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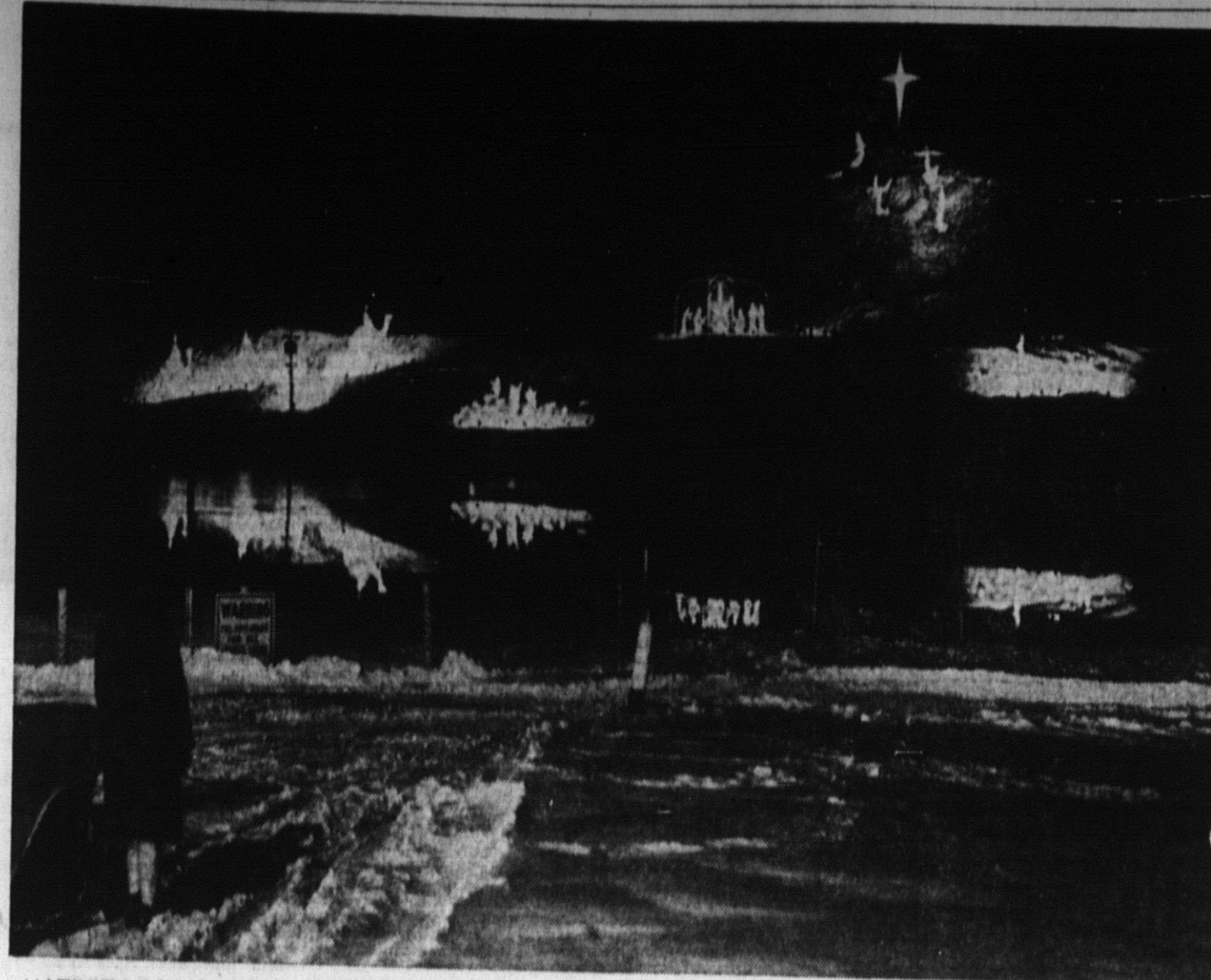

## Huge Suit Against Dow Dismissed

GRAND HAVEN — An order of discontinuance was filed by Judge Raymond L. Smith in Ottawa Circuit Court Tuesday dismissing a \$4.5 million damage suit, said to be the largest ever filed in the local court.

