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

Charles Bowman Firm Hit by \$200,000 Blaze

An early morning fire of undetermined origin roared through the Charles Bowman Company, 131 River Ave., causing an estimated \$200,000 damage before firemen brought the stubborn blaze under control.

Two firemen were overcome by smoke and fumes. Chief Richard Brandt and fireman Jerald Heerspink were given oxygen at the scene. Several other firemen were also treated for minor injuries.

Firemen responded to the alarm at 11:50 p.m. Wednesday, after a passerby reported the fire to police who called firemen.

W. L. Baker, vice president of the company, who estimated the damage, did not immediately know the cause of the blaze.

The company smokes cheese and other products, for use in smoked cheese crackers and seasoning. About \$50,000 damage was estimated to the Bowman equipment and stock, Baker said.

Baker also said that the building was owned by the De Pree Chemical Co.

Heavy smoke hampered firemen in getting to the blaze. Breathing apparatus was used by firemen to enable them to enter the smoke filled building.

A truck from the Central Park station was called by Chief Brandt to help bring the fire under control. Approximately 42 firemen were on hand. The men remained on the scene until about 6:30 a.m. today.

The fire was concentrated in the basement and first floor of the two-story brick building. Baker said about \$100,000 worth of vitamin D was stored in the basement. Baker said the loss was covered by insurance.

Part of the building was leased to the Steketee Van Huis Printing Co., whose storage

stocks were also lost in the fire. An estimate of damage was not immediately available.

A brick wall which adjoined the Marvin Albers Co. next door, prevented the fire from spreading. Von Ins Pizza, 102 River Ave., remained open most of the night, furnishing coffee to the firemen. Dykstra's ambulance also stood by to assist the injured.

Bill Vanden Berg, of Holland, brought a portable air compressor to the scene and refilled the firemen's air tanks, enabling them to remain in the building.

Local Firm Apparent Low Bidder

GRAND HAVEN — A Holland firm is the apparent low bidder on the construction of a new Grand Haven post office. Five bids were opened in the office of the General Services Administration in Chicago Wednesday, and Martin Dyke and Sons of Holland was low bidder at \$362,000.

Muskeron Construction Co. was next low bidder at \$380,000.

A government spokesman reported that the bids will be forwarded to the design and construction department in Chicago for tabulation. The main GSA office at Washington will award the contracts.

The new building will be of face brick and cut stone with an aluminum and plate glass entrance and the entire building will be air conditioned. It will be erected in 1966 at Fourth and Washington Sts. across from the new county building.

The present post office building at Third and Washington Sts. has been declared surplus property by the Chicago office and local public agencies and the city government have been notified that they may submit a plan for its use and procurement of the building and property. Mayor William Creason has not yet conferred with City Council as to whether the city is interested in the property.

A time limit for submitting a plan is Jan. 6.


The lobby will be open for box holders and those desiring stamps from dispensing machines. The regular holiday schedule for pickup and dispatches will be observed.

Henry Japinga's Grandson in Rose Bowl

Henry Japinga will get a special treat on New Year's Day when he watches his grandson play on television in the Rose Bowl.

Japinga, who lives at the home of his son Don Japinga and family at 1672 Wolverine, will be watching his grandson, Don Japinga of Wayland, who is co-captain of the Michigan State University football team.

Confined to his room for the past two years (except when he was a patient at Holland Hospital) because of arthritis, the 85-year-old Japinga has listened to radio accounts and watched television of Michigan State's football success.

A widower since 1947, the elder Japinga has lived with his son and family for the past 18 years.

Talking about his grandson, Japinga said "He's a good boy with no swell head." The MSU defensive halfback visits his grandfather on weekends every few weeks. He plans to visit here when he returns from California.

The 21-year-old Japinga is the son of the late Louis, a Holland native. His mother is the former Martha Slowinski of Wayland, formerly of Holland. Louis died of a heart attack in 1962.

Japinga is one of 14 grandchildren. The elder Japinga also has 13 great grandchildren. Another grandson, Bill, Dick's son was a MIAA tennis champion at Kalamazoo College after being a top basketball and tennis player at Holland High. Harold's son, Doug, was a baseball and basketball player at Lapeer College.

The Japinga name has been synonymous with athletics for many years in the Holland area. The Japingas had six sons and three daughters, Mrs. Clifford Steketee, Mrs. Leonard Holtgeerts and Mrs. Roscoe DeVries, all of Holland.

