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## Income Tax Looms as Part Of Solution to School Needs

A state income tax for Michigan to meet the state's mounting needs, particularly in the field of education, loomed as a strong possibility at a hearing of the Senate Education committee Wednesday afternoon in the library of Holland High School.

"Fiscal reform will be the first item of business when the legislature convenes in January, and a state income tax seems to be the only realistic solution," Sen. Robert Vander Laan of Grand Rapids said in outlining the state's financial condition which although presently solvent is not rosy and could run into large deficits by July 1, 1967, unless responsible action is taken. He added that a state income tax would encompass some relief on other taxes.

The hearing in Holland was part of a week-long series which concludes today with a hearing in Lansing to which representatives of some 30 school districts are invited.

Purpose of the hearings, according to Sen. Jerry Dunn, committee chairman, is to share information on educational functions, seek guidance in the area of financial help needed for quality education, and to obtain local reaction in the total area of the state aid formula.

Also on the committee panel was Sen. Harold R. Volkema of Holland who will be committee chairman next year. Accompanying the committee were Art Ellis of the legislative fiscal agency and Harold Brown, chairman of the financial division of the Department of Education. About 25 were present.

Volkema pointed to the need for the legislature to act responsibly to provide funds not only for education but for all other necessary services. Looking at the representatives of teaching and administrative personnel, he said, "You are the troops that we expect to back us when we go after the funds for all these functions."

He said teacher salaries are the largest single expenditure in the financial picture and suggested the possibility of tri-semester salary schedules for better utilization of school buildings. He pointed to the need of upgrading the teaching profession and the need for teachers to get behind millage issues to sell programs on the local level.

Only two persons testified. Burrell De Young, representing West Ottawa teachers, outlined problems facing the West Ottawa district which levies 18.27 mills for operations and 6.1 for debt service on a tax base of \$11,300 per child in state equalized valuation. He said if West Ottawa were to meet the recommended \$6,000-\$9,100 schedule next year, the district would need \$1,240 more per teacher. He also pointed to MCA recommendations for a \$6,500-\$9,800 schedule.

Holland Supt. Donald L. Ihrman spoke briefly on what he called "observations" and said Holland currently is levying the lowest millage of any K-12 district in Ottawa county, also pointing to the scheduled millage election in January. He said he preferred any increase in state funds to come under the

state aid formula rather than earmarked funds.

As for tri-semester plan, De Young felt a longer work year for teachers was not unreasonable although he expected many older teachers certainly would object. Ihrman said there is merit to considering such a plan and suggested more in-service training for teachers during the long vacation period. All agreed that Headstart and summer reading programs were most helpful the past summer.

The question of diverting industrial taxes into a statewide fund was discussed, but Chairman Dunn said he had introduced such a bill and it did not get out of committee.

Chairman Dunn, who as a "lame duck" could speak candidly, said the state is reluctant to set minimum salaries for teachers, although there has been considerable more pressure for such a move since school boards have gone through collective bargaining sessions the past year.

"No superintendent is trained as a labor negotiator, nor is any classroom teacher," he said. "Consequently, both sides seek counsel and the negotiations have not been particularly happy. What we need is maturity on both sides of the table."

He added it would be well for teachers to recognize their own responsibilities in the drive for higher salaries and get squarely behind millage elections which are a necessary part of the education structure. "I'm a teacher and I helped call on 30,000 households to sell a millage issue. We sold it too," he said.

## Bids Taken On Sewer Expansion

Dykhouse - Bowen - Fullerton of Grand Haven is apparent low bidder for the Holland sewer interceptor expansion program to extend sanitary sewer service to Holland Heights and the South Shore Dr. areas, plus the necessary lift stations.

The bids were opened in City Hall Tuesday afternoon and the Grand Haven bid totals \$1,351,028. There were two other bids, one covering only a part of the project.

