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## Moderating Temperature Melts Snow

A fourth day of moderating temperature Monday substantially reduced the heavy snow blanket in Holland, but also made the light fluffy stuff wet, sticky, heavy and hard to manage. More cars were probably stuck in the sticky snow today than at any time last week.

On top of the warmer temperatures, the ground remained warm from the extended warm spell earlier this month, and snow on the ground had turned mushy for some six inches. Ground deposits were still estimated at about two feet deep.

City Engineer Lavern Serne said attempts were being made to remove some of the heavy snow deposits from outlying shopping areas and trucks and the front loader were busy early today at the Central Ave. and 16th area, also at Washington Square.

Further attempts to clear these deposits were scheduled Tuesday. The one-way parking rule remained very much in effect Monday and Police Chief Jacob Van Hoff said it might be many days before it would be lifted. Motorists are asked not to park on the north and east sides of the roads, unless otherwise marked. This rule does not apply to the business districts or boulevards.

Holland post office was having its busiest day today. City and rural deliveries were particularly heavy, and the foot traffic inside the post office kept three stamp windows busy continuously. Cancellations Sunday and today hit well over the 100,000 mark.

Postmaster Louis Haight said postal employees were "swamped" but were doing a good job of getting the work done. This was the time of the "squeeze" with both heavy incoming and outgoing mail. The week-long snowstorm slowed not only Holland but many other points in the country, resulting in the current jam-up.

City Engineer Serne said employees working on snow removal had lost track of how many hundreds of loads of snow had been dumped at three locations, the city dump at the foot of College Ave., another dump at Pine Ave. and Fourth St., and the 12 St. parking lot at Henry Park.

Kenny Terpstra, who superintends the street work, said city equipment has held up well with only minor repairs so far. Sidewalk plows have had a particularly difficult time all week, particularly bucking the cross furrows at intersections. For a time last week, plows were operating in pairs, one pushing the other, when difficulties arose.

Board of Public Works employees were digging out some fire hydrants today.

Sliding snow off the City Hall roof kept all traffic using the front entrance. There was some danger of falling snow in the downtown area and barricades were put up in at least one location.

A flag of some kind on the car aerial continued to be a good idea, particularly for low-slung foreign cars or new models. These are an aid to other drivers who cannot see over huge piles at curbs or corners.

A thank-you from the postmaster to Holland people for digging paths for the city carriers led at least one person to request the same consideration for the milkmen.

## Students Begin Holiday Vacations

Upon completion of this week, local students will not return to classes until after the new year begins.

Holland Public Schools close at the end of the school day Thursday and classes will resume Wednesday, Jan. 2. Holland Christian Schools, which adjourned after classes Wednesday, will reopen on Jan. 3.

Students in the West Ottawa Schools will be dismissed Friday afternoon and will return to classes on Wednesday, Jan. 2. Friday at 2 p.m. is the official closing time for Hope College, with classes resuming on Tuesday, Jan. 8.

At 11:30 a.m. Thursday the St. Francis de Sales pupils will be dismissed from classes until Jan. 2, and the Seventh-day Adventist School, which ends classes at 2:30 p.m. Thursday, also resumes on Jan. 2.

Other local schools closing include Federal, Thursday noon until Jan. 2; Harrington, Thursday afternoon until Jan. 2; Maplewood, Friday at 11:30 a.m. until Jan. 2; New Groningen, Friday, at 10:30 a.m. until Jan. 2; Van Raalte (rural), Thursday at 11:30 a.m. until Jan. 2.

## West Ottawa Board Changes Vacation Time

The West Ottawa Board of Education Monday changed spring vacation from the second week of April to the first week in April to have the vacation period coincide with that of Hope College and Holland High School.

## Red Cross Won't Build Near Holland Hospital

The Ottawa County Red Cross board is seeking a site or an existing building for its county headquarters after reassessing previous plans to erect such a building on property at Holland Hospital.

Since the county has joined the Muskegon Regional Blood Center in a unified blood program, the need for a building near the hospital in order to use trained hospital personnel no longer exists.

County Chairman Frederick S. Burd of Holland explained to the board Monday night at chapter headquarters at 1 West 10th St. that National Red Cross which must approve all building programs has recommended a smaller building than planned since a city the size of Holland would have many places for donor clinics such as churches, Civic Center, the college, etc. Under the mobile arrangements, six to eight such clinics might be held in Holland in the course of a year.

Consequently, the building committee has been instructed to consult local realtors on availability of sites or existing properties suitable for remodeling or conversion into chapter headquarters, and report back to the executive committee in 30 days. This does not preclude having donor clinics in headquarters if the existing building is large enough, but regional leaders frown on what might be interpreted as unnecessary outlay.

