Judge Sets Aside Court Judgment

GRAND HAVEN—Judge Raymond L. Smith has entered an order in Ottawa Circuit Court setting aside a default judgment of \$20,000 entered in a suit brought by Michigan Terminix Co. of Michigan against a former employee, Dale D. Brown, Coopersville. The attorneys for the two parties agreed to the stipulation as it was agreed that the judgment was inadvertently taken.

The judge ordered that the judgment, taken Nov. 8, be set aside and the cause restored to the trial docket. The defendant is given the usual time to answer, as provided in the court rules.

The suit was started by the Michigan firm, claiming the former employee had used his knowledge from the firm to cause damage to the firm's operations.

Shelley Speet Scholarship Fund Formed

Establishment of the Shelley Speet Mills Memorial Scholarship Fund was announced at a meeting of the distribution committee of the Greater Holland Community Foundation Wednesday.

The new scholarship fund is in memory of Shelley Speet Mills, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Speet of Holland, who was murdered in the Mills apartment in Grand Rapids Sept. 10, 1970. The couple had been married less than three weeks and the murder is still unsolved.

The fund currently has some \$1,300 from the sale of wedding gifts plus memorial gifts at the time of death. The trust is for music and art scholarships in the Holland area on both high school and college level, and under the terms of the trust, the Speet family will appoint a screening committee to process applications. Shelley was a talented art student and her husband, William Mills, is band director and music instructor at Lowell High School.

Gifts for the fund may be received at any time.

In other businesses, the distribution committee authorized payment of \$5,000 to Community Action House, the gift of an anonymous Holland donor.

The committee also reviewed the financial statement of the foundation. During the past year, the foundation purchased a building at 548 West 18th St. for \$22,000 to be used by the Ottawa County Mental Health Services. An additional \$12,625.75 was spent for remodeling, furnishings and parking lot improvement. A share of the cost was realized in the sale of the property of the former Holland Counseling Center at Van Raalte Ave. and 15th St.

BPW Names Electrical Plant Head

The appointment of Raymond J. Klies as superintendent of the James De Young power plant was announced Tuesday by Superintendent of Utilities Guy E. Bell.

Approval of the appointment was given by the Board of Public Works at its regular meeting Monday afternoon.

The position of power plant superintendent carries with it the dual role of chief engineer for Holland's power plant.

Klies' appointment fills the vacancy caused by the death last month of Lester B. Overway, who had been power plant superintendent for the past 6½ years.

Klies, 47, has been employed by the Board of Public Works for the past 24 years, having started on May 19, 1947, as a water tender. Other positions he has filled at the power plant are those of boiler operator, turbine and switchboard operator, and chief boiler operator. 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GARY, Ind.—Mrs. Roger Smit, 24, wounded a week ago when shot in the head by an assailant who posed as a police officer in a telephone call, was reported in "fair" condition Monday at Methodist Hospital here.

She had been listed in serious condition in the hospital's intensive care unit. Mrs. Smit, the former Ruth Achterhof of Holland, was removed from the intensive care unit last week.

Gary police were expected to return Lester D. Adams, 21, of Gary, to Indiana to face charges in the kidnapping. Adams was taken into custody by Mississippi authorities Friday as he prepared to leave the Jackson, Miss., airport in a plane.

Gary police Det. Wally De Rose said Adams had signed extradition papers and would be returned to Indiana in a day or two to face charges in Lake County criminal court at Crown Point.

De Rose said Adams came under suspicion shortly after police were able to talk with Mrs. Smit.

Mrs. Smit provided a description of a house to which she was taken, a truck and a dog that smelled. De Rose said he was able to locate the house and determine a subject and his name.

Detectives learned the man had left his place of employment and was believed heading by plane for Chicago or Mississippi.

Mrs. Smit received a telephone call at her Munster, Ind. home Monday, Nov. 29 by a man posing as a police officer who claimed her husband, a coach at Illiana Christian High School Lansing, Ill., had been injured and asked her to meet the caller in Gary.

De Rose said Mrs. Smit went to a prearranged location where a man with a handgun forced his way into the car and the two drove to another car and then to a garage and a house.

Later Mrs. Smit was taken to a wooded area near the house where she was ordered on the ground and shot in the back of the head with a large caliber handgun.

Mrs. Smit staggered from the woods onto a street where two women found her and summoned aid.

GRAND RAPIDS — East Grand Rapids, using a well balanced scoring attack, downed West Ottawa's Panthers, 83-59, here Friday evening, in the Panthers basketball opener. First game jitters and too many turnovers by the Panthers cost them the game.

It was evident that this was not East's first game of the season as they were more polished than the Panthers. They opened the season a week ahead of West Ottawa and Coach Joe Jauch thought this might have made the difference along with the fact that one of the Panthers' starting guards was on the sick list this past week.