The oldest son, Martin, didn't participate in athletics but the others, Dick, Russ, Harold (Brute), Louis and Don all took part.

Dick, Russ, Harold and Louis played football, basketball and baseball at Holland High and Hope College while Don played basketball, football and tennis at Holland High. Dick, Russ and Harold were also fine baseball players on Holland city teams while Louis was an all-state football halfback.

Martin, Dick and Don are of Holland. Harold lives in Grandville and Russ in Ann Arbor. The elder Japinga played

The jury deliberated 55 minutes.

Viet Nam Seen As Top Issue Before Congress

"Viet Nam should dominate the next session of the 89th Congress," U.S. Rep. Robert P. Griffin of Traverse City (R, 9th district) told more than 125 members of the Holland Chamber of Commerce at a "Breakfast with Bob" Tuesday in Hotel Warm Friend.

Other things facing Congress will be appropriations for programs authorized earlier, certain labor legislation promised by President Johnson but not delivered, renewal of the fight on 14B, the minimum wage bill, federal standard unemployment compensation, and a push for secondary picketing in the construction industry, he said.

"The administration is recognizing serious problems, fiscally speaking," Griffin said, pointing to stepping up the war in Viet Nam at a cost of \$10 billion. "Anyway one looks at the new session, Viet Nam will be the most important subject."

Griffin felt that Robert McNamara's decision to close SAC bases could be justified on defense and was not made to save a few dollars. But he personally felt the drastic cutback was not well timed, particularly on the critical international front.

As for minimum wages, Griffin was of the opinion that the \$1.75 per hour minimum might be cut back to \$1.50 or \$1.60, plus much haggling and rearranging of exemptions. But he had no real doubt the bill would pass. He described as "a real thorny issue" the federal standard unemployment compensation bill.

As for abolishing the electoral college, he said this element of national elections should be drastically revised and that the proportion of the state vote should in some way be reflected in the totals.

"The electoral college favors the party in power, and no change is seen at present," he said.

Griffin devoted a good share of his talk to the difficulties of the minority party in the nation's capital. "At best, all the Republicans, who number only 140 to 295 Democrats, can do in this session is to provide opposition when opposition is indicated, and I think Jerry Ford (minority leader) has been doing a terrific job considering the problems," he said.

He referred to a recent television documentary on congressmen's problems and explained additional problems for GOP elected officials who receive only a small share of the staff aid available to committees.

The Government Control committee of which Griffin is a member has 50 persons on the staff but only three are assigned to the GOP, and the Education and Labor committee has a staff of 48 but only five are assigned to Republicans. "Added to the thousands in the various agencies hired by the administrations, there isn't a great deal the minority party can do," he said.

Griffin said too much legislation goes through in a haphazard manner without thorough debate. He pointed to one meeting of the Education and Labor committee in which Chairman Adam Clayton Powell allowed 20 minutes to discuss a multi-billion-dollar education bill that ultimately passed. A subsidy on arts and the humanities was given only 15 minutes' debate.

Griffin criticized the concept of the Great Society in that it bypasses state government and puts huge sums of money in the hands of appointive persons who

deal directly with leaders of a community, and not necessarily elected leaders.

"The great ideological struggle at all times is not the objectives or ends men seek, but over the ways to get them. Our founding fathers protected us from any great power in one place, dividing government on local, state and federal levels, and dividing federal government on legislative, executive and judicial. The Great Society has skipped many of these steps and has concentrated raw power in the hands of appointed bureaucrats on the federal level," he said.

Cong. Griffin was presented with a pair of wooden shoes. Clarence Klaasen presided at the meeting.

DALLAS, Tex.—Dr. J. Harvey Kleinheksel, 65, of 1606 Wauka-Zoo Dr., Holland, died Tuesday morning at St. Paul's Hospital in Dallas, following a cerebral hemorrhage he had suffered earlier in the evening.

Dr. and Mrs. Kleinheksel had gone to Dallas to visit their daughters and his brother during the holidays.

Dr. Kleinheksel was born in Holland on Sept. 1 and lived in Holland all his life. He attended Fillmore Elementary School, Hope Prep and Hope College, where he received the A. B. degree in 1922. He did graduate

In 1928, Dr. Kleinheksel came to Hope to teach and held the rank of professor for the last 37 years. He was a member of Hope Reformed Church and the Greater Consistory, and a member of the American Chemical Society.