The bids have been referred to Black and Veatch, consulting engineers, for evaluation and report. The recommendation will be presented to City Council, probably in January, and plans call for awarding the contract in 30 days or less.

It marks the third time the Board of Public Works has taken bids on the sewer expansion. Voters approved a \$1.9 million bond issue April 5, 1965, but the first two bids were rejected because bids exceeded money on hand. Since that time most of the southeast sewer project has been installed. Plans also were revised for the third bid taking.

The Dykhouse - Bowen - Fullerton bid lists 700 yards for completion. The work involves intercepting lines of 30 and 24 inches, and several smaller lines ranging from 12 to 21 inches.

## Postmaster Grateful for Early Mailing

The heavy influx of holiday mail was leveling off somewhat today at the Holland post office.

In a more relaxed atmosphere, stamp window clerks had a break now and then between customers today, something that hasn't happened often in recent weeks.

Postmaster Louis A. Haight was high in his praise for the cooperation of local persons mailing their holiday greetings and parcels early this year. "Never before have things gone so well," he said.

Early mailing which in turn reduces peaks and tieups mail seems to have been a trend all over the country. Parcels from large centers have been arriving on time and there seem to be no serious tieups anywhere.

Haight said the busy season at Holland post office started Monday, Dec. 5, and increased steadily until Monday, Dec. 19, when 95,000 pieces of local mail were put through the cancelling machine. This was the greatest influx of local mail for any one day in two years. Previously, the local office usually hit one or more days of 100,000 pieces of mail.

On Tuesday, cancellations ran 71,000 and on Wednesday 42,000. The mail load appeared to be lighter today. Incoming parcels today weighed about 900 pounds, compared with up to a ton earlier this week.

"We like the lengthened season much better," Haight said. "We have been able to get through the entire season using our own help on overtime, and have had few if any tieups. We are most grateful."

## County Expands Visual Services

An expansion in the program of vocational rehabilitation services to the visually handicapped and blind, Larry Hill, director of the Ottawa County Department of Social Services said today.

Applications will now be accepted for individuals with 20-70 vision with poor prognosis. A full time counselor was added to the staff. One primary objective of the service is to locate and help people with limited vision plan for their future vocation.

GRAND HAVEN — Frank McGee, 72, of 1084 West Muskegon Ave., Muskegon, was killed at 2 p.m. Saturday when a tractor overturned, pinning him underneath, while pulling out a tree at the Felix Zukaitis home at 17430 West Spring Lake Rd.

McGee was operating a farm tractor which was connected to a truck to keep it from skidding. It took two wreckers to remove the heavy equipment. McGee was pronounced dead at Grand Haven Municipal Hospital by Dr. Richard A. Poel and confirmed by Dr. Peter A. McArthur, medical examiner, who said McGee died of a crushed chest and internal injuries.

The Fruitport fire department stood by in case of fire. State police investigated. McGee reportedly was removing the tree under contract.

## Two Persons Are Killed In Car-Truck Collision

ZEELAND—Two persons were killed and three others injured in a violent car-pickup truck collision on M-21 at State St., shortly before 1 p.m. Tuesday.

Dead on arrival at Zeeland Community hospital was Henry H. Boeve, 46, of route 5, Holland. Boeve was a passenger in a car operated by Wallace Chester Folkert, 48, of route 3, Holland. Cause of death was due to internal injuries.

Folkert's wife, Myrtle, 47, also a passenger in the Folkert auto, died at about 1:30 p.m. at Zeeland hospital. Cause of her death was chest and internal injuries. Dr. Gerrit Kemme served as medical examiner.

Folkert was admitted to the hospital with fractured ribs and lacerations. He is reported in good condition.

Zeeland police said the Folkert auto was crossing M-21 and the driver apparently did not see the pickup truck operated by Ray Barrett, 31, of 346 Pinecrest Dr., which was westbound on M-21.

