Local Court Busy With Many Cases

Holland Municipal Court has been a busy place of late with processing many cases, most of them regarding traffic.

Four persons paid fines and costs of \$85.10 on charges of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor. They are James Merrill Hellebrands Jr., 34, of 453 West 20th St.; Earl Neil Dry, 47, of 248 West Ninth St.; Robert William Kurth, 21, of 342 Third Ave.; and Antonio A. Mrs. Dyke said the children were at play in the basement of the home Monday afternoon when she heard an explosion and found Greg's clothing afire. The child suffered second and third degree burns. Authorities said the explosion was caused by a can of gasoline. Fire damage was minor.

New Commission Seeks To Preserve Old Papers

Hope College and Western Theological Seminary of Holland and Calvin College and Calvin Theological Seminary of Grand Rapids are cooperating in a venture with the Netherlands Museum to gather and preserve historical papers for study in the future.

Known as the Dutch-American Historical Commission, this organization will collect personal papers, correspondence, business records, diaries, notebooks, old newspapers, scrapbooks and museum artifacts.

Willard C. Wichers, director of Netherlands Museum who announced formation of the new group at a recent meeting of the Michigan Historical Commission in Lansing, said plans call for depositing museum items in the Netherlands Museum while all others will be deposited in the institution to which they are most closely related. In all cases, however, a duplicate of the documents will be available for any participating institution and full recognition will be given to the donor.

The new commission hopes soon to make public announcement of its field agents who will aid the commission in the collection of materials. Meanwhile, people wishing to deposit historical materials with the commission may contact members of its board: Dr. Herbert Brinks or Dr. Gordon Spykerman, Calvin College and Seminary; John May, Hope College; Dr. Donald Bruggink, Western Seminary; Wichers, Netherlands Museum; or the librarians of the participating institutions, Dr. Lester De Koster of Calvin or Mildred Schuppert of Western.

Wichers said cooperation between the Reformed and Christian Reformed Church communities in the area of historical scholarship is not a new phenomenon. He pointed to correspondence between Henry Beets and Edward T. Corwin, the respective historians of the Christian Reformed and Reformed Churches, indicates that as early as 1901 these men were deeply concerned about preserving historical records having common value for the two denominations.

Much later, in 1949, a joint committee of the two churches published an English translation of the Minutes of Classis Holland, 1848-1858. The new commission just formed represents an effort at institutionalizing this harmony for the preservation of the historical materials of the Dutch in Michigan.

The concern of the commission was thus aptly described: "The history of the Dutch-Americans in Michigan for more than a century is a saga of devotion and sacrifice."

\$15,000 Sought In Damage Suit

GEAND HAVEN—Five Grand Haven residents started a \$15,000 damage suit in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday as the result of a traffic accident on M-45 in Robinson township Aug. 1966.

Kenneth Midkiff of Grand Haven, June Midkiff, Roger Midkiff and Mary and Robert Scott Kolanko as plaintiffs seek damages from Yvonne Wierding and the Hartman garage at Hudsonville.

Plaintiffs claim all five were injured in the accident near 120th Ave., east of Grand Haven. They claim that Yvonne Wierding was driving a car owned by the garage and was headed east on M-45 and that she drove to the left of the Midkiff car, causing an accident.

Swim Pool Committee Reactivated

The Holland Board of Education Monday night reactivated its swimming pool advisory committee to continue its work as the community swimming pool at 22nd St. and Maple Ave. takes shape and nears completion.

Board Member Harvey Butler outlined previous work of the committee in promoting the swimming pool election and serving as an advisory group in the planning.

Serving on the committee were Russel Bouws and Jerry Jonker of the Christian Schools, Pastor William Tol of the Seventh Day Adventist Church, Richard Arthur of St. Francis de Sales School, Don Cochran and Harvey Butler representing local citizens and Supt. Donald L. Ihrman as ex-officio member.

Cochran has since left Holland for a new position in Ohio and a replacement is expected to be named in his place. Function of the group will continue to be as an advisory group reporting to the Board of Education.

He said the Board of Public Works has been contacted about installing street lights similar to the kind at the high school and the Holland Garden Club has offered to pay the fee for landscaping plans by a registered architect and perhaps contribute toward the landscaping.

The Junior Welfare League is considering purchasing a resuscitator for the pool with proceeds from the Candy Cane Ball, Butler said.

In general, the committee will work with Supt. Ihrman to develop a swimming program for the fall opening of school.

Collect \$22,325 So Far in Hope Of Future Fund

A total of \$22,325 was announced today by Clarence Klaasen, chairman of the Holland Community Campaign for Hope College, following the second report meeting of the campaign. The drive for funds is part of the "For the Hope of the Future" program of annual giving for Hope College.

In announcing the total to date, Klaasen urged the campaign interviewers to make all their contacts, observing, "we still have a long way to go if we're to be successful in this year's effort." A \$50,000 goal has been set as the community's contribution to the college.

New monies reported today totalled \$10,200. To date, special gifts division, headed by Herbert Marsilje, has reported \$3,650; special industrial division, with William Beebe and Herb Thomas as co-chairmen, reported \$3,500; industrial division, also chaired by Thomas and Beebe, has reported \$11,460; commercial division, chaired by William DeLong, has reported \$3,390; and the professional division has reported \$325. Neal Steketee heads the professional group.

The next report meeting will be held Thursday, Dec. 22, at 7:30 a.m. at the college.

Brochure Drawn for School Vote

"Invest in Their Future Now" is the title of a proposed brochure which the Board of Education is planning to distribute in connection with a special school election Jan. 10 in voting operating millage of 5.5 mills, an increase of 2.5 mills over the current levy.

The information, which the board approved in general at its monthly meeting Monday night, follows a question-and-answer format listing, time, precincts, absentee ballots, teacher salary comparisons with other Ottawa county school districts, curriculum development, comparisons with operational millage in other districts, increase costs, and the necessity for the vote.

Of the seven k-12 districts in Ottawa county, Holland is fourth on A. B. and M. A. minimums, and fifth on A. B. and M. A. maximums. The A. B. schedule runs from \$5,300 to \$7,720, and the M. A. runs from \$4,600 to \$8,420.

