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## November Permits Hit \$403,217

A total of 49 building permits totaling \$403,217 were filed with City Building Inspector Jack Langfield during November. This brings to 320 the number of permits issued in Holland since July 1.

Permits included six new houses for \$129,194; 21 residential remodeling for \$19,918 and 9 commercial alterations for \$179,800. The latter included a sizeable addition to Holiday Inn.

## Grand Haven Hospital Fund Drive Starts

GRAND HAVEN — A campaign to raise \$600,000 in north-western Ottawa county for a new hospital authority, now being organized, is under way and eight divisions have been named to lead the drive.

Harold Ringelberg of Grand Haven is chairman of the board of the authority, which includes the cities of Grand Haven and Ferrysburg and Grand Haven, Robinson, Crookery and Spring Lake townships.

Ringelberg said today that both the fund drive goal and a two - mill tax levy for ten years are needed to erect the new hospital, which will cost \$2,500,000. It will be erected as a connecting unit to the present hospital at 1300 Sheldon road at Grand Haven. The present building erected in 1939, will be remodeled and modernized in the expansion program.

The Loutit foundation recently announced that it will give \$1 to the drive for each \$2 raised by the private subscription. Gifts are being solicited on the condition that the public will approve a 2 mill levy at a special election Jan. 23. Only property owners can vote.

## Serviceman Writes Of Vietnam

In early November Mrs. Ernest Penna gave her sixth grade class at Longfellow School a creative writing assignment. Each student was to choose at random a name from those servicemen listed in The Sentinel and write a letter.

Randy Billerbeck, son of Mrs. Henry Billerbeck, 4 East 29th St., wrote to W-1 David D. Burns, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard D. Burns of 1237 Janice St., and received a reply which was brought in to the Sentinel newsroom recently.

The letter, written in a friendly, narrative style that makes the reader feel as though David is speaking directly to him, begins with some details about the author. David has two brothers, Bob and Tim, graduated from Holland High School in 1965 and attended college for one year.

He goes on to tell that he is with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment located five miles south of Xuan Loc (pronounced Swan Lock) which is about 35 miles east of Saigon. David is a pilot on an armed helicopter and enclosed pictures and descriptions of the type he operates. He gives his regiment's code name, his own code name and then explains some of the military jargon connected with them.

David describes the monsoon rains which begin in June and end about the last of September and remarks that "All of the rest of the time it is very dry and very hot" and "...the wind blows dust all over, and sometimes it is so bad you can't see where you are going. Several choppers here have crashed because the pilot couldn't see where he was going, the dust was so thick."

In spite of the monsoon rains, dust and heat, it seems as though David hasn't lost his sense of humor as he jokes, "All the insects here are very big, as a matter of fact the mosquitoes are so big here, I have to wait for them to get off the runway before I take off!"

David goes on to tell about the country and says, "Really, Randy, Vietnam is a beautiful country. When I fly over the jungle real low, I can see monkeys looking at me, and there are thousands of little parakeets of all colors. Blue, green, yellow, and we have peacocks here and even the rare 'bird of paradise.' Oh, I have also seen herds of elephants, and wild water buffalo here also. It is so pretty, it is hard to realize there is a war here."

David adds that his squadron has a pet spider monkey named Charlie and it will eat "anything" but especially likes Winston cigarettes.

David explains that he has to fly "tonight" and closes the letter:

"So work hard in school, Randy, be good, and mind your Mom and Dad.  
"All of us here in Vietnam are doing our best for something we think is right, and to make a better world, so guys like you won't have to go to war."

## Allegan Plans To Boost Water And Sewer Rates

ALLEGAN — Allegan City Councilmen this week approved the first reading of two new ordinances in a first step to raising Allegan's water and sewer rates. Approval of these ordinances would increase by 50 per cent water rates presently charged. The decision was based following submission of final rated studies made by Williams and Works, a Grand Rapids engineering firm.

The rate hike will be used to finance long needed improvements to the city's sanitary and storm sewers, and will also foot the costs of a 3 million gallon water treatment plant pending voted approval of financing at a spring election.

Monthly rate charges will up the minimum monthly bill for the first 1,000 gallons to \$2 and will set the following per thousand gallon monthly costs: 50 cents a thousand up to 9,000 gallons; 40 cents a thousand for the next 10,000 gallons; and a 20 cents per thousand for the next 900,000 gallons, with a rate of 15 cent per 1,000 gallons for all over 1 million gallons.

Present monthly rates set a minimum of \$1.20 for the first 2,000 gallons, 18,000 gallons at 25 cents per thousand, 12 cents per 1,000 for an additional 980,000 gallons, and 10 cents a thousand for all usage over 1 million.

Sewer rates will be set at one half of the last monthly metered water charge. Present sewer rates will be set to charge the same rate as for water usage.

The Williams and Works survey originally proposed to finance improvements by an increase in water and sewer utilities revenue by 100 per cent, but council vetoed the plan lowering costs and setting a 50 per cent ceiling.

## Hospital Expansion Program Set

MUSKEGON — A long range expansion and modernization program for Hackley Hospital, to be undertaken in four stages at costs up to \$9,000,000 over the next 10 years, has been approved by trustees.

Next year, a public fund raising campaign to raise \$2,000,000 will be launched. Expansion will start with construction of a new north wing of three floors and basement for medical-surgical and obstetrical beds with footings and services to accommodate up to eight floors eventually.

A fourth floor for a psychiatric department will be included in the initial project if federal assistance can be obtained.

## Teachers Considering Board Offer

James O. Lamb, president of the Board of Education, announced at the board's monthly meeting Monday night that the board has made an offer to public school teachers on a two-year contract in an effort to resolve the current salary dispute.

"We have endeavored to keep faith not only with the people, but with the teachers and the taxpayers, and all I can say at the present time is that the offer is under consideration," he said.

After the meeting, Ted Boeve, chief negotiator for the Holland Education Association, indicated that the HEA has an agreement with the board not to release premature information, but he said further meetings are being planned to iron out some details, and the offer will be considered by the teachers at a meeting at 4 p.m. Monday in the Holland High auditorium.

Holland teachers currently are teaching under a Circuit Court injunction ordering them back into the school room after four days of "withholding services" early in September. They are being paid on last year's salary schedule, plus increments, with the understanding an adjustment will be made once a master contract is signed.