Barrett and his passenger, David McHargue, 31, of 13555 Quincy St., were taken to Holland hospital. Barrett is reported in good condition with bruises and possible internal injuries. McHargue was treated for lacerations and released.

Zeeland police said that Barrett had just completed passing a semi and was still in the passing lane at the time of the crash. The impact pushed the Folkert auto into a ditch, snapping off a utility pole.

All of the occupants of the

Folkert auto were thrown from the wreckage, according to Zeeland police. Zeeland police said the semi narrowly missed hitting the wrecked vehicles.

The Folkert car was struck broadside, on the passenger side and all the occupants were sitting in the front seat, police said. Ottawa sheriff's deputies and state police assisted Zeeland police.

Boeve and Mrs. Folkert were the 31st and 32nd traffic fatalities in Ottawa county this year.

Boeve was a member of the Ebenezer Reformed Church and was presently serving as elder and Sunday School teacher. He was a board member of the Youth for Christ and held the position of Fillmore township

treasurer. He was employed by the Ryzena Lumber Co. of Grand Haven. He also owned and operated a farm in Fillmore township.

Surviving are the wife, the former Verna Mulder; five sons, Michael, Timothy, Robert, Joseph and Jeffery, all at home; four daughters, Mrs. Ronald (Kathleen) Sikkema of Ellsworth, Minn., Jane, Ruth and Dona, all at home; two grandchildren.

Also surviving are four brothers, Clarence, Russell, Nelson and Roger, all of Holland; nine sisters, Mrs. John Brinkhuis of Martin, Mrs. Wallace Nies of Holland, Mrs. Albert Luurtsema of Zeeland, Mrs. Harry Helder of Grand Rapids, Mrs. Sage Ver Hoeven of Holland, Mrs. Clifford Giles of Grand Rapids, Mrs. Raymond Brondyke of Holland and Mrs. Dorothy Ruisard of Glenn Ely, Ill.

GRAND HAVEN — A Holland driver was assessed fines and costs of \$205 plus jail sentences of five and 10 days when he was arraigned before Justice Lawrence De Witt Monday.

Antonio Arredondo, 24, of 268 East Ninth St., charged with reckless driving, was sentenced to pay \$75 fine, \$15 costs and serve five days. On a charge of driving while his operator's license was suspended, he was assessed \$100 fine, \$15 costs and 10 days in jail. Jail sentences will run concurrently.

If fines and costs are not paid, he will serve an additional 20 days.

Arredondo was arrested by state police at 6:25 p.m. Saturday following a chase of up to 115 miles an hour in the vicinity of US-31 and Port Sheldon Rd. He was lodged in the county jail over the weekend.

## Hope Given NSF Intern Program

Hope College has been selected as one of six of the 12 Great Lakes Colleges Association schools to participate in its teaching intern program, according to word received today by President C. A. Vander Werf.

Supported by the National Science Foundation, the program makes available to Hope College a grant of \$30,250. Three interns, one each in biology, chemistry, and psychology, will join the Hope faculty next fall as part of the proposed interdisciplinary program.

The program, which is relatively new, has been implemented at Hope College since 1964. Dr. Allan Brady, the college's first intern, taught zoology. Dr. John Read, taught chemistry and Dr. Nancy Tooney is currently teaching and experimenting in biochemistry.

The program's purpose is twofold: young post-doctoral interns who have had no teaching experience are placed in good teaching positions giving half of their time to teaching and half to research, and the college benefits by the addition of new courses, a possible restructuring of old courses, the opportunity to have its departments achieve a size appropriate to scholarly stimulation, and the chance to bring to its campus fresh ideas and techniques with which graduate schools are working.

The GLCA-NSF interdisciplinary intern program follows a broader program than did its prototype, the GLCA Kettering intern program. All members of the faculty involved in Hope's new program will serve in a consultative role to the three interns with one faculty member in each department specifically assigned.