Local Red Cross leaders have agreed that headquarters should be large enough for classes, home service work, Junior Red Cross activities, office activities and storage. An advisory committee which will include the service chairman for canteen, first aid, Gray Ladies, home nursing and Junior Red Cross will assist the building committee.

The current chapter house which has been rented for several years is scheduled to be razed to make way for a parking lot.

In other business, by-laws were amended to include Ottawa County jurisdiction of that part of Holland city lying in Allegan county. This move had been approved by area headquarters some time ago.

Vice Chairman Wilbur C. Cobb outlined plans for a steering committee to set up a fund campaign next March in those areas of the county not covered by United Fund or Community Chest.

The new headquarters will be financed through a bequest some years ago from the estate of J. Edgar Lee of Spring Lake.

## More Schools Studied for Grand Haven

GRAND HAVEN — School Supt. Ralph Van Volkinburg Monday outlined plans for a new building program involving \$3,338,000 covering a new junior high building, two new elementary buildings, additions to the senior high building and several outlying elementary buildings.

The program involves a proposed 25-year bond issue to be presented to the voters sometime in 1963 for 3 or 3½ mills.

This report was made to the 75-member citizens advisory committee which had gathered in the Gardner-Denver building recently leased by the board.

Claud Knoll, chairman of the buildings and grounds committee of the board, said his committee recommends a new junior high school accommodating 1,300 students to be erected on a 30-acre site on Griffin St. near Robbins Rd. ## City Will Seek Federal Loan For Windmill

City Council Wednesday night authorized City Manager Herb Holt to make application to the Federal Housing and Home Finance agency for a loan to finance the Windmill project.

This was recommended by the special Windmill committee headed by Carter Brown of Castle Park. It was indicated that the initial step would be for Council to adopt a resolution authorizing an appropriate official to execute such an application.

Councilman Henry Steffens said plans for the project are far greater than the Windmill which Holland hopes to obtain from the Netherlands. He said plans include a playground on a natural waterway on perhaps the last available water front property in the city. He added it would be wise not to specify amounts at this time since plans are not yet completed for the extend of the development.

By resolution Council annexed four parcels of city-owned property in Holland Township to the city of Holland under the unilateral annexation law of the state of Michigan.

Total acreage of the four parcels is estimated at 75 to 80 acres. One parcel is some 20 acres of swampland just north of the River near River Ave. which previously had been deemed to the city by the Holland Chamber of Commerce. This property, known as the Dutton property, had been specified for park purposes.

The second parcel is the proposed site of a lift station for the Board of Public Works in the vicinity of Fairbanks Ave. and Eighth St.

The third is the pumping station on East Eighth St. near the US-31 bypass.

The fourth is the combined properties of Pilgrim Home Cemetery No. 1 (north of 16th St.) and Smalenburg Park on Fairbanks Ave.

In explaining the resolution, City Attorney Gordon Cunningham said these parcels had been exempted from the proposed Van Meer incorporation. Since they were city-owned they were not subject to taxes by the township, consequently the township suffers no loss of revenue.

In other business, Councilman Harold Volkema commended the street department for its accomplishments during last week's storm. He said many people had expressed praise for services done by the department, and only a few had registered kicks.

City Manager Herb Holt added that last week's storm, the worst in 25 years, demonstrated the value of Holland's snow removal program. He said many southern cities which do not have equipment such as Holland has often are paralyzed for days when 6 to 8 inches of snow falls and added that the department's performance last week certainly justifies the money Holland spends on its snow removal program.

## Ottawa County Farm News

The certified seed potato list has arrived at our office, listing all Michigan grown varieties and the grower's names. If any of you are looking for certified seed potatoes for the year ahead and want to buy them early, you can check at the office for the preliminary list. Later, in a month or six weeks, a booklet will be made up and will be available if desired.

We notice from our report from the State Department of Agriculture that there still are five herds quarantined because of brucellosis. Again, we would like to emphasize that those calves born during the later part of the year should by all means be vaccinated. State law now demands vaccination in order to sell these animals for breeding purposes.

Here is some yield data on the potato varieties that our growers might be interested in having. On 3-year averages on yield per acre, (in cwt. of U.S. No. 1's) we have the results showing variety, yield and specific gravity, respectively: Ardena, 262, 1.081; Avon, 271, 1.076; Excel, 326, 1.079; Katahdin, 282, 1.072; Onaway, 275, 1.069.

In the November issue of the Michigan Farm Economics we found an interesting article entitled "Are Your Cows 'Milking You'?" We would recommend every dairy farmer read this as it has some very pertinent information that all should know. We will be glad to send a copy to anyone writing in for it. Emphasis in this article is on production and the milk receipts over feed costs, using varying production and grain rates. Also in the same issue is an article we would recommend to all poultrymen. This is entitled "Do Your Hens Make a Profit?"

