Hope Associate Edits New Book

The University of Nebraska Press has recently published "Current Issues in Animal Learning," a volume edited by Dr. James H. Reynierse, associate professor of psychology at Hope College.

The twelve contributions were organized by Dr. Reynierse in recognition of the University of Nebraska Centennial and as part of an expanded centennial colloquium series sponsored by the University of Nebraska psychology department during the 1968-69 academic year.

Each of the papers is an original empirical, systematic or theoretical contribution centering around the integrating theme of contemporary issues in animal learning psychology.

A chapter by Dr. Reynierse was a cooperative effort with Michael J. Scavio and James Unless, both former students and was entitled "An Ethological Analysis of Classically Conditioned Fear."

Louis Rosendahl Dies at Age 75

Louis Rosendahl, 75, of 298 West 12th St., died late Monday at Holland Hospital following a lingering illness.

Born in The Netherlands, he came to the U.S. as a child of eight. He was a veteran of the First World War, having served with the U.S. Army in France and Belgium. He was a retired poultry farmer.

City Considers Visit of Artrain

Representatives of local civic groups met in City Hall Tuesday to discuss inviting the Michigan Council for the Arts Artrain to Holland at some future date, possibly associated with a Tulip Time festival.

The Artrain, headed by Mrs. William G. Milliken and Mrs. Joseph L. Hudson Jr. is currently being set up to bring outstanding art first-hand to Michigan communities outside urban centers.

Tax Bills Out for Park Township

Park township property tax statements were in the mail today for some 4,200 parcels representing a total tax levy of \$1,021,492.06, according to Mrs. Coralyn Haan, township treasurer.

Total state equalized valuation is \$24,647,850. Tax rates for the West Ottawa school district list \$43.09 per \$1,000 state equalized value. This tax gives 84.3 per cent to schools, 10.3 to the county and 5.3 to the township.

The rate for Park township in the Holland school district lists \$32.90 per \$1,000 valuation. This rate for the area on the south side lists 79.5 per cent for schools, 13.75 per cent for county and 6.75 for the township.

Residents may pay taxes weekdays from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. at the Park township office at 1464 Ottawa Beach Rd.

Dog licenses may be purchased during the tax collection period. This year, each application for a dog license must be accompanied by proof of vaccination for rabies. This calls for a certificate of vaccination with a vaccine licensed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture signed by an accredited veterinarian.

According to the state law, the expiration date of the certificate shall not be earlier than Dec. 31 of the year for which the dog license is issued. It is suggested that applicants wait until after Jan. 1 to have dogs vaccinated so that the two-year period for the vaccination will be good for the 1972 license.

Hear Talk On No-Fault Insurance

Aims of no-fault insurance for Michigan, designed to reduce or eliminate court action on accidents, were outlined at the Chamber of Commerce Early Bird Breakfast this morning in Hotel Warm Friend.

The speaker was Richard Hartman of Lansing, manager of the home office of Auto Owners Insurance Co., who spoke as a representative of the Michigan Insurance Information Service, a public information organization of Michigan's Property Casualty Insurance companies.

Hartman explained a four-bill package currently under consideration by the Michigan legislature which would place limits on legal fees and provide direct payment for injuries and repairs in automotive accidents.

In the latter case, the injured person or the person whose car has been damaged would receive direct payment from his insurance company, covering medical bills, collecting for time lost and repair bills. If the other party involved were at fault, the insurance company would eventually deal with that person's insurance company for settlement.

While this arrangement sounds simple and workable, the variables involved pose many problems, and the speaker said in the final analysis the insurance problem is largely a legal matter.

He said the program was designed after increasing costs of repairs and hospital treatment resulted in a big curve in increasing insurance costs, and he said both the public and the insurance industry agreed "something must be done," but could not agree on just what is to be done. The current package is a modified version of the so-called no-fault insurance.

He said the proposed program calls for limiting legal fees to not more than 25 per cent of the settlement unless other agreements are made in court. He added that high-risk insurance clients cause the most problems and that companies cannot agree on what is to be done with the drunk driver, the driver on drugs, the suspended license, the person on a bet or in a race, or the person eluding the police.

Three main cars will contain art of all kinds and a fourth will serve as a creative workshop. A caboose will be used as an office and lounge for conferences.

Two Michigan State University students, James Remanga and Peter Stoughton, have adopted Artrain as a project in landscape architect courses and surveyed possible sites in Holland. A slide presentation showed sites in the vicinity of Holland depot, near Civic Center, and on new city-owned property at Kollen Park.

When Artrain appears in various communities, plans call for a series of cultural events in each center based on music, art shows, and other facets of the creative arts. The train itself, about 400 feet long, would have a broad sampling of all art forms.

Hopefully, the Artrain will be ready by summer of 1971 and Traverse City will be the first to entertain a visit. Both Gov. Milliken and U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin are residents of Traverse City.

Artrain is designed as a catalyst to stimulate thought and action on art and civic betterment. Its related cultural events could lead to urban beautification, further park development, action on pollution abatement and the like.

Community Action House Holds Meet

The annual business meeting of the Holland Community Action House was held Tuesday at Herrick Public Library with Mrs. Stuart Padnos presiding.

Director Ralph Kickert reported on information and referral service at Community Action House and said that it has been a central location for outreach by social service agencies and organizations. Kickert also commented on the Migrant Legal Assistance Program, Ottawa County Council on Migrant Affairs, HAZAH, a County Health Department Clinic, the Volunteer Service Bureau and the Youth Employment Service (YES).

The director, thanked the leadership of Mrs. Steven Van Grouw and Mrs. Kenneth Armstrong and also thanked Mrs. Padnos, chairman of the board of directors of CAH, who also heads the volunteer receptionists committee.