The Hope College proposal was coordinated and drawn-up by Dr. Robert DeHaan, chairman of the Education Department at Hope College and former director of the GLCA Programmed Instruction Project. Assisting him were Dr. Douglas Neckers, chemistry professor, Dr. Philip Creek, biology professor, and Dr. Philip Van Eyl, professor of psychology.

## Council Has 23-Minute Meeting

In a 23-minute meeting, one of the briefest in many months, City Council Wednesday night disposed of several items of business of a routine nature, wished each other season's greetings and were presented with poinsettias from the Park department. Decking Council halls with poinsettias at Christmas has become a holiday tradition in Holland.

Mayor Pro Tem Bertal Slagh presided in the absence of Mayor Nelson Bosman who is still convalescing from an illness dating back to September. Also absent was Councilman John Van Eerden gave the invocation.

A letter from Arthur Visser, 608 Crescent Dr., suggested that instead of sidewalks in the Montello Park area that a strip be added to the road and marked for that purpose. He said such had been done in Grand Rapids. City Manager Herb Holt said he had City Engineer Harold Derks check into the Grand Rapids system and talk with engineers in Grand Rapids. This program had been tried for about a mile on East Michigan St. in Grand Rapids adding a four-foot width with a reflectorized line and proper signs, but Holt said engineers there said it had proved "very unsatisfactory." The communication was filed.

A petition requesting paving 24th St. from Plasman Ave. to Graafschap Rd. was referred to the city manager for study and report.

A letter from persons wishing to remain anonymous expressed gratitude to a local police officer for services and understanding as well as the deep concern he showed when they had a problem with their son. They enclosed a check for \$25 to be used in the city's youth safety program. It was accepted with thanks.

The Hospital Board reported gift of a Christmas tree from the St. Augustine Seminary and \$410 from the medical staff for the employees' Christmas party. They were accepted with thanks.

Council approved a Hospital Board change order to the contract with Elzinga and Volkens involving an additional \$10,062.92 for revisions in the foundation near the existing building. With all change orders to date, the total cost of the hospital building contract is listed at \$2,914,388.36, with additions less than the deductions.

A recommendation of City Attorney Gordon Cunningham appointing William Coupe as deputy city attorney was approved. Cunningham who introduced Coupe said the latter has passed his state bar exams and his appointment will be effective as soon as he is accepted for practice in the courts of Michigan.

A report on the 20th annual gathering of the Municipal Employees' Retirement System was presented as prepared by John W. Fonger and Burton Borr who represented city employees at the meeting Oct. 21 in Lansing.

Claims against the city by Matthew Kleinjan, 111 East 25th St., and Dr. Donald De Witt, 390 Fairhill Ct., were referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

Since only one bid was entered for the demolition of buildings at 46 and 55 West Eighth St. and this bid was \$650 above estimates, Council rejected the bid and ordered the project readvertised.

Council approved the bid of Employers Insurance of Wausau, Wis., for workmen's compensation, general liability, automotive fleet and umbrella excess in total net amount of \$56,552.13. It was the only bid. It had been referred to Insurance Audit and Inspection Co. for analysis and no objections were raised.

By a vote of 6 to 1, Council approved a recommendation of the city manager on a request of the police chief to eliminate parking on the north side of 26th St. east of Michigan Ave. to Pine Ave. if extended. Hollis Clark cast the dissenting vote on the basis that parking on both sides in this area constitutes a problem and asked that a further study be made.

Councilman Richard Smith asked about progress on rezoning of property of Scott's, Inc., and City Attorney Cunningham said the report would be forthcoming shortly after the first of the year.

The meeting closed with greetings read from Mayor Bosman, wishing holiday greetings to council members, to loyal city employees and to all residents of the community.

"May every joy and happiness be yours as you gather in your family circles during this special season. May you experience the true spirit of Christmas, cherish your many blessings and radiate the true love of God," the message read.