Late in the meeting, answering a question from the audience, Supt. Donald L. Ihrman said that the scheduled visit from the accreditation team of the North Central Association of Secondary Schools has been postponed until such time as the contract dispute is resolved. The visit had been scheduled for February.

Requested presentations by two staff members related to gymnastics for girls and a wrestling program for boys, Miss Julie Keefe, girls' gym teacher, showed films of local girls performing last year. She said nine girls participated last year and competed in three meets, and that 16 started this year but she felt obliged to cancel the program since there was no promise of support in the budget.

Clyde Line, newcomer to the faculty this year, said he was interested in a wrestling program on an intramural basis but became critical of school policies on insurance and sick leave. He added, however, that he liked Holland, that lower salaries were partially offset by lower cost of living, and that the students were of high caliber.

Board Member Harvey Buter asked why the Athletic Council did not resolve athletic programs instead of having teachers make presentations to the board, but President Lamb said the lack of a master contract left the school budget unresolved, and no assurance could be given that teachers would be paid for extra duties.

"As for me, I will do all in my power to see that the next millage issue passes," Lamb said. Miss Keefe had expressed concern that new athletic programs might be the first to be cancelled if millage issues were not passed.

A communication from the Saugatuck Board of Education informed the local board that a citizens committee was studying consolidation and asked whether Holland would be interested in consolidating with Saugatuck and another K-12 district. Lamb appointed Harriet Heneveld and John Keuning of the schools committee to consult the subcommittee and obtain more information before a local recommendation would be made.

The board granted a release to Mrs. Marla Coombs, teacher at Washington school, for the second semester so that she can join her husband who has been in the service.

As her replacement, the board

approved a contract for Kathleen Olson who will be graduated from Hope College in January.

The board approved a resolution authorizing issuance of a duplicate lost coupon for \$16.25 in connection with the 1960 bond series. Arrangements were made through Atty. James Townsend.

Supt. Ihrman announced that the State Department of Education has approved a grant of \$37,050 for the summer reading program in 1968 and reimbursement for the special education program involving physically handicapped and speech correction, the cost to be determined later.

## Fire Chief Brandt Gives Safety Tips For Christmas

Fire Chief Dick Brandt today offered some safety tips to help make Christmas more enjoyable for Holland area residents.

Brandt said that a stand that substantially supports the tree of the type equipped with a water container is recommended. And, for best preservation results, the container should be filled with a solution made up of one and one-half pounds of ammonium sulfate, one-half pound of boric acid crystals, one-half pound of borax and three gallons of water.

"Under no circumstances should candles be used on or near the tree, and whenever possible flameproof or noncombustible decorations should be used," he said. "Use only approved electric lights."

"No tree should be set up near an exit, in a hallway, or where it might be exposed to heat," Brandt said. "Any tree showing unusual dryness should be dismantled and removed from the building."

One last tip from the chief is that "Christmas wrappings should be disposed of promptly and safely, and not in an indoor fireplace."

## Building Is Destroyed By Early-Morning Fire

An early-morning fire completely gutted the Beachcomber tavern at 2155 Ottawa Beach Rd. today, causing a total loss to the establishment.

The blaze, which apparently broke out in the front part of the building, was reported at 5:10 a.m. Wednesday after a resident across the lake spotted it and called in the alarm.

Firemen from both Park Township No. 1 and No. 2 stations were at the scene until 8:35 a.m. today. Park Township Fire Chief Jacob De Feyter said four trucks were there.

Firemen said flames were coming out of the windows of the southeast corner of the building when they arrived. It

was reported firemen were not at the scene more than five minutes when the section of roof over the southeast corner of the cement block building caved in.

Fire Chief De Feyter believed the blaze broke out in the front area of the building where booths and tables were located. The entire inside of the building was gutted. Only the walls and part of the roof remained standing.

## 2 Bound Over In Breakins

COOPERSVILLE — Two Coopersville subjects who allegedly broke into several business places in the county Monday night have waived examination in justice court and have been bound over to Ottawa Circuit Court.

Marvin Earl Moon, 19, charged specifically with breaking into Anne's Restaurant on Fruitport Rd. in Spring Lake township, was arraigned before Justice Lawrence De Witt Wednesday. He failed to provide \$2,000 bond.

State police returned early today from Muncie, Ill., with Larry Laug, who later appeared before Justice Eva Workman on a charge of breaking into Woody's Sport Shop. He failed to provide \$3,000 bond.

Both were taken to the county jail. They are scheduled to appear in Circuit Court Jan. 9.

Owner Jay Timmer of 381 Fifth Ave., estimated damage to the building and contents at between \$35,000 and \$40,000, part of which is covered by insurance.

Timmer had no idea as to how the fire might have started. He told Ottawa deputies everything was all right when he left the building at 2:30 this morning. Deputies said Timmer was called about 5:30 a.m. today and informed of the fire.

Fire Chief De Feyter said cause of the blaze has not been determined; however, deputies said there was some speculation the blaze might have been started by defective wiring inside the building.

## Christmas Rush Starting At Post Office

The holiday rush has begun at Holland post office.

The post office was open all day Saturday for the convenience of Christmas mailings, and close to 25,000 pieces of mail were put through the cancelling machines.

In previous years, peak days would surpass the 100,000 mark, but in recent years, the Christmas season has covered a longer period of time, spreading the work in a manner that was easier to handle.

To date, Postmaster Louis A. Haight has used the regular staff. Whether part-timers will be hired will be determined later as demand indicates.

He reminded local persons that all mail must be in by Dec. 22 for any assurance for delivery before Christmas. Christmas falls on Monday this year, and the last delivery will be on Saturday, Dec. 23.

Alexander Co., Holland, and Alexander's wife Doris seek damages from Patricia Ann Van Geldren and Lynda Lee Van Kampen of Ottawa county, the result of a traffic accident on College Ave. on Feb. 6, 1967.

Alexander was driving a 1964 sedan which collided with a 1960 car driven by Lynda Lee Van Kampen, resulting in serious injuries to Alexander. He seeks \$35,000 damages and the H. K. Alexander Co. seek \$21,808 damages from the defendants for loss of his services. Mrs. Alexander seeks \$2,500 damages for the loss of companionship of her husband.