At present Holland is lowest in total millage of the seven districts, levying operational millage of 13.77 and debt millage of 3 for buildings and site, for a total of 16.77 mills. Spring Lake lists a total of 24.77, West Ottawa, 24.37; Coopersville, 20.97; Hudsonville, 19.20; Zeeland, 18.37, and Grand Haven, 16.87.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman also read a letter from High School Principal Fred S. Bertsch Jr., pointing out that the high school conceivably could lose its accreditation with the North Central Association if additional millage is not forthcoming. The local high school has been accredited with the North Central Association since 1910 and with the University of Michigan since 1898.

Bertsch explained that under its policies and criteria, the North Central Association has eliminated its "Accredited-Advised" category for those systems with minor violations. The next category is "Accredited-Warned" which could lead to dropping the school unless corrective action is promptly taken.

Bertsch wrote: "While not wishing to be an alarmist, unless the board's proposal for voted millage is passed at some time prior to our evaluation we will most certainly be warned and it is conceivable in light of the fact that the community has defeated four out of five proposals for operating millage in the past four years that we could be considered in violation of this criterion in any event."

"Should the electorate continue to withhold from the Board of Education those operating funds needed to conduct the present school program, I would infer that we would be forced to make modifications, improvisations and reductions which would almost inevitably violate some or all criteria on teacher load, instruction, and classroom instructional materials and equipment," he wrote.

Holland High School is scheduled for a reevaluation during the 1967-68 school year. Such a visit takes 2 1/2 to 3 days.

Supt. Ihrman also announced that the Senate Education Committee is concluding a series of regional meetings throughout the state with a meeting Dec. 21 at 2:30 p.m. in the library of Holland High School.

President James O. Lamb presided at the meeting which lasted 1 1/2 hours. All members were present and Mrs. Lowell Heneveld gave the invocation.

Allegan Light Plant Vote Slated Jan. 18

ALLEGAN — Registered voters, who expect to be out of the city when a special election is held here Jan. 18 to determine whether Allegan's light plant is to be sold, should apply now for absentee ballots, the city council advised Tuesday.

According to the city charter, the proposed sale of the municipal plant to Consumers Power Company for \$1,782,000 hinges on approval by a three-fifths majority of city electors.

The council plans to meet in special session next week to pass on a pre-election brochure presently being prepared for distribution to the public. According to Mayor C. J. Smith and the council, the publication is being designed to present both sides — pro and con — relative to the proposed sale of the utility.

Dutchmen Are Lone Leaders In MIAA Race

ALBION — Hope College escaped from Kresge gymnasium with an 81-74 victory Wednesday night and sole possession of first place in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association basketball race until next year.

However, the win was none-too-easily achieved for coach Russ DeVette's league leaders.

Hope had to overcome 31 ball control errors, 29 per cent shooting in the first half, a harassing Briton defense and a small (but vociferous) partisan crowd of 500 to pick up its third league win in as many starts and fourth victory in five contests overall.

Hope won't be in action again until two weeks from today (Dec. 29) when the Dutch Classic tourney opens in the Civic Center. Other teams will be Central and Northwestern Colleges of Iowa and Michigan Lutheran.

After a non-league date at Wheaton (Ill.) College Jan. 2, the Dutchmen swing back into league activity against Kalamazoo's Hornets who are just one-half game behind the MIAA pacesetters at 2-0.

Albion coach Dean Dooley sprung a surprise in starting what must have been one of the smallest lineups in college basketball—5'7" Ed Stephens and 5'11" Don Genson at guard, 5'9" Jim Bell and 6'1" Jeff Lowman at forward, and 6'3" Bill Breckenfeld at center.

Dooley's plan was to press, and it worked, forcing Hope into 20 first-half ball control errors. Hope didn't help matters any by firing 51 shots at the basket with just 15 finding the range for a dismal 29.4 per cent in the first 20 minutes.

Hope never led in the first half, trailing by as many as nine points (23-14 and 25-16), but managed to battle to a near stalemate at halftime (41-39 in favor of Albion).

After spotting the Britons two quick baskets to open the second half, Hope came on strong to take control of the boards and also take its first lead of the game.

With junior forward Floyd Brady and sophomore center Bruce Van Huis in command of the boards, the Dutchmen raced to a 49-44 lead, outscoring their hosts 10-2 in a four-minute stretch.

Hope extended its lead to nine points (62-53) when Brady ripped off five straight points and wasn't headed until Rick Ziem, an unheralded Briton freshman, came through with a long jumper and a pair of free throws to cut Hope's lead to 72-70 with just over three minutes remaining in the game.

Van Huis' fade-away jumper from eight feet gave Hope a four-point advantage which was once again cut to two when Bell, the MIAA rushing champ as a freshman this fall, sank a pair of foul shots.

Gary Ryma's free throw and a basket by Brady with 1:50 left was all Hope needed. When they got possession of the ball again, the Dutchmen simply played keep away for a half

minute until a final flurry of points in the last 18 seconds.

Brady led all scorers with 21 points, but his major contribution was 20 rebounds. Van Huis was next in scoring with 15 and equalled that total in rebounds.

Ryma added 14 points, Don Kronmeyer 12 and Carl Walters eight for Hope, while Ziem paced Albion with 18, and Bell contributed 12.

Hope had 27 offensive and 37 defensive rebounds for a total of 64 to Albion's 49 (23 offensive and 26 defensive).

The Dutchmen recovered from the 20-minute cold spell in the first half to hit on 14 of 31 shoots from the floor in the final half to finish with 29 of 82 (35.4 per cent).

The Britons went cold in the second half after connecting on 19 of 48 in the first half. Their second half shooting was 11 of 52 (an almost unbelievably poor 21.2 per cent). The final Albion figures read 30 of 100 for an even 30 per cent.

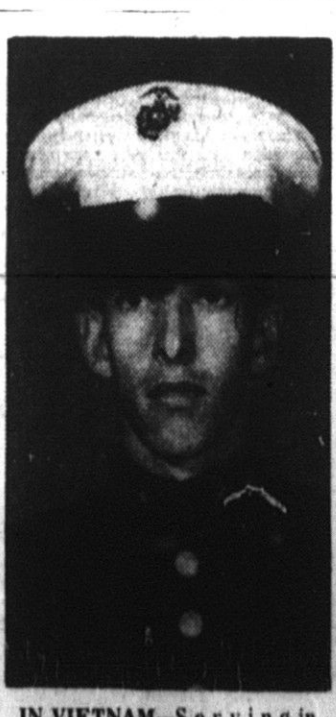
DeVette said after the game that he would "take it (the victory) any way we can get it." It was Hope's first win at Albion in four years.