Grand Haven Approves Water Plan

GRAND HAVEN — A step towards the solution of a water-supply problem in an industrial area in Grand Haven township adjoining the city of Grand Haven was taken by the Grand Haven city council Monday night.

A citizens committee from the township which has been studying a possible solution to the water problem for several years met with the city council and approved a proposed agreement in which the city will supply water to the area which is located along US-31 at Hayes Rd. within a mile south of the city limit line.

The proposal will now be submitted to the township board. Residents owning property along the proposed pipeline may also purchase the water.

The new line would be installed mainly to relieve the water problem at several industrial plants including Harbor Industries Inc.

An installation fee would be charged each initial customer, the cost to be determined by the amount of front footage owned by each customer. The city would charge an additional cost for tap-in and service to the customer's property line.

The price of water would be the same charged to the city users with an additional readiness to serve township residents according to a formula arranged by the city attorney's office.

Fire hydrants would be placed every 1,000 feet along the proposed pipeline and the township would pay \$100 a year per hydrant.

The extension of a pipeline into the township would be a part of a waterline improvement project planned for the Sheldon Heights area within the city in 1966.

Three Holland Couples Are Granted Divorces


GRAND HAVEN—Three Holland area couples were given divorces in Ottawa circuit court by Judge Raymond L. Smith Monday.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 28
Nehemiah
Nehemiah 4:8-14, 21-23
By C. P. Dame

A preacher called Nehemiah, "a layman who knew his limitations." He loved God and God's people and gave up an important position in order to give help to a needy cause and to frustrated people. Because he was inspired to service he was able to inspire others.

I. A big work calls for a big man. "So built we the wall," Nehemiah was one of the builders. He was like Daniel, a child of the captivity. It was in 587 B.C. that the Babylonians carried Judah into captivity. Cyrus the Mede conquered Babylon and permitted the Jews to return to their own country under the leadership of Zerubbabel.

In 458 B.C. a second expedition came under the leadership of Ezra. Things did not go very well in Jerusalem. Nehemiah, the king's cupbearer, holding a position of power and prestige, for he was a sort of prime minister and master of ceremonies, one day met some Jews who had come from Jerusalem who told him of the sad plight of the city. This news made him weep, pray and fast. When he appeared before the king his grief was noted — he told the reason and got permission to go to Jerusalem to build. That was in 444 B.C. Why? Well, he saw a need and he realized he could help. Many people have done like Nehemiah — they saw a need and volunteered to serve.

Why did Nehemiah leave a soft easy job to tackle a tough project? He saw an opportunity to be useful and he grabbed it. The city of Jerusalem needed walls for its protection. Nehemiah investigated the situation, taking a night tour of the city, which gave him first-hand information, and then rallied the people and finished the job.

II. A big man can overcome opposition. Nehemiah met with ridicule, faced discouraged workers, greedy rich Jews and a crafty enemy but they could not stop him. He had faith in God and pointed his fellow workers and officials to God, calling upon them to be unafraid.

Nehemiah was a fine organizer. Half of his servants built while the other half held weapons. Some of the workers held a weapon in one hand and a tool in the other. A man with a trumpet was close to Nehemiah, always ready to sound an alarm. By praying and planning and working, the work was finished and all opposition was overcome.

III. Our age calls for sacrificial spiritual leadership. "So neither I, nor my brethren, nor my servants, nor the men of the guard which followed me, none of us put off our clothes, saving that every one of us put them off for washing."

Nehemiah set a high example. If spiritual leaders want results they must set a high example. Consistently, Sunday School teachers, pastors and leaders of youth groups, cannot look for great spiritual blessings unless they pay the price. The Church of our time needs builders who have the spirit and faith and courage of Nehemiah the dedicated layman.

Publication Describes Hope Building

Hope College's Physics-Mathematics building has been described in the American Institute of Physics publication, "Physics Buildings Today."

The publication provides college planners with a useful guide toward meeting the need of expanding physics departments all over the country.

"Physics Buildings Today," a 64-page supplement to the 1961 publication "Modern Physics Buildings: Design and Function," describes 26 buildings that have been constructed in the last five years. The Hope Physics-Math building was completed in 1964 at a cost of \$850,000.