A settlement has been made in a suit filed June 17 by James D. Robbins and Jack De Young Spring Lake inventors, against Dow Chemical Co. of Midland. The two men claimed they furnished Dow with a formula for a solvent used in connection with an appliance the two men invented and also used in dry cleaning establishments or self-serve dry cleaning plants in the United States.

The case was dismissed by Judge Smith following a stipulation signed for both parties by their attorneys. The order reads that the judge dismiss the case "with prejudice to the plaintiffs and without costs to either of the parties."

## Mrs. B. Marcotte Succumbs at 77

## Ottawa County 'Any Deer' Harvest 'Definite Success'

Ottawa County's "any deer" season was a "definite success" and a record deer harvest of an estimated 1,000 deer was taken in the county, conservation officer Harold Bowditch reported today.

About 200 to 300 of these does, Bowditch said. Bowditch believes that there will be as many deer next year as the yearly production was not harvested.

However, Bowditch said, there will be a decrease in the number of fawns next year due to the number of does harvested. Bowditch's field work revealed little opposition to the "any deer season." Most people felt it was good for the county, Bowditch reported. He said it will reduce the amount of crop damage, reduce the total herd and may help reduce the number of car accidents.

The conservation officer said 51 road-killed deer were recovered during the months of October and November. Several other deer were crippled and to date, 115 deer have been killed by cars this year in the county.

## 4,000 Attend Nativity Scene Dedication

GRAND HAVEN — Gov. George Romney spent about an hour in Grand Haven Wednesday night helping to dedicate the world's largest nativity scene which has 70 figures and is spread 300 feet along the dunes of Dewey Hill across Grand River at the foot of Washington St.

About 4,000 persons gathered in the 20-degree weather for the ceremonies which were arranged by the Tri-Cities Ministerial Association. A chorus of 100 voices sang familiar Christmas songs.

The governor arrived at the local airport in a plane piloted by Mrs. William Cresson, wife of the Grand Haven mayor.

An honor guard of Co. A, Michigan National Guard, and the Grand Haven High School band were at the airport to welcome the governor, the band playing "Hail to the Chief." The governor rode into town in an open convertible.

The governor was presented with a large painting of the nativity scene by Mrs. E. K. Ellis of Grand Haven who designed the figures which were cut out and prepared by members of the Grand Haven fire department.

The nativity scene with its huge figures and 44-foot star at the crest of the hill lights up several times from 6 to 10 p.m. every night. Each 12-minute segment opens with the reading of Bible verses plus taped music.

Trailing 67-60 with nine minutes left in the game, Hope scored seven straight points and with 5:41 left in the game, Clare Van Wieren's baskets tied the score 67-67.

After being called for an offensive foul, Carl Walters stole the ball and scored to put Hope in front, 69-67. The Flying Dutchmen never again trailed.

Van Wieren added two jump shots to shove the margin to six points. Adrian managed to get the score to four points on two occasions but fouls cost the Bulldogs and Hope built up the 10-point margin with some fine free shooting.

It was the free throws that won the game as the Flying Dutchmen made 24 of 40 including 12 of 14 by freshman Floyd Brady, who sank six straight in the second half, four in the last two minutes.

Van Wieren, who fouled out with 2:45 left in the game, hit six baskets in the second half and made five shots in sparking the Hope attack. Van Wieren and Brady led the winners with 22 points each.

The score was tied seven times in the first half before Hope took a 39-38 halftime lead. Hope had held a 39-34 lead just before the half but four quick Adrian points pulled the Bulldogs within a point.

Hope made 31 baskets in 75 tries for 41 per cent while Adrian hit 32 of 89 for 35 per cent. Adrian sank 12 of 26 free shots.

A total of 47 fouls were called in the game and Hope lost Van Wieren and Roy Anker while Adrian had Dick Seagert, Jim Ingham and Mike Garrett foul out. Garrett led the losers with 21.

Van Wieren hit eight of 21 from the floor while Brady had five of 16. Bill Potter, starting his first game at center, hit five of 10 while Walters had eight of 14 and Chris Buys, one of five. Anker, Potter's son, sank three baskets in three tries.

Holland freshman Don Krone-meyer looked good in a reserve role. Strong on defense, Krone-meyer also added a field goal in five attempts.

## Van Iwaarden Is Awarded Fellowship

A National Science Foundation science faculty fellowship has been awarded to John Van Iwaarden, assistant professor of mathematics at Hope College.