Panthers Stopped, 84-40

Grand Rapids South Christian rolled over West Ottawa Friday night 84-40 in an Ottawa-Kent League basketball game played at the West Ottawa gymnasium.

The big story of the game was the superior rebounding of the Panthers both offensively and defensively, and the inability of West Ottawa to hit field goals.

The win for South Christian pushed its record to 2-0 in the conference, while the loss for the Panthers dropped them to a 0-2 mark in the O-K and 0-3 overall.

West Ottawa coach Jack Bonham started the game by using a 2-1-2 zone defense hoping to stop the shooting of the Sailor guards. The strategy worked until the second quarter when guard Bob Bonnema hit five field goals to break the zone.

The first quarter was played on even terms as both teams traded field goals with South Christian taking a slim 17-13 lead. The second quarter was the start of West Ottawa's downfall as they were unable to connect for a field goal until 3:46 remained in the period. They were outscored 20 to 10, with 10 of South Christian's points coming on long jump shots by Bonnema.

The lack of rebounding showed as West Ottawa could only get one shot. This lack of offensive rebounding by the Panthers enabled the Sailors to open up their fast break which repeatedly caught the defense flat footed. The winners led at half 37-23.

Bonham switched to a man to man defense in the third quarter hoping to stop the Sailors

offense. However, South Christian adjusted to the change and was able to work the ball into close-range where they scored with consistency.

Panther guard, Bill Henson, was the only West Ottawa player in the third quarter to show any scoring punch. The 5'8" sparkplug, scored 11 of West Ottawa's 15 points. The big man for South Christian in the third quarter was Bob Boverhof who scored 10 points and did a good job of rebounding. The score at the quarter's end was 58-38.

The fourth quarter proved to be almost a total shutout for West Ottawa as they hit only one field goal and no free throws. South Christian had their best quarter as they made 26 points.

South Christian's coach Jay Morren stated that their game strategy was to pick up the Panther guards at mid-court and hopefully break up the play patterns of West Ottawa before they could develop.

South Christian completely dominated the rebounding as they secured 32 defensive and 24 offensive rebounds for a game total of 56. On the other hand, West Ottawa was able to get only 18 defensive and a hard-to-believe four offensive rebounds, for a game total of 22.

The shooting of West Ottawa was clearly off as they hit on 14 of 54 for 27 per cent. They were 7 for 22 in the first half and 7 of 34 in the second half. In free throw shooting the Panthers hit 12 of 21 tries for 57 per cent.

South Christian enjoyed great shooting accuracy as they con-

nected for 32 or 73 shots for a 44 per cent on halves of 14 for 36 and 18 for 37. They were less accurate at the free throw line as they made only 14 of 34 attempts for 41 per cent.

Bonham, although disappointed about the play of his team, had high praise for substitute guard Henson. Henson dumped in 21 points to lead the Panthers in scoring. Bonham felt that the superior rebounding of the Sailors and the poor shooting by his team led to its defeat.

West Ottawa's next game will be Dec. 16, when they travel to Hudsonville Unity Christian in a non-league encounter. West Ottawa's record for the year is 0-3.

Shinabarger Paces 78-53 VCC Victory

Holland High ripped apart Grand Haven's zone defense for 30 second-quarter points then raced on to a 78-53 Valley Coast Conference basketball victory over the Bucs Friday night.

A near-capacity crowd of 2,000 in the Holland High fieldhouse saw junior guard Dan Shinabarger throw in 26 points, 12 of them in the decisive second frame, for his second straight big scoring night. Shinabarger scored 27 in Holland's win over East Grand Rapids Tuesday night.

The quick little guard was limited to a single point as the teams battled to a 11-11 stand-off in the first period then cut loose for 24 in the middle two quarters in leading coach Don Piersma's Dutch to leads of 51-28 at halftime and 59-41 going into the final stanza.

Holland riddled Grand Haven's zone for 12 field goals in 17 attempts in the second quarter and the Bucs were finally forced into a man-to-man defense, which proved equally as ineffective.

As Piersma explained after the game, "you have to know how to play a man-to-man defense. If you play the zone without knowing it (man-to-man) you have nothing to fall back on."

Coach Jon Hall put his Grand Haven team into the man-to-man and the Bucs gave up 32 points in the first 12 minutes of the second half.

Holland, although no taller than Grand Haven, held a remarkable 60-25 advantage in rebounding. Center Jim Swartz hit the boards for 12 first-half rebounds and wound up with a game-high total of 14. Forward John Thomas was close behind with 13 retrieves.

The Dutch also dominated final shooting figures with 31 of 63 field goals for a solid 49.4 per cent, while Grand Haven found the range on just 22 of 63 for 34.9 per cent. Holland hit a none-too-spectacular 16 of 27 free throws (59.3), the Bucs were little better with nine of 15 for 60 per cent.

Bob Pete, another junior guard for the Dutch, again came off the bench to help Shinabarger spearhead the Holland attack and also turned in an excellent defensive game.

Jim Fortney, who moves into the front line when Pete enters the game, scored 17 points. Thomas added 11 and Swartz nine for the Dutch.

Rick Westhoff hit for four

quick field goals early in the third period and led Grand Haven with 14 points. No other Bucs were in double figures, however.

Holland played a steady floor game, headed by Shinabarger and Pete, and committed just 11 ball control errors in the first 28 minutes of the game. Grand Haven wound up with 19 turnovers in the same period of time and 24 in the game to 15 for the Dutch.

Piersma inserted the "shock troops" (Randy Rogers, Tim Hillegonds, Max Bush and Randy Bobeldyk) for the last half of the final period and the foursome, along with Roger Jones, held their own against a steady stream of subs (10 in all) from the Bucs' bench.

Holland will be idle for a week before taking on another VCC rival, Grandville, next Friday night at Grandville.

Center Steve Jacobusse, who has missed all but the first Holland game with injuries to both elbows, is not expected to be ready before the Dec. 23 showdown with VCC pacesetter Muskegon Heights in Holland.