Mike Gorman, West Ottawa's big center was in foul trouble early in the game and he was not able to play the entire game. The Panthers rebounding was not at its best and they were guilty of 22 turnovers. East had a very well balanced scoring attack as the five starters all hit in double figures. The Panthers rebounding was superb as it was also well balanced by the entire team.

West Ottawa could only get two players in the double figure bracket as Ray Wells and Con Zimmermand hit on 10 points apiece. West Ottawa did show some speed and Jauch figures with the first game under their belt and the return of some players to good health they will be much improved. Bill VandenBerge was fighting a bad cold all week and Steve Hartman should return to the line-up soon.

There were a few bright spots for the Panthers. Wells, a forward who should see lots of action this season, scored 10 points and showed some fine rebounding. Wells and Gorman led in that department and Jauch singled out Zimmermand, Doug Vork and Wells on their defensive play.

HAMILTON — The Hamilton Hawkeyes coached by Tom Bos dropped their second basketball game of the season here Friday night to Byron Center, 62-59.

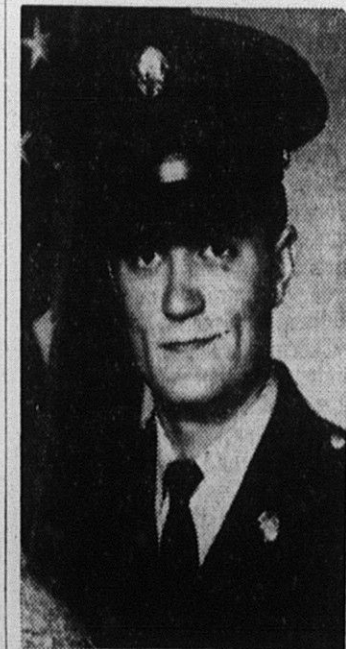

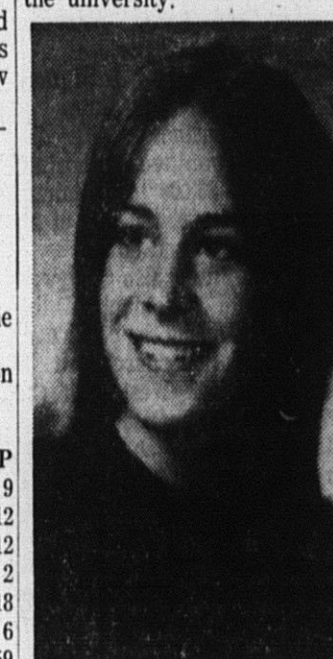

Section 6
EEA Sum Set
For Ottawa

GRAND HAVEN — William L. Kennedy, chairman of the Ottawa county Board of Commissioners, today announced that initial funds have been received from the U.S. Department of Labor to fund section 6 of the Emergency Employment Act.

The federal government is funding 90 per cent of the program, and that figure for section 6 amounts to \$332,500. The local unit of government must raise the balance, and this can be in kind. Section 6 funding is in addition to section 5. Section 5 funds were received in October and the federal share there was \$747,000.

The U.S. Department of Labor has approved two additional positions for the county, six new positions for the city of Holland, two for the city of Grand Haven, two for the city of Zeeland and two for the North Ottawa Community Hospital.

Other new positions approved are two teachers aides for Allendale public schools, four for Coopersville public schools, 11 in Grand Haven public schools, three for Holland public schools, seven for Jenison public schools, one secretary for the Intermediate school district, four for the Spring Lake school district, six for West Ottawa public schools and three for Zeeland public schools.

The two additional workers for the county are a sanitarian for the health department and an environmental planner for the County Planning Commission. The six new positions for the city of Holland are five parking attendant meter patrolmen and a sanitation inspector. The two Grand Haven positions are a typist clerk and an animal warden.

Two Zeeland positions are a groundsman and a water service man for the Board of Public Works, two for North Ottawa Hospital for a cardiopulmonary aide and an in-service coordinator.

The school positions list two teachers aides for Allendale; a fleet custodian and three custodial aides for Coopersville; four teachers, one maintenance man and six teacher aides for Grand Haven; two teachers and a secretary for Holland, a librarian, four secretaries and two custodians for Jenison, a remedial reading teacher, a maintenance man, a study hall supervisor and a teachers aide for Spring Lake; a recreation teacher, one elementary teacher and four custodial maintenance trainees for West Ottawa and three teachers aides for Zeeland.

Section 5 had previously established 112 positions and as of this date 74 have been filled. Both programs are designed to give preference to Vietnam veterans, public assistance recipients, minority groups and other disadvantaged individuals.

Oscar Peterson, 90, of 5 East Eighth St., life-long resident of Holland who served as city clerk from 1927 to 1947, died early Friday in Holland Hospital where he was admitted last Saturday.