The fellowship grants Van Iwaarden 12 months study toward his doctorate at the school of his choice. The award includes payment of tuition and travel for the year, and full regular salary.

Van Iwaarden will begin work under the fellowship in September, 1965, following a summer of independent study. He plans to complete doctoral requirements by September, 1966. One of 350 undergraduate professors given the NSF fellowship, Van Iwaarden was selected from over 5,000 applicants.

Van Iwaarden has previously been awarded two NSF summer grants for study. A 1957 graduate of Hope College, Van Iwaarden was awarded an M.A. from the University of Michigan in 1958. He joined the Hope College faculty in 1961, after teaching two years at Michigan State University.

Van Iwaarden resides at 117 East 10th St., Holland, with his wife Louise and their three children.

NEW YORK — Officials of Beech-Nut Life Savers Inc. said Wednesday they were "hopeful for a successful conclusion of negotiations for a new plant in Holland by mid-January."

An executive said "Beech Nut surveys in Holland are nearly concluded and we very shortly hope to announce final plans. There is every indication that the results of the surveys will be satisfactory."

The firm has an option on approximately 98 acres of land fronting on 48th St. with the eastern boundary the Allegan C & O tracks.

Roscoe Giles, executive vice-president of HEDCOR and the Chamber of Commerce said Beech-Nut has not yet signed a formal contract for the land which is owned by HEDCOR.

Cost of the plant is estimated at \$10 million or \$11 million over three years.

Initial employment is estimated at 350 with at least double that number in the next few years.

Beech-Nut makes a variety of items including life savers, gum, candy, baby food, coffee and cough drops.

Survey teams for Beech-Nut have made dozens of visits to Holland during the past six months.

Religion at a Christian institution of higher education is not merely a course in the curriculum or an extra-curricular

activity. On many a secular campus you will find a "Department of Religion and Bible" listed in its catalogue or bulletin. "Student Christian Associations" are everywhere. In most campus organizational structures there are "Religious Life Committees." Many schools even have regularly designated intervals of time allotted for voluntary or involuntary "chapel."

But religion, at a Christian institution of higher education, is more than these. "Religion is an awareness or conviction of the existence of a Supreme Being, arousing reverence, love, gratitude, and the will to obey and serve." It is always related to theology: "the critical, historical, and psychological study of religion and religious ideas."

At a Christian College like Hope, religion is the life of the people who make up the institution.

A Christian College is more than a place where faculty and students engage in study and learning; it is a collection of people who study and learn with divine purpose. As they agree upon this purpose, they constitute a Christian College.

God is the ground and source of our being, the Creator of all things. This is the basic Christian concept underlying whatever is studied at a Christian College. This "handling of the things of God" is education at its best because it is always theologically oriented. Every pursuit of knowledge is research and discovery of that which is created, and of the Creator God who is thus involved in the elements and ideas which He permits man to experience under His all-wise Providence.

The administrator, accepting the religious implications of his position, organizes and directs the affairs of the institution "as one entrusted by God" with the physical facilities, the personnel, and the Christian concept of learning. His religion determines his relationship to his faculty, to his students, to his administrative helpers, to his Board of Trustees, to his community, and to all his plans for the future.

The professor instructs in a particular discipline as one privileged to use his God-given ability and experience among those who manifest confidence in him. He uses his subject matter as one who understands the difference between being "in" the world and "of" the world.

The student applies for admission to this college because he already recognizes the significance of an education that is related to religion as the basic reality of life. He wants to study where his knowledge can be most intelligently related to his life and his generation under God. Thus he finds meaning and purpose, without which his time and effort seem futile and fruitless.

One more thing must be said. Just as objects, locations, individuals, families, nations, etc., are known by their names, so a Christian institution, bearing the name of Christ, is always and inevitably identified with Him.

The Christian College evidences its understanding and appreciation of the place of Christ in all aspects of its existence. As the members of a college experience God's redemptive work in His world through Jesus Christ, it is in a position to continue its usefulness by God to communicate ultimate truth.

We cannot expect any institution of higher education to be more Christian than the degree

of religious perception resident in the administrators who direct, the instructors who teach, the students who study, and the churchmen who support it. Their sense of commitment to Jesus Christ as indispensable and central in the life of each and all is the barometer.

