Sheldon while the Syswera car was coming from the opposite direction when it went out of control and slid into the lane of the Driesenga auto.

A second passenger in the Driesenga car, Willis Tucker, 35, of route 1, Zeeland, suffered left leg injuries but sought his own treatment. The mishap remained under investigation.

Lindstrom Named New Police Chief

Former Albion Chief
Now With State Office
Of Criminal Justice

Charles L. Lindstrom, 31, former Albion Chief of Police and a program manager with the state Office of Criminal Justice Programs in Lansing Tuesday was named Holland police chief by City Manager William L. Bopf.

Lindstrom, who assumes his duties Dec. 14 with an annual salary of \$15,121, succeeds Les Van Beveren who resigned in September. He and his wife, Jacqueline, and two daughters, aged 7 and 5, now live in Holt, a suburb of Lansing. He graduated from Ypsilanti schools.


A graduate of the Michigan State University school of police administration, Lindstrom was an Albion police chief from November, 1967 until he took his present position with the state one year ago.

Before Albion he served as police officer and training officer with the East Lansing police department while attending MSU. He has taught police administration subjects at Kellogg Community College, Battle Creek and at police academies in Calhoun County.

Between 1962 and 1965, Lindstrom held positions with the Oakland, Calif., police department, as juvenile officer, a member of the tactical unit, and a police officer.

In announcing his appointment, Bopf said Lindstrom was the "number one choice, unanimously" of an oral board which had interviewed the seven finalists of 26 applicants which had taken a written examination.

Bopf said he placed emphasis on the fact Lindstrom has been a police chief at Albion, a community he said was similar in

makeup to Holland with a college and a large minority group population.

Bopf said Lindstrom was hired on his "surface qualifications" and added that he had received communications from citizens urging the hiring of a man of Lindstrom's qualifications.

Bopf said he looked toward Lindstrom to represent an "emerging level of well qualified police personnel" in Holland with a sensitivity in dealing with minority problems.

Since Van Beveren resigned, Lt. Ernest Bear has been acting chief. Bopf, in an 8 a.m. meeting with the police department, informed the personnel of his choice for a new chief and commended Bear and the men for maintaining the high caliber of operations of the department during the interim.

Bear will continue as acting chief until Lindstrom assumes the duties.

Reached in Lansing, Lindstrom said he was looking forward to moving his family to Holland to establish roots.


In taking the Holland police position, which meant a salary cut, Lindstrom said he was anxious to return to municipal police work.

Now a planner for law enforcement improvement in the state, Lindstrom said he desires to return to municipal law enforcement duties because he has recognized "as far as professional satisfaction I can achieve more within a municipal department."

A fisherman who enjoys boating and golfing, Lindstrom said his work in Lansing involved developing programs and administering \$2½ million dollars in federal funds to state police agencies.

Lindstrom said he sees a closer working relationship between the police officer and the court system to maximize the efficiency of the judicial system.

One of the biggest areas of concern facing Lindstrom in his new position in Holland is construction, staffing and operations of a new police station of which construction is proposed to start in the spring.

Civic Chorus To Present 'The Messiah'

ZEELAND — The Zeeland Civic Chorus will present its 31st annual concert Thursday, Dec. 3, at 8 p.m. in the First Christian Reformed Church, when they present George Frederick Handel's oratorio "The Messiah."

Albert P. Smith of Grand Rapids will direct the performance again, making this his 22nd consecutive year in Zeeland. Ann De Pree Reising, former Zeeland resident, will again take the soprano part making this her sixth appearance with the chorus.

Norma Kalawart Solle, contralto, will be back for her 17th consecutive year and Richard Versailles, tenor soloist, will be here for his eighth appearance with the chorus. Robert E. Smith Jr., of River Forest, Ill., will sing the baritone solos of the oratorio.