His first job after graduating from high school was as conductor on the electric railroad which ran between Holland and Macatawa during the summer season. Later the company expanded with runs to Saugatuck and Grand Rapids. After 12 years with the interurban, he went to the Holland Shoe Co. for 15 years, leaving in 1927 to become city clerk, for four years before becoming clerk.

City business was less complicated in those years. There was no city manager and no city auditor, and the clerk's office absorbed all the functions not specifically assigned to other departments.

In earlier days, Peterson was a leading pitcher in softball, playing several years on shoe company team. An enthusiastic sportsman, he was an enthusiastic fisherman and when he retired in 1947 he moved to his summer cottage at Chippewa, remodeling it for a year-round home.

For 25 years, he was active as a director in the Ottawa Savings and Loan Association.

In 1955 he received a 50-year jewel and lifetime membership in the Knights of Pythias. He had joined Castle Lodge No. 153 of Holland in 1904 and served in many capacities. In 1952 when Castle Lodge of Holland disbanded, he transferred to Muskegon Lodge No. 32.

Surviving are the wife, Josie; a son-in-law, Everett Elwood of Sun City, Ariz.; two stepsons, Clyde H. Coster of Detroit and Lloyd Coster of San Clemente, Calif.; two stepdaughters, Mrs. James (Virginia) Birney of Mason and Mrs. Matthew (Carma) Erwin of Harbor Springs; 15 step-grandchildren, several step-great-grandchildren, several nieces and nephews.

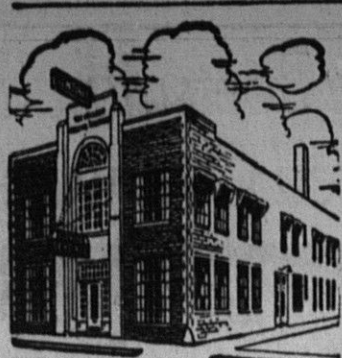

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THE TRUTH MUST OUT

Ultimately the truth must out. And the Office of Economic Opportunity says: "We don't have any good validated theories for moving people out of poverty." What this means is, we just go ahead and try this and that but we haven't any reason to believe that any of our theories have worked, though they have cost us billions of dollars. If you can get a bureaucrat to admit the above, you must be hitting at the truth.

What happens says the Office of Economic Opportunity is this: "more than a third of the poor in any one year move above the poverty level the next year but that most are replaced by others slipping down." Moreover, according to the statistics of the OEO the decline in the number of people on the poverty level shows little relationship to any program. It simply reflects the over - all economic growth. This says that given an opportunity to work, people will do so. And this is buttressed by statistics showing that the greatest decrease in poverty has been in families headed by males, people in a position to accept and hold a job.

We think this honesty on the part of the Office of Economic Opportunity is refreshing. Now if we could get this message down to the horde of sociological planners we might get on the right track. A situation in which there is a climate to carry on business at a profit will make more jobs than any program which ignores the basic premises on which our economic system is based.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 12
God Keeps His Promise
Luke 1:68-79; Luke 2:29-32
By C.P. Dame

Christianity and singing go together. When the gospel changes a person or a whole family, singing often follows. When people sing they express their emotions. This lesson tells about two people who in song made known that they were thankful that God fulfills His promise.

I. God deserves our praise. The following hymns or songs are found in Luke's gospel. The Magnificat is found in 1:46-55; Benedictus is in 1:68-79; the Gloria in Excelsis is in 2:14 and the Nunc Dimittis is in 2:29. The lesson text consists of two songs, both composed by two elderly men.

Zachariah was a priest. He was one of the 20,000 priests in the land, and this number was divided in 24 courses with each course serving a week. Zachariah belonged to the course of Abia. Once in a life-time every priest received the privilege to offer incense on a golden altar in the Holy place in the temple. It was a high moment in Zachariah's life when he was engaged in this holy function but it became unforgettable when an angel told him he would become the father of a son who would be filled with the Holy Spirit and be a spiritual leader. Because he doubted, the angel told the priest that he would be dumb and unable to speak until the birth of the son.

The priest went home, and although the couple was elderly, the son was born and when he was eight days old he was circumcised and named John at the insistence of Zachariah who spoke again and being "filled with the Holy Spirit" prophesied. His song is divided in three parts, the first tells of the acts of God, the second of the mission of the son and the third of the future acts of God. The priest praised God for all His many activities.

II. Spiritual leadership is an honor and a responsibility. "And thou, child, shalt be called the prophet of the Highest"—this the father said about the future of his son. John would give "knowledge of salvation to the people." In his preaching John later on called people to repent and made them concerned and ask for baptism.

Forty days after the birth of Jesus, Mary and Joseph brought the child Jesus to the temple according to the requirement of the law (Leviticus 12). They brought two pigeons for the offering, not a lamb which was more expensive. At this event, Simeon, a righteous and devout man who was looking for the consolation of Israel, took the babe Jesus in his arms and blessed God and praised Him because his eyes had seen God's salvation which would be for all people. Jesus would be the cause of the fall of many and the cause of the rising of many. The words of Simeon are being fulfilled constantly.