It was emphasized that as the sphere of influence grows, the need for more volunteers becomes greater.

Dave Meyers thanked Hope College for their donation of the use of the building housing CAH and the retiring board of directors. The board included Mrs. Celestino Reyes, Kenneth Zuerlein and the Rev. William Burd.

Nominated and elected for a three year term were Mrs. Tony Gamez, John Marquis, the Rev. Glen O. Peterman and Frank Zepeda. The nominating committee were Mrs. Carol Van Putten, Ciro Cadena and Hubert Weller.

It was pointed out that there is a great need for a legal aid bureau in the community.

Mark Vander Ark reported on housing and the new project of HAZAH, 115 to 118 units, that would be located on South Washington in the near future.

Director Kickert announced that as an extension of the summer Migrant program, Church Women United are sponsoring Thomas Amaya to work as a liaison between local social service agencies and the Latin American community. He will be available at Community Action House to meet individual and collective needs of this group. He will coordinate his work with that of the CAH in an effort "to help people to find help."

Both the director and the chairman urged everyone to become active members by volunteering their services or becoming paying patrons in this venture.

'Explosions' Said Jet Sonic Booms

Holland police said they received numerous telephone calls from concerned residents early Wednesday who reported hearing what sounded like an explosion.

Police said the first noise was heard at 1:50 a.m. and the second noise, similar to the first, was heard at 2:30.

Officers said they noticed what appeared to be a jet plane flying toward the east high in the sky following the second noise and assumed the noise was a sonic boom caused by the aircraft.

No damage reports were received by police.

Council Has 50-Minute Meeting

City Council approved purchase of three trucks for city departments at a regular meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

Low bid of R. E. Barber Inc. for a 1971 display van for the street department for \$2,598 was approved. The \$2,900 bid of Huizenga Dodge for a four-wheel drive half-ton pickup truck with plow for the street department was approved as best bid. De Nooyer Chevrolet Inc. submitted best bid of \$3,149.98 for a one-ton platform truck for the cemetery department. There were trade-ins on all transactions.

Also approved was a Library Board agreement with Gordon M. Buitendorp Associates Inc. for architectural service in connection with a new entrance on the parking lot side of Herrick Public Library with fee not to exceed 10 per cent of construction costs. In a previous communication, estimated cost was listed at \$21,000.

A communication from Holland-Zeeland Family YMCA requesting the use of Civic Center one afternoon and evening a week on a regularly scheduled basis from January through April for various activities was referred to the city manager for study and report. City Manager William L. Bopf said he also was conducting an evaluation study of Civic Center uses and suggested that future bookings the next 60 to 90 days be on a tentative basis. He said Civic Center rate revisions also were under study and new rates probably would be effective July 1.

Council set Dec. 16 as date for public hearing on an application of Dr. Laurence Schmidt, for a variance of fire district requirements in constructing a veterinary clinic building at 956 Washington Ave.

City Clerk D. W. Schipper submitted a report listing appointments to be made during January. Persons whose terms expire are Mildred Campbell, Greater Holland Community Foundation, five years; Ralph Bouwman, citizen member of Board of Review, three years; Gordon Cunningham and Jack Leenhouts, officer members of Board of Review, one year; John Keuning and Larry Geuder, Planning Commission, three years; Board of Review appointments are by Council, planning commission by the mayor, and the community foundation by mayor with council concurrence.

Certifications were confirmed for Councilman Lamb, Lamb Inc., engineering department, \$3,537.92; Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolts Inc., Park department, \$3.06.

Council adopted a city manager recommendation on a recreation plan for the city, listing priorities at Lincoln School and Washington School. An application for grant assistance under the State Recreation Bond issue will be submitted to the appropriate state agency.

Also approved was a city manager recommendation approving service station permits for Neuman's Car Wash, two underground tanks and two pumps on Washington Ave.; Wooden Shoe Texaco, convert exterior of station at US-31 and 16th St.; Fill-N-Wash, Car Wash at 147 River Ave., latter subject to requirements of fire chief and relocation of curb cuts.

Council approved renewal of comprehensive liability and workmen's compensation insurance for the city with Employers Insurance of Wausau, Wis., with premium quotation of \$43,373 for workman's compensation, and quotation of \$35,416.50 for liability, with authority to add certain employees in the Department of Environmental Health and the Board of Public Works for personal injury coverage at approximate cost of \$15 per employee.

Councilman Robert Dykstra thanked the city manager for his part in having the C and O improve crossings on Ottawa Ave. at 16th and 17th Sts., and asked he convey the appreciation to the railroad.

Dykstra also referred to the published open letter to mayor and Council by a list of merchants pointing to a tax boost of \$25,000 a year for maintaining the proposed downtown mall, "without prior knowledge." Dykstra said a \$24,000 figure had been quoted at the open hearing in Civic Center, and since then a lesser figure of \$15,000 to \$18,000 has been advanced by City Manager Bopf.

As for rerouting Tulip Time parades, Bopf said the Tulip Time board is considering routing the parade over River Ave. and west on Eighth St. Mayor Nelson Bosman said the route is still under study.

Councilman Lamb said the newly appointed building authority is studying additional parking for downtown, and Bopf added that under the authority

P. Lambers Swept From Breakwater

Companion Attempts
Rescue; Victim Won
Vietnam War Citations

Congressional Medal of Honor winner Paul R. Lambers, 28, of 986 Graaflach Rd., who braved hostile gunfire in Vietnam to win the nation's highest military award, drowned Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. when swept by high waves from the south breakwater at Holland Harbor.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said Lambers and a companion, Morton Van Howe, 22, of route 2, Hamilton, were walking along the lower level of the breakwater about 30 yards from the east end when the pair was washed into the chilly waters of the channel.