In another suit, Frozena Burgess of Detroit and her husband, Joe, seek judgment of \$125,000 from a Holland ladder company, Geerds and Zwieter, Inc. The plaintiffs claim that Mrs. Burgess fell from a ladder made by the defendant while picking fruit at a farm at Rome, Mich., Oct. 15, 1964. The fall resulted in serious injury to Mrs. Burgess, plaintiffs claim.

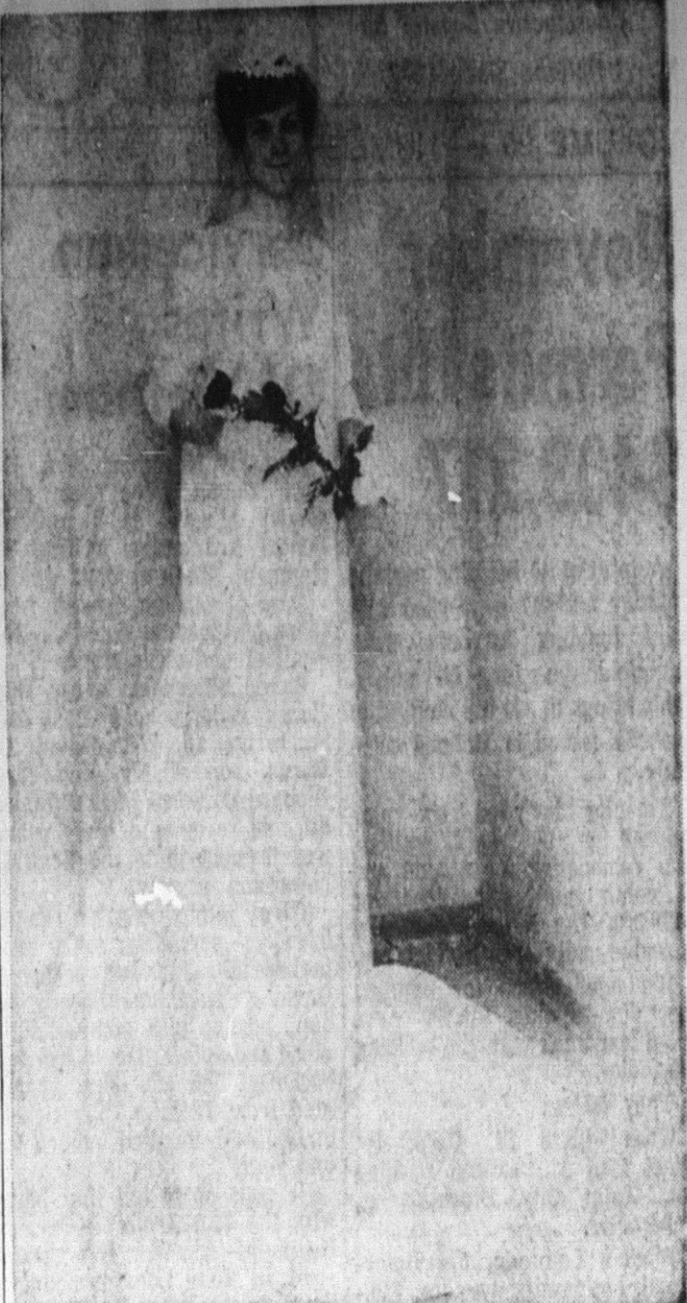

## Holland Scores 102 In Victory

GRAND HAVEN — There was buried treasure in the Buccaneer gymnasium but it was the Dutch who tilled it home.

Shooting 55 per cent from the floor, Holland High's basketball team unleashed a powerful scoring attack Friday night to smother Grand Haven, 102-71, giving the Dutch their second Valley-Coast Conference win.

Though senior guard Dan Shinabarger of Holland garnered 32 points and Grand Haven's senior center, Ike Nietring notched 36, the game was more than an individual scoring duel between the teams' leaders.

Shinabarger's usual versatile effort was matched by the front line of Bob Pete and Max Bush who scored 20 and 15 points respectively. The forwards also performed well defensively and helped Holland control the boards.

The Buccaneers held small leads for half of the first period but the Dutch slowly pulled away to a commanding 10 point spread at the quarter mark, 30-20. Pete scored five baskets in the first quarter, lifting Holland's field goal percentage to 64.

In the second quarter Holland's shooting percentage dropped to 46, but the Buccaneers fell much lower to 24 per cent. Holland held a halftime margin, 57-31, and hit for their highest percentage, 67 per cent on eight of 12 tries.

Utilizing a good fast break and a zone press executed well by Pete and junior guard Dave De Witt, Holland raced to its widest spread, 39 points, midway in the third period, and finished the quarter with a 79-50 lead.

Coach Don Piersma played his substitutes for much of the remaining quarter with the honor of scoring the 100th point going to Paul Overbeek. After scoring 15 of his points in the quarter Nietring fouled out with :03 remaining.

Center Dave Gosselaar continued to improve adding 14 points and taking several of Holland's 43 rebounds. Grand Haven grabbed 29 rebounds.

Piersma commented after the game that Grand Haven was a "good team, better than we had thought. They beat a lot of people. Nietring is one of the best players we have seen."

"We were able to work the ball in close on them and shoot within a perimeter of ten feet for the good shots," Piersma added.

Next week Holland entertains Grandville in a conference game at 7:45 in the fieldhouse.

## Christian Takes Third Straight

Holland Christian's basketball team rolled to its third straight win, 86-65, over Muskegon Christian Friday night in the Holland Civic Center before a capacity crowd.

The Maroons were a much better ball club than in their first two games, as they moved the ball extremely well, with excellent passing, particularly by senior guard Bob Van Langevelde. Repeatedly Van Langevelde would hit the open man under the basket with quick passes, including a crowd-pleasing behind the back pass to Jim Vogelzang for an easy lay-up.

The Warriors of coach Elmer Walcott, led by three baskets from center Pete Wagenmaker, stayed with the Maroons for the first five minutes, and held the lead on three occasions. However, two baskets by Dan Brower, along with buckets by Van Langevelde, Bob Dozeman, and Lloyd Dozeman, moved the Maroons from a 12-11 lead to a first quarter bulge of 22-14. Van Langevelde hit four of his five baskets in the first quarter, as he was content to feed the other players the remainder of the game.