The publication provides a range of examples of different types of design for different purposes in the physics program. The architectural accomplishments of liberal arts colleges and smaller institutions as well as those of the large universities are represented by photographs, artists' renderings, and floor plans.





Views From The Campus

(Robert Cecil began his college work at Davidson College, N.C. Then, after serving with the Air Force for three years, he returned to school, this time at the Juilliard School of Music where he earned his B.S. degree. In 1952 he received his Masters at Yale. For four years he taught brass instruments and was assistant director of the band at Yale. From Yale he went to New York as a free lance musician and a member of a chamber music group. He also taught one semester at Brooklyn College and gave private lesson to students at the Beardsley School. Cecil is associate professor of music and director of the band at Hope.

This past summer, while serving as associate director of the Hope College Vienna Summer School, it was one of my duties to make a reconnaissance trip to Czechoslovakia and Poland and to report on the advisability of including these countries in next summer's study tour.

One of my most delightful experiences abroad was in War-

saw. Almost immediately on arrival I went to the American Embassy with what may seem like an unusual request—could they introduce me to a professional French-horn player. Perfectly one who spoke English? Accepting the challenge, the cultural secretary made an appointment for me with Stefan Kierke, one of the horn players in the Warsaw Philharmonic. Stefan turned out to be a warmhearted and fascinating man. During World War II he had been a member of the Polish Freedom Fighters in England where he had learned to speak English. In addition to English and Polish, he speaks German and Russian quite fluently, he has degrees in music and international law, and has extensive art and rare book collections which overflow his one-room apartment.

The day I spent with him was a memorable one. When I met him at Warsaw's Philharmonic Hall, he invited me to attend that morning's festival and was rehearsing Beethoven's Seventh Symphony.

After lunch Stefan and two other members of the orchestra's horn section joined me in their club room for an afternoon of talking shop and playing music together. Stefan loaned me one of his horns (I just happened to have my mouthpiece along) and we played quartets in an atmosphere that until then I hadn't been able to recapture since my student days. The next day I had to leave Warsaw, and Stefan came to see me off. To my surprise he had brought along two very handsome gifts: an autographed copy of some studies for the horn composed by him and a very lovely wood-cut of Torun, the Polish town where Copernicus was born.

I enjoy telling this story because it illustrates a theory about horn players that I have always had—that they belong to a very special and wonderful fraternity as binding as any secret society. A perceptive observer will notice that they share certain common characteristics. The most pronounced of these include an abnormal response to the vibrations produced by brass instruments, a basic distrust of conductors (it would require another article to explain this fully), and a subtle but determined dedication to keeping alive the prevalent attitude that the horn is the most difficult of all instruments to play.

I feel that one explanation for this pattern of behavior has to do with sheer survival in a highly competitive field. To be reasonably accurate player requires a certain degree of emotional stability. In orchestral playing, for example, if you don't feel friendly toward the other members of your section, your animosity can spill out the end of your bell in the form of fractured notes—too much distrust of the conductor can bring the same result, and some embarrassment. On the other hand, to have the goodwill of your fellow players can be very comforting on the evening of a concert.

Musicians who teach in liberal arts colleges are naturally expected to teach a number of subjects in their field and I am no

exception. In addition to teaching brass instruments, I teach a course in music theory, one in music history, and I conduct the Band. I certainly enjoy the variety that my kind of job affords and it is a challenge to look beyond the end of my bell, but I feel that my enthusiasm for teaching stems from my love affair with the horn. To find the time and energy to practice is difficult, but not to practice is even more devastating than harboring unfriendly feelings. I have learned that when my playing suffers, my teaching suffers also.

New acquaintances often ask what my special field in music is. When I was younger and status-conscious, my answer was apt to be, "I am a professor of music" or "I am a conductor." Now my reply is simply, "I am a horn player." Oh, I forgot to mention that horn players do have a certain amount of pride.

3 Changes Made In Redistricting

ALLENDALE — Three changes in the school redistricting map for Ottawa county were approved at a final meeting of the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District Reorganization committee Thursday night in Allendale.

One change involves Nunica district which will be assigned 100 per cent to Spring Lake district instead of being split between Spring Lake and Coopersville.