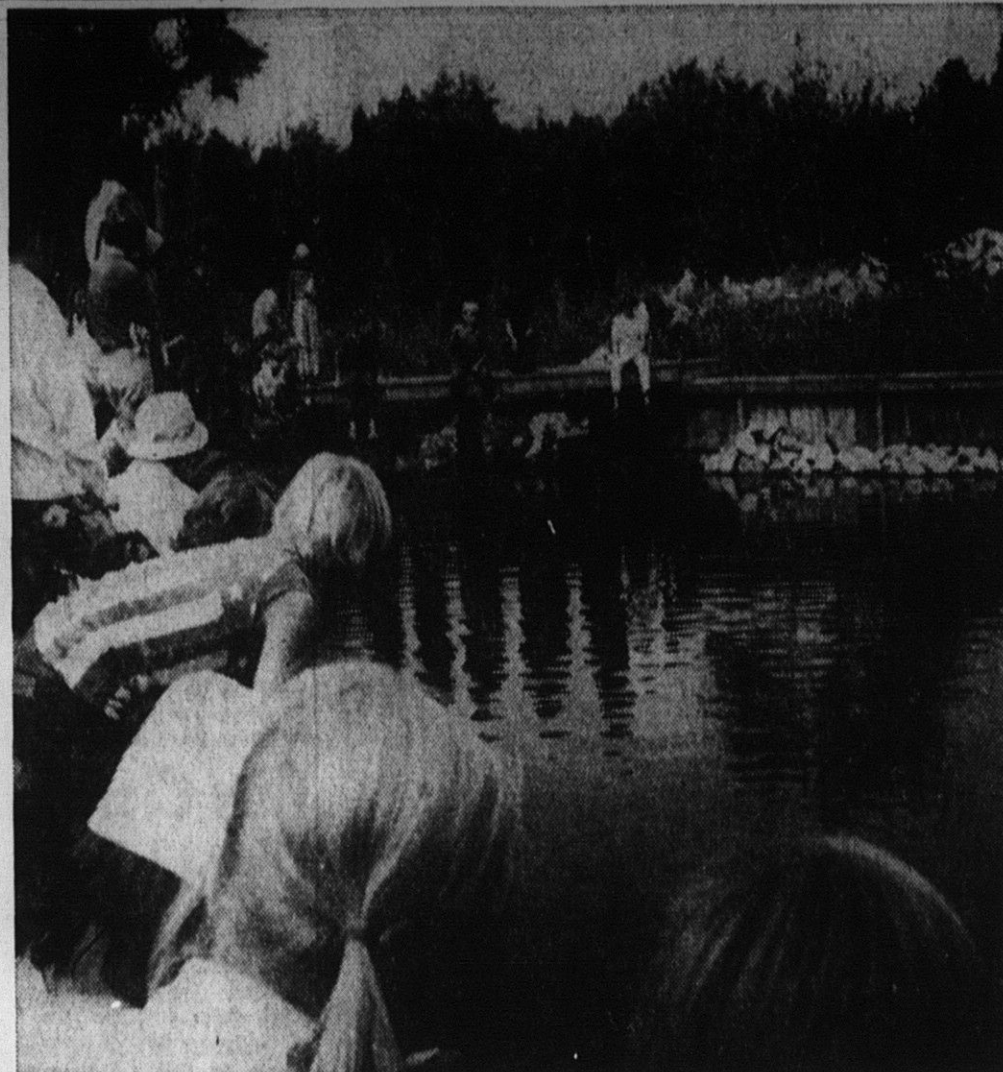

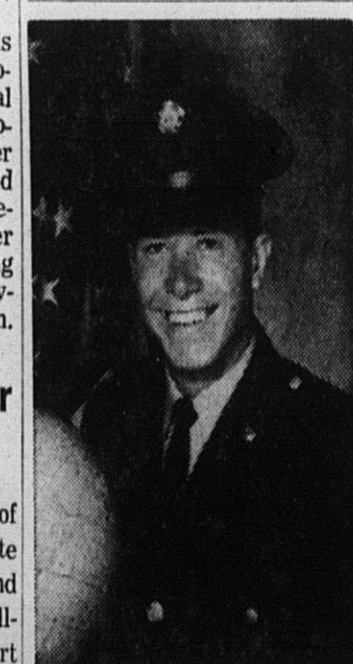

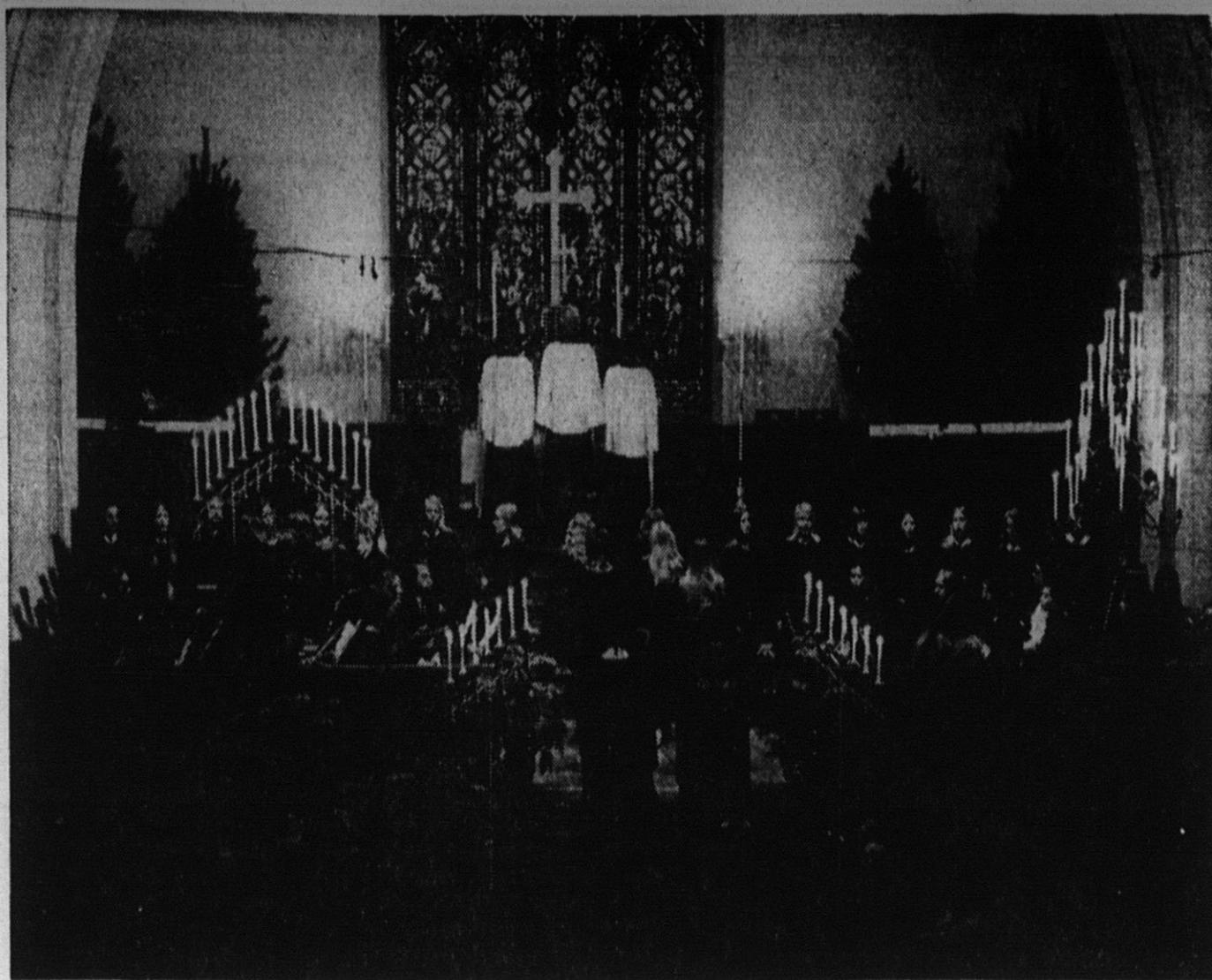

"No, we didn't work on anything different in practice after our loss to Earlham," said Coach Russ DeVette. "We just played a lot better."

The Dutchmen were sparked to their first victory of the season by senior guards Dan Shinabarger and Lorenza Howard. Shinabarger led the scoring for both teams with 29 markers while Howard canned 25 for a career high as a Dutchman.

Hope took a quick 6-0 lead on two baskets by Shinabarger and two free throws by Howard before the Cougars finally scored a fielder.

After leading by a 10-4 score, the Dutchmen went, and the Cougars outscored them, 7-0 to take their first lead of the night at 11:10 with 15:53 to play in the first half.

The contest remained nip and tuck the rest of the half, as both squads were tearing down the hoop with fantastic outside shooting.

Shinabarger pumped in 18 of his game high 29 points in the first 20 minutes, as Hope led at the intermission, 48-42.

Reserve forward Doug Edema, who recently finished playing on the Hope football team, came off the bench to take down some key rebounds, as the Dutchmen were holding off the Cougars' attempt to take over the lead.

With Howard and Shinabarger picking off were they left off at the half, the Dutchmen raced to their biggest lead of the night, 13 points at 60-47 before the Cougars came back to life.

Shinabarger and Howard not only were finding the range from all over the court, they also showed area fans they can pass with the best of them too, as they set up several of their teammates for easy buckets.