With Bob and Lloyd Dozeman, Steve Bushouse, Brower and Art Tuls hitting for baskets, the Maroons went to a 36-20 bulge in the middle of the second quarter, and were never in trouble from there on. The half ended with the Maroons enjoying a 45-29 margin.

Nine players hit the scoring column for coach Art Tuls' team in the first half with Brower leading with 10. Wagenmaker and Don Portenga each had 10 for the Warriors at halftime, with Portenga connecting on six of seven free throws.

Tuls used his regulars throughout the third period, and they continued to pad the lead, outscoring the Warriors 24 to 10. Bob De Nooyer hit on four baskets and Vogelzang three to lead the scoring in the period, while the Maroons limited Muskegon Christian to only three field goals. Christian led 69-39 at the end of three quarters.

The Warriors outscored their hosts by a 26-17 count in the final quarter, as both teams substituted freely.

Once again, the tall Maroons' front line of Vogelzang, Bushouse and Brower, along with reserve Bob Dozeman, gave them control of the backboards, pulling down 48 rebounds as against 22 for the Warriors. Brower was especially strong on the boards, as he picked off 20.

Coach Tuls was pleased with the performance of his team and was "happy to win the game."

Christian had five players in double figures with Brower being high with 16, followed by 15 for Vogelzang, 13 for Bob Dozeman, 12 for De Nooyer and 10 for Van Langevelde. Portenga, with six baskets and eight for 10 at the charity stripe, was high for the game with 20 points.

The Maroons took 76 shots and connected on 37 for a fine 48 per cent. The Warriors, meanwhile, hit on only 24 of 69 for 34 per cent. Several shots taken by the Warriors were blocked by the Maroons.

Holland Christian will journey to Ludington next Friday night for a game with the Ludington Orioles.

## Pair Arrested For Robbery

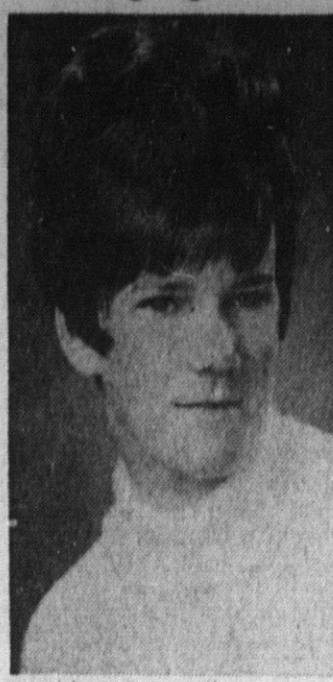
Holland police arrested two young men Thursday afternoon in connection with the robbery and beating of a Holland man Sept. 23.

## November Snowfall at 10 Inches

November was colder and wetter than usual but not particularly snowy, according to Lynn Wheaton, weather observer for Holland.

The average temperature was 36.1 degrees or 4 degrees below normal, and the precipitation was 4.74 inches or 1.98 inches above normal.

Snowfall totaled 10 inches, but fell on only four days early in the month. Traces of snow were noted Nov. 27 and 29. Precipitation fell every day for the first 12 days of the month with the exception of Nov. 8 and 9. Just over an inch fell the first day and 1.80 inches fell Nov. 4, the day 1.5 inches of snow was left on the ground.

A maximum of 54 was registered Nov. 1 and a low of 16 on Nov. 29. Greatest snow depth listing 4.5 inches was registered Nov. 5. Greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period was Nov. 7 but the amount of snow on the ground was only 3 inches that day.

Maximum was 54, compared with 66 in 1966, 65 in 1965, 73 in 1964 and 64 in 1963. Minimum was 16, compared with 19 in 1966, 21 in 1965, 16 in 1964 and 22 in 1963.

Average temperature was 36.1, compared with 40.5 in 1966, 41 in 1965, 42.5 in 1964 and 43.4 in 1963. Average maximum was 41.8, compared with 47.1 in 1966, 48.1 in 1965, 50.3 in 1964 and 52.1 in 1963. Average minimum was 30.5, compared with 33.9 in 1966, 33.8 in 1965, 34.7 in 1964 and 34.7 in 1963.

Precipitation totaled 4.74 inches, compared with 5.33 inches in 1966, 2.32 inches in 1965, 3.68 inches in 1964 and 4.31 inches in 1963. Precipitation fell on 18 days, compared with 18 days in 1966, 17 days in 1965, 13 days in 1964 and 14 days in 1963.

Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was 1.80 inches, compared with 1.40 inches in 1966, .90 inch in 1965, 1.68 inches in 1964 and 1.10 inches in 1963.

Total snowfall was 10 inches, compared with 13 inches in 1966, 3 inches in 1965, 5.5 inches in 1964 and 3.5 inches in 1963. Greatest snow depth was 4.5 inches, compared with 7.5 inches in 1966, 3 inches in 1965, 3 inches in 1964 and 3.5 inches in 1963.

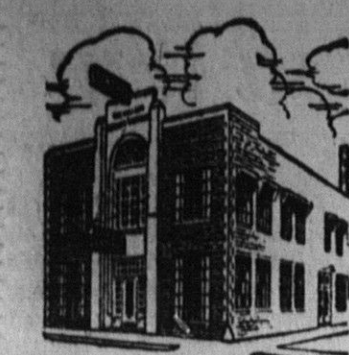

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#### HOW MUCH WAS THAT?

The Chase Manhattan Bank came up with some figures that ought to be of interest to all of us. In 1966, \$213 billion in taxes were collected by all government units. This included the multitude of fees, which of course, are also a tax. The amount was 29 per cent of the gross national product, and of this amount, 19 per cent went to the federal government.

In 1939, the total tax was 17 per cent of the gross national product, and 1966 shows a jump of 12 per cent. We had better not jump to conclusions about who takes the biggest share of the tax burden. People who earn from \$5,000 to \$25,000 pay two-thirds of the federal income tax bill. Tax at the local level rose faster in the last ten years than that at the federal level. It rose 79 per cent while that of the federal government rose 54 per cent. This ought to tell us to keep an eye on what we spend at home as well as that which we spend in Washington.