Another change involves Allendale district which will go 100 per cent to Hudsonville instead of being split between Zeeland and Hudsonville.

The third change involves West Ottawa and Grand Haven districts. These districts will remain unchanged. The preliminary report had recommended a slight squaring off of the district at Pigeon Creek affecting six families in a transfer from Grand Haven to West Ottawa.

The decision to keep the two districts unchanged will remove these districts from the proposed county-wide vote. According to state law, the other six high school districts (Holland, Zeeland, Hudsonville, Jenison, Coopersville and Spring Lake) can engage in a single election with the single yes-no vote prevailing.

Jennie Kaufman, superintendent of the Ottawa Area Intermediate School district and chairman of the reorganization study committee, presided at the three-hour session. Fourteen of the 18 committee members were present.

There was discussion on assigning Harrington and Federal districts to Holland, as well as considerable discussion on Nunica and Allendale assignments. Changes for each high school district were voted on separately. Votes were not unanimous.

The final report with map redrawn to reflect the three changes will be forwarded to the state reorganization committee by Dec. 31. The 18-member committee has been working since late February to put all areas into K-12 districts.

Three public hearings were held for various parts of the county. The first hearing was held in Hudsonville Dec. 9. Others were Dec. 13 in Spring Lake and Dec. 14 at West Ottawa school.

Maroons Drop Third Game This Season

LUDINGTON—Holland Christian's basketball squad found out that "shooting is still the name of the game" here Friday night as the red hot Orioles stopped the Maroons 70-53 before 1600 fans in Hawley gymnasium.

In posting its fifth win in six starts, Coach Joe Kowatch's club hit nearly 50 per cent from the field and 79 per cent from the charity stripe to outpoint the Maroons who were having a cold night. Coach Art Tuls' squad which now has a 2-3 mark, outrebounded the Orioles, showed a better defense and took 20 more shots but still couldn't take the win.

Ludington connected on 24 out of just 52 shots from the field for a 46 per cent average on halves of 14-27 and 10-25. Christian attempted 72 shots from the floor but could only connect on 23 for about 32 per cent. It was a bad second quarter which started the Maroons on their way to defeat. After playing the Orioles even for practically all of the first period but still trailing 16-13, the Maroons could hit but just three out of 20 shots in the period to fall behind 39-25 at halftime.

The northerners were paced throughout the entire game by a flashy shooting trio of tireless Bill Wrege who meshed 22 points, followed by forward Mitch Newberg with 20 and center Doug Beattie with 15. Wrege, with great stamina and drive, played a great game as he set up numerous other scoring opportunities when he did not score himself.

Tuls again started a young lineup which included two sophs, but used all 12 men on the squad with 10 breaking into the scoring column. Jack Berghoef, senior forward, along with junior Ken Vander Kamp and Soph Steve Bushouse completely dominated the board play. Bushouse was used only sparingly however as he was in foul trouble most of the night.

After the Maroons had taken the opening basket on a one hander by Berghoef, the lead sea-sawed throughout the first period, before the Orioles, led by Beattie with seven points, managed the three point bulge.


Probably the biggest cheer of the game came with eight seconds left when John Thomas sank a short jumper to give the Dutch 161 points.

Bargaining Election Set For Jan. 12

A special election for teachers in the West Ottawa school district to determine whether the West Ottawa MEA district will represent teachers as sole bargaining unit has been scheduled Jan. 12 from 3 to 5 p.m. in the township fire station, the West Ottawa Board of Education was informed at a monthly meeting Monday night.

The election, to be conducted by the National Labor Relations Board, is for all teachers who hold certificates and who have been employed under contract by the West Ottawa district as of Dec. 17. Certificates may be special, temporary, provisional or permanent.

On request of Peggy Tenney, chairman of the teachers' salary commission, the board agreed to name two members to meet with the commission. Selection will be made after the Jan. 12 election.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said out of 350 petitions for recognition as bargaining units among teachers groups in the state, only 30 to 40 are holding NLRB elections. He pointed out that the state act is permissive, not mandatory. If the vote is defeated Jan. 12, there will be no further issues on bargaining group selection for a year.

The board spent about an hour discussing the report of the county reorganization committee which had held a public hearing on its recommendations Dec. 14 in the West Ottawa cafeteria. Attending as interested citizens were Mr. and Mrs. Henry Smith and Mr. and Mrs. Carl Schaftenaar.

