New Scholarship Fund Established

The expression "Safety Pays" now has a new meaning for the 110 employees of the Louis Padnos Iron & Metal Co.

Because of the outstanding safety record achieved by employees on the job in the yard and on the highway, the company has received a refund of \$27,333 on its workman's compensation insurance premium, the sum will be used to fund a scholarship program for Padnos employees and their families.

Company President Seymour K. Padnos presented this sum to Arend D. Lubbers, president of Grand Valley State Colleges, at a luncheon at Point West Friday attended by local representatives of educational, financial, commercial and legislative interests of the community. GVSC will administer the fund with the express understanding that it also will be available for financing study at other institutions of learning.

Padnos said last year the company paid \$62,000 in workman compensation premiums, and the amount paid by the insurance carrier for injuries, etc., amounted to slightly more than 10 per cent of the premium.

The Padnos executive staff suggested to managements that the refund be used to benefit employees in recognition of the fine achievement.

Consequently, the entire \$27,333 was turned over to the scholarship fund. Grand Valley was selected when more than 50 per cent of the responses chose this institution as the most likely choice they would make in selecting a school to attend.

Lubbers said this spirit of giving as evidenced by Padnos employees again characterizes American generosity unknown in other countries. He spoke of the remarkable story of an immigrant family attaining success through hard work, and drive, with resultant generosity.

State Rep. James F. Fransworth briefly reviewed the Padnos story, how Louis Padnos left his native Russia at 13, walked a good share of the way to the Netherlands, learning Dutch there, and later immigrating to America. It was in Chicago that a promoter outfitted Padnos with a backpack of products for peddling, and suggested Holland, Mich., as a likely market because Padnos,

a Russian Jew, could speak Dutch.

Fransworth said the story was all the more remarkable in that Padnos instilled in his two sons ideals and business practices which saw the Padnos business burgeon into the large complex it is today.

The insurance refund which underwrites the scholarship program is the latest in numerous instances of recognition for safety received by the Padnos Co., both from the insurance carrier and the Institute of Scrap Iron and Steel, the national trade association for scrap processors.

Accident Claims Zeeland Woman

ZEELAND — Marie Elizabeth Boeve, 71, of 372 96th Ave., was fatally injured in a two-car collision Saturday at 5:40 p.m. at State St. and M-21 which injured three other persons. It was the first fatal accident in Zeeland since June 24, 1970.

She died in Holland Hospital at 8:50 a.m. Monday of fractured ribs and head injuries sustained in the crash and was the 32nd traffic fatality of the year in Ottawa County compared with 33 a year ago.

Zeeland police said the Boeve car was heading north on State St. and pulled from the median into the path of the car westbound on M-21 and driven by Annette Howard, 18, of 4869 136th Ave. Officers said witnesses told them the Howard car was operating without lights.

Injured and treated in Holland Hospital and released were Kimberly Robinson, 7, Patricia Clark, 21, both from Grand Rapids, and Linda Howard, 24, of 4968 136th Ave., all passengers in the Howard car.

Mrs. Boeve was a member of Faith Reformed Church, a member of the church choir and was director of the Zeeland All-Church Women's Choir. She was also a member of the Zeeland Hospital Guild.

House Drive Helps, But GHUW Short

Cooper said his caseload had increased to 4,034 persons in the two-week period ending Dec. 6, up nearly 1,000 from a month ago.

The MESC office will operate with different hours during the Christmas and New Year holiday weeks. The office will be open Monday, Thursday and Friday from 7:15 a.m. until 6 p.m. and on Tuesday, the day before the holidays, from 7:15 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.

Graduates Given Tasks For Future

ALLENDALE — Grand Valley State College graduates at the mid-year commencement were charged to meet the future with meaningful involvement and to work for equality in all processes of justice.

Those charges were made in commencement addresses Saturday by Richard M. Gillett, business and civic leader from Grand Rapids, and retiring U.S. Congressman Martha W. Griffiths of Detroit, before 320 graduates.

Gillett said he found a message in watching the progress of GVSC development through meaningful involvement but warned that "simply running fast" will not be enough in the future.