There is little question about where most of our money goes. Defense takes by far the biggest share and the second largest is the interest on the federal debt. One can only speculate on what we could do if we had a decade of peace and a chance to get the debt down by some billions of dollars.

It seems quite certain that with an expanding economy and a greater population that the budget will move upward. What is perhaps a better picture of what is going on is a look at the percentage of the gross national income that goes for governmental purposes. There is something about the above figures worthy of a bit of reflection. If that's how much I'm putting into the job of being governed, I had better keep an eye on who's doing the job for me, and that means getting out on election day to vote. Don't forget, you're the director, or at least a stockholder, in a corporation that's doing a lot of business. This is the month when many people are making the last payment on their 1967 income tax. The property tax bills are also being received. This is a good time to write a short letter to all the elected, hired and appointed government people. Economy and reducing waste and duplication we think are good subjects for letters.

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 17  
Keeping Life's Covenants  
Malachi 1:6-9; 2:10, 13-16  
By C. P. Dame

The name Malachi means "My Messenger." Some scholars think that the prophet's name was Malachi, while others think the word refers to his work and mission. The prophet says nothing about himself except that he calls himself "a bearer of the burden of the word of God." He was the last of the Old Testament prophets, a contemporary of Nehemiah, serving about the year 445 B. C., among a people who maintained the forms of religion but failed to show its power.

I. Some dishonor God who deserves the highest honor. God said, "I have loved you" and the people asked, "Where-in hast Thou loved us?" They were disillusioned. Priests who were supposed to be leaders despised God's name by offering polluted bread upon God's altar. God states a fact of nature in saying that a son honors his father and a servant his master but the people failed to honor Him.

In all the sacrifices offered to God the best animals were to be presented — the animal had to be a male, a year old and without blemish. Instead of heeding this command they offered the lame, blind and sick. They would not bring a present of such kind to the Persian governor yet they did it to God!

Worship in God's sight is important. What about our worship services? And what about our attitudes to worship? Changes take place in the order of services not all of them are improvements, but the order is not important but the spirit and the sincerity and reverence we show are. Do we at times dishonor God at our worship services?

II. We have covenant relationships. "Have we not all one father? Hath not one God created us?" These two questions are worthy of thought. By virtue of creation God is the father of all mankind. Malachi was a Jew. He directed these questions to his fellow countrymen, Jews, who had made a covenant with God. The whole nation had made a covenant with God. Hence the prophet said that his hearers were brothers in a twofold sense, by creation and by covenant relationship.

Christians should remember their obligations to all mankind as well as their obligation to fellow-believers. Now covenants involve obligations. Malachi charged his hearers with violating obligations.

The prophet also mentions the evil of divorce. Some men in Malachi's time divorced their wives and married younger women, some even married heathen wives and thus dealt treacherously with the wives of their youth with whom they had made a covenant. God is concerned about a godly offspring. Most likely the children of those mixed marriages would follow the heathen mother. Mixed marriages do not foster godliness.

The words, "For I hate divorce" need special consideration. And the words, "So take heed to yourselves, and do not be faithless" deserve thought. Unfortunately divorces are becoming more common among church members. This lesson charges us all to remember our obligations to God, to our fellow men and to the members of our families.

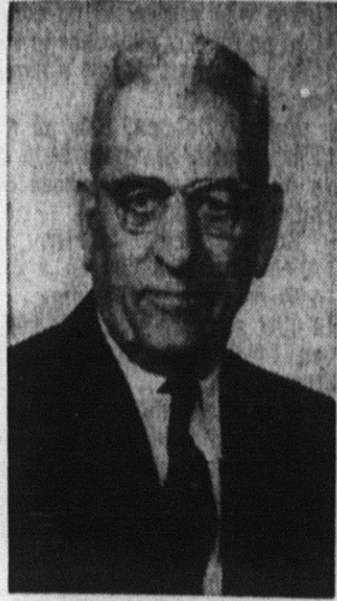

## Dr. Van Zyl Dies at 73 In Oregon

GRESHAM, Ore. — Dr. Gerrit Van Zyl, 73, retired professor and longtime chairman of the department of chemistry at Hope College, died of a heart attack Sunday in Gresham.

Dr. Van Zyl, who resided at 1601 Waukazoo Dr., was visiting

his brother and a son at the time of his death.

As head of the chemistry department at Hope from 1923 to 1964, Dr. Van Zyl's leadership resulted in the development and preparation of many students for graduate work in chemistry in colleges and universities throughout the country.

In 1957 he was named a Fellow of the New York Academy of Sciences, a distinguished honor conferred upon a limited number of members, who in the estimation of the Council, have done outstanding work toward the advancement of science. In 1962 he was named one of the six outstanding college chemistry teachers in the United States and Canada, by the Manufacturing Chemists' Association.

Dr. Van Zyl was a former president of the Michigan College Chemistry Teachers Association and was an organizer of the Midwestern College Chemistry Teachers Association, as well as the Hope Science Alumni Chapter.

Born in Sioux County, Iowa, on July 29, 1894, Dr. Van Zyl received his elementary and high school education in the Hesperia, Iowa, public schools and the Northwestern Classical Academy. He received his AB degree from Hope College in 1918 and was awarded the State College Scholarship to the University of Michigan.

Upon completion of his Master's degree in 1921, he initiated his pre-doctoral study. In the summer of 1923 Prof. A. T. Godfrey, chairman of the Hope College Chemistry department, died and Dr. Van Zyl succeeded him. While Dr. Van Zyl performed his new duties as chairman, he continued his pre-doctoral study completing the requirements for his doctorate at the University of Michigan in 1924.

He was a member of the Trinity Reformed Church in Holland and served as an Elder for 15 years.

A veteran of World War I, he was active in Boy Scout work for many years and was a member of the Holland Chamber of Commerce.

## Attend NFO Convention In Louisville

ALLEGAN — Delegates from Allegan County who attended the annual convention of the National Farmer's Organization Wednesday and Thursday in Louisville, Ky., have returned to their homes and immediately began preparations to halt low farm prices.

Attending from the Allegan area were Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Schaap, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Reurink, James Merbs, Jay Schaap and Gordon Bouws.