Van Howe managed to swim to the safety of the breakwater and prepared to dive into the waters in an attempt to rescue Lambers. But deputies said Lambers vanished beneath the waves before Van Howe could dive in.

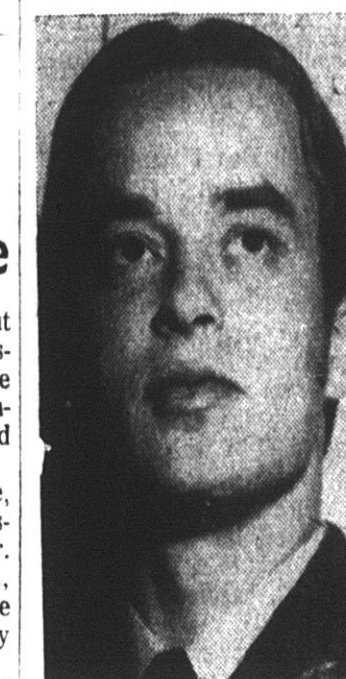
A search today by members of the sheriff's department marine patrol failed to locate the body.

Deputies said Lambers, a Holland Christian high school graduate, and Van Howe had gone to the channel with Van Howe's brother, Peter, 17, of 254 West 16th St., who remained on rocks between the pier and breakwater.

Deputies said the walk on the wave-swept breakwater apparently resulted from a dare.

A witness on the Ottawa Beach side of the channel, David Wojtas, 22, a Hope College junior from Rockford, Ill., notified Coast Guard officials after he watched as the two were washed from the breakwater.

The Coast Guard launched a search of the channel and shoreline areas with a 44-foot motor lifeboat and a helicopter from

Chicago equipped with search lights. The search, hampered by 10-12 foot seas and winds of 30 miles per hour, was called off at 8:50 p.m.

Lambers was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Richard M. Nixon during ceremonies Nov. 24, 1969 at the White House.

He was cited for his actions in Vietnam Aug. 20, 1968, while a staff sergeant with the 25th Infantry Division.

His platoon leader was seriously wounded by a Viet Cong attack and Lambers helped repair a recoilless rifle, directed fire point-blank at the attackers and single handedly repulsed the attack by exploding mines and throwing grenades, killing nine Viet Cong.

The citation continued that Lambers repeatedly exposed himself to hostile fire at great risk to his own life in order to redistribute ammunition and to care for seriously wounded comrades and to move them to sheltered positions during the five-hour battle in the enemy offensive against Tay Ninh City.

Lambers, who entered the service in May, 1967, also won the Distinguished Service Cross in Vietnam, the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, National Defense Service Ribbon and Vietnam campaign ribbons.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Jeanette Lambers of 986 Graaflach Rd., a brother, Howard of Kalamazoo and two sisters, Mrs. Theodore (Myra) Zwip of Grand Rapids and Mrs. Charles (Carol) Witteven of Fremont.

Mercury Reached 64 in Holland

Accompanied by warm, gusty winds Tuesday's spring-like temperatures reached a high of 64 degrees.

An above 60 reading is rare for December in Holland when the maximum temperatures usually run in the 40s and 50s.

Tuesday's high was only one degree short of the 65 maximum recorded during December, 1961.

Merchants to Aid Shoppers With Parking Fees

As a gesture of good will to Christmas shoppers, most downtown stores will finance an hour's parking for shoppers making purchases of a dollar or more, starting Saturday and running through Dec. 24.

This action was taken by the Downtown Merchants Association, following a mailed questionnaire. Participants do not include dime stores or similar establishments dealing in small items with limited markups, or those stores which provide their own parking.

Morrie Tubergen, president of the association, said participating stores plan to have a convenient roll of nickels at cash registers. He said merchants adopted this system in preference to a free parking plan two years ago which resulted in abuse of privileges and some all-day parking by employees and professional people.

Pleads Guilty To Larceny Charge

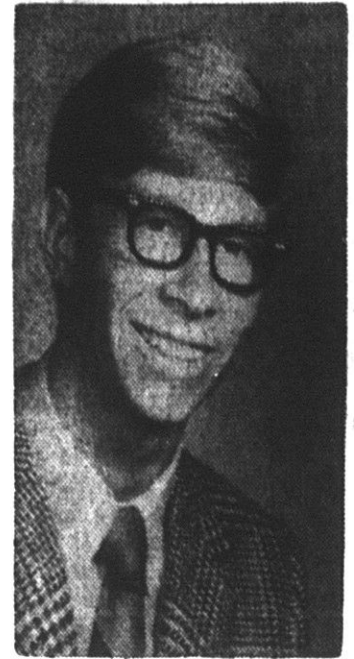
Name Helder To O-K Honor Team

Jim Helmink Hits 22 To Pace Scorers

GRAND RAPIDS — Holland High's basketball team almost pulled out another upset victory over two-time Class A state champion, Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills here Saturday night but the Indians roared back in the second half to overtake the Dutch by a final 60 - 59 score.

Coach Don Piersma's Dutch raced out to a 14-11 first quarter lead and increased the margin to 35-29 at the intermission behind the hot shooting of Jim Helmink and the fine backward work of Greg Slenk and "Buck" De Vries.

Ottawa went into a zone defense in the second half and trailed 43-34 with five minutes to go in the third quarter. At this point, reserve Bob Ellis came off the bench with four key points to cut Holland's lead to 45-43, heading into the final stanza.

Dave Brownson swished two free throws to give the Dutch a 57-56 edge but Terry Bouknicht canned a basket and Ellis clinched the victory on a tip-in. De Vries put in two free throws to close out the scoring at 60-59.