The board reiterated its stand on democratic process for elections, but pointed out the law is on the books. The West Ottawa district feels it is being denied the democratic process in that an election of most of the county would make local determinations. Since the Dec. 14 hearing, adjustments have been made in the proposed district map which would eliminate Grand Haven and West Ottawa districts from the county-wide vote.

Van Raalte and William Sanford, board member, reported on attending a labor law workshop conducted by the Department of Public Instruction which pointed out school boards should budget for negotiation costs and retain a lawyer for all negotiations, keeping the public well informed of developments. Contracts to teachers should include complete working agreements. Primary purpose in all negotiations must be good education for children.

The board approved a salary schedule for janitors and custodians as drawn up by Business Manager Ed Donovan. Schedule for maintenance and social security retirees was boosted five cents an hour, with starting pay to be set at \$1.45 an hour, rising to \$1.55 in the third year. Custodians' pay will be boosted 15 cents an hour, placing first year men at \$2 a hour and five-year men at \$2.40 an hour. This will cost the board an additional \$5,194 with \$4,159 coming from rentals and \$1,035 from the 1965-66 school budget.

The board studied bids for stock supplies with tabulations at \$8,128.83 and authorized the superintendent to accept alternate bids geared to the best interests of the school, the amount not to exceed \$8,500.

Sanford presided at the meeting in the absence of President Harvey Knoll who has been ill. The meeting adjourned at 11 p.m.

City to Get Airport Funds

Holland will share in a new Federal Aviation Agency program totaling \$1.28 billion for construction of 887 new airport landing facilities and improvements in 3,219 existing airports across the country.

The local program is part of \$30 million allotted to Michigan under the federal setup.

Holland has been recommended for airport construction which includes building of a runway, taxiway, access road, lighting, fencing and clearing of land on a site selected by the community, or possibly added development to a private development acquired by the community.

Holland city currently is considering a site in the south part of the city which includes the present Holland city airport.

Last week City Council authorized aerial mapping of approximately 1,000 acres at the site to determine obstacle heights within the glide paths. Contract was awarded to Abrams Aerial Survey Corp. of Lansing at a cost of \$3,740. Council previously had allocated funds to match available state funds for program development.

The Holland official said each NFL official is watched every game and is given "some type of numerical grade." Former officials Charlie Berry, Jim Biersdorfer, Ron Tehan, Ron Gibbs and Emil Heintz are each assigned a game each week, Koop said.

Also checking on the officials each week are commissioner Pete Rozelle, treasurer Austin Gungel and director of officials Mark Duncan.

These men make personal observation and report to the NFL office. In addition to these observations, movies of all games are sent to the NFL office and studied.

As umpire, Koop plays behind the defensive line, about three to five yards behind the ball. On pass plays, Koop steps up toward the line so the pass receivers can't use him.

He has to keep a constant check on the five interior linemen, watching for ineligible receivers downfield. His officiating consists of calling the interior line play, illegal procedure and holding. He also calls the "bullet" pass plays over the line.

Koop said he called one touchdown back this season. It was in New York between the Chicago Bears and Giants. Gayle Sayers of the Bears threw a touchdown pass but Koop detected holding on the Chicago center.

As for the players in the NFL, Koop reiterated that everyone can see watching the games in person or on television. That is "the pros are big."

"I was impressed with not only their size, but their speed, quickness and agility," Koop said. He illustrated with Dick Butkus, Chicago's fine rookie linebacker.

"He has fantastic reactions," said the man who stands behind the middle linebackers. He also noted the ability of Dennis Gaudatz, Baltimore linebacker and Green Bay's Ray Nitschke, "who does something different on every play."

He also praised Detroit's Alex Karras for his defensive work and said some of the players talk to the officials more than in high school or college officiating with quotes like "watch No. 67 he held me on the last three plays."

He said because the players and coaches "talk more," he felt it was harder to officiate in the NFL than in college, high school or the pro league in which the Grand Rapids Blazers perform.

As for the spirit, Koop said the pros have a great personal pride and that supplies the incentive and enthusiasm. Competition is keen and this results in outstanding performances, he said.

"My ribs are sore just listening to these guys hit," Koop said.

Explaining television's influence on the game, the sponsors have a certain number of commercials each game, including commercials after every score or missed field goals.