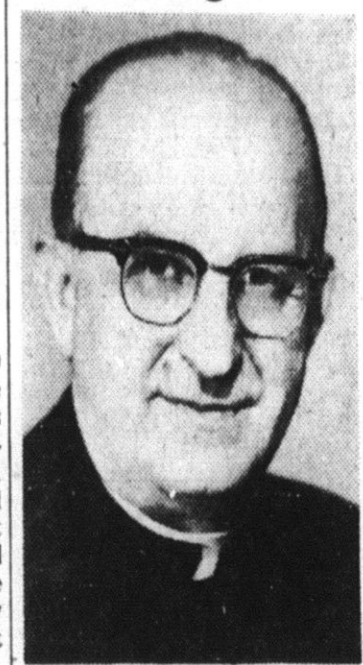
Origin of the blaze was not immediately determined but it appeared it may have started in the electrical system.

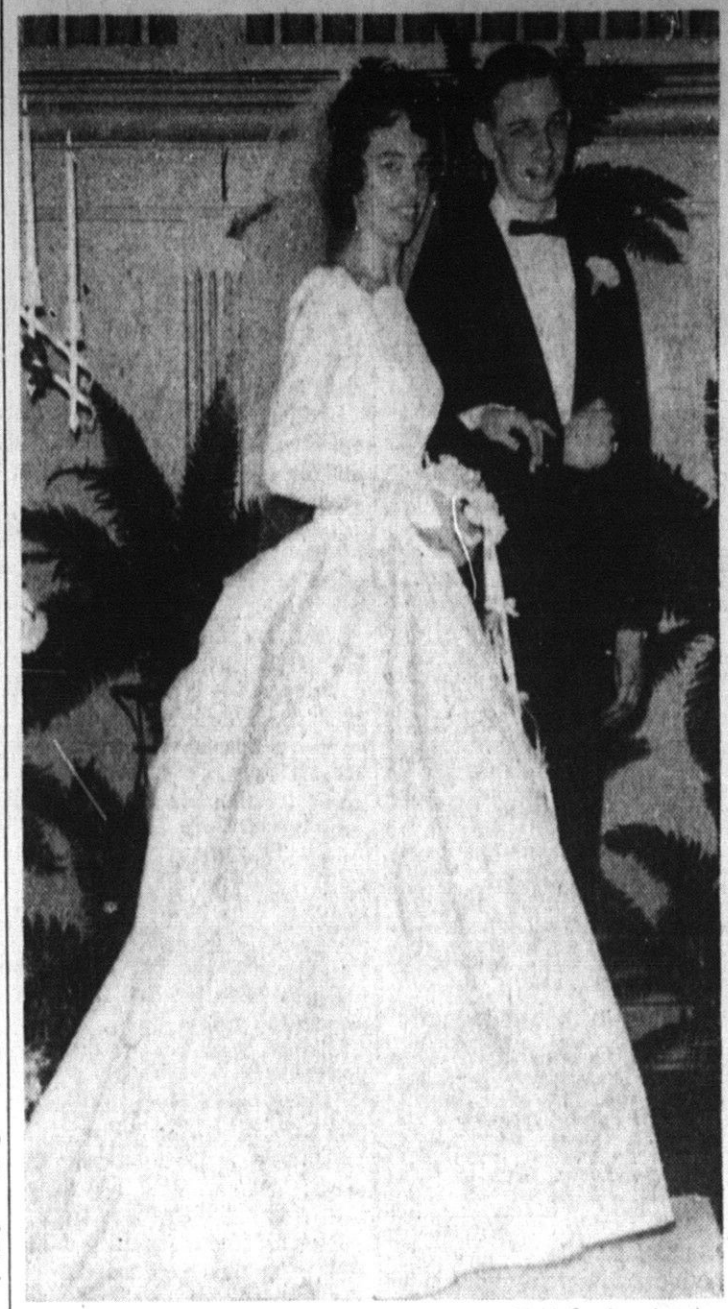

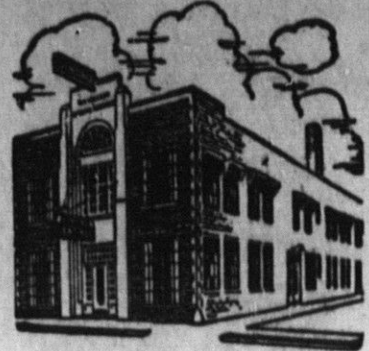

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## "NUCLEAR POWER"

Two events were recorded in the news of this month, twenty years apart, yet closely related. Twenty years ago in a laboratory beneath the stands of the University of Chicago's old Stagg Field Stadium, scientists produced the first controlled nuclear reaction. With the success a new age had come into existence. The men who worked on this first experiment have seen many of their predictions come true, and have seen applications in the fields of industry, medicine and transportation.