Religion is the heart of the Christian College, and Jesus Christ is the "life-blood" of God in that heart by the "pulsating presence" of the Holy Spirit. It is God's promise that He, and He alone, is able to lead us into all truth. From century to century He is the life of the Christian College.

This is Hope College at its best! What an awesome privilege to be a College Pastor!

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## THE SAFE DRIVER

In this country we kill about 40,000 a year in automobile accidents and injure another 3,000,000. If this kind of carnage happened because of military operations we would think ourselves engaged in a full-scale war. Somehow, because it happens in cars and on highways we don't get very excited about it.

What makes driving so dangerous? Several things. One is the automobile itself. Some are too powerful for their brakes. Most are engineered for "beauty" rather than safety. Certainly there is no standardized safety code applied to all cars. Another is the highways and streets. These are often marked by confusing signs and crossings are often obscured by buildings, trees, or shrubbery. Finally there is the driver, perhaps the most important factor in our motorized mayhem.

Careful drivers could minimize the dangers inherent in bad roads and essentially unsafe cars. But there are drivers who, even though they try to be careful, are a menace to safety because of physical or emotional impairments. A Conference on Medical Aspects of Driver Licensing and Driver Safety which met recently in Chicago spent some time on the problem of the medically unfit driver. It is a sticky problem for many reasons. Some disabilities are hard to discover, especially the emotional ones, which may in the long run prove to be the most dangerous.

The automobile has become an American necessity. The ability and right to drive are almost essential for living a normal life. This is why safe driving is so important and why the removal of a driver's license is so upsetting. But surely we must do something to make driving less fatal — something about all three factors: roads, cars, and drivers — and we are happy to hear that someone is seriously engaged on one of these problems.

So buckle up your seat belts. If you remember, four people had their seat belts buckled and it helped when they had an accident.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, December 13  
On Behalf of a Slave  
Philemon, verses 8-21  
By C. P. Dame

We have only one of Paul's personal letters—it is his letter to Philemon. Paul wrote this letter in prison where he also wrote Ephesians, Philippians and Colossians. Philemon and his wife Apphia and their son Archippus lived in Colosse. Very likely Archippus was the pastor of the church. Paul calls the father "our fellow worker" and the son "our fellow soldier." Father and son were both Christian workers. This lesson tells us about an appeal prompted by love.

I. A lover has the right to make an appeal. Philemon's slave, name Onesimus, had run away to Rome. He may have stolen from his master. In Rome, Paul and Onesimus met and the slave became a Christian. Paul knew Philemon the master for he had led him to Christ. After his conversion he had led a devoted Christian life. The conversion of Onesimus, the slave, created a problem for Paul. A slave was the property of his master. In the eyes of the law Onesimus was guilty. We can imagine very well that Paul and Onesimus talked about the problem which was theirs. A decision was reached. Paul wrote a letter to his friend Philemon on behalf of Onesimus to receive him, now as a brother. Although Paul had the right to command Philemon since he had led him to Christ he preferred to make an appeal.

II. The gospel changes lives. The slave experienced conversion. Consequently there existed a father-son relationship between Paul and his convert. Paul would gladly have kept Onesimus, whose services would have helped him, but he did not want to do anything like that without the consent of Philemon. The slave's conversion also changed his relationship to his master. Both were now brothers in Christ for both were now Christians.

The question is sometimes asked why Paul did not denounce slavery. If he had taught that slaves should be set free the whole Christian movement would most likely have been crushed. The time to make known the real teaching of the gospel on this subject had not yet arrived.

III. Those who give favors can ask for favors. Paul asked Philemon to receive the runaway slave as he would receive him. Paul had not wronged Philemon but the slave had done so. Paul told Philemon to charge what the slave owed him to his account.

Paul asked this favor with winsomeness and confidence. He wrote, "Refresh my heart!"—who could refuse such an appeal? "Confident of your obedience, I write to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say"—who could let a man down after reading these words? Paul always expected the best because he gave his best. Many of us think that Paul suggested to Philemon to free the slave. Whether he did that or not we do not know but we may be sure that Philemon heeded the appeal of Paul and royally responded.

Luther made the observation that "as Paul takes over the entire debt of Onesimus, so Christ takes over our entire debt, but in a higher sense." Those who know that Christ has taken over their debt of sin feel highly obligated to Him and show it by their consecrated service.