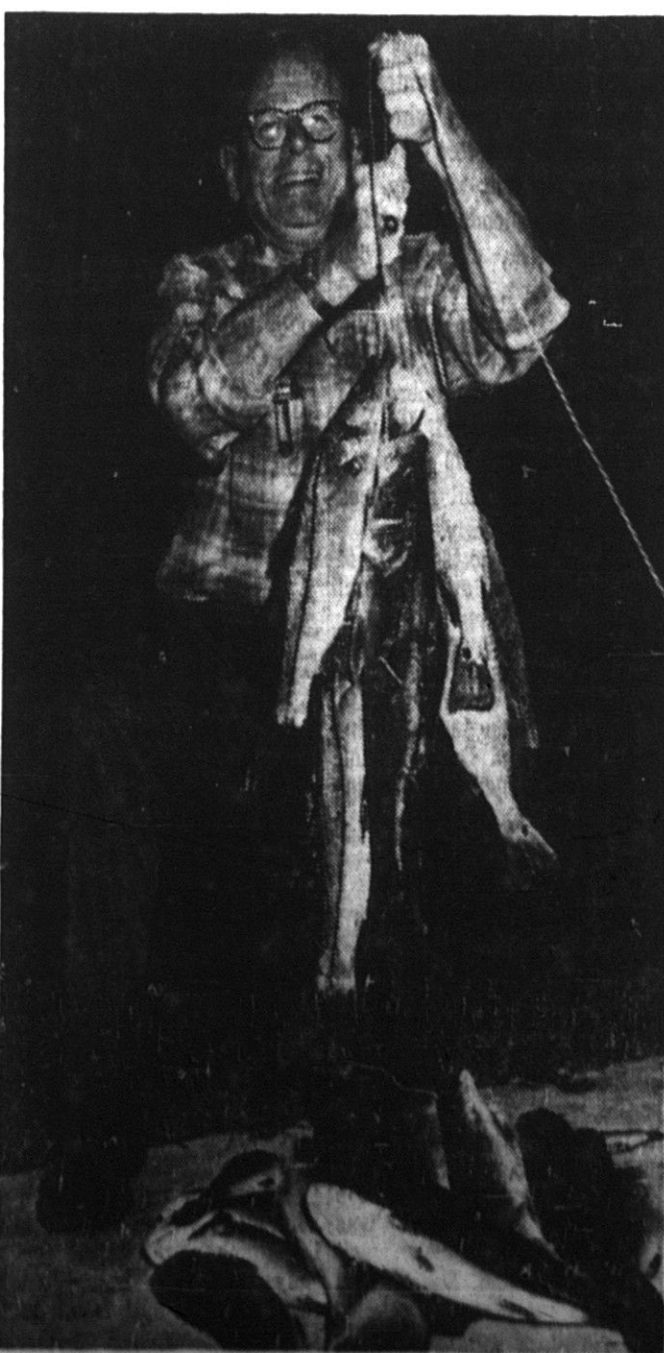

## North Side Water Plan Progresses

However, we can't help having some misgivings about the optimism which surrounds this international accord.

It isn't very difficult, it seems to us, to agree on how the moon shall be run, what policies shall be laid down about its governance, as long as there are no people there that must be governed. Government in a vacuum is one of the easiest things in the universe. It's when there are people involved that the business gets difficult. The moon is much larger and much farther away than, say, Vietnam. The trouble with Vietnam is that there are people there, and this makes all the difference.

Wait until there really are people on the moon, and then see whether or not we can come to any easy agreement about how things shall be run there. That's when the going gets tough. We're happy, of course, that there is some thought about preserving peace in the outer reaches of space, but we're much more concerned about peace on earth and good will toward men — especially at this time of the year.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 25  
Born This Day—A Saviour  
Luke 2:8-20

Christmas this year falls on a Sunday. We could remember two events in the life of Jesus—His birth and His resurrection on this Christmas day—but most likely we will think of His birth.