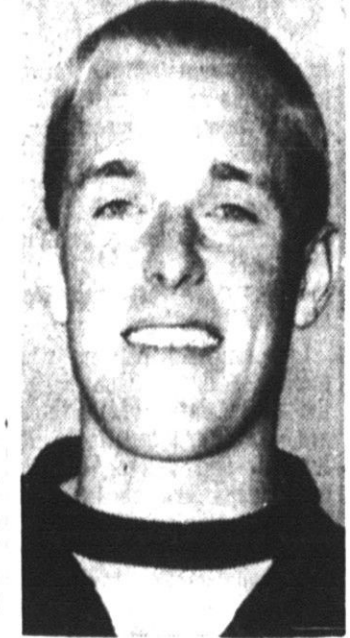

Mrs. Albert Klinge introduced the speaker.

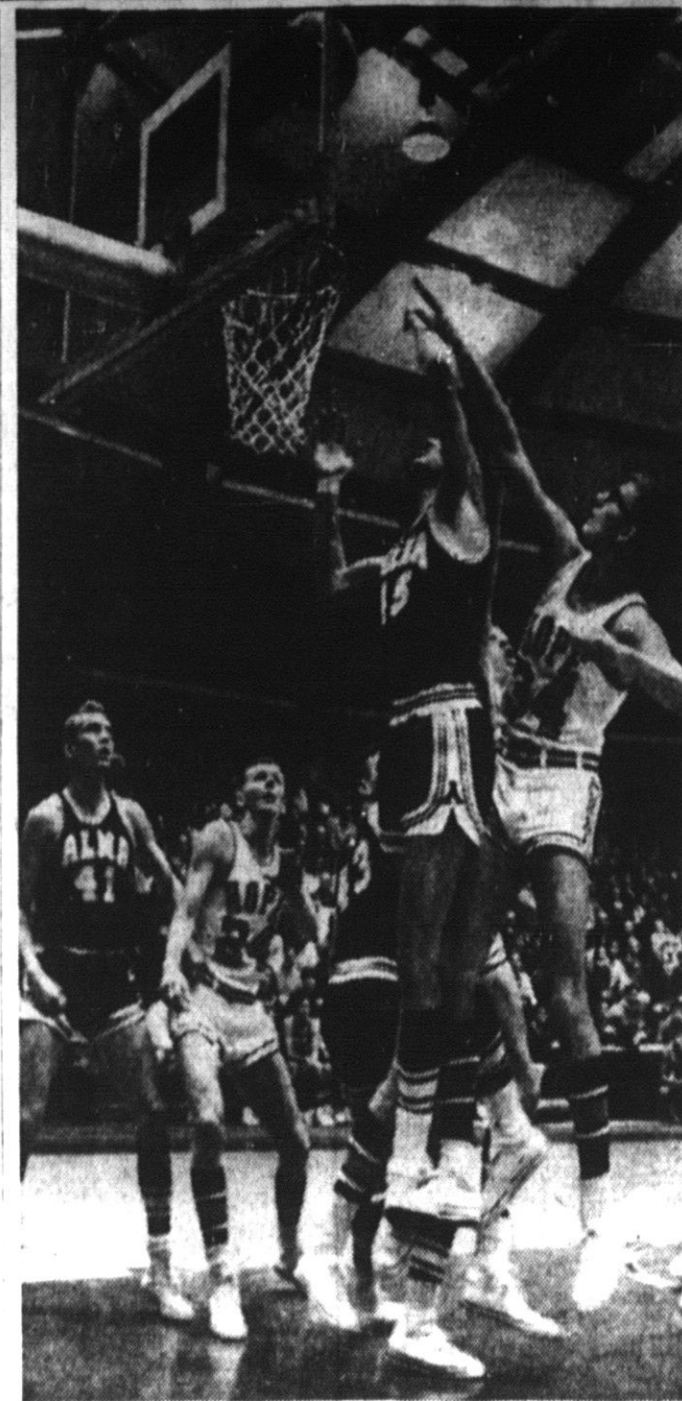
Holland Officers Complete Course

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BUDGET TIME

It was just a matter of months ago that federal lawmakers were a bit disturbed about a budget that would reach \$100 billion. The latest information that is being filtered to the country is that the next budget will be around \$130 billion and probably \$140 billion.

We are quite well aware that the Vietnam war accounts for a great portion of this budget. Even without the war, the defense budget was taking 50 percent of the total appropriations. But no one need be naive about the impact of last year's legislation on the budget. Scores of new programs were adopted, calling for outlays of billions of dollars.

Economists, that is those of a certain school, have suggested constant government intervention to maintain a prosperous economy. But they also suggested a payment of bills during times of prosperity. During months and years of the greatest prosperity we have ever known, this has not been done. We haven't tried to put our house in order by paying our bills when the tax take was substantial.

We aren't too sure that all this can be laid to party politics. We could mention names on both sides who have been careless about our economy, and we could do the same for those who have been deeply disturbed about our spending. Perhaps we'll have to admit to an easy attitude among the electorate that has brought on a careless attitude toward fiscal problems.

It may be that the very magnitude of the coming budget will cause Congress to make some sharp cutbacks. Whether we like it or not, a tax increase might alert the nation to the reality of the situation. A new Congress, alert to the ease with which a seat can be lost, and faced with the necessity to increase taxes, could be a real boon in getting some responsibility into our whole spending program.

The old saying "Saving for a rainy day" does not appear in any of our governmental affairs today. Just spend, spend and spend. This to our way of thinking does not help to reduce the government debt.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 18
Prophet of the Most High
Luke 1:67-80

By C. P. Dame

This is the first of 15 lessons from Luke's gospel. The writer was a Gentle, the only Gentle writer of the New Testament. He was a doctor of medicine, tradition says he was an artist. His gospel has been called the most beautiful book in the world. The gospel says much about prayer, about women, and is called the gospel of praise. It contains three great hymns — "The Magnificat," 1:46-55; "the Benedictus," 1:68-79; and "the Nunc Dimittis," 2:29-32. Luke portrays Christ, who is for the whole world. It was written about 60 A. D. This first lesson tells us how God prepared the forerunner of the Messiah.