"We must run twice as fast to move ahead rather than stand still today," he said.

Mrs. Griffiths charged the young and educated to understand that law is based on cold facts, not myths or warm feelings, and that such facts can be found.

"To see this nation's bicentennial year a time when equal justice is for all would be a great step in our history," she said. Mrs. Griffiths sponsored the Equal Rights Amendment.

Gillett and Mrs. Griffiths were presented Doctor of Laws honorary degrees from GVSC president Arend D. Lubbers.

Reach Agreement For Launching Site

Construction is expected to start soon on a public boat launching ramp at Port Sheldon following announcement of an agreement to lease property from Consumers Power Co.

Ottawa County Board of Commissioners chairman William Winstrom said Consumers Power notified him Tuesday that agreement had been reached on a leasing agreement to use Consumers property on the north side of Pigeon Lake just west of Lake Shore Dr. for the boat launching ramp and parking for between 40 and 50 cars.

Cost of the project was estimated at \$30,000. Winstrom said work to make arrangements for the boat launching ramp was begun four years ago. The project has been okayed by the State Department of Natural Resources.

West Ottawa Board Holds Meet

The West Ottawa Board of Education, Monday night, approved the purchase of a 1974 Chevrolet van, 16 passengers, at a cost of \$8,340.28 to transport special education students within the district.

In other action the board endorsed the principle of utilizing the following pupil-teacher ratios in arriving at a budget projection estimate for the 1975-76 school: high school, 20 to 1, middle school 19.65 to 1 and elementary, 21.33 to 1.

The Board also entered into an agreement with the University of Michigan, Bureau of School Services, for the purpose of evaluating the Middle School program and services and the counseling services of the district at a cost not to exceed \$2,600.

The board also directed assistant superintendent Peter Roon to contact a member of the Bureau of School Services to speak with the board at a special workshop session scheduled for Dec. 30.

Roon, reading the Superintendent's report, noted that three bids were received with one bank declining to bid on the \$750,000 note secured by anticipated state aid. Low bid from the People's State Bank at an interest rate of 5.75 was accepted.

Roon also noted that the school district entered into a contract with Fredericks, Paul and Associated for Unemployment Tax Consultant Services. The board was informed that due to certification non-compliance a vacancy exists in the instrumental music department at the secondary level. Application and candidates are being reviewed by the secondary director.

Dial-A-Ride Service Has Upsurge

Holland's Dial-A-Ride bus system has something of a "happy problem."

A big upsurge of business in December has caused some longer waiting periods than the operators would like.

Whether it's the Christmas season or the first big snowfall or some other combination of circumstances has not been determined but calls have increased from an average of 276 calls a day during November to well over 300 in December.

To help solve the problem, a fifth bus was added in the afternoon and started Monday. Additional buses will be added in the morning, as needed.

Jan Meinel, who directs the Dial-A-Ride system from city manager's office said her office is receptive to suggestions . . . and complaints. Such calls should be directed to the city manager's office.

Dial-A-Ride service is obtained by calling Dial-A-Ride as listed in the telephone book, or prominently displayed on all buses. Some persons with complaints have been at a loss to know whom to call.

Dial-A-Ride service was initiated here last Feb. 4. This is the first Christmas season the service has been in effect.

Zeeland Council Buys Playground Items For Park

ZEELAND — City Council spent considerable time Monday discussing a proposed new zoning ordinance to replace one adopted in 1966. An industrial developer appeared before council to discuss and question proposals affecting industrial areas.

Additional discussions are expected on the proposed ordinance before a public hearing is scheduled.

Council approved the purchase of playground equipment for the Lawrence Ave. park at a cost of \$4,500 and awarded the purchase of Christmas hams for full time employees to Huizenga's Stop and Shop at a total cost of about \$700. There are 46 full time workers for the city.

Council adopted a new policy for street cuts and the charges will reflect the actual costs for time and materials involved instead of the flat charge of \$9.35 a square yard. The new policy will allow the city to recover costs for repatching the cuts.