I. The Lord's angels brought the news of the birth of Jesus to the lowly Luke, the historian tells us that Augustus, the emperor, issued a decree that all the world should be taxed. In response to this decree, Joseph, a carpenter of Nazareth, with his wife travelled from Nazareth to Bethlehem to be enrolled there for both were of the house of David and Bethlehem was the ancestral city of that family.

While the couple was in Bethlehem Mary gave birth to her firstborn son. Since there was no room in the inn, Jesus was born in a manger. The Old Testament contains many prophecies regarding the Messiah. Micah the prophet foretold that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem. Heaven showed its interest — angels made the event known. In this scientific age many people do not believe in angels. The Bible mentions them many times. Disbelief in angels is not new—the Sadducees in the days of Jesus believed not in angels.

Some shepherds, a lowly kind of people, first got the news about the birth of the Saviour. Often, the lowly whom the world overlooks, God honors. The angels passed by the high and the mighty and gave the news to the shepherds and they accepted the message and were glorified after they were told not to fear.

II. Good news enriches. After the departure of the angels the shepherds decided to go and see, which they did and found everything exactly as the angels had said. They believed the message "which the Lord hath made known" to them. The greatest news that could reach human ears came to them. Luke says that "they came with haste" and no wonder for it could hardly be otherwise and they "found Mary and Joseph and the babe lying in a manger." They were highly rewarded for believing and doing. Faith brings blessings.

"And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child." They became missionaries. Ever since that day the story of the birth and life and ministry of Jesus has been told again and again.

How many heeded the message of the shepherds is not recorded but they no doubt got a blessing telling the story. "But Mary kept all these things in her heart." The shepherds returned to their work with a new experience and a new spirit. If we have the gospel, let us make it known for the world where we live needs it.

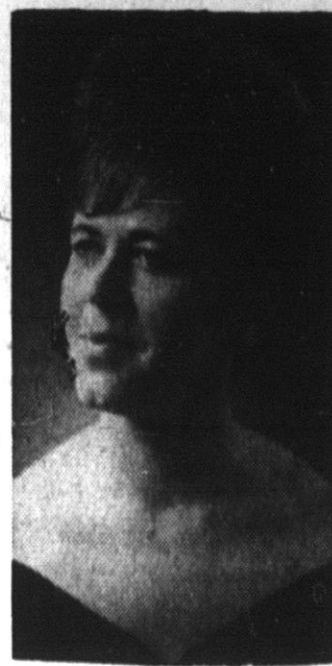

## West Ottawa Concerned Over Tax Impressions

In a meeting that lasted until midnight, the West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night studied burgeoning enrollments, increasing educational costs, tax rates and community needs, and expressed concern over erroneous ideas of taxation.

About 2½ hours was spent on a preliminary report on enrollments and room needs as compiled by Donald P. Sumrill, educational consultant for Guido A. Binda and Associates of Battle Creek, architect for the West Ottawa High School.

This report gave enrollment projections, with sharp increases in the 5-19 age bracket but a decline in the 0-4 bracket. K-6 figures for the district this year listed 2,118, but this figure is expected to reach 2,229 by 1969. The 7-12 enrollment this year is 1,479 but is expected to reach 2,105 by 1976. The junior high - high school building is designed for 1,500. The report also revealed that 11 more elementary classrooms are needed by next year despite the fact that three new elementary schools have just been constructed.

The board expressed sharp concern over what they considered erroneous information in the Holland township tax bills which placed the highest rate on taxpayers in the West Ottawa section of the township.

It was explained that the total millage of 24.37 is divided as follows: 8.77 allocated, 9.5 special voted and 6.1 debt retirement. The board pointed out that the real concern is the amount spent per child and West Ottawa has the lowest rate in the immediate classifications. The board said West Ottawa's cost of \$217.17 per child is less than Holland city costs of \$256.45 per child, Grand Haven, \$244.92; Federal, \$374.38; Harrington, \$344.30.