Fred Trimble, 6'4" forward led the Indians in scoring with 17 points while Helmink topped all scorers with 22 and De Vries added 13. Brownson and Slenk chipped in with 12 and 10 for the Dutch.

"We played tremendous defense and I'm happy with the outcome, even though we lost," said Piersma. Brownson played a fine floor game while Slenk and Helmink put on quite a show.

Holland canned 21 of 24 free throws and hit on 39 per cent of its shots from the field compared to the Indians 45 per cent total.

Coach Ken Bauman's little Dutch dropped a heartbreaker in overtime, 49-48 as Jed De Boer led Holland with 22 points. Steve Miller and Ron Israels tossed in 10 each for the Dutch.

Holland led at the half, 29-25 but missed easy layups throughout the game to hand the Indians the decision.

"We have a lot of work to do," Bauman stated after the defeat.

Holland will host Kentwood Friday in its home opener.

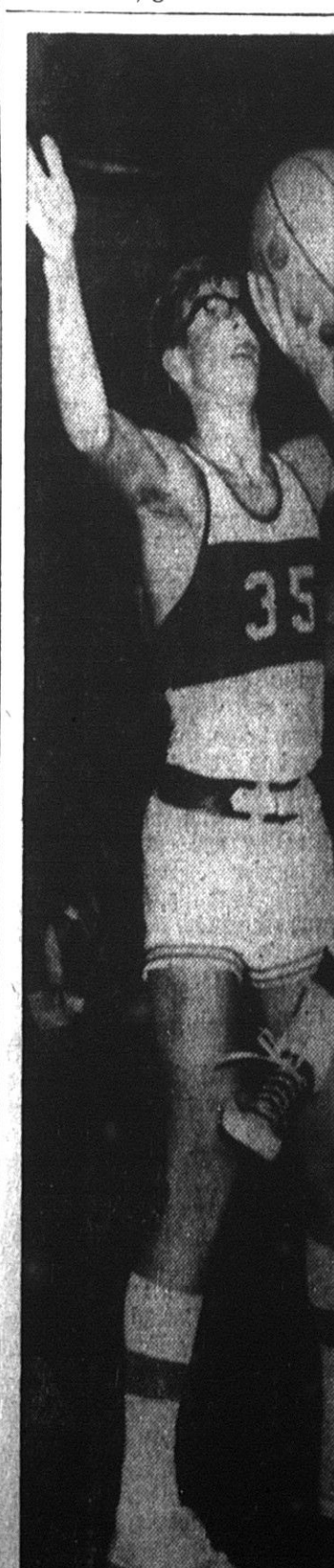

FREEDOM AND KARL BLEY

In these days when we hear all the criticism of the American system and are regaled almost exclusively with details of its shortcomings, it is somewhat reassuring to note that some people still consider this country the symbol of freedom in the world. The adventure of Karl Bley is one of those reassuring stories.

We may, of course, conclude that Bley just was misled and misinformed about this country. We may conclude that he hasn't been listening to the right people. He hasn't heard the disquisitions of Jane Fonda or recognized the justice of the complaints of the Black Panthers.

Yet it is a fact that his brother, who has been living in this country long enough to know, was the one who encouraged, engineered, and assisted in Karl's escape from Communist East Germany to this country. Perhaps Karl's brother is insensitive, too, but we are willing to bet that those people who have lived where infringement of freedom is governmental policy will find life in this country extremely pleasant. It is even pleasant enough to risk one's life for, and to plan for for years and years.

Perhaps the Bley brothers have more gratitude for the kind of country this is than many Americans who take all their freedom for granted and can see only their minor inconveniences. We like that Karl Bley story. It says something good about us.

1 John 3:11-18, 23-24

We are living in a time when many people are concerned about the poor, the minority groups and the handicapped. More people show concern for others in December than at any other time and that is due to the fact that Christmas awakens concern. This lesson teaches us to love God and to show this by loving our fellowmen.

I. God tells us to love one another. God spoke through John, the apostles whom Jesus loved much. John used the word "love" many times in his writings. Do you remember which books of the Bible John wrote? The people to whom John wrote had heard from the beginning of their Christian life that they should love. Although they had heard before that they should love, John said that this duty needed to be told again. It is hard to love some people at certain times. Christians should love each other and all mankind. Love removes fences.

"And not like Cain... who murdered his brother." Who had deed may brand a person for life. Cain slew his brother because "his own works were evil and his brother's righteous." Abel, by his goodness, reproved Cain which hurt his pride. Cain hated Abel, the world hates God's people and the world shows it variously. Good men by their righteousness reprove evil men who do not like it. To love is Christian but it is hard.