Board Is Unanimous In Action

Van Raalte Headed District Since Its Organization in '59

The three year contract of Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte, which is due to expire on June 30, 1975, was not renewed by the West Ottawa Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

By a unanimous vote board members decided not to renew the contract and determined that appropriate action should begin to "specify, locate, interview and employ a replacement for the position of superintendent for the district."

The motion also carried with a notation that a copy of the minutes of the meeting be provided to Van Raalte as official notice of the action.

The move came following a statement by board president, Ed Haltenhoff who noted that the board had carried a tremendous burden for the past eight months and had taken the most serious step after long deliberation and concern for the district and the way it was heading.

Following the initial motion to remove Van Raalte from office a second motion was suggested and passed unanimously covering the severance considerations.

The board then passed the motion specifying that a special committee consisting of three board members be appointed by the President to meet with Van Raalte to discuss the terms and conditions of his retirement from the position of superintendent of the district with full recognition of his years of service and with total concern for the orderly transfer of leadership of the district to a new superintendent.

The committee members, Louis Van Slooten, Donald Ladewig, and Wesley Waldron, with legal assistance from Roger Kidston and with secretarial work by Judy Ross, were directed to begin their work immediately and complete their responsibilities for board action on or before Jan. 20, 1975.

A third motion covering the transition and replacement was also passed unanimously by the board.

The motion specified that a steering committee, consisting of three board members; three administrators, three teachers and three private citizens of the district be appointed by the President to recommend job specifications, the method of locating and the interview procedures for filling the vacated superintendency.

Board members appointed to the committee by Haltenhoff include Carl Schaftenaar, William Lalley, and Peg Schroeder. Administrators on the committee will be Peter Roon, Duane Hooker and June Reimink and teachers will be William Bloemendaal, Carl Von Ins and Violet Hansen. Citizens appointed were Henry Vandenbrink, Lester Van Dree and Bernie Vonk.

The three motions were passed with no discussion within five minutes during the 2 1/2 hour board meeting.

The school district's first and only superintendent, Van Raalte, was formally appointed on June 2, 1959 following an interim period of serving in that capacity from Oct. 13, 1958. Van Raalte, a Holland High School and Hope College graduate, was formerly a teacher and then principal of Beechwood School.

Van Raalte had been with the district for 25 years including the time the district consolidated on Oct. 7, 1958.

Following the formal meeting Haltenhoff expressed the feelings of the board on the action taken. Many things added up to a change in direction including the initial failure on the millage vote, Haltenhoff said.

No determination has been made whether the new superintendent would come from within or without the school district. Haltenhoff indicated, but added that under the leadership of one man for so many years outside influences had been locked out.

Haltenhoff said that Van Raalte had been advised at a workshop meeting two weeks ago on the action the board had planned to take but Van Raalte decided to allow the board to take whatever action it deemed necessary.


Van Raalte, 49, advised the board that he would be taking some of his back vacation days, was not at the meeting and was not available for comment.

Parents and guardians also have the right to inspect contents to insure accuracy and fairness. Procedures for such examination including hearings will be established by individual Boards of Education and will be made available on request.

No records, files or data on an individual student will be made available to anyone without the consent and notification of the student or parents or guardian of a student under 18, except (1) legitimate interest of teachers and school officials, or (2) there has been a federal request for submission of student records in connection with application for financial aid.





ONLY NATURAL

There's been great jubilation in Greece the past couple of days because the people there have had a chance to vote on their form of government. They chose democracy. They chose it by an overwhelming majority — about 70 to 30 per cent in favor.

And what we say is that this is entirely natural. First of all, Greece is the place where all this democracy business began. We realize that it wasn't the same way back then in the time of Plato and Socrates as we think of it now, but at least it made a good deal of the individual making up his mind about political matters, and in this way directing the affairs of government.

Besides that we have learned from long experience in this country and in the English-speaking world in general that, bad as it may sometimes be — and it can develop its Water-gates and Teapot Domes — democracy is the best form of government still devised by imperfect man.

The Greeks have made their choice. We hope they have the self-discipline to make their new system work. If it works as well for them as it has for us, they may have less to complain about than most people in the world.