The 100 voice Civic Chorus is made up of various choirs and individuals from the Zeeland area who practice for the better part of two months for "The Messiah" performance. The chorus is accompanied by Mark Steigenga, of Grand Rapids, a student at Calvin College and presently minister of music at Messiah Lutheran Church in Grand Rapids.

The chorus draws strong support from Zeeland each year when more than 130 patrons contribute to make possible this great choral work. Each chorus member also pays substantial dues for the privilege of singing in the group.

The rendition will take place in the First Christian Reformed church because of its fine three manual organ, well qualified for the magnificent work, and the large seating capacity of the auditorium.

3 Get Prison Sentences

GRAND HAVEN — Three Holland - Zeeland men were given prison sentences today by Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith.

John Loos, 24, of 45½ East Seventh St., was sentenced to 2 to 14 years in Southern Michigan Prison on a bad check charge. No recommendation was given. Loos was given credit for 26 days already served.

Richard Lightfoot, 18, of 532 Central Ave., Holland, and Ralph Todd, 26, Zeeland, charged with possession of marijuana, were both sentenced, Lightfoot to Ionia Reformatory for 18 months to 10 years and Todd to Southern Michigan Prison for 2 to 10 years. Both will receive credit for 35 days in jail.

Paul Vanden Berg, 18, of 118 West 18th St., Holland, also charged with possession of marijuana, was put on probation for two years and must pay \$200 costs. Vanden Berg, Lightfoot and Todd were arrested by Holland police and sheriff's deputies.

Driver Injured In Truck Mishap

Ronald Jousma, 41, of 591 104th Ave., injured Monday night when the pickup truck he was driving went out of control along U.S. - 31 at the railroad overpass east of the M-40 intersection, was admitted to Holland Hospital with head injuries and fractured ribs. His condition was listed as fair.

Holland police, who said the mishap remained under investigation, reported the accident occurred at 9:03 p.m. The Jousma truck went off the northbound traffic lane and into the median.

Firemen were called to wash spilled gasoline from the pavement.

No Injuries in Crash

Jose Torres Torrez, 59, of Ropesville, Texas, was cited by Holland police for failure to yield the right of way after the pickup truck he was driving north along Michigan Ave. and a station wagon operated by Olga E. Morgan, 40, of 340 Maple Ave., westbound on 32nd St., collided at the intersection Monday at 7:43 a.m. No injuries were reported.

Chapel Choir Sings for Nixon

Singing for President Nixon at a White House worship service Sunday proved to be a truly great thrill for the Hope College Chapel Choir and one well worth traveling 1,500 miles on a busy weekend.

The 32 choir members echoed the observation of their director, Dr. Robert Cavanaugh, when he said that in his 30 years as director of the choir that what impressed him most was the gracious treatment by President and Mrs. Nixon and others in the White House.

Director Cavanaugh and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. McCarthy, pastor of St. John Fisher Parish, Palos Verdes Peninsula, Calif., were special guests of President and Mrs. Nixon at coffee in the Nixon living quarters before the service. Here they received a tour including the Lincoln Room with Lincoln's big bed and one of the original copies of the Gettysburg Address. There also was the Queen's Room used by Queen Juliana and other royalty, and one room called Dick's Hideaway where the President can go for peace and quiet. In the middle of this room is a beatup easy chair which the family brought from California, a chair which the President refuses to have repolstered or replaced.

The choir sang two selections, "Prayer for Peace," by Paul Fetter, a relatively new number with lots of contrast and one already selected for the choir's spring tour to California in 1971, and "O, Clap Your Hands," by Ralph Vaughan Williams.

Some Hope College observers at the worship said the choir sang exceptionally well, and with deep conviction. President Nixon who had listened to choir recordings opined it was one of the four or five best college choirs in the country.

The President erred when he first introduced the choir as coming from Grand Rapids, but he interrupted the recessional at the close to apologize, saying he had been thinking of Jerry Ford, the distinguished Congressman from Grand Rapids. He also mentioned Guy Vander Jagt as an upstanding Congressman. Vander Jagt is an alumnus of Hope. "I'd never live it down if I didn't know where Hope College is," he said.