I. The Holy Spirit inspires. Zacharias, the father of the Baptist "was filled with the Holy Ghost, and prophesied." Zacharias was a priest, a descendant of Aaron—their names were childless. His name means "the Lord doth remember." When it was the turn of the division of priests to which Zacharias belonged to serve he was given the honor of burning the incense in the temple. Whilst doing that an angel spoke to him, telling him that his prayer had been heard and that he would become the father of a son, who would be called John and who would be filled with the Holy Ghost and do great things for God.

Zacharias asked how this would be since both he and his wife were old. The angel said that he would be speechless until the message would be fulfilled. The son was born to this aged couple and on the eighth day when he was circumcised he was named John at the demand of the father whose tongue was then loosed and he praised God.

II. The Holy Spirit prompts one to praise God. The priest knew the Old Testament. In his hymn there are seventeen quotations or allusions to Old Testament passages. His mind was saturated with Old Testament truths. His hymn contains interesting words and phrases such as "redeemed," "an horn of salvation," "saved," "holiness and righteousness"—and the names of two great men, David and Abraham. The promises which God made to both of these men were being fulfilled in the days of Zacharias. He saw God at work.

III. God has His messengers. Zacharias the father said that His son would be called "the prophet of the Highest." The father served God and his deepest longing was that the son would do likewise—and this longing would be fulfilled. John would "give knowledge of salvation unto his people by the remission of their sins." The two words, "salvation" and "remission" are important.

The greatest message anyone can proclaim is that of the salvation which God has made possible through Jesus Christ whom John would preach. Recall how he pointed people to "the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world." The church today has this message to proclaim. Does the church do it? If not—who will?

Spring Lake Man Dies In Sand Slide

GRAND HAVEN — A 47-year-old Spring Lake man died of suffocation at 2:05 p.m. Friday while working with five others cleaning the inside walls of a 60-foot gravel and sand storage tank at Construction Aggregates in Ferrysburg.

Arthur Hyde, of 15783 Railroad Dr., Spring Lake, was working near the top of the tank when he was caught in a sand slide and was covered with two to three feet of gravel and sand.

The other five men worked 10 to 15 minutes to dig him out and applied mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Grand Haven firemen went to the scene with ropes and ladders. Oxygen was administered by an ambulance attendant. City police also responded.

The work crew was removing sand which had adhered to the inside walls of the storage tank.

Dr. Peter A. MacArthur of Grand Haven, serving as medical examiner, declared the man dead of suffocation at the scene.

Hyde was born in Grand Haven and was married two years ago to Mrs. Aleda Siders. He was a heavy duty gravel-separator operator at Construction Aggregates. He saw service during World War II serving with the United States Army and was a member of the Spring Lake Ex-Servicemen's Club as well as the Fraternal Order of the Eagles in Grand Haven.

One brother, Willard, was killed in action during World War II.

Besides the wife, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Clyde De Can, of Spring Lake and one son, Donald, who is serving with the submarine service on the U.S. Bream, presently overseas; his father, Ernest, of Grand Haven township; one sister, Mrs. Carl Van Heest, of Grand Haven; five brothers, John, James and Elmer, all of Grand Haven township, Edwin, of Nunica and Kenneth, of Spring Lake township; three grandchildren.

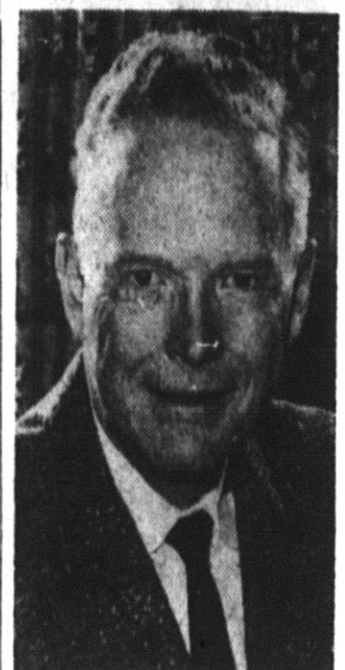
Besides coaching at Senn High School from 1937 to 1960, Leighton was a professional tennis player and instructor at River Forest Country Club for 17 years.

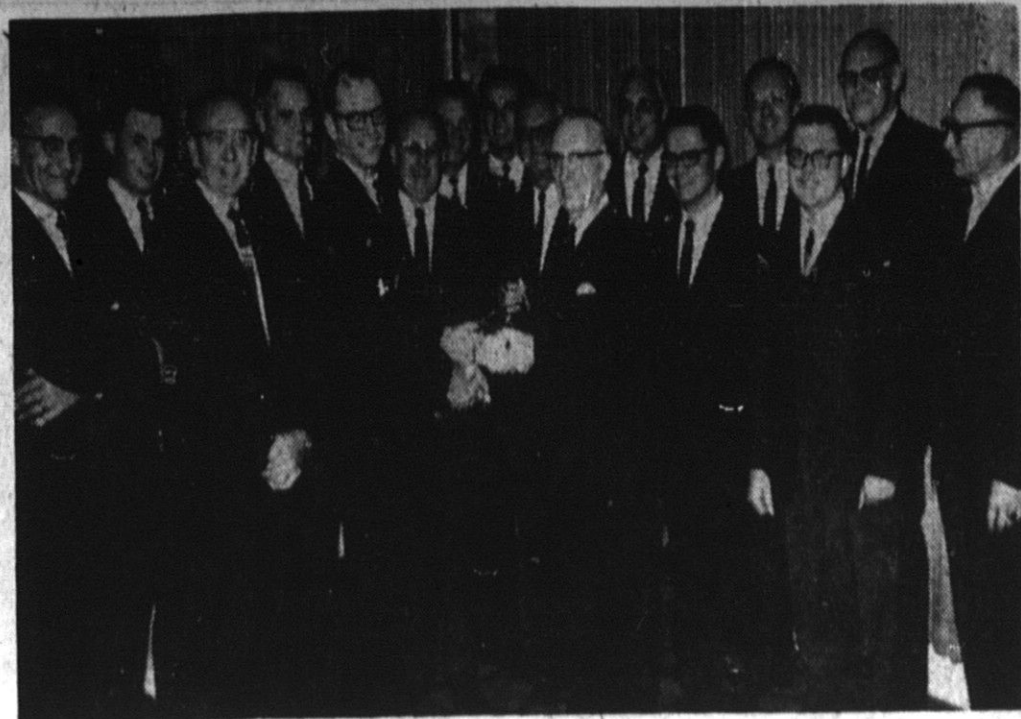
Young Calvinist Group Holds Board Meeting

To the Hindu, the Virgin Birth spells out a new concept of life and to the Muslim, an entirely new beginning.