Saturday, Dec. 8, almost twenty years to the day, the big Rock Nuclear Plant at Charlevoix went into action. This plant, owned by Consumers' Power Company, is the first to supply Michigan residents with atomic powered electricity. Nine hundred thousand of Consumers' customers were given a tangible relationship to the atomic age.

Built on the shores of Lake Michigan, it stands in the middle of one of nature's beauty spots, a symbol of the growth of the new age, and of its potentiality to do mankind good instead of evil. To the thousands of travelers who pass within a short distance of the plant, it may well say that Michigan and its industry are moving forward with the new day. Basic to all industrial growth is power. This \$27,000,000 plant is the source from which power goes to homes and industry.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, December 23  
God Comes to Us  
John 1:1-18  
By C. P. Dame

Christians believe that God in the person of Jesus Christ paid a visit to this world and that is why we have Christmas. This great event is overlooked by many, ignored by some and not believed in by others.

Our lesson tells us about the great mystery and miracle of the incarnation—the coming of God to us in flesh and blood.

I. Jesus makes God known to us. The first 18 verses of John 1, called the Prologue, constitute our lesson text.

The first verse of the text states the eternity, personality and deity of Jesus who is called "the Word" by John. By our words we express our thoughts, principles and ideas. Through our words we communicate with each other and learn to know our fellow men.

Jesus, the Word, who is God and always was with Him, is able to make Him known so that we understand Him better. And this He has done. The Old Testament prophets spoke for God, Jesus in person revealed Him.

John portrays the greatness of the Christ.

"All things were made by Him"—in short, God created the world through Jesus—recall the words, "for in Him all things were created" (Colossians 1:16). Jesus is also the source of life—"In Him was life; and the life was the light of men" as John says.

The word "life" is found 54 times in John's gospel. Jesus is the source of physical and spiritual life.

John also calls Jesus, "the light of men." This light shines in the darkness of the world. The darkness could not put the light out. II. Jesus was rejected and accepted.

John, the author of the gospel, summons witnesses who testify to the deity of Christ. John the Baptist is the first witness. He came and witnessed in order that "all men through Him might believe." However, not all accepted Jesus. The world which He created "knew Him not" and what was worse, His own people "received Him not."

But some did believe and they received Him and became God's children through regeneration. The new birth is the work of God and not of man. Today, some reject Jesus and some accept Him and become His.

III. Jesus Christ brings grace and truth to us. The Word became flesh, that is human. The word "flesh" sometimes refers to sinful human nature but not to this text. When Jesus became man he did not lay aside His divine nature and that is why we call Him the God-Man.

Jesus has both human and divine nature. Those who were closely associated with Jesus "beheld His glory, the glory of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth."

The word "grace" appears four times in the lesson text and is not used again in the Gospel of John, the word "truth" is used 25 times in the gospel.

John wrote from personal experience and hence His words have much weight.

Observe that John mentions Moses and Jesus—Moses gave the law but grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. Both the Law and the Gospel speak of God's grace.

Christmas tells us that God came and paid us a visit in the person of Jesus Christ and now we know God better. And since we know Him better we ought to serve Him more devotedly.