Congressman Vander Jagt had been invited to the service but sent his regrets as he was in Michigan.

A White House aide commented he had never seen President Nixon spend as much time with the young people as with the choir after the service. The President had a special comment for one member, Sheila Schuller, whose father is minister of Garden Grove Community Church in Garden Grove, Calif.

The Holland delegation was impressed with the ease and informality in the White House. Although it was evident that many security men were about, choir members might wander into all rooms on the first floor, admiring the furnishings and paintings, particularly one fine painting of President Eisenhower in the big hall that runs the length of the White House from the East Room to the State Dining Room.

There were 382 attending the service, one of the largest groups ever assembled in the East Room. Among the guests were members of the Cabinet who appeared pleased to talk with the young people, newly elected governors, and new Congressmen.

Among persons easily recognized were Defense Secretary Melvin Laird, Secretary of Treasury David Kennedy, Secretary of State Rogers, Secretary of Agriculture Hardin, Secretary of Labor Hodson, Postmaster General Blount and Supreme Court Justice Burger. There also were several chiefs of staffs.

Although the White House had a relaxed atmosphere, choir members and others were aware that the job of president is an awesome task. Some remarked that President Nixon seemed particularly attentive during the choir's moving "Prayer for Peace."

One White House staffer was glad to see the Hope Choir. Bob Schroeder of Detroit, a 1968 graduate of Hope, is with the Army Signal Corps and is assigned to the White House in charge of communications. His wife is the former Mary Jean Damstra of Holland.

A Secret Service man, Dick Grossenbacher, asked to be remembered to Robert De Young, dean of students. He served as starting quarterback for De

Young's football team when De Young was coaching at Whitehall High School.

A special guest at the White House was Al Capp, the cartoonist. He talked a lot with the Hope students and said he'd be glad to get an invitation to visit Holland.

At the preliminary coffee before the service, both President and Mrs. Nixon mentioned to Dr. Cavanaugh that they had received invitations to visit Holland's Tulip Time on several occasions, and hope to accept one sometime. The President was in Holland on a campaign train when he was running for vice president in 1952.

The choir arrived in Washington at 8 p.m. Saturday and spent the night at Holiday Inn about three blocks from the White House. Some students went immediately to the Washington Monument and others went to the White House, looking through the fence.

A friendly guard asked them where they were from and expressed disbelief when they said they were singing in the White House Sunday. So the students sang for him. He called over some other guards and they were treated to an impromptu concert.

On Sunday, the choir arrived at the White House at 9:45 a.m. and rehearsed for 45 minutes in the East Room. The processional also was practiced. The service lasted 40 minutes. News media were in a separate room with speakers.

The choir joined other guests in light refreshments in the dining room after the service and reception lines. Orange juice, coffee and tiny sweet rolls were on the menu. Then the choir posed with the President. After some 45 minutes, the choir returned to the motel, checked out and took a quick bus tour of Washington, driving down Embassy Row and along Constitution and Independence Aves.

The temperature was comfortable in the mid-50's. The bus left at 5 p.m. for home and after two - thirds of the return trip hit snow in Toledo, Ohio. The bus arrived at 7 a.m., one hour later than expected.

Most students reported to class almost immediately. Some were practice teachers. All were on deck at 11:30 a.m. for a choir rehearsal for the Christmas vespers service.

The message by Msgr. McCarthy was a Thanksgiving meditation titled "Now Thank We All Our God."

A reporter in advance had asked "What are you going to lecture the President on?" and the priest replied, "Ministers generally comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable, but I am here to comfort the afflicted."

His Thanksgiving message was geared to the thought of "be thankful for what we do have." He said the United States seems to have its best times during its worst times. He felt the government should aim at solving man's inner problems rather than too much priority on outer space.