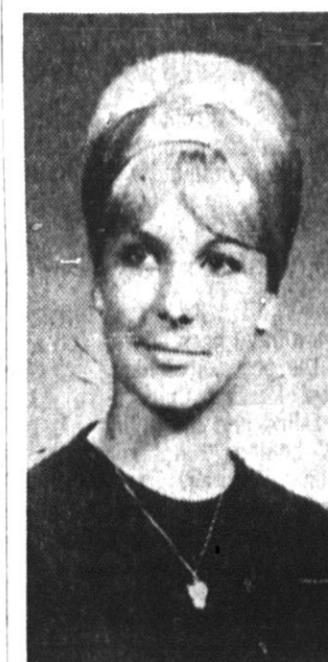

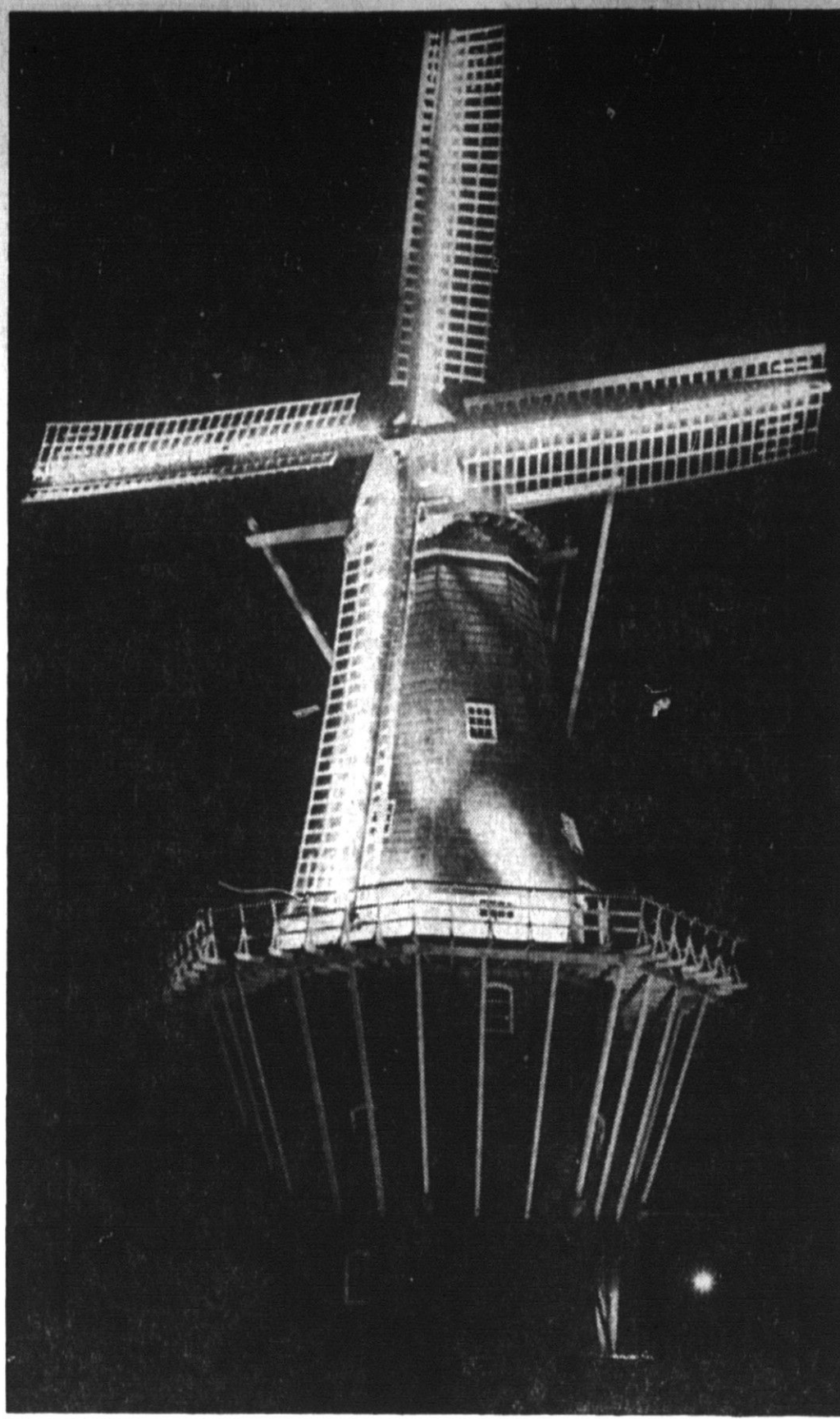

School Report Reveals Building Achievements

A progress report on construction at three elementary schools and the community swimming pool was given at a monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in the high school library.

At Van Raalte School, terrazzo floors have been poured and are in the process of being ground. Most heating units have been installed and the building is being heated. Toilet rooms have been plastered. Feature glass block units are being installed between the corridor and the library and multi-use room.

At Longfellow School, roofing work is in process and windows are being set. Light fixtures and heating units have been delivered to the job and the building should be enclosed in two weeks. Masons are cleaning the walls.

At Maplewood School, masonry work is nearing completion. Steel joists and deck are nearly complete in the classroom wings. Some pre-cast trim has been delivered to the job and steel framing for the facing has begun at the north wing. Windows are stored at the job.

At the Community Swimming Pool, the structural floor slab for the diving hopper has been constructed. The reinforcing steel for the hopper walls is being assembled. Dewatering continues. Foundation walls have been constructed for the east portion of the building, and the area backfilled.

The board approved a recommendation of Supt. Donald L. Ihman to hire Glen Sykes as an elementary physical education teacher to succeed Paul Berta who is going into insurance. Sykes will graduate this month with a B.S. degree from Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo and will assume his new duties after the Christmas vacation.