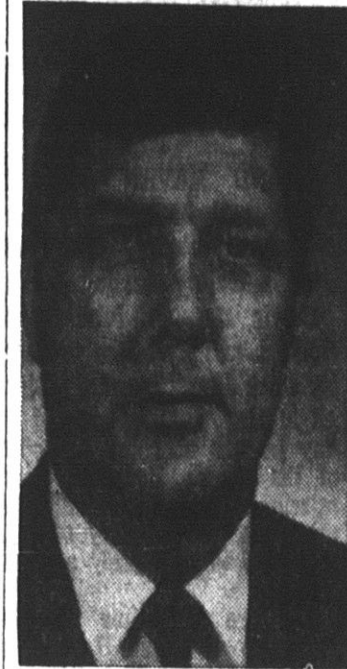

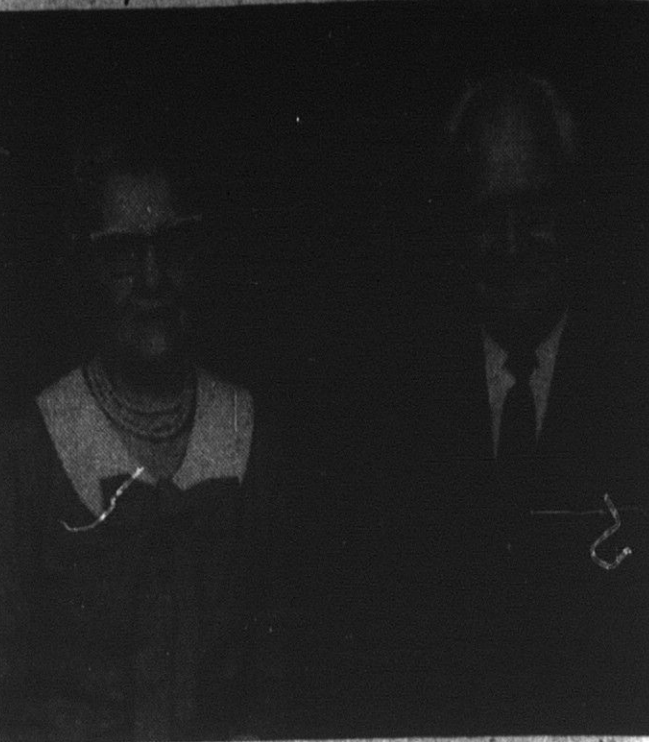

The following question has been submitted to this office: "May a member of the County Board of Commissioners be appointed to the Board of Road Commissioners?"

My answer is that the proposed appointment would not be valid. Michigan Statutes, Section 5.33 states that no Commissioner while he is a member of the Board, shall be eligible to appointment to any county office or position that is within the jurisdiction of the Board of Commissioners.

Since the Board has the power to fill a vacancy of the Board of Road Commissioners, this position is within the jurisdiction of the Board of Commissioners and no member of the Board of Commissioners may be appointed to fill the vacancy.

However, if the proposed appointee, resigns or is not re-elected, then that individual should be eligible for appointment to the Board of Road Commissioners. The appointee must take place after the individual resigns or is not re-elected for any other reason no longer holds office with the Board of Commissioners. In other words, you should not consider the appointment of a member of the Board of Commissioners to the Board of Road Commissioners until after that individual is no longer a member of the Board of Commissioners.

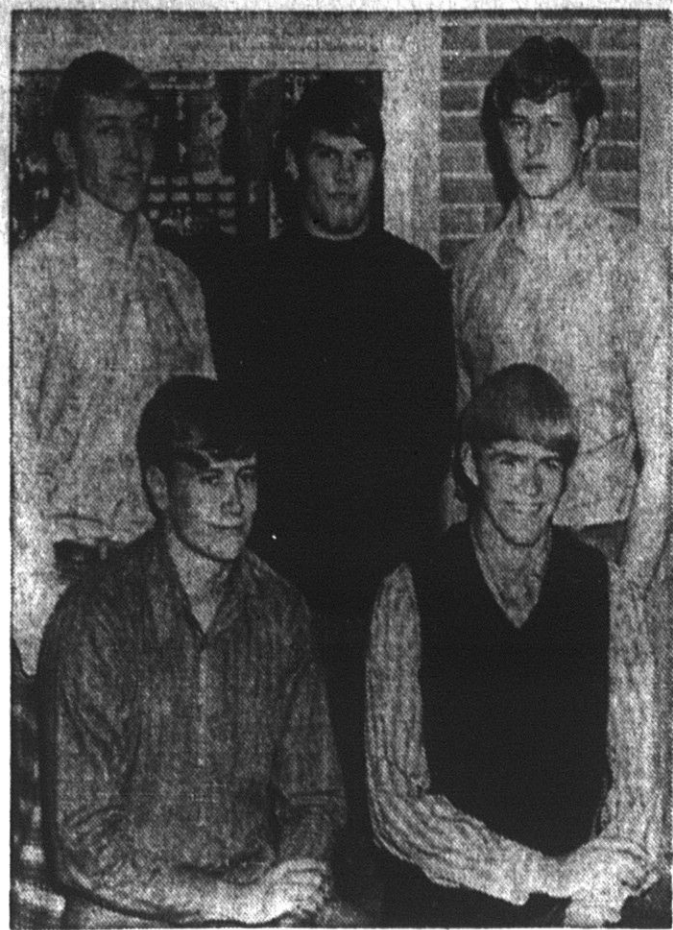

3 Science Institutes Set at Hope

The National Science Foundation (NSF) has announced that Hope College will host three Summer Institutes in 1971, including a new one in "Oceanography and the Limnology of the Great Lakes."

Hope has hosted summer institutes in mathematics and chemistry for several years. The NSF will grant Hope a total of \$156,842 for the three 1971 institutes for junior and senior high school teachers of science and mathematics.

Dr. Eugene C. Jekel, professor of chemistry at Hope, will return from a one-year leave of absence to again direct the institute in chemistry, for which Hope will be granted \$61,350.

The institute for mathematics teachers will again operate under the direction of Dr. Jay E. Folkert, professor of mathematics and chairman of the department at Hope. The NSF will grant \$52,140 for the mathematics institute.

The NSF also announced its intention to continue to support the mathematics institute through 1973 and the chemistry institute through 1972.

The new institute in oceanography and the limnology of the Great Lakes will be directed by Dr. J. Cotter Tharin, chairman of Hope's geology department. The NSF grant of \$43,352 will allow 40 junior and senior high school science teachers to study at Hope for six weeks, July 5-Aug. 13, 1971.