National NFO president, Oren Lee Staley, said that the only reason farmers are receiving the present low farm prices is because enough farmers are willing to sell at the present low prices. He further stated that every businessman puts a price tag on his product and does not sell until that price is paid. "The farmers must do the same," Staley said, "They must refuse to sell their products until they get fair prices. That means a holding action."

More than 12,000 voting delegates from 30 states attended the convention making this the largest convention of farmers in history. The delegates voted to start preparations for an all-commodity holding action to halt low farm prices.

First step in the plan approved for the all-commodity holding action was to ask every non-member to join the NFO, stressing that the NFO was not asking non-members to desert their present organization but to join the NFO for the purpose of uniting their production for the purpose of collective bargaining through NFO. The timetable for the all commodity holding action was that within 40 days the NFO would advise its members to stop selling grain; that not even one bushel should be sold.

Livestock would be added to the holding action at the opportune time with dairy also being added at the opportune time.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey addressed the convention. Both Staley, president of the NFO, and Erhard Pfingsten, vice president, were re-elected by acclamation during the annual election of officers.

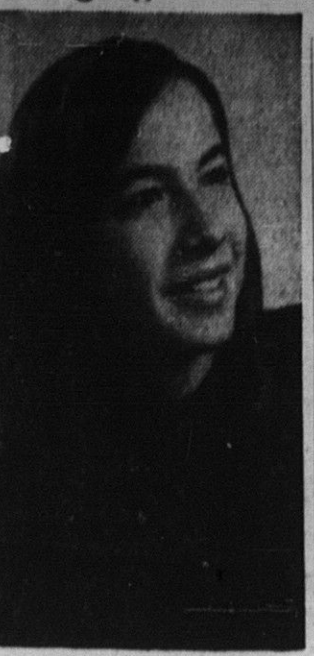

## School Curriculum Based On Interest of Pupils

DOUGLAS — An elementary school in the village of Douglas is operating this year for the first time with a curriculum based on the interests of each pupil.

"We want to develop positive self-concepts, communications skills, and investigative skills in our students," says Dr. Claud Crawford, who is principal of the school, professor of psychology at Hope College and visiting professor of psychology at Grand Valley State College in Allendale.

"The lower elementary group, grades one through three, are divided among four rooms," Crawford stated. "Assignments are made on available space, but no student is necessarily required to spend his time in his own room."

"The upper elementary students, grades four through six, are allowed to choose the room in which they will center their activities according to their interests. One room is devoted primarily to math and science, with teachers whose interests and abilities are in that field. Another is for humanities and social studies, and two others are for the arts."

"We believe that a child will learn the same amount of material in a program that lets him choose his subjects as he will in the conventional graded, subject-oriented program. We believe he will learn communication and investigative skills better, because his interests will motivate his learning."

Two psychology professors from Grand Valley, Drs. Arthur and Greta DeLong, will spend the day Dec. 15 observing the school in action. Although the DeLongs have worked with Professor Crawford in formulating plans for the new program, this will be their first visit to the school.

A luncheon for elementary and high school staffs and for parents in the community will be held in the elementary school at 11:45 a.m. Dec. 15, at which the DeLongs will report on the program as it relates to reading skills and positive self-concepts.

Professor Crawford says that although parents of elementary school children were given the choice of enrolling their children in the new program or in a conventional program in the same school, only 70 of the 300 pupils remain in graded classroom situations.

"Although it is too early to measure results of this program," Professor Crawford states, "We have every indication that it is working out well. One of the difficulties we have encountered is that few teachers are prepared to teach in this situation, since all their training has been in conventional methods."

At present, 16 teachers instruct in the new program, making a pupil-teacher ratio slightly more than 14 to 1. Crawford says that he hopes Grand Valley, which now has three student teachers in the elementary school, will work more closely with him to develop a teacher education program adaptable to what he terms "the inevitable future of elementary education."



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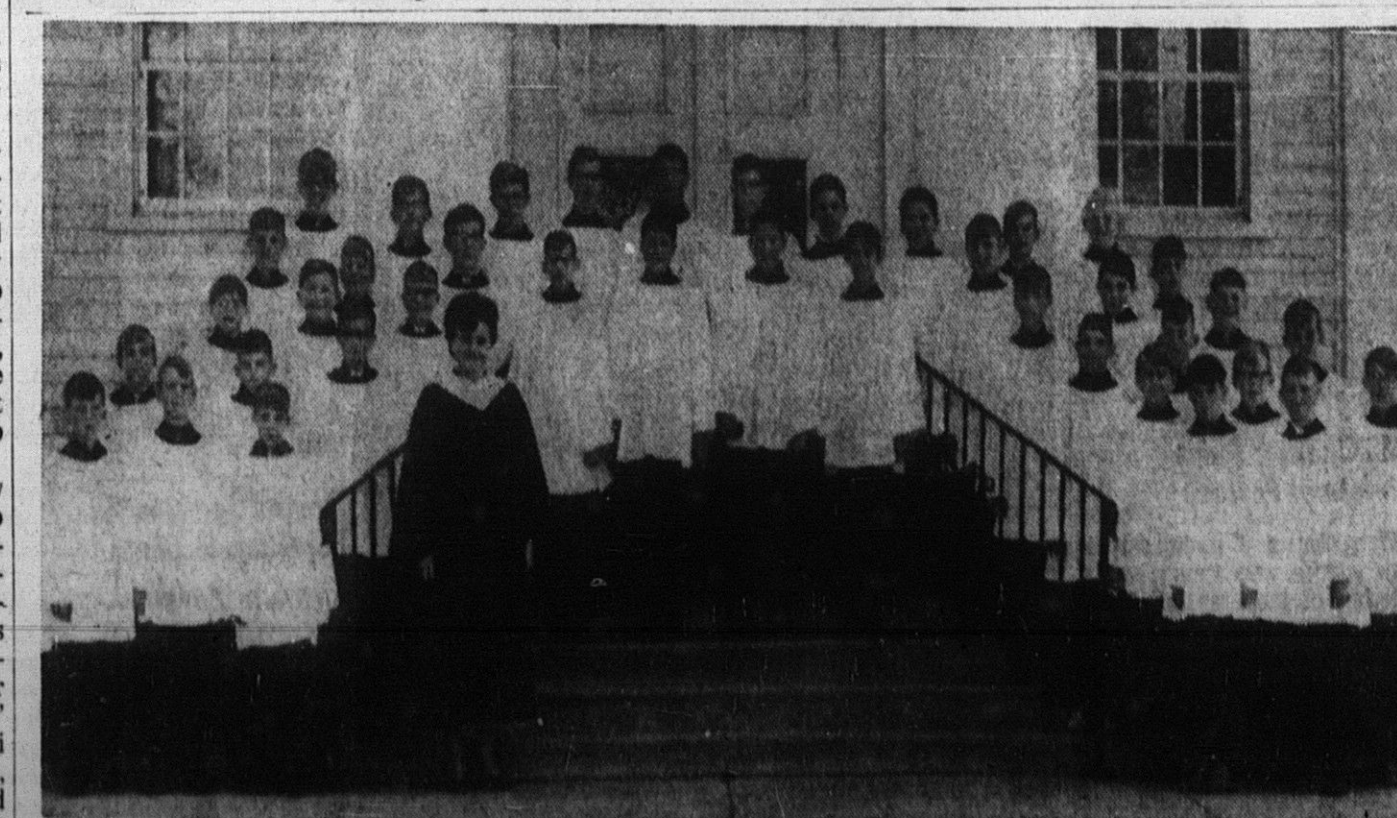