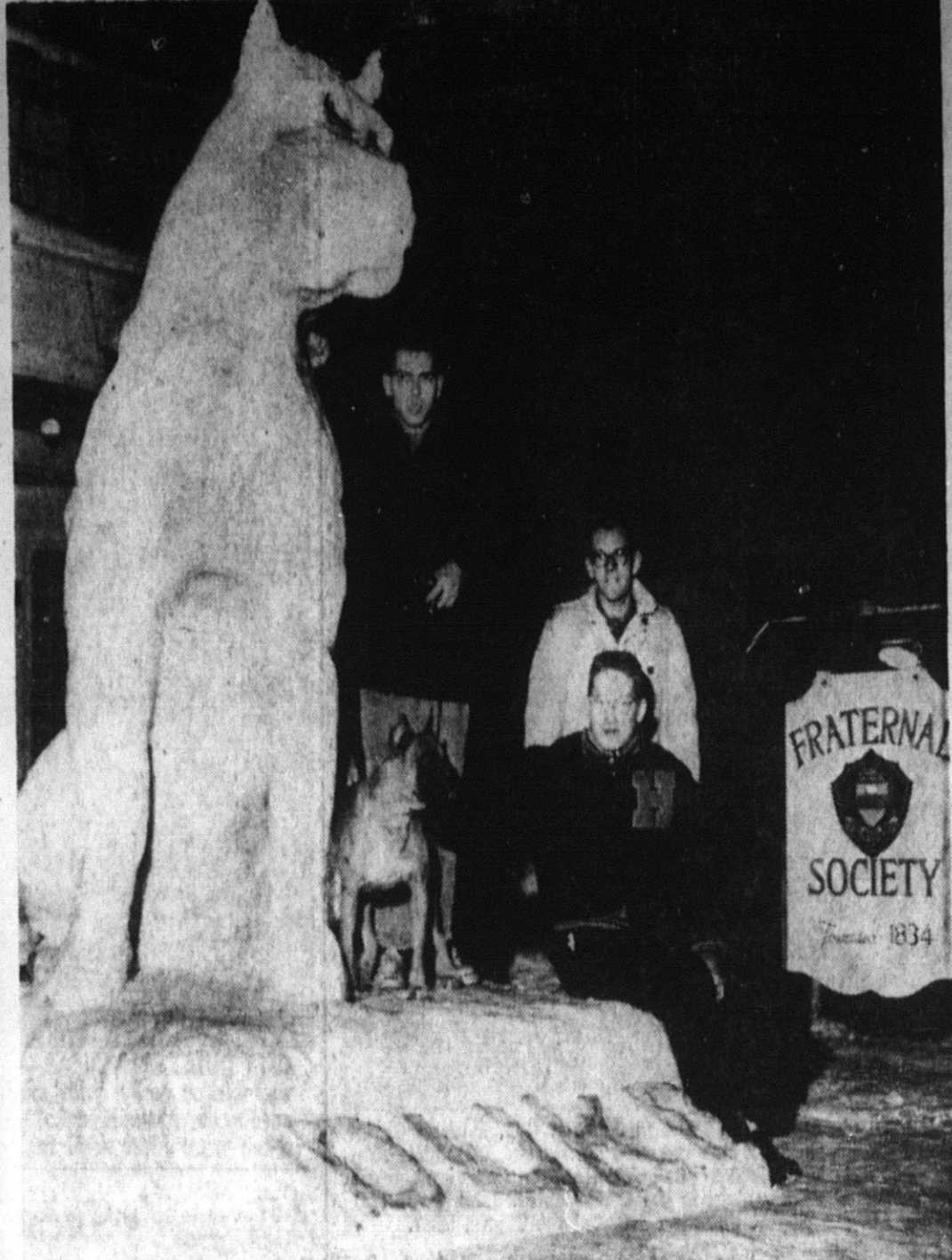

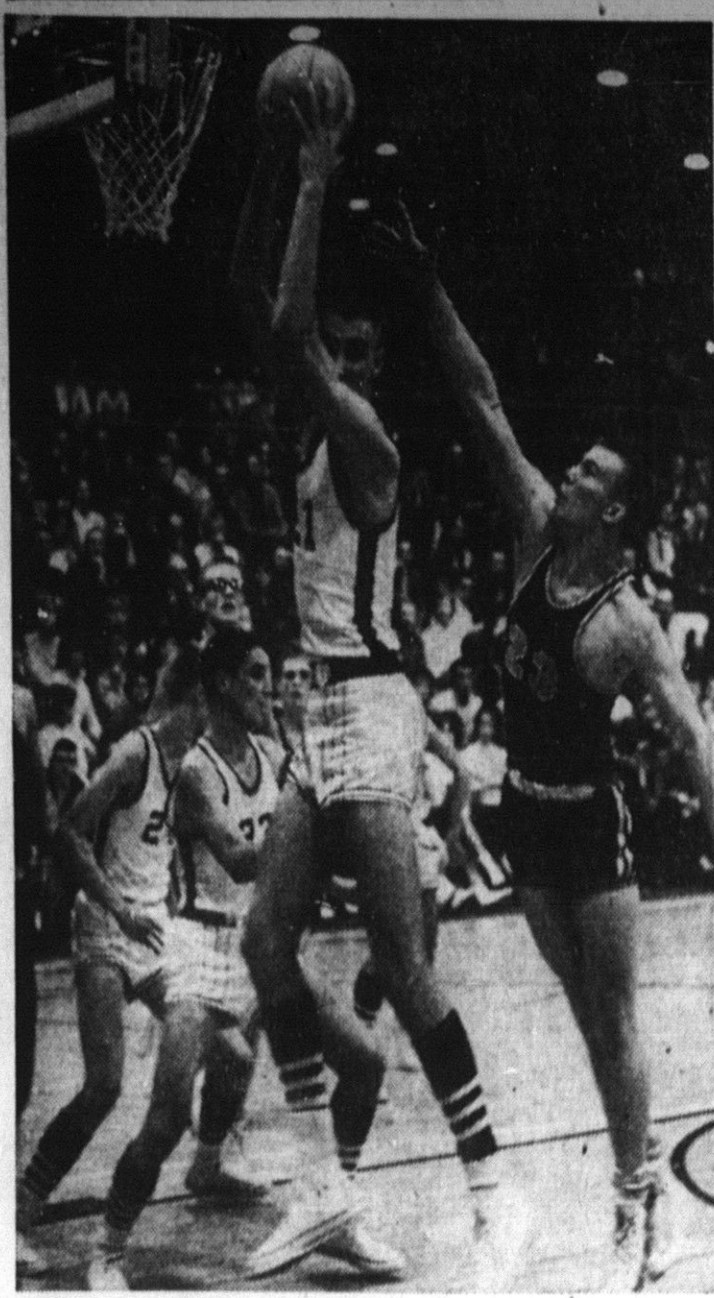

Holland Christian's improving basketball squad stayed on the victory trail in the Civic Center Friday night by downing an aggressive Allegan quintet, 52-47 before 1,700 fans. Coach Art Tuls' club has now won two straight and is 2-2 for the season while the Tigers now own a 3-2 mark. Allegan's other loss came at the hands of Kalamazoo Christian.

Christian never trailed after the first period and never by more than two points. The score was tied five times in the first half and twice more early in the third period. Then the Maroons made their move for the win and led 39-30 early in the final stanza for their biggest margin of the game.

It was strictly a game of defenses with the invaders playing an aggressive pressing type of game, while the Maroons surprised with a zone defense. Coach Tuls rarely uses a zone but the move paid off as the Tigers were forced to shoot from out and hit a low percentage.

Offensively the Maroons continued to show more spark with Ron Lubbers coming into his own with 11 markers all in the second half, center Dave Tuls again was the big spark on the offense besides doing a great job on the boards. ## Allegan's Snow Removal Fast Becoming a Political Issue

ALLEGAN — The city's snow removal problems will still be around in April.

In the opinion of most residents the condition of city streets and sidewalks is bound to have an effect on the April 1 municipal election when voters will have a chance to elect three councilmen — a majority on the five-member body.

Snow removal became a political issue during the past week after the city council postponed a regular Monday night meeting.

Mayor Pro Tem William Whitcomb, acting in the absence of Mayor Richard Haskins, said he called off the meeting because he had a bad back.

Former Mayor Marvin Hays hinted the real reason the meeting was postponed was because word had gotten out that a large contingent of downtown businessmen planned to attend the session to file protests against the way the city's snow was being taken care of this year.

At the heart of the controversy is a resolution passed by the council by a 3-2 vote (Haskins, Whitcomb and Buckley against Hays and Daniel Conroy) requiring all department heads to adhere strictly to budget limits.

Hays said it was a mystery to him how the council could be expected to know in June how much money would be needed for snow and ice control in December and January.