The discussion led to equalization, state aid formulas and fiscal reform on the state level, and the need for more resources, particularly if the district is to remain competitive with other districts on teacher salaries.

As for the projected enrollments and school crowding, the board decided that the entire subject must be analyzed in greater depth. There was considerable discussion on the declining birth rate, its effect of an older and more mature community with young parents growing older and having fewer births, and the effect of migration into the district by older parents having children largely of school age. Also discussed was the "tight

## Personnel Rules Okayed In Allegan

ALLEGAN — Allegan county supervisors have adopted without major changes the "Personnel Rules and Regulations" prepared by the board's committee on salaries after several months of hearings and study.

Committee Chairman John W. Fonger of Holland and members Fritz Jager of Gunplain, and Clem Rewa of Dor, were accorded an ovation by the board for their work in preparing the county's first set of rules governing employee relationships.

Prior to adoption of the new rules Tuesday, most personnel policy was set by individual department heads.

Fonger said the regulations "probably aren't perfect... but they represent a 'first step' toward uniform policy."

The new rules hold that "it is the declared policy of Allegan County that employment in county government shall be based on merit and fitness, free from racial, religious, political or other considerations not pertinent to job performance."

The word "political" in this statement of policy had been written into the committee's first draft, removed at a later session and finally restored by amendment during final action by the board.

Another amendment, establishing the salaries committee as a final "appeal board" for employee grievances, failed to pass.

The new regulations establish policies for employment conditions, fringe benefits, job classification, compensation and pensions.

Alger Workman, Allegan, was elected to fill the one-year unexpired term of Joe Armstrong on the County Parks and Recreation Commission. Armstrong submitted his resignation at Tuesday's meeting, explaining that his work requires his absence from the community too frequently to "do justice to the job."

Carl Arenhovel, Plainwell supervisor and a retired engineer, reported to the board on the results of a personal "unofficial" examination of some of the county's obsolete bridges.

Arenhovel said "the good Lord must be holding up some of these bridges, because nothing under them is."

He urged the board to take necessary steps to put a bridge funding issue on the ballot "just as soon as possible."

Last year a special one-mill tax for five years was defeated by a narrow margin. Arenhovel said, "We've got to work harder next time to make sure the people know just how serious this situation is."

"Sooner or later," he said, "a school bus is going to drop thru one of these bridges and we'll have to face up to the responsibility for the consequences."

The Roads and Bridges Committee of the board was directed to determine the earliest possible date for another election on the bridge funding question.

## Hulst Sparks Christian's 68-49 Win

Senior forward Don Hulst came through with his finest night of the season as Holland Christian got back on the winning track Friday night.

Hulst scored 20 points (nearly doubling his total of 21 in four previous games this season) and pulled down nine rebounds as coach Art Tuls' Maroons whipped Ludington, 68-49, before about 2,300 fans in the Civic Center.

Hulst had plenty of help, but it was his 10-point second quarter that paced Christian to a big 42-24 halftime advantage. Junior center Steve Bushouse, who led all rebounders with 15, contributed six of his 10 points in the same period.

The Maroons, now winners in four of five games this season, held a giant 48-22 margin in rebounding. Hulst's forward runningmate, John Lappinga, added eight rebounds to give Christian's top front line a total of 32 recoveries — 10 more than the entire Ludington team.

The huge advantage on the boards enabled the Maroons to launch 79 shots — 19 more than the visiting Orioles — despite 18 ball control errors to Ludington's 13.

Christian connected on just 27 of the 79 field goal tries for a cool 34.2 per cent, but many of the attempts were tips by Lappinga, Hulst and Bushouse. The Maroons actually pulled down more rebounds off their own board than Ludington had defensive rebounds (22 to 15), in an unusual display of rebounding dominance.

The Orioles made 21 of their 60 attempts from the floor for 35 per cent.

Lappinga, Hulst and junior guard Bob Van Langevelde combined for 16 points to get the Maroons off to an 18-10 first-quarter lead. Christian led 10-2 midway through the period.