With only 30 seconds left in the game and Hope on top by seven points, 88-81, the Cougars made things rather interesting by tallying five markers during that time to make the final deficit, 88-86 in favor of the Dutchmen.

Both teams played fine ball, as Hope only committed 12 turnovers compared to 11 for Concordia.

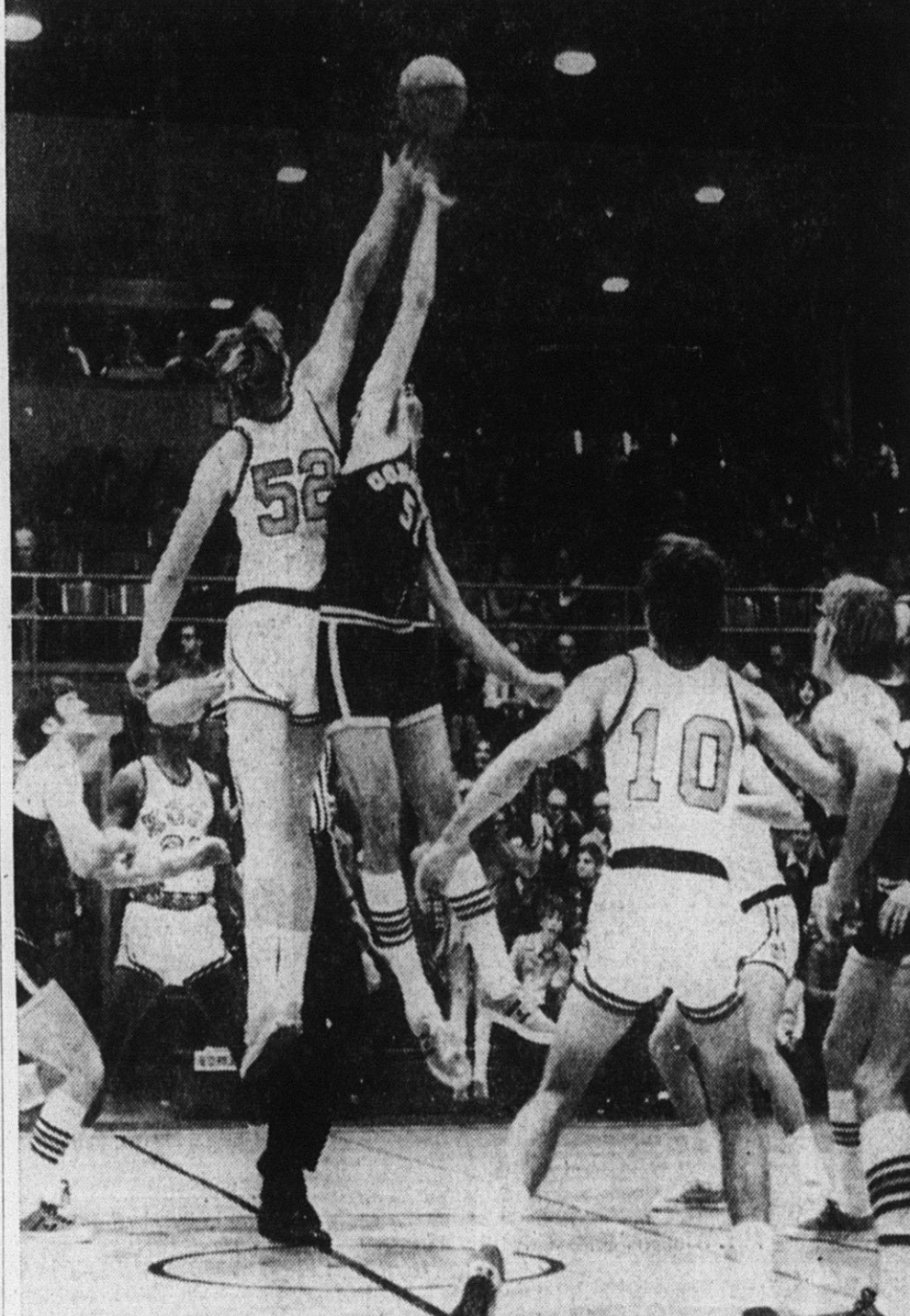

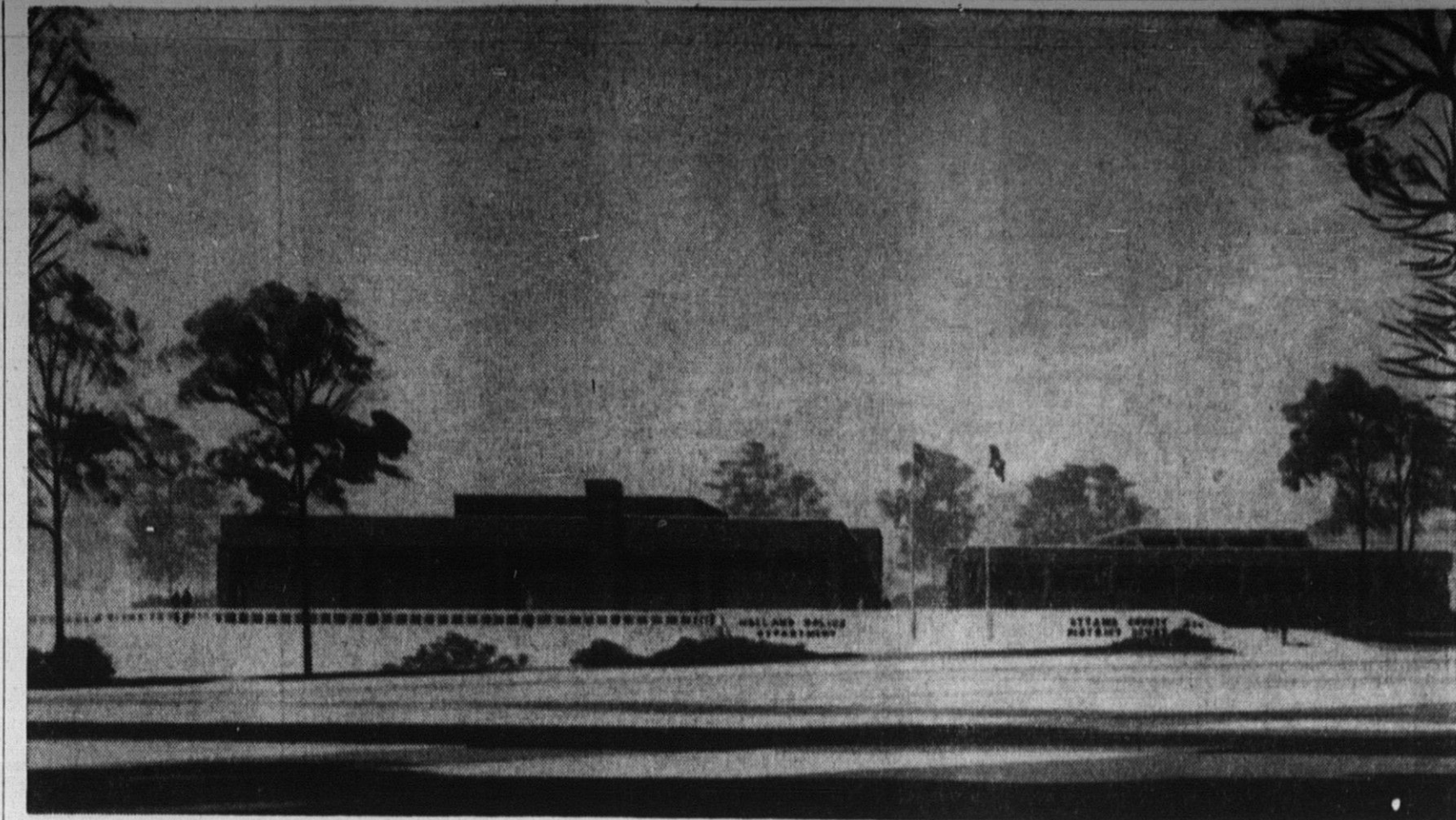

Nikolais Dancers Present Dynamic Performance

Backed by electronic music in stereophonic sound and a wide array of colorful, moving designs on carousel projectors, the Nikolais Dance Theatre opened to mixed reaction in its program in Civic Center Tuesday night, sponsored by the Holland Concert Association, a merger of the former Community Concert Association and the Hope College Great Performance series.

An innovative force in theatre, Alvin Nikolais in 20 years has evolved a new art in multimedia, abstract theatricals, a dynamic "total theatre" in which spectators may interpret abstractions of sound, shape, color, light and motion any way they like.

In fact, the spectator is quite free to regard the program as an "experience" or "happening" much like being involved in a highly fluid Rorschach test. While there was plenty of applause, the most enthusiasm for this contemporary art stemmed from the college age crowd.

To sensitive ears, the volume of the electronic score could be a trial. But the program had its bright, happy spots too, with dancers appearing in ballooning costumes, one number in picturesque costumes by a trio of pretty girls, and an arresting number in which three men appeared in enclosed "tents" in a stylized series of movements, often resembling sculptures.

Programs were not clearly marked, and a good number of the audience left during the

second intermission, missing the company's monumental 1968 "Tent" which is a favorite number of most members of the company.

The company travels with over a ton of equipment consisting of transformers, switchboards, sound equipment, some 40 special spotlights, 14 projectors, miles of cables, plus props, costumes and other supplies. Some 300 slides are used and light cues number close to 100 in a half hour. Projectors are operated by remote control.