**Vernon J. Ramaker, 27, Dies of Skull Fracture; Both Cars Demolished**

A young Holland man was killed and an Illinois man was seriously injured when the cars they were driving collided Friday at the intersection of Beeline Rd. and Felch St. Holland township.

Vernon J. Ramaker, 27, of 940 East 12th St., was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital by medical examiner Dr. E. Vander Berg. Ramaker had suffered head injuries in the accident at 7:52 a.m. today. Death was attributed to a skull fracture.

Herbert R. Gerst, 51, of 3157 Colonial Rd., Quincy, Ill., driver of the second car involved, was admitted to Holland Hospital. He is reported in "fairly good" condition, undergoing treatment for multiple fractures of the left leg, left arm, left knee and possibly the pelvis.

Gerst, who has been temporarily working in the area at Consumers Power Company, has been residing at 134 Garfield, Spring Lake.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said the accident occurred as the car driven by Gerst was about to make a left turn from Felch St. to go south on Beeline Rd. Deputies said the Ramaker car was headed in a northerly direction on Beeline Rd.

Deputies who are continuing their investigation said both cars were totally demolished in the crash.

Ramaker's death marks the 19th traffic fatality for Ottawa county this year. Reports show there were 30 deaths recorded the same time last year.

Ramaker, a lifelong resident of Holland, had been a member of Holland Heights Christian Reformed Church.

He is survived by his wife, the former Hazel Rotman; one daughter, Judy, at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Ramaker of Holland, and one brother, Kenneth Ramaker, of Holland.

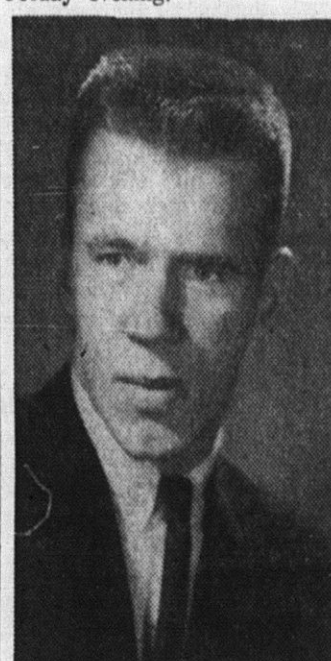

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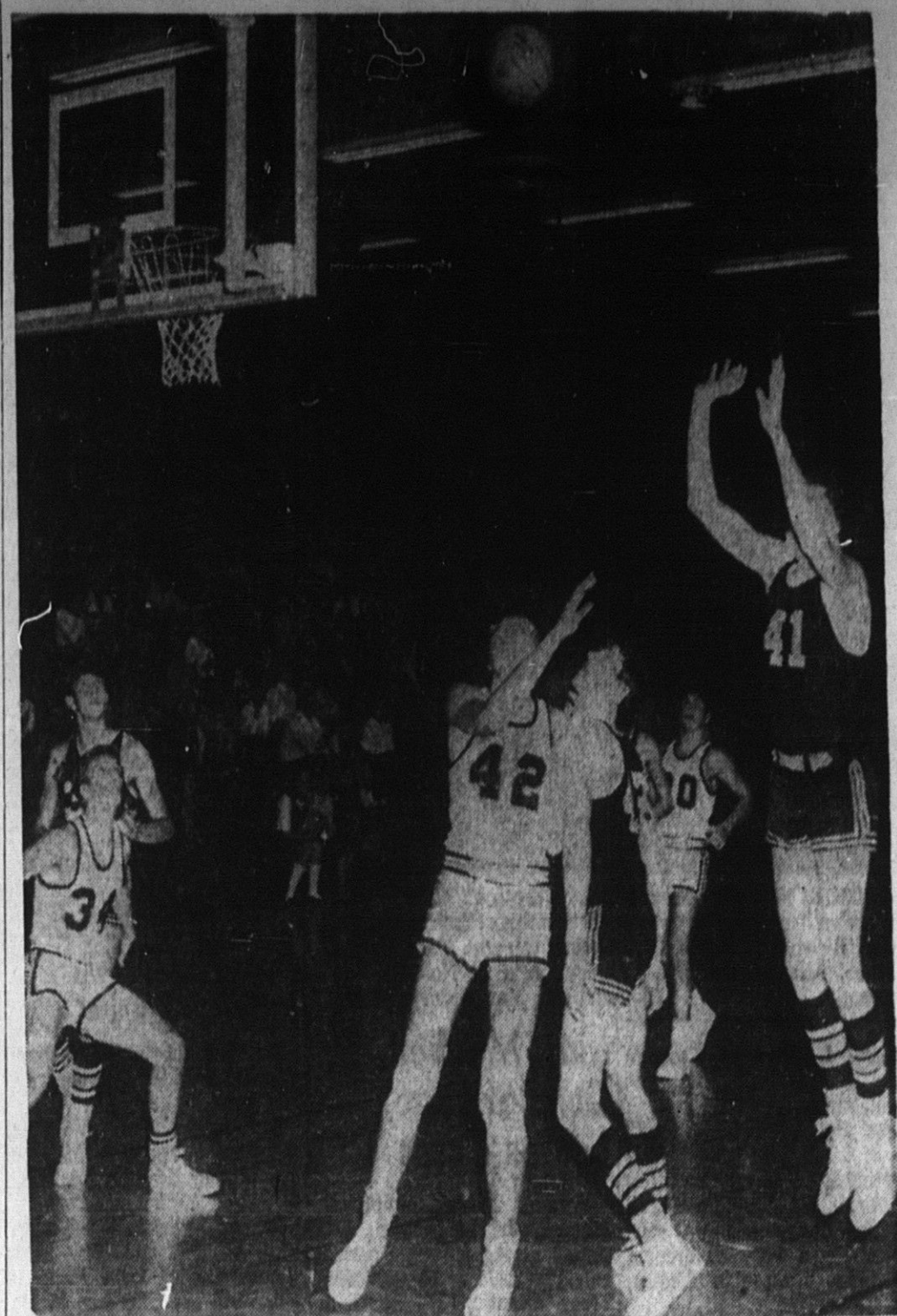