At any rate, the council put only \$2,000 into the budget for snow removal, an amount which vanished quickly under the late October snow and the current storm.

The strict budget limit wasn't the only problem, however. Street Department Superintendent Roy Shoemaker said the snow caught him with some equipment broken down, including the loader used to remove snow piled up against the curb in the business district.

Shoemaker said the council's budget rule kept him from hiring additional men and renting extra trucks as he was accustomed to doing. He said he had been attempting to handle the problem with his regular crew up until Monday night when he added shovels and rented trucks. Shoemaker said his regular six-man crew had been working from 18 to 20 hours a day ever since last Thursday night, December 9.

Condition of city streets has been the No. 1 topic of conversation at the "koffee klatches" most of the week. A steady stream of downtown merchants passed through City Manager Kenneth Bollinger's office Monday to lodge complaints and all were advised to express their feelings at the council meeting — the one postponed by Mayor Pro Tem Whitcomb.

The problem also resulted in angry "letters to the editor" in the local newspaper, pointing out that Allegan always had been proud of the way the city took care of the snow and ice in recent years, but — as one writer said — "every other town around is ahead of us now."

At the heart of the problem is the fact that Mayor Haskins never has made any bones of his feeling that the city did too good a job of snow removal. In frequent city council meetings he expressed the view that the street department "over-trained" when it came to snow removal and when he became mayor — promising more economy and greater productivity in city departments — snow removal was his first target.

The council's postponed meeting also had one other result. It left the city officially with only four council members. Unofficially the council had selected Jerry Krupp to fill the vacancy left when Daniel Conroy resigned due to poor health. But his appointment was to be made official at the Dec. 10 meeting.

Krupp's term of office will be shorter than expected. His term will expire, along with those of Haskins and Whitcomb, in April. If the present attitude of most residents is any indication and Haskins and Whitcomb seek another four-year term, the principle election issue will probably be "snow and the removal thereof."