Dr. Tharin will be joined on the institute staff by Dr. William French, assistant professor of geology at Hope; Dr. David Klein, chairman of Hope's chemistry department and Dr. Ron Ward, chairman of the biology department at Grand Valley State College.

During the institute, the geology department's extensive facilities—including the 37-foot research vessel Infinity H and several smaller craft—will be extensively utilized in Lake Michigan and Lake Macatawa (particularly the Pine Creek Bay area of the latter), and in heretofore unexamined Kelly Lake, located a few miles west-southwest of Holland.

DeRidder, member of the Tulip City Mineral and Gem Society, told about rock collecting and polishing of stones, the fastest growing hobby in this area.

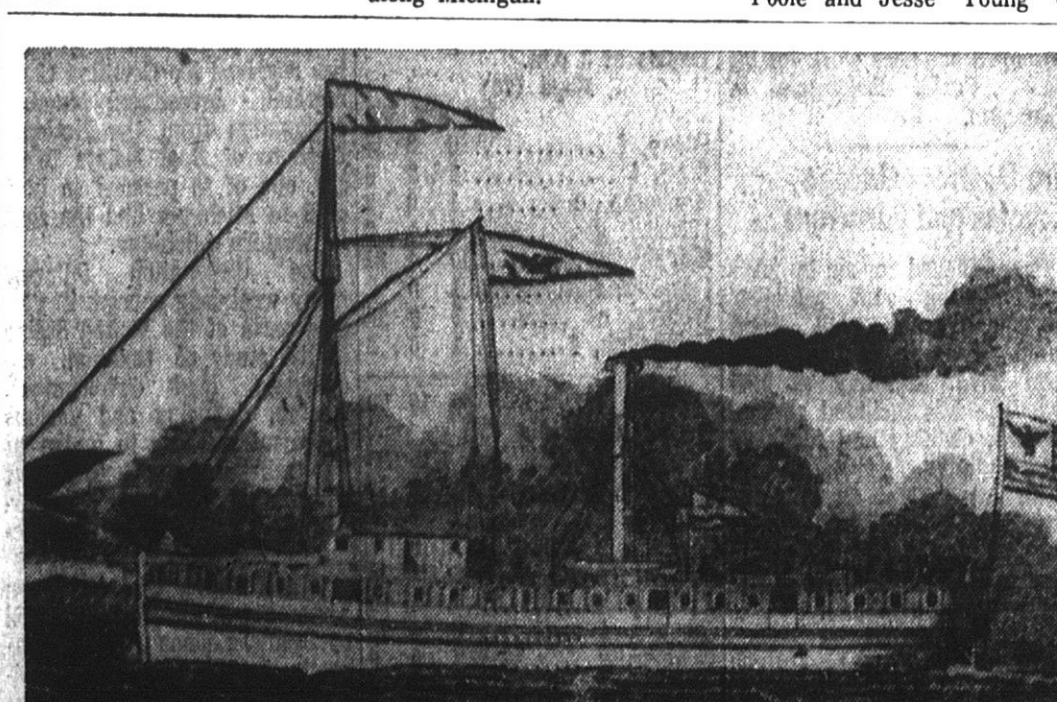

J. H. Schierbeek, 82, of Coevorden, The Netherlands, died Saturday morning after a lingering illness.

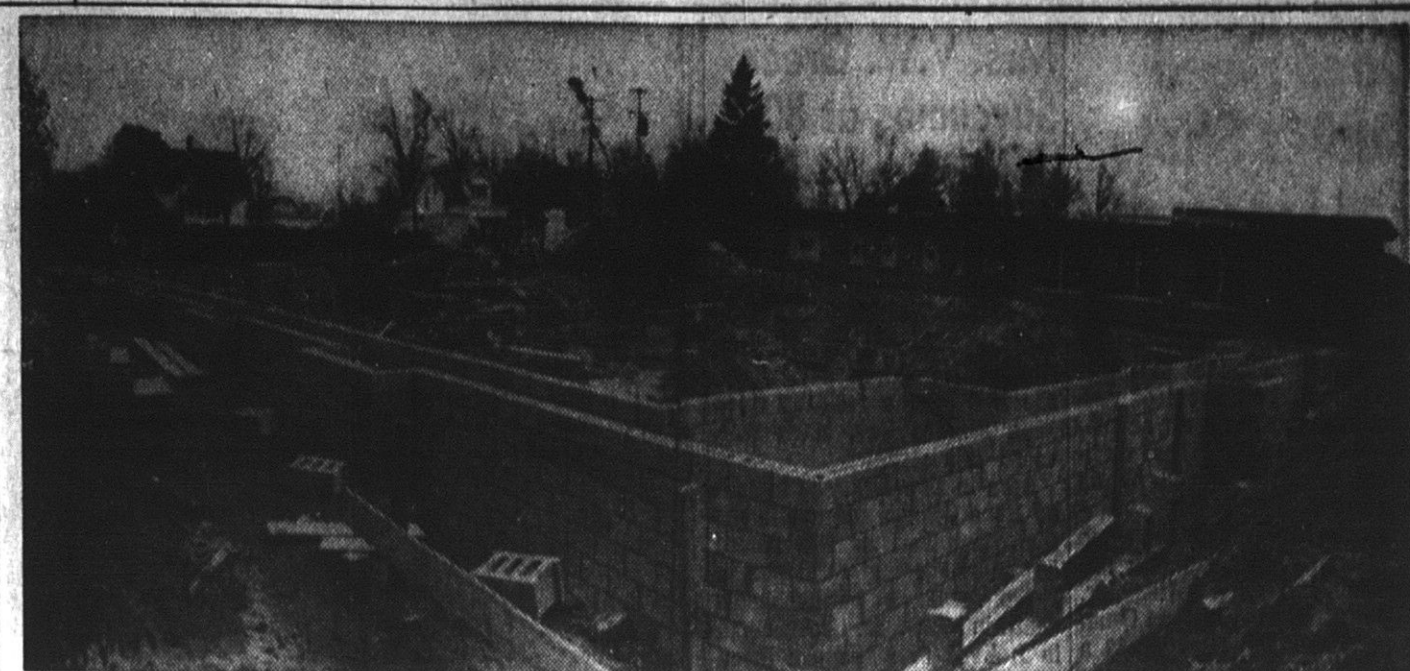

FIRE DESTROYS PHOENIX — Back in 1847 some Hollanders were coming to Holland, Mich., and other west Michigan communities to settle and spend their first Thanksgiving with the settlers who had come with Dr. A. C. Van Raalte and the Rev. Cornelius Vander Meulen and Janneke Vande Luyster. They were aboard the propulsion driven steamer Phoenix which had sailed from Buffalo Nov. 11, 1847, the last scheduled trip of the season. It had left Manitowoc, Wis., on the last lap of a more than 4,000-mile

ocean and lake voyage and had covered the "horse shoe" of the Great Lakes with Chicago as their destination. Then on Sunday, Nov. 21, at 4 a.m., 15 miles north of Sheboygan, Wis., and five miles off the Wisconsin shore, flames broke out on the under side of the deck above the boiler. Of the 200 Dutchmen aboard, only 25 survived the holocaust. In all, 43 were saved. One Dutchman, Hendrick J. Esselinkpass, made it to Holland but he did not arrive in time for Thanksgiving.

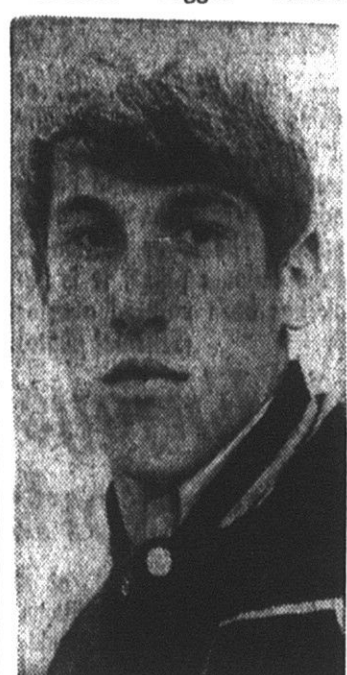

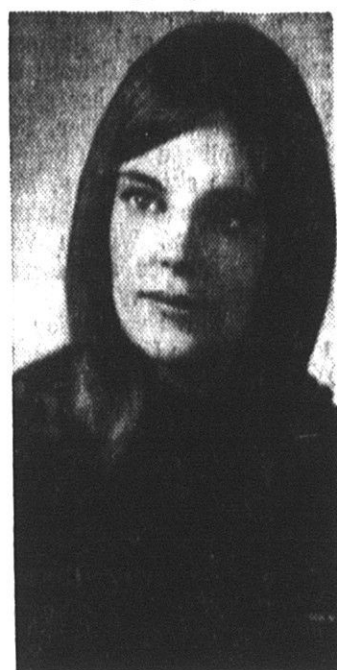

Dogs Need Rabies Shots For Licenses