A special concert Jan. 12 will be the association's next program in Holland. Appearing in Civic Center at 8:15 p.m. Jan. 12 will be Evelyn and Bob Beers, famed singers and players of American traditional folk music. This concert is a substitute for Estro Armonico, the Amsterdam chamber group which cancelled its American tour this year. The concert had been slated Oct. 26.

Offenbach's "Orpheus in the Underworld" is now scheduled Friday, Jan. 7, at 8:15 p.m. in Muskegon Central Campus auditorium presented by the Canadian Opera Co. 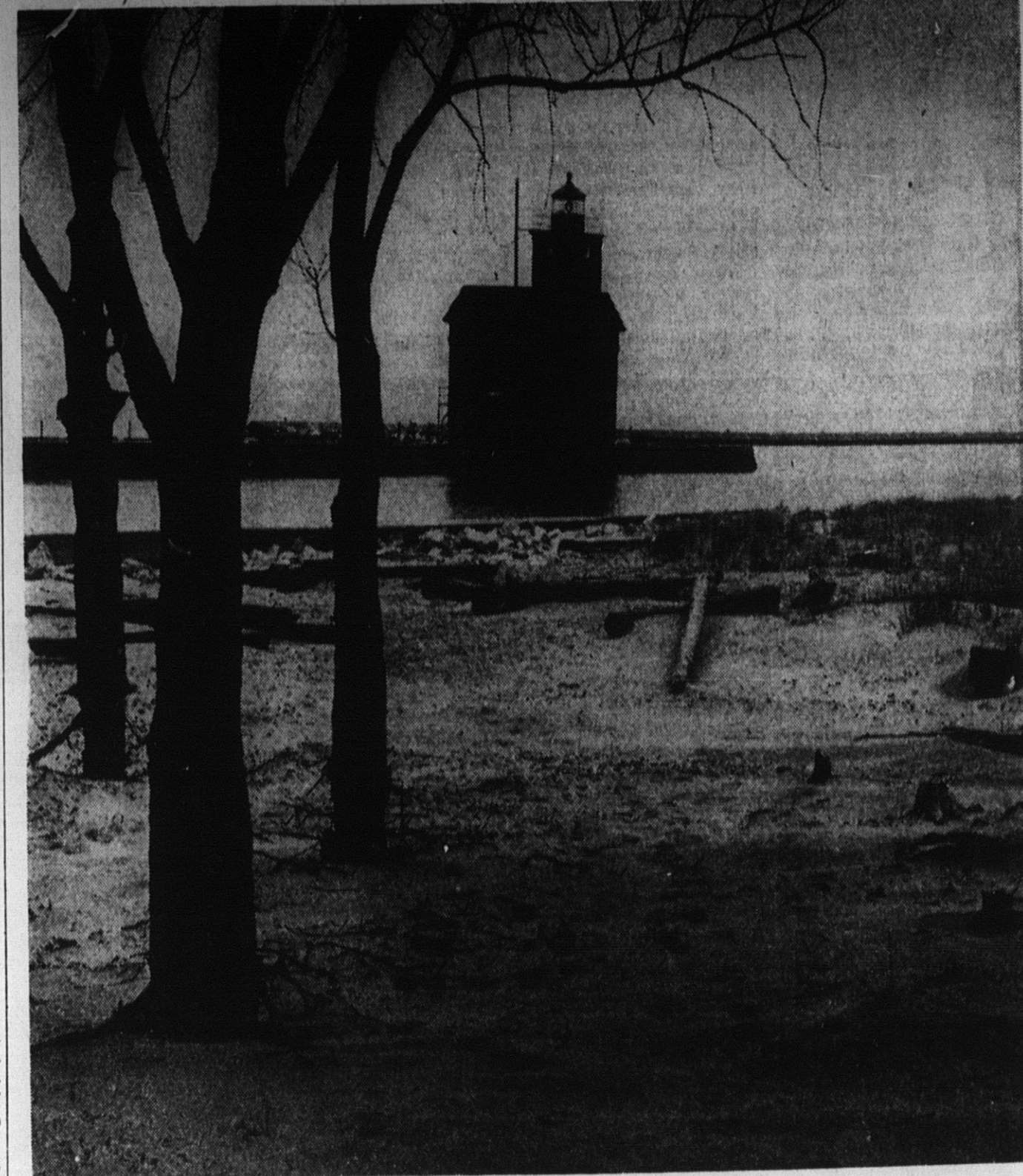

She had been assaulted and shot in the head by an assailant in a wooded area Monday afternoon after receiving a telephone call that her husband, a Christian high school teacher in nearby Lansing, Ill., had been injured.

Detective Wally De Rose at Gary police headquarters believes the name of Smit in a telephone book was a random selection by the assailant, and that there was no other link. It appears that the suspect left Gary on Thursday.

Extradition proceedings are being processed to return Adams to Gary on a kidnaping charge. Bond of \$75,000 has been set by a Lake County Criminal Court judge in Indiana.