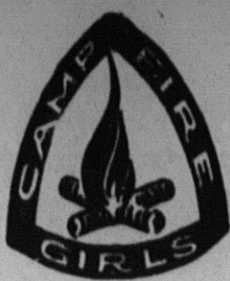

De Vette hopes his club has found its shooting "eyes" as MIAA action starts Wednesday for Hope at Adrian followed with the home league opener against Olivet next Saturday night in the Civic Center.

Trailing 59-38 at half, Hope chipped away at the lead throughout the final 20 minutes and moved into full stride in the final eight minutes.

Playing against the Elmhurst reserves, Hope began its push and before long three of the regulars had returned to the game. Hope got the bulge to nine points with 1:10 left in the game.

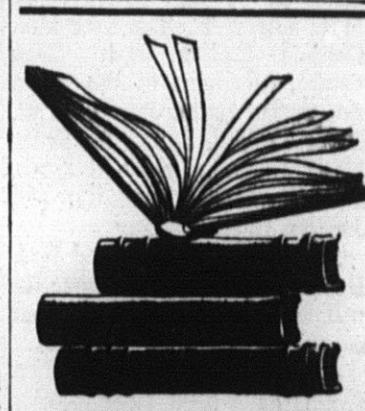

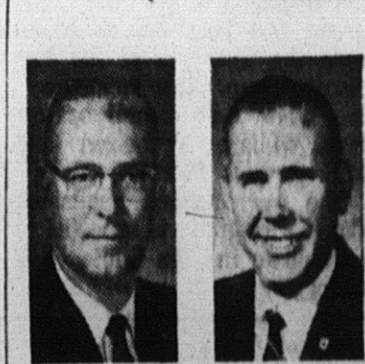

## 500 Visit Christmas Art Show at Holland High

Well over 500 persons strolled through the art gallery of the Hazel Forne Herrick Art Center on Holland High campus Thursday night for the opening of the Christmas art show of the art department.

Titled "Christmas Around the World," the gallery featured seven Christmas trees of various nations, beautifully decorated and showing the results of unleashed imagination attuned to yuletide joy. The gallery which can easily accommodate 100 visitors at a time used lighting emphasis to advantage. Suspended from the ceiling were dozens of colorful mobiles, shimmering in reflected light.

Attracting the most attention was the contemporary tree which was not really a tree at all, but a series of stained glass panels patterned after a Greek cross. The four panels surrounding the center post dealt with the holy family and the Christmas story whereas the adjoining fins depict miscellaneous Christmas motifs. Research and design of this project was done by Bill Schwarz but the leadwork and staining was done by nine craftsmen in advanced art classes.

Other trees were the Scandinavian tree, decorated with gifts, candles and ornaments of felt, wood, straw and cookies made by members of the family, plus a straw goat in the corner to butt all bad children and a sheaf of grain for the bids; the Polish tree decorated with ornaments made by the family; the German tree with its self made straw stars, gold paper stars and walnut shells. The American tree has no single set of Christmas customs

but is an amalgamation of the world and the various nationalities. Many American trees are decorated with handmade ornaments, strings of popcorn, etc., but commercialism has robbed many Americans of the joy and satisfaction of making their own decorations.

A candle light tree rapidly took decorative shape as visitors filled out "candle cards" and attached them to the tree. The Dutch tree, decorated much like American trees, featured two huge wooden shoes at the base, one filled with hay and carrots for St. Nicholas' horse and the other with gifts which St. Nicholas presumably left after feeding his horse.

The Mexican tree, which reflects the Mexican "Posada" from Dec. 16 to Christmas, was decked with tin ornaments, handmade paper flowers and straw decorations.

Along the north wall of the gallery was the giant Christmas greeting prepared by students, plus huge candles and a picturesque black fence made of cork rings, obtained at the bargain rate of a cent a ring.