Dog licenses for 1971 went on sale Tuesday at the city treasurer's office in City Hall, and attention was called to the state requirement that proof of vaccination for rabies must be submitted for all dogs. These certificates must be signed by an accredited veterinarian.

License fees remain the same as last year, \$1 for males and unsexed and \$2 for females. Dog owners in the Allegan County portion of the city pay \$2 a dog. The license period runs through Feb. 28 after which fees are doubled. Treasurer Jack Leenhouts said Holland city annually registers about 1,550 dogs. Dogs under six months old need no licenses but licenses should be obtained when they reach six months.

Allegan County Treasurer James Boyce and County Dog Warden George Wolters also are calling attention to the state law which requires proof of vaccination for rabies for all dogs. All dog fees in Allegan county are \$2.

Boyce cautioned persons issuing dog licenses to examine carefully all certificates to determine if the license to be issued will not exceed the time for which the vaccination is guaranteed; to record certificate number of the veterinarian on the face of the license application, and to write the expiration date of the certificate on the application.

Kennel licenses do not fall under requirements of this particular law.

The Michigan Veterinary Medical Association is located in Holland.

CD Siren Test Held

Civil Defense warning sirens in Ottawa county were tested at 11 a.m. Friday with "no malfunctions reported." CD head Glen Timmer said.

The test alert included a one minute steady tone, followed by one minute of silence and a one minute wailing tone.

In addition to the sirens, radio monitors in schools, hospitals and industries were tested.

Timmer said members of police departments and boards of public works cooperated by checking operations of the sirens in their communities.

In Holland, Civil Defense warning sirens are at five locations including Central Ave. at Eighth St.; Central Ave. and 30th St.; 23rd St. and Diekema Ave.; Eighth St. and Cypress and 27th St. and Myrtle Ave.

The sirens are to be used to provide a warning of impending peacetime disasters or enemy attacks.