W.H. Atwood Burial Rites Are Held

Graveside services were held at 1 p.m. Tuesday in Pilgrim Home cemetery for Prof. William H. Atwood, 83, of 5820 North Kent Ave., Whitefish Bay, Wis., who died Friday of heart failure in St. Michael's Hospital in Milwaukee.

Prof. emeritus Atwood was born in Armour, S.D., graduated from Hope College in 1912, received a master of science degree at Marquette University. He wrote several textbooks in biology and was listed in "Who's Who in Science."

He served as head of the biology department at Milwaukee State Teachers College for 35 years, retiring in 1957. He was a member of the Hope College Alumni Association and member of the United Community Methodist Church of Whitefish Bay.

Surviving are the wife, Ida, a son, Dr. W. H. Atwood Jr., of Elkhart, Ind., three daughters, Mrs. Frank Prasnikar of Glendale, Wis., Mrs. Curtis Kendall of Wilmette, Ill., and Mrs. John Schuleren of Cedarburg, Wis.; three sisters, Mrs. Charles Davison of Edwardsville, Ind., Mrs. Herman Cook of Lake Worth, Fla., and Mrs. James Stegeman of Muskegon; 12 grandchildren and one great grandchild.







A glimpse into some of the deeper meanings of modern American life was provided in this year's choice of a senior play for Holland Christian High School, "Another Language," a comedy drama by Rose Frank-

It was not a battle of materialism and aesthetics, but rather a contrast between the good American life as lived by a great share of middle class people and the greater vision which includes appreciation of the arts — a sensitivity which is "always there" but not always recognized.

Mrs. Bastian Kruithof, the director, was successful in having most of her cast recognize these differences. All cast members were Hallams, a clan not unlike Galsworthy's Forsyte Saga, headed Gerda Luth as the matriarch, a good woman whose Tuesday night "at homes" were a "must" for her four sons and their wives — all of them Hallams.

Grandma Hallam was strong for family uniformity — eat more of grandma's good food, have larger families, and don't fuss with unnecessary things like music she didn't understand. But she was not above feigning a faint if her idea of

family structure were threatened. Grandpa, played by Dan Mouw, was a kind, sympathetic person, less concerned with family bickering, but lacking the strength to change anything.

Into this framework are fitted four sons, four daughters-in-law and a grandson. One daughter - in - law, Stella, played by Sandy Van Hemert, and the grandson, played by Tom Roels, have this sensitivity to fine arts which puts them into a situation grossly misunderstood by other Hallams outraged by these people who speak "another language." In the denouement, true understanding is achieved by Stella's husband, played by Bill Wildschut.

Others in the cast, all sons of the matriarch and their wives, are Jack Heybour, Laurie Yeomans, Herm Medema, Evonne Deur, Chuck Steenstra and Anita De Nooyer.



Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Nov. 29, 1970
Growing Through Struggle
Matthew 5:10-18
Ephesians 6:10-18
By C. P. Dame

Several years ago a book was published in England with the title, "The Cult of Softness." It describes the attitude many people take in this age. Many shun struggles. Our lesson tells about growth through struggle, because some Christians do not struggle, they grow not, but those who do struggle grow.

I. Jesus calls the persecuted blessed. The first part of the lesson text is from the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus, who preached that sermon, was persecuted. He got a blessing from being persecuted. Jesus told his followers that they would be persecuted. During the first three hundred years of its history the church was persecuted. Christians are blessed because they are persecuted for righteousness' sake. Another phrase "for my sake"—on account of Jesus—teaches that the suffering is for the purpose of advancing the kingdom.

"Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you." The word "revile" shows that the persecutors will tell lies about the believers. No one likes to be lied about. How can such people be happy?

The persecuted believer gives proof of the fact that he belongs to Jesus Christ and that the Holy Spirit is at work in his heart, and that he belongs to a great tradition—the great prophets of the past were also persecuted. The believers of all times can remind themselves of being united to the godly believers of all the past and the present. Christians are still persecuted.