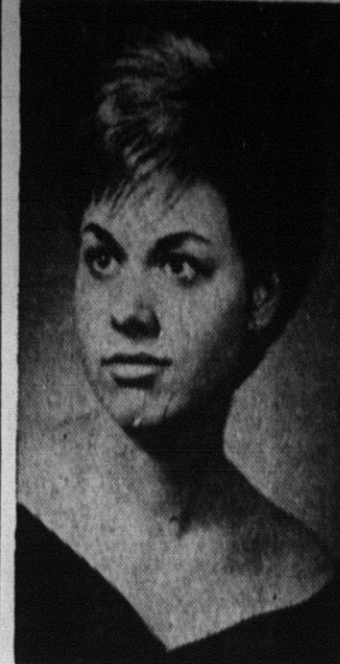

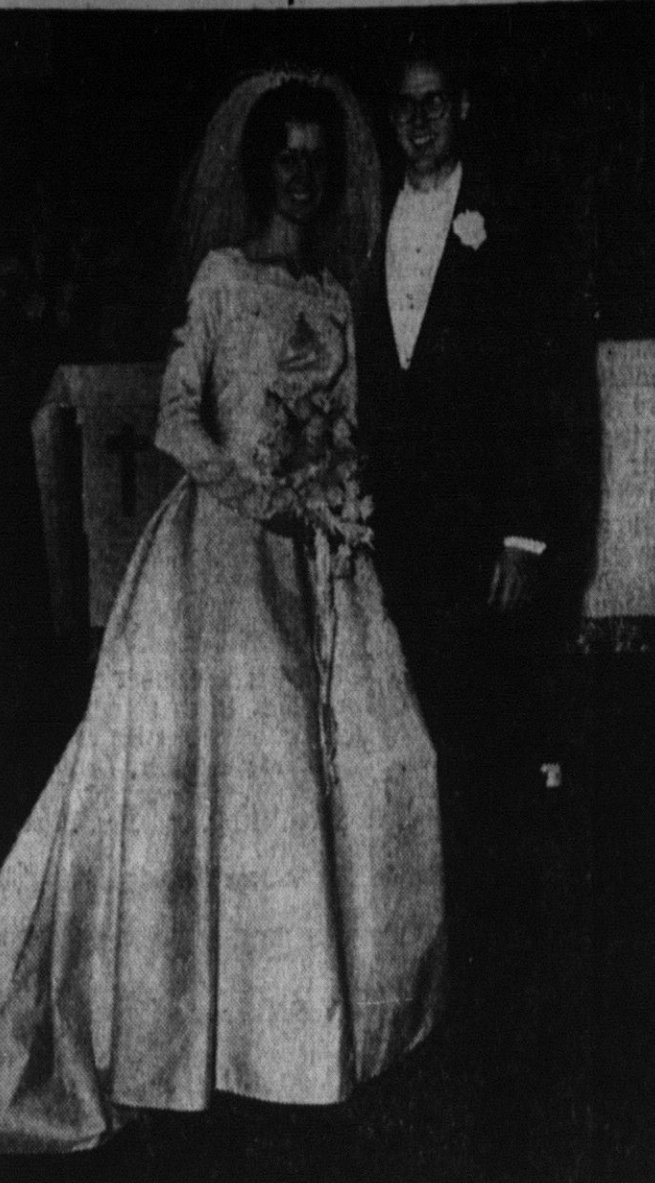

Holland Christian's basketball squad topped its second win of the season Friday night by downing East Grand Rapids, 53-44 in a tight defensive battle before 2,000 fans in the Civic Center.

Coach Art Tuls' club came back in strong in the third quarter after trailing throughout much of the first half. The Maroons outscored the invaders 16-9 in the third period to clinch the victory.

Christian was not as sharp as it was in its opening win against the Hudsonville Unity Christian quintet. Despite the win, Tuls said he was disappointed with the overall performance of his club. The Maroons were guilty of many floor errors in ball handling and bad passes. A fighting Holland High basketball team refused to quit Friday night and pulled out a 78-71 victory over Godwin before 1,400 fans in the Holland fieldhouse to even its record at 1-1.

Defending state champion Benton Harbor looms up next for the Dutch and the Tigers will invade Holland next Friday night.

If Coach Don Piersma's club displays the same kind of desire they showed against the Wolverines and continue with the fine shooting, they will give Benton Harbor trouble.

It was a band of juniors and subs who did the most to pull Friday's game out after Godwin had built up an eight point, 45-37 early third quarter lead and appeared to be ready to take command.

But Holland didn't budge an inch. Juniors Bob Brolin and Larry Pete took over the shooting assignments and each sank three baskets in the 22-point third period.

The rally chopped the lead but Godwin still held a 61-58 third period edge as the Wolverines had tallied 23 in the quarter.