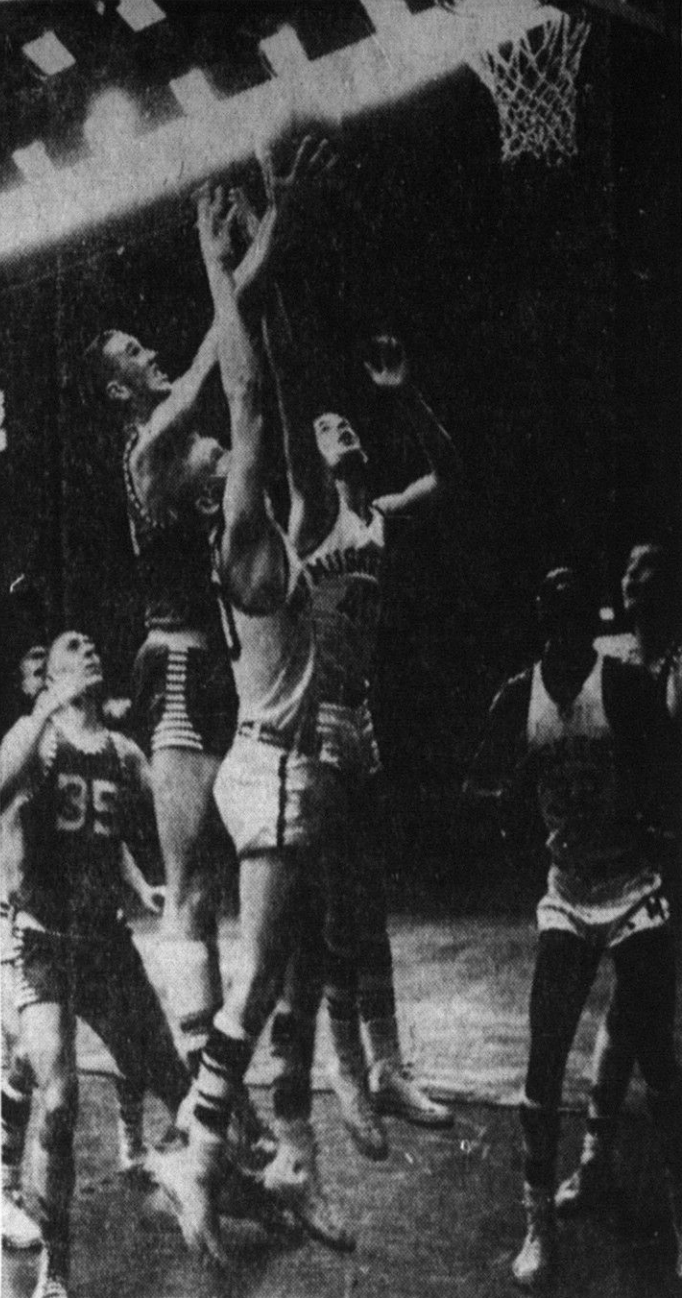