II. Paul tells us that the Christian life is a warfare. While in prison Paul wrote the Ephesians from which the second part of the text is taken. The small congregation, many of whom had come from paganism, had to battle against all manner of foes and much opposition in order to maintain their Christian faith. They needed divine strength. "Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of his might."

Four terms — principalities, powers, world rulers and spiritual hosts of wickedness described the visible enemies of God and his people. And they are hard at work today according to our news media. In order to overcome these superhuman enemies it is essential that Christians "take the whole armour of God" and use the weapons God has provided.

Pal describes a Roman soldier and says that the Christian has weapons which he can use in his holy warfare. When those weapons are used victory is bound to come. And these weapons are much needed today and they are as effective as ever in this worldly age. Through the battles and persecutions spiritual growth will come about.







Those crippled and unable to leave their rooms were contacted by a worker with a list who assisted them in their selection.








Mrs. I. Hajicek Dies at Age 61

West Ottawa's 'Crucible' Rendered With Maturity

The West Ottawa High School opening night performance of Arthur Miller's thought-provoking play, "The Crucible," showed a maturity and sensitivity beyond what one might expect from a high school cast.

The play began a little slowly but gained momentum as the intensity of the play increased drawing out superb performances from the student actors.

The subject of the play is the Salem Witch Trials of 1692. Fear prompted "good" citizens to condemn neighbors to die for witchcraft on the slightest pretense as a collective hysteria deprived the people of their senses.

The play demonstrates how innocent people were condemned to hang because of the wild accusations of foolish children with vengeful motives. John Proctor, played with great sensitivity by Michael Allen, is the victim around which the play centers.

Because he has refused the repeated advances of the child-woman Abigail, portrayed by Linda Stolp, he and his wife, maturely interpreted by Marcia A. Perry, are among the victims sentenced by the testimony of this vengeful dictator of the children.

Linda Stolp plays a convincing power-crazed, self-centered Abigail as she wields control over the other children, played by Chris Godfrey, Cynthia Nienhuis and Emily Ann Porter, to the point of controlling what they see and believe.

David MacQueen as the Rev. Samuel Parris plays a man so intent on seeking out evil and purging it that he is blinded to the truth. Michael Clark is an anguished Rev. John Hale who discovers too late that he has been swept up in a lie and is partly responsible for the executions of innocent people.

An outstanding performance was delivered by John Beem as the elderly Giles Corey who resists the persecutions and accusations with the conviction that he and the others are Godly, innocent persons.

More important than individual plaudits is the fact that the cast worked well together, with no upstaging but with a genuine joint effort to evoke a mood of confusion and fear in the auditorium that left the question of why "good" people can be so easily manipulated by their fears in the minds of the audience.

Also rendering fine performances were Mary Gay Porter, Deborah Brown, Deb Van Kampen, David Walker, Deb Holt, Ron Vander Slik, Ed Sosa, Darrell Vander Hoef, Nancy Ann Kiel and Randy Bower as townspeople. Jim Chrispell and R. Kim Longstreet were the deceived yet well-intending judicial officers.

The play, directed by instructor Phillip Sturdevant assisted by Sharon Veele, was staged with authentic, imaginative costumes on a flexible stage.

Arthur Miller wrote "The Crucible" in 1952 as a reaction to the 1950 Communist scourges of Sen. Joseph McCarthy which brought attacks on many reputable, innocent persons, the program explains.

It is a production which sensitive young people would find especially relevant in an age where labels are cast so carelessly by every faction on their opposition. The play warns of the danger of collective fear so thoughtlessly incited.






The play no doubt took endless hours of costume and set preparation and rehearsal. The effect was evident in an excellent performance.





Co-champions Adrian and Alma dominate the 1970 MIAA all-conference football teams announced today by the league's coaches.


Adrian landed seven players on the all-MIAA offensive and

The teams include 11 seniors, five juniors, six sophomores and a freshman.



pids and Rockford look on paper as the teams to beat in the O-K Red Division this season," concluded Jauch.