With 5:37 left in the game a Pete jump shot put Holland in front, 64-63 but Godwin's Tom Dykstra matched it on the return up floor and took what proved to be its last lead of the game, 65-64.

Two free shots by Randy Johnson at 5:03 put Holland in front and Brolin added another after a technical foul. A half-minute later Godwin's Jay Buist hit to again tie the score, 67-67.

Then big Mike Lawson came to life. Godwin had forced Holland to play the outside the entire game and the 6'10" junior was ineffective in the center.

But he grabbed a rebound basket to put Holland in front, 71-67 at 3:52 and scored four of the next six Holland points in the minute and a half. Pete got the other basket.

With 2:13 left Holland held a 75-67 lead. Brolin scored the final three points and took high point honors with 15.

In the final period, Holland hit eight of 16 from the floor and shot a fine 51 per cent in the entire game. The third quarter mark was even better as nine of 13 dropped. In the first half, the Dutch hit five of 13 and eight of 18.

Junior Steve Millard, who finished with 13, was Holland's first quarter sparkplug as he tallied nine of Holland's 18 points. Godwin got 12 in the first period but 5'9" Bob Van't Hof took over 10 points in the second quarter and led the Wolverines to a 38-36 halftime margin. He also led the losers to the early third period lead.

It was a rough contest with 50 fouls called, 24 against Holland. Godwin used its well-known pressing defense. With all of the fouls both clubs spent much time at the charity line. Godwin came off best with 23 of 30 while Holland hit 18 of 31. The Dutch lost Millard and Cal Beltman in the third period and John Leenhouts on fouls while Godwin also lost two in the third period and one in the last minute.

Van't Hof led Godwin with 22 and Dykstra had 14. The Wolverines sank 33 per cent of their shots with periods of 5-19; 7-17; 8-19 and 4-18. It was Godwin's second straight loss.

Pete's 12 points, all in the second half, stood out in a reserve guard role. Lawson added 10 and his replacement Al Holleman sank two key second half baskets. Another junior, Dan Colenbrander also added a needed fourth quarter field goal.

## Ottawa County Farm News

By Richard Machiele, Ottawa County Extension Director

Some of our peach growers will be interested in attending the National Peach Convention planned for Feb. 7 through 10 at Grand Rapids. This is the first time the convention has been so near home. Peach varieties will be discussed, also picking, handling, and selling peaches and other technical and marketing topics.

We want to remind our Ottawa County farmers that the new minimum wage act goes into effect on Jan. 1. This will not apply to many of our farms as the act applies only to farmers hiring four or more workers between the ages of 18 and 65 years of age who work for more than 13 weeks during any consecutive 12 month period. The new law states that starting Jan. 1, 1965 the minimum wage is \$1.00 per hour; starting Jan. 1, 1966 — \$1.15 per hour and starting Jan. 1, 1967 — \$1.25 per hour.

Milk production in 1965 will be about the same as the 125.7 billion pounds for 1964. Marketed will exceed commercial use. About eight billion pounds of dairy products are expected to move to the Commodity Credit channels or be exported. Fewer cows, but increased production per cow will keep total production of milk at the 1964 level.

Fed cattle prices recovered some of the early October loss in late October and early November. Feeder prices were continued at high levels. From strengthened, while slaughter July to September, fed cattle marketed from 28 states was up 9 per cent over 1963. Total slaughter of steers and heifers under Federal inspection was up 12 per cent. The differential between choice and standard steers has widened to about \$4.50. This past summer, USDA purchases amounted to 3 to 5 per cent of commercial production. The demand for beef will be stronger in 1965 with less competition from pork.

Hogs continued high level of slaughter this fall raises the question whether spring pig crop was down 8 per cent as the USDA estimated. Prices probably hit their seasonal low of \$15 to \$16. Prices should recover some this winter.

Wheat — About 48,000 wheat farms signed up in Michigan for the wheat program this fall.

According to The American Guernsey Cattle Club "Kamplands Royal Jingle" a junior two-year-old registered Guernsey cow, owned by Donald Kamp, Byron Center, Michigan, has completed an official DHIR actual production record of 10,980 pounds of milk and 421 pounds of butterfat, in 305 days two times a day milking. The testing was supervised by Michigan State University.