Another Christmas lesson! If we study it with a sense of wonder it will be the best lesson of a life time. We rejoice at the fact that more people celebrate Christmas now than ever before and many know why Christ came, namely to save people from their sins.

I. Let us first take a look at the ancestry of Jesus. Matthew gives one list, Luke another. Matthew divides the list in three groups, each group composed of fourteen generations. The first is from Abraham to David, the time in which the promise was given; the second is the period from David to the captivity in Babylon, a time of greatness under David but of shame also on account of the exile; and the third from Babylon to Christ, in which there was the fulfillment of the promise. Note the two prominent names, Abraham, David, known for their faith, although they both stained their lives with sins.

Jesus was born a member of a fallen race. Some of his ancestors were great, some obscure. It is worth noting that four women are mentioned in the list which is unusual and not all were ideal. The humanity of Jesus must be remembered.

II. Let us next look at the birth of Jesus Christ. Note the name, meaning one who saves, which implies the fact of rescue, and the title, Christ, the Anointed prophet, priest and king. Mary, a girl from Nazareth was engaged to be married to Joseph, a carpenter. She had been told by an angel of the honor that was to be hers. Before the couple came together, Mary was pregnant, which in those days was a serious sin. Joseph planned to quietly divorce her. An angel interfered with his plan by telling him "that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit."

In addition the angel told Joseph to call the son's name, Jesus, "for he shall save his people from their sins." The angel plainly told of his mission which today some people overlook. Joseph learned two great facts — the son was conceived not in the normal but in a supernatural manner and that he would do a very singular mission — to save people from sin's slavery. His miraculous birth and mission foretold in the Old Testament. The time of fulfillment had come! It is worth stating here that historic Christianity has all through the ages confessed the virgin birth of Jesus and all branches of Christianity have stated this in their creeds.

III. Lastly let us look at the law's mission. In the discussion about the law Paul thinks of the whole Old Testament. Some Christian converts insisted on keeping the whole law with its ceremonies but to this Paul objected. The law's mission was temporary, just as eighth grade teaching is. Faith took its place, faith in Jesus Christ who met all the demands of the law for sinners. Faith is essential to salvation. This deserves much emphasis in our time.



Jim Helmink Is 'Mr. Hustle' On CMU Cage Squad

MT PLEASANT — Now that Central Michigan University's football team is back from the Camellia Bowl and through with post-season competition, guess what CMU sports fans are thinking about?

Post-season competition. Yes, according to CMU's 6'4" senior forward Jim Helmink, it

isn't unlikely that the basketball squad could be involved in play-off competition in March. "Defense is going to have to carry the team," Helmink says. "Not any one particular player but the entire team's defense. That's what's going to win ball games for us. I know we can put the ball through the hoop." And if the team is ever lacking in spirit, Jim's got enough to carry everybody. He is a picture of determination on the court, always putting out 110 per cent. His efforts last year earned him the CMU Hustler Award.

"You don't have to watch our games or practices very long to realize that Jim plays with great intensity," Coach Dick Parfitt says. "He comes closer to giving 100 per cent all the time than anyone in the game."

But he's got more than just hustle. He's got a good outside shot and is a tough defensive player. He averaged 11.6 points a game last year and picked up nearly four rebounds a game. But most impressive is his 16.6 scoring average for the last ten games of the season, hitting on 6 per cent of his shots.

In the first three games of this young season he hit for 14.3 points a game, good for second on the squad behind forward Dan Roundfield, scoring 29.0 points a contest. CMU hosts Ball State University Saturday (Dec. 21) at Rose Center at 2 p.m. BSU defeated Central 98-94 last year.

In the off-season, Helmink lifted weights to strengthen his defensive game. At 6'4", 200 pounds, he is often pitted against much taller and heavier opponents.

"All I can do is try to shove those guys around," he says. "The referees are always watching (Dan) Roundfield and (Ben) Poquette so I can get

away with being a little rough." Poquette and Roundfield are both 6'8".

Helmink also worked during the summer on his one-on-one play. He says, however, that he gets most of his points from moving without the ball and using his teammates' picks.