The board authorized new vocal music textbooks for sixth graders following a report by Alvern Kapenga, music department chairman, who pointed to the need of new materials in the vocal music department. He indicated new methods for teaching vocal music are every bit as advanced as new approaches to mathematics and reading, but people are inclined to regard music in a lesser light. Cost of just under \$1,000 has been budgeted. In coming years, the department hopes to institute new aids for the entire elementary system.

Kapenga also reviewed the Thanksgiving Day outing of the high school band to Detroit to march in the Hudson Thanksgiving Day parade. On the two-day excursion, the band toured Greenfield Village and the museum on the day before the holiday and spent the night on the Village grounds. Dr. Harry Bevan of Wayne State University who is succeeding Leonard Falcone at Michigan State University addressed the band that evening.

Rising at 5 a.m. on Thanksgiving Day, the band members donned their uniforms and wooden shoes and marched the parade route. "We had a lot of

fun and were well received," Kapenga said. "It's given the band that touch of esprit de corps and it's good for the youngsters."

Dale Mossburg, who represented the Holland school district on the Ottawa county school reorganization committee, reported that the state reorganization committee has approved the Ottawa plan and that an election for the entire county excepting West Ottawa and Grand Haven districts will be set some time between 90 days and six months hence.

He said a simple majority will determine whether the plan is approved. Harrington and Federal districts have been assigned to Holland. Grand Haven and West Ottawa will not vote since there are no changes in their boundaries.

The plan is the result of many months of study and puts all school districts into eight K-12 districts in Ottawa county.

\$100,000 Sought In Furnace Case

Athlon Industries, Inc., formerly Holland Furnace Co., has filed suit in Chancery Court in Wilmington, Del., seeking \$100,000 from P. T. Cheff of Holland, former Holland Furnace president and board chairman for the \$100,000 claim against the furnace company by Federal Court Jan. 27, 1965.

A hearing is slated in the Wilmington court Jan. 16. The case grew out of a Federal Trade Commission order in 1959 directing the company to cease and desist from certain sales practices. The new suit charges Cheff with being primarily responsible for company losses.

The suit allegedly seeks to recover the \$100,000 fine, \$1,300 in court costs, \$29,609 in attorney fees and defense costs, plus the costs of the Chancery Court action. The furnace company was incorporated in Maryland.

According to past published information, this is only one of several cases in the courts concerning Holland Furnace. One case still on the active list is a \$6 million claim against M. J. Stevens who took over Holland Furnace in May, 1962, at which time Cheff stepped down as chairman of the board. The company has had several presidents since that time.

Maroons Handed First Loss, 61-54

'66 'B' Champ East Christian Post Victory

GRAND RAPIDS — Holland Christian failed to get its offense untracked here Tuesday and dropped its first basketball decision of the season, 61-54, to defending state Class B champion Grand Rapids East Christian.

Despite its offensive problems, coach Art Tuls' young Maroons stayed in contention until the final seconds of play, trailing by just three points until the Panthers sewed things up with 23 seconds left in the game on a pair of free throws by forward Craig Vander Linde.

About 1,500 persons witnessed the second meeting of the two teams in the Central Christian gymnasium. In the first game, a year ago, Holland won, 67-66 in overtime. Ironically, 1965-66 was the Maroons' poorest season in 15 years, while the Panthers went on to win the state title.

Only front-line returnee from the championship squad, center Ron Flietstra, was expected to provide the Panthers' offensive punch this season, but 6'4" guard Steve Veneklasen stole the show Tuesday night.

Veneklasen gunned in 23 points, primarily on shots from outside, not an East Christian trademark.

Flietstra, on the other hand, was limited to one basket and three free throws in the first half by the Maroons' rugged junior center, Steve Bushouse.

Bushouse, who scored 13 of Christian's 30 first-half points, got into foul trouble, however, picking up his third near the end of the first half and his fourth just over two minutes into the third period.

Bushouse also kept the Maroons in contention on the boards with seven of his eight rebounds coming in the first half.

The solid Panther front line had little trouble controlling the boards when Bushouse was taken out of the game after his fourth foul. Holland had the height advantage with 6'6" junior Jim Vogelzang or 6'7" sophomore Dan Brower — or both — in the game in place of Bushouse, but the better and more experienced East Christian rebounders (Flietstra, Bill Rykse and Vander Linde) were able to retain board control.

The Maroons led coach Corrie Bykerk's Panthers throughout the first period (18-16 at the quarter), but fell behind almost immediately in the second and last led 21-19 with 6:16 left in the first half.

East Christian built up a 10-point lead (42-32) early in the second half before the Maroons rallied behind the efforts of Lloyd Doezman, who tossed a pair of long jumpers, a layup and a free throw as the losers cut the deficit to 47-44 after three quarters.

Neither team was able to find the range in the final period (Holland hit five of 12 field goal tries, East Christian four of 13), but the Panthers cashed in on six of eight free throw opportunities, the Maroons none of two.

Vander Linde's clutch effort at the line came with 23 seconds left in the period. His first toss hit the front of the rim and trickled in, ending Christian's hopes of remaining unbeaten. The second barely rippled the net.

Forward John Lappinga, one of four juniors in the Holland starting lineup, led the Maroons with 14 points. Bushouse followed with 13, Doezman with nine and Bob DeNooyer with seven.

Christian, now 3-1, hosts Ludington Friday night in the Civic Center. East Christian is also 3-1 and meets Central Christian in Calvin College's Knollcrest Campus fieldhouse Friday night.

The Maroons finished with 21 of 60 field goal attempts for 35 per cent, while East Christian was 21 for 54 for 39 per cent.