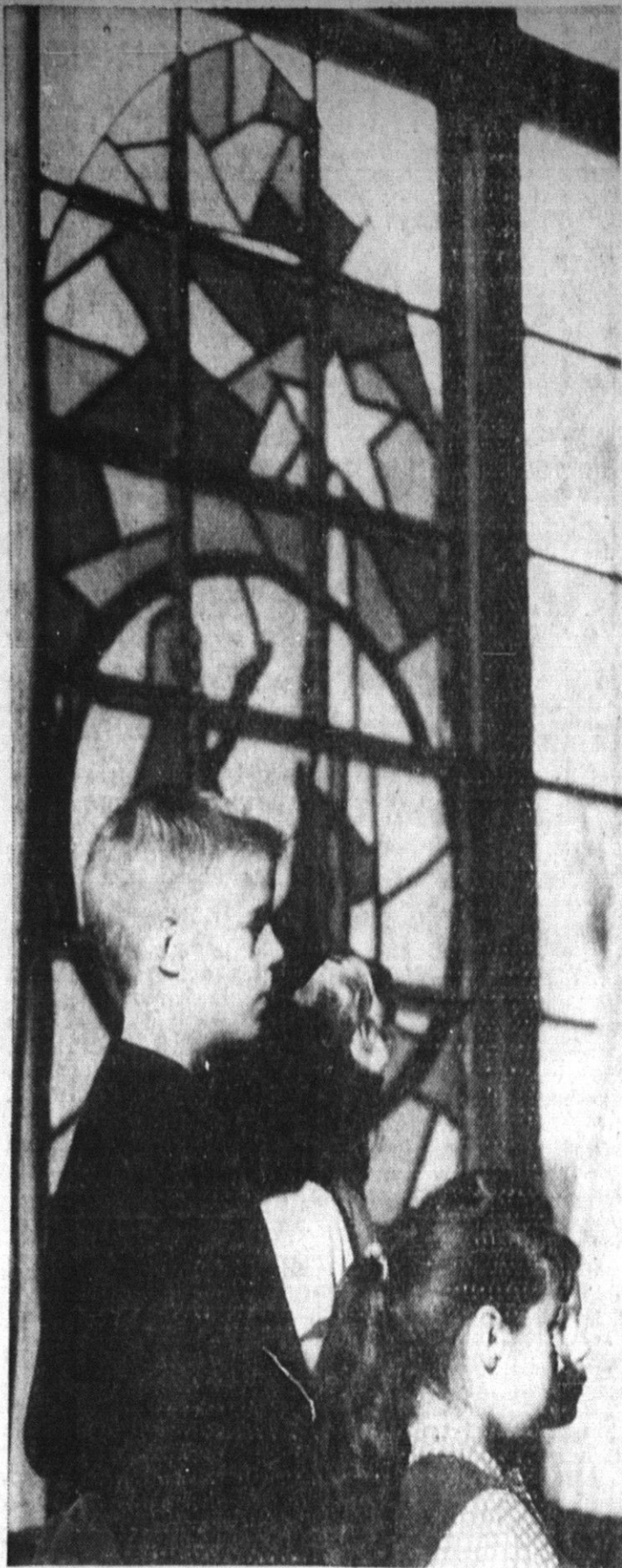

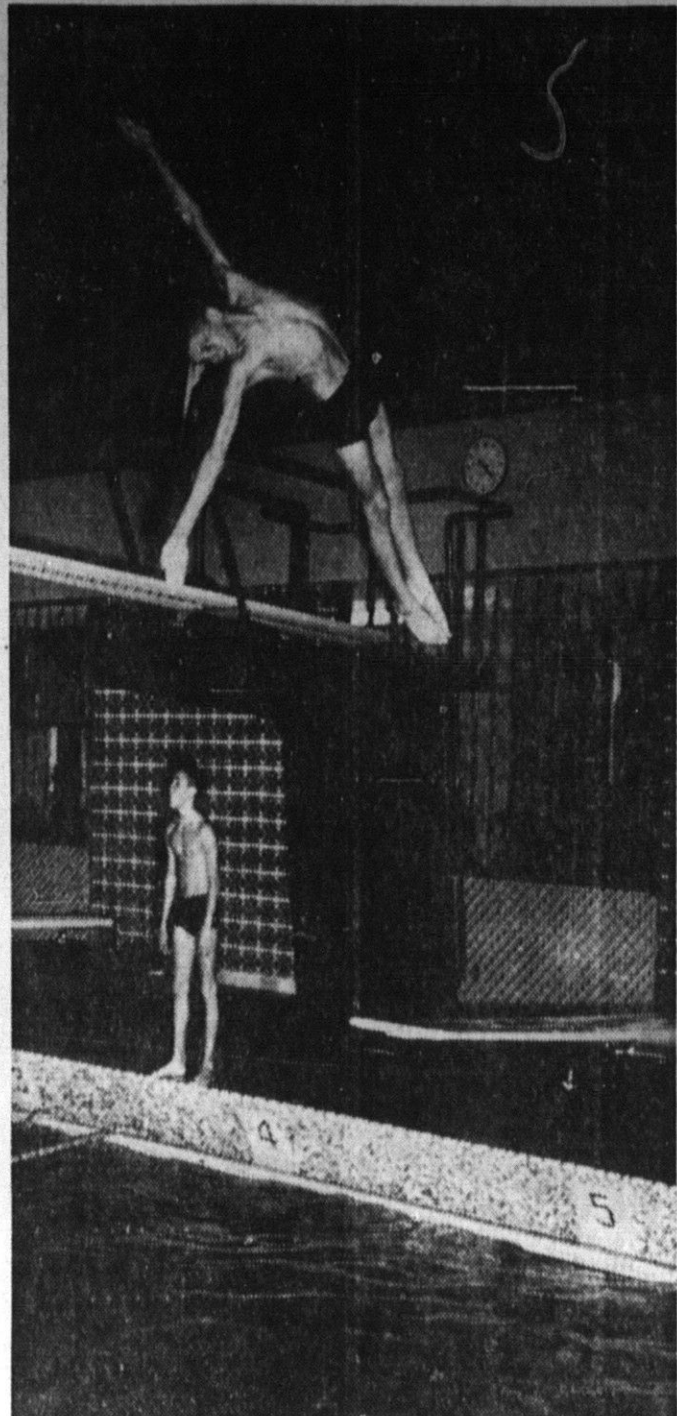