Helmink just broke into the starting line-up at the beginning of last season. Matt Means, CMU's star receiver on the football team, was expected to start at forward on the basketball team. But Means suffered a knee injury and while he was recuperating, Helmink won the job. He never gave it back.

After proving himself last year, Jim is beginning to draw a little heavier coverage but he still gets his shots.

"I think it's tough for the other teams to concentrate on any one player. If they do, it's going to be Roundfield (hitting nearly 30 a game) and if they sag in on Danny they're going to leave me wide-open."

Helmink was an All-State performer for Holland High School scoring 26 points a game. At CMU, he spent two years on the junior varsity scoring 16 points a game as a freshman and 19 as a sophomore. He was named the most valuable player his sophomore season.

But for Jim this year's the big one.

"We have to be consistent and we have to win on the road," he says, pointing to a first place finish in the Mid-American Conference to get into play-off competition.

Central whipped Western 81-67 in the season's third game to record its first MAC victory. Thirteen more just like it and ... well, do they have a Camellia Bowl in basketball?

SOUTH HAVEN — Holland Christian's basketball team turned what seemed to be almost certain defeat into a 65-59 victory Tuesday night, their fourth win in five games. The Maroons trailed by 15 points early in the fourth period, before going into a full-court press which throttled the Rams. South Haven still led by a 59-51 score with 2:30 left to play. Then the Maroons, who were much more aggressive in the final quarter than the rest of the game, tallied 14 straight points for the win.

The teams alternated by quarters, with the Rams having the upper hand in the first and third periods and Christian in the second and fourth.

Christian jumped to an 8-4 lead on three baskets by big Keith Frens and a pair from the charity stripe by Del Petroelje. South Haven then took over to hold a 16-12 edge at the quarter.

South Haven pulled out to a 27-18 lead before Jon Houseward, Frens, Kraig Boeve and again Frens countered, to put Christian within one. After the Rams tallied three points, Houseward and Tom Zoerhof connected to knot the score at halftime, 30-30.

The Maroons should never have left the floor for the half-time intermission, for when they came back they could do little right, and suffered through a horrid third quarter which saw them make just six points and two of 12 shots. Meanwhile, South Haven put 17 points on the board and was in command, 47-35 after three periods.

With 6:50 left to play in the game, the score stood at 53-38. Coach Dave Vander Hill then ordered the press to be put on, and the whole game suddenly changed, as little by little the Maroons chipped away at the lead.

Dave Van Langevelde netted a free one, Frens, Van Langevelde and Jack Scholten hit fielders, and the scoreboard read 53-45 with 5:30 left. Then for three minutes the teams played even for a 59-51 Ram lead. Houseward came through with a basket and free throw, Frens three from the stripe, and Van Langevelde tied the game at the 1:40 mark. Frens then connected from the field, Van Langevelde and Zoerhof twice each at the free throw line, and the game was in the win column for the Maroons.

Special credit should go to Houseward, who although not fully recovered from his leg injury, played most of the game, as his replacement, Joel Vogelzang, was down with the flu for several days. Vogelzang did see limited action. Under the circumstances Houseward did a creditable job and scored 11 important points in the process.

Zoerhof also turned in a fine game, again coming off the bench and getting the offense moving in the second and fourth quarters. Tom also connected for 14 points.

Christian outrebounded the Rams, 36-26 with Frens taking down 12. Stan Harrell had 13 for South Haven. Frens also had a game high 21 points. Sherman led the Rams with 15.

Coach Dan Vander's team received a real scare before pulling out a 51-48 overtime win over South Haven. The Rams led at the quarters 11-10, 26-18 and 40-33, before Christian tied the game at 44-44 at the end of regulation time.

With 16 seconds left in the overtime Mark Van Dyke hit a free throw to give Christian the lead for the first time in the game. One second later Duane Terpstra hit one from the line. Dan Schipper, who also turned in a fine defensive performance, iced the game with a free one with three seconds left.

Van Dyke scored 18 points, Terpstra 11 and Ken De Jonge 10. Mike Williams tallied 12 for South Haven.




Blind Provide Program At Lions Christmas Party



Ties J. Pruis Succumbs At Age 76