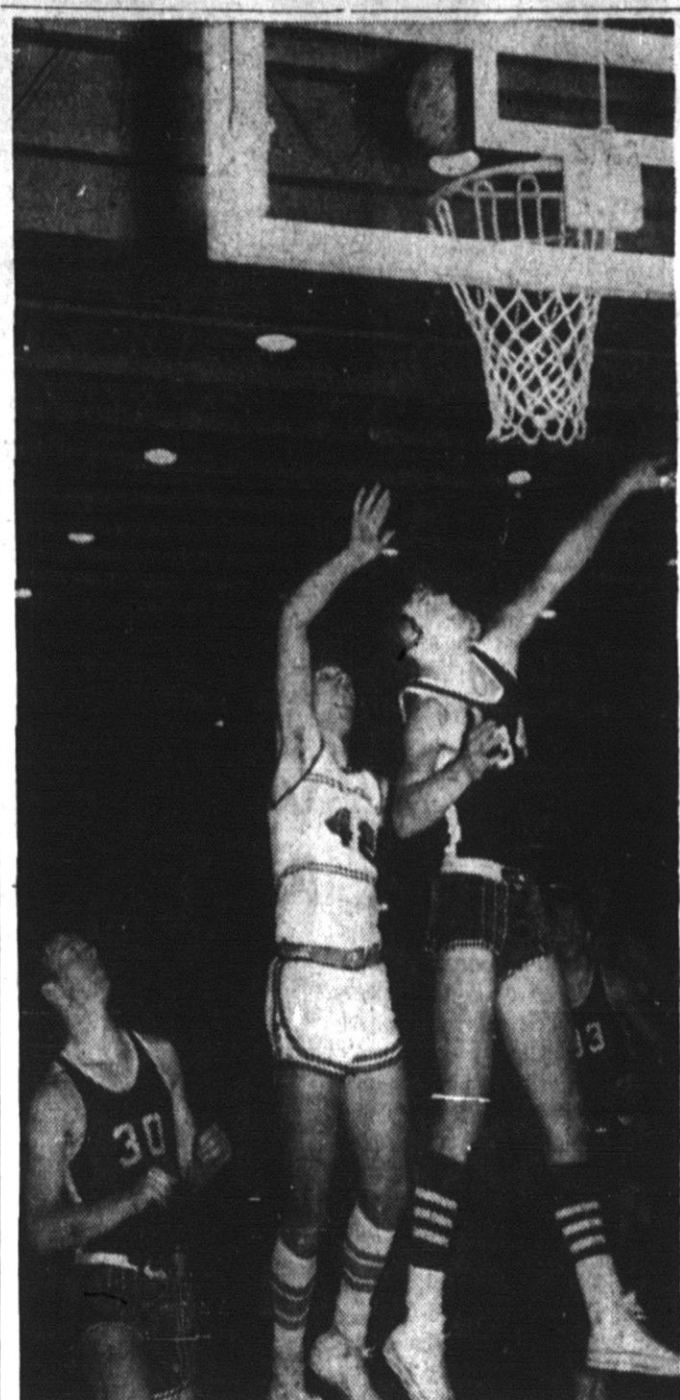

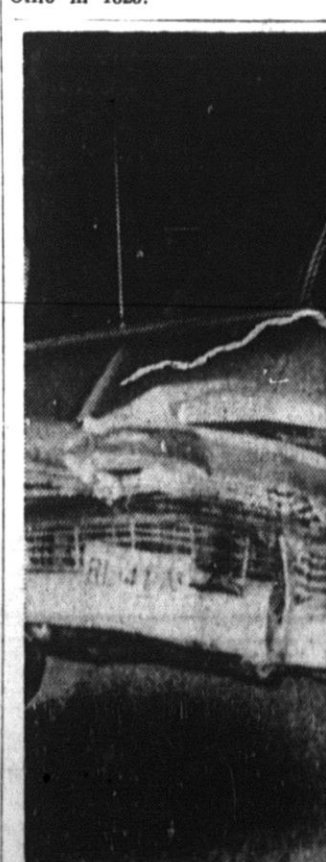

Sag Harbor on Long Island, N.Y., has a windmill too. A full size non-operative windmill has been erected on "made land" at a new bridge from Sag Harbor to North Haven on eastern Long Island. 90-58 Win Keeps Hope Tied for Lead

Hope College rolled past Alma College, 90-58, Saturday night before 2,000 fans in the Holland High fieldhouse to remain tied with Kalamazoo and Olivet for the early lead in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association basketball race.

Kalamazoo kept pace with coach Russ DeVette's Flying Dutchmen by edging Albion 76-71, for its second straight league win. Olivet measured Adrian 89-71 to also post a 2-0 league mark.

Hope got double-figure scoring performances from five players and one other — West Ottawa sophomore Bruce Van Huis — added nine points and 18 rebounds.

Van Huis, making his second start as a varsity performer, helped Hope to a 66-46 advantage on the boards. His rebound total was the individual high for a Hope player this season. In three previous games, the 6'5", 200-pound center had pulled down a total of nine rebounds.

Other season marks fell Saturday. The 90 points was Hope's top output and the yield of 58 points the lowest for the Flying Dutchmen.

That wasn't all. Holland junior Don Kronmeyer led Hope with 16 points, his top output, and co-captain Carl Walters added 12, his top effort. Walters' guard runningmate, Gary Rypma, came through with his second straight 12-point performance and senior transfer student Jim Schoon came off the bench for his first double-figure scoring game in a Hope uniform with 10 points.

Hope's fifth player in two figures was, of course, Floyd Brady with 13 points. Brady had six rebounds and both marks were season lows for him. In the three previous games, he had totaled 30, 18 and 30 points, 16, six and 15 rebounds.

A total of 12 players scored for Hope, including a pair of Holland natives, John Leenhouts and Rick Bruggers, both of whom made their varsity debuts Saturday night. Only player who failed to score was freshman Bruce McCreary, up from the junior varsity.

A pair of junior transfers from Soo Tech, guard Gord Hettrick and center Ron Sober, provided Alma with its only semblance of an offensive threat. Hettrick finished the evening with a game-high of 20 points. Sober added 11.

Hope never trailed but found itself tied during the early going — 19-19 until Schoon's long jumper from the corner and Van Huis' layin goal with an assist from Rypma put the Dutchmen up by four with 8:05 left in the first half.

Alma remained in contention for the rest of the half as Hettrick's 12 points and all 11 of Sober's paced the Scots to a narrow 43-37 deficit at intermission.

Hope outscored the visitors 23 to 8 in the first nine minutes of the second half to sew up the win. Its third in four games and second straight in the league. Alma is 1-2 after three games, all in the MIAA.

Hope hit 39 of 76 from the floor for an excellent 51.3 per cent, while Alma made good on 25 of 75 for 33.3 per cent. The Dutchmen were 12 of 19 from the free throw line, Alma eight of 12.