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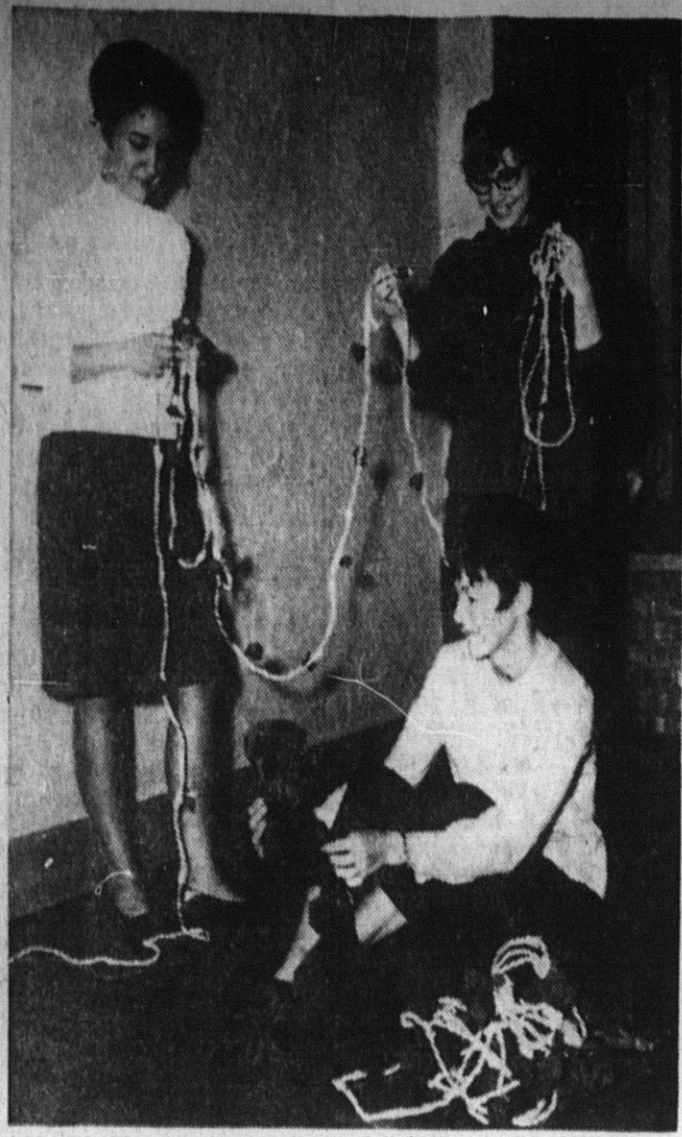

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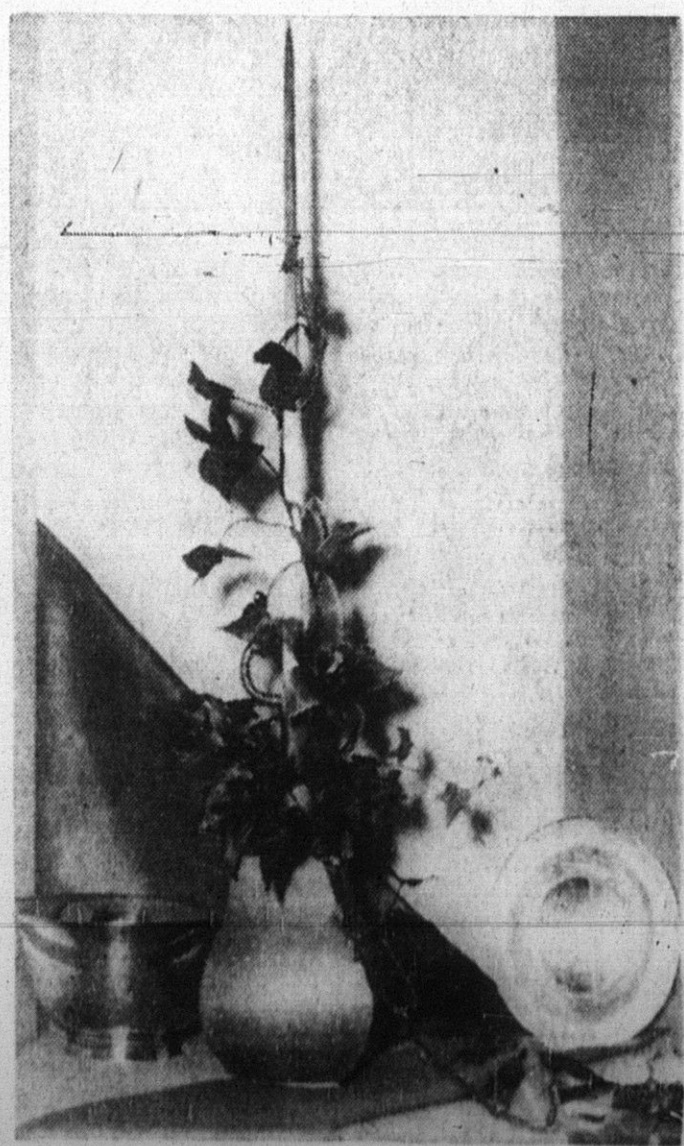