Then Hulst's 10 points and six by Bushouse put the Maroons out in front 42-24 at the intermission. The Christian lead reached 24 points (52-28 and 54-30) before the Orioles made 2 belated comeback to cut the margin to 54-38 after three periods.

Bob DeNooyer, in his first non-starting role this season, came off the bench to score 12 of his 14 points in the second half to keep the Maroons out of reach the rest of the way.

Ludington forwards Rusty Hawk and Don Thomas scored 13 and 12 points respectively to pace the Oriole attack but got little support, except from sub Dennis Christensen, who tossed in nine points.

The loss was Ludington's third in four games. The only Oriole win of the season came at the expense of Big Rapids.

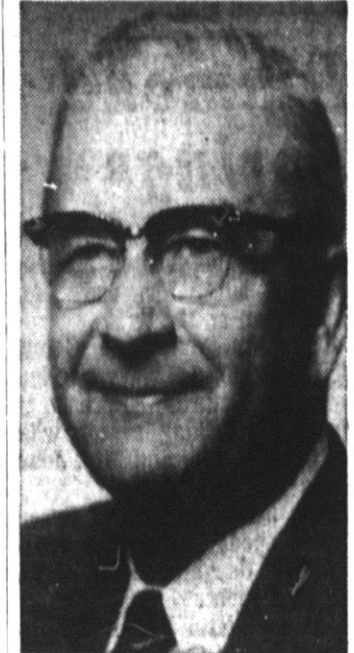

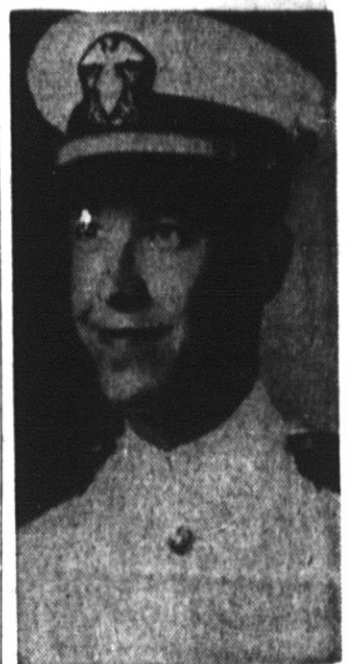

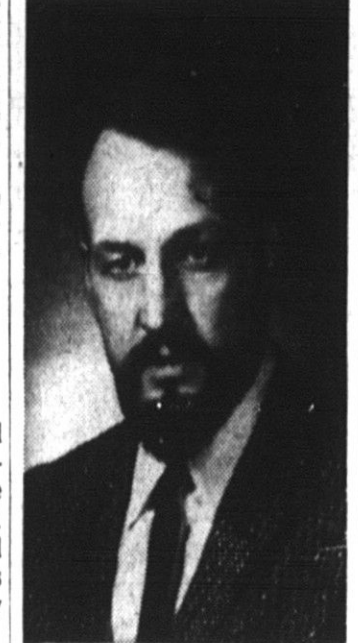

Philip C. Homes

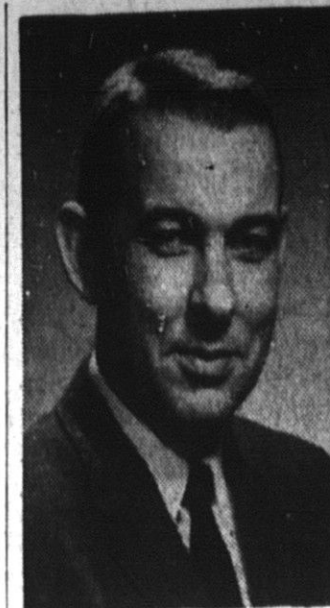
awarded by the Great Lakes Colleges Association (GLCA) Humanities program to faculty in its 12 member colleges.