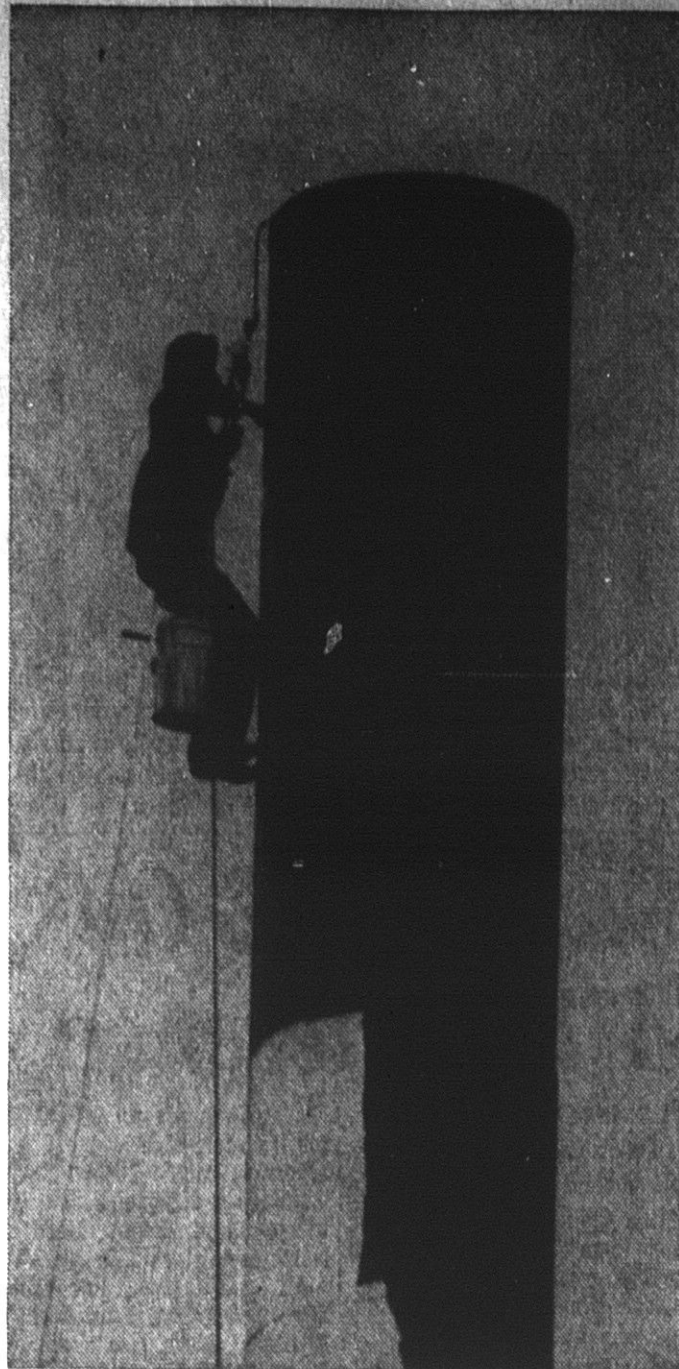

Township Sues Sewer Authority

GRAND HAVEN — Another suit was filed in Ottawa Circuit Court Wednesday by Grand Haven township, and its supervisor, Emil Teska, in connection with the installation of a proposed sewage disposal plant on property, now owned by the Grand Haven - Spring Lake sewer authority and located on Memorial airport.

Named defendant in the latest suit is the Sewer Authority, which recently acquired 26 acres of land on the southwest corner of the airport as a site for the disposal plant.

The township claims that construction and operation of a sewage plant is contrary to the zoning ordinance of the township, would be detrimental to the value of nearby property and houses and would be a public nuisance.

The township further claims that the plant would pollute navigable and non-navigable streams into which it will discharge its excess waste and will endanger water supplies in the area.

The plaintiff petitions the court to issue an injunction prohibiting any action by the Authority until a decision is made by the State Court of Appeals on another suit which challenges the legality of the annexation of the airport property to the city. The Circuit Court has ruled that the annexation is legal, as it is a park.

A hearing is asked and the court is asked to determine that the proposed site is contrary to the zoning regulations of the township. After the hearing, it is requested that a permanent injunction be granted.

Shinabarger Scores 24 In Losing Effort

RIVER FOREST, Ill. — Hope College opened its basketball season here Tuesday night on the heartbreaking side as they lost to Concordia College, 73-70 after leading 32-30 at the half.

Hope led by as many as eight points in the first half as Dan Shinabarger led the first half scorers with 16 points against a man-to-man defense.

Concordia switched to a zone defense with a chaser on Shinabarger in the second half and held Hope's excellent scorer to only eight points in the final 20 minutes.

Shinabarger led the scoring parade for both teams with 24 points while teammate Marty Snoop chipped in with 15 and Wolters added 10. Dave Heiden led the winners with 18 while Craig Mueller scored 16.

The Dutch scored one more field goal, 30 to 29, than Concordia, but were able to make only 10 of 23 free throws compared to 15 of 24 for the winners which turned out to be the difference of the contest.

Hope outbounded Concordia, 71-47 as Wolters led the Dutchmen with 16 and showed why he is called by Coach Russ DeVette as the "most improved" player on the team this winter with his fine performance.

Concordia outshot Hope from the field, 38 per cent to 37 by hitting on 29 of 75 shots compared to Hope's 30 of 80 attempts.

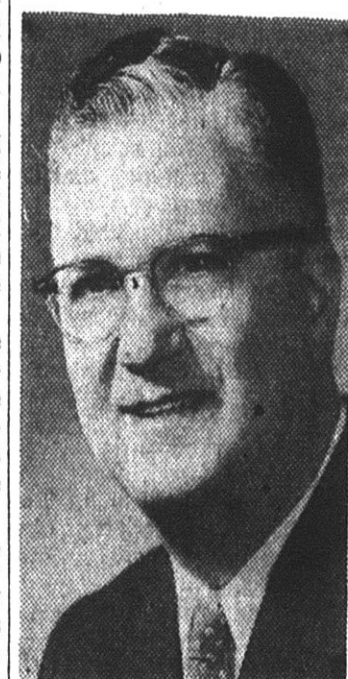
