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Assessment Equalization Done by Law

GRAND HAVEN — The equalization department of Ottawa county is not responsible for the increase in taxes, the director, Fritz Guldswag, said today.

Ottawa county, along with all other counties in Michigan, changed its assessment to 50 per cent of true cash value in 1966, in accordance with act 409, Public Acts of 1965, effective in 1966 and subsequent assessments.

The adjustments were made by city assessors and township supervisors in accordance with the law. The 50 per cent of market value is the same as the previous equalization values and did not concern the newly organized equalization department. Other assessments may have been rectified at the time.

The function of the equalization department is to make studies of various classification of properties in townships and cities and thus arrive at a true cash value of the entire unit. These figures are used by townships, schools and the county to determine the amount of monies they are to raise, after the allocation of the 15 mills and the extra voted mills have been determined. Breakdown of the state equalized valuation to the individual property owner is done by the local assessor.

The equalization department does not aim to raise valuation of any taxing unit, but its purpose is to see that each taxing unit in the county pays its just share of county tax.

If a local assessor, past or present, has not kept pace with the rising market, it can be expected that total equalized valuations of the unit will be increased to bring it up to present market values.

Commend Action In Suspending GVSC Lanthorn

GRAND HAVEN — A resolution endorsing and commending Sheriff Bernard Grysen and Prosecutor James W. Bussard for their action in stopping publication of the newspaper "The Lanthorn" on the campus of Grand Valley State College was unanimously passed by the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors at their final meeting of the year Monday.

The resolution also opposes the use of any public funds to assist in the defense of the editor, James Wasserman, charged with distributing obscene literature.

The resolution pointed out that the majority of students at the college are offended by the use of such language, and that the principles of civil rights and freedom of speech do not include the license to be vulgar. The injunction was served Dec. 3, signed by Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith who indicated last week that the court and the school administration will issue a joint statement following a meeting of the GVSC Board of Control Friday.

Mailings Heavy In Post Office

It was a heavy day Monday in Holland post office for handling Christmas greetings, and more than 102,000 pieces of mail went through the cancelling machine.

Postmaster Louis A. Haight said this was the heaviest day in cancellations in a few years since people generally are co-operating in early mailings thereby extending the season and eliminating some mail jams. He said mail is being delivered on schedule. All full time employees and substitutes are working overtime.

Tax Collections At 20 Per Cent

Winter tax bills have been out for two weeks, and collections to date in Holland city total \$149,083.13, according to City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts.

This is roughly 20 per cent of the total levy of \$711,269.75 which covers county tax, delinquent summer tax, intermediate school district and special assessments.

Feb. 14 is the deadline for payment without penalty.

Christmas Coffee Planned by Mayor

Mayor Nelson Bosman is holding a Christmas coffee in his office on the second floor of City Hall Friday. Local residents are invited to call from 9 to 11 a.m., 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 8:30 p.m. Women employees in City Hall will assist.

This will be the mayor's first Christmas coffee in his office. Last year he held open house when his office was opened.

Stakeout Leads To Arrest of Two

Two Holland men were arrested Tuesday afternoon and charged with possession of marijuana following a 12-hour police stakeout initiated when an alert citizen spotted a suspicious car on 104th Ave. near 16th St. in Holland township early the same morning.

Gregorio Rios Jr., 21 of 88½ West 16th St., who is awaiting trial on another narcotics charge, and Manuel Ramirez, 28, of 409 Columbia Ave., were arrested in a joint effort by Holland police officers and officers from the Ottawa county sheriff's department.

Both men demanded examination at their arraignment shortly before noon Wednesday in Holland Municipal Court before Calvin Bosman, Associate Municipal Judge of Grand Haven. Bond was set at \$1,500 each.

Date of examination is pending the availability of chemists from the State Crime Laboratory to testify and verify the contents of two small packages found is marijuana.

Authorities were notified at 2:30 a.m. Tuesday after a car was seen parking the road and a person was spotted putting something along side the road near a ditch.

City and county authorities watched the scene of the cache for 12 hours before two subjects

appeared to retrieve the two small packages containing the marijuana.

It is theorized the two placed the packages at the site themselves and fled, thinking they were being tailed, when they were accidentally noticed by the citizen.

The two were arrested at 2:40 p.m. Tuesday after speeding from the scene, triggering a short chase on the gravel road by police.

Officers said one of the packages was thrown out of the car when it was stopped. The other was found in the car.

The vehicle was seized and is being held by authorities for being used in the transportation of narcotics.

The two packages of marijuana were taken to the State Crime Laboratory in Lansing this morning by police.

Rios is presently out on \$2,000 bond pending trial in Ottawa Circuit Court on a charge of illegal use of heroin. He was one of seven persons arrested by Holland police and Federal narcotics agents early last Aug. 3 when an undisclosed amount of heroin and marijuana were seized.

At that time, it was reported a federal undercover agent was called in around late July when it was learned the ring covered more than Michigan.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies who are investigating said Bartlett and Dine were hunting with two other men. According to Dine, he heard a noise and when he turned around, his gun accidentally went off striking Bartlett.

The two men were standing approximately 80 feet away from each other when the gun went off, sheriff's men reported.

Holland police picked up the pair on a felony warrant in Holland early Saturday morning. Allegan sheriff's deputies transferred them to the Allegan County Jail. Shoulders and Slater were bound over to circuit court after waiving examination in Justice Otto Schmitz's court Sunday.

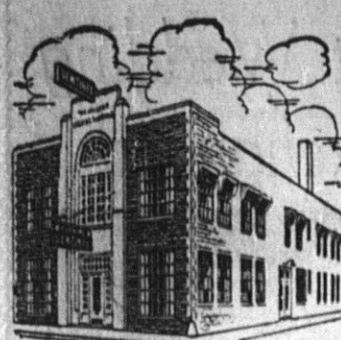

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GOOD NEWS

The nature of news is such that the bizarre, the unusual, often the bad news captures the headlines. We wish it were not so. One item of extraordinarily good news did capture the headlines recently but hardly received the attention it deserved. We refer to the meeting Friday, Dec. 13, between President Johnson and President Diaz Ordaz of Mexico, amicably settling for the time being the 100 - year - old Chamizal border dispute between our two countries, as a result of the meanderings of the Rio Grande River.

President Johnson at the ceremonies properly said: "We have shown that borders between nations are not just lines across which men shake their fists in anger. They are also lines across which men may clasp hands in common purposes and friendship."

One can imagine how much ill - will would be engendered, perhaps even violence and bloodshed incurred, if our borders with our Mexican and Canadian neighbors were fringed with armaments and forts as is the case in so many other portions of the globe today.

The recent meeting strikes us as a specific example of the general truth uttered many years ago by the late great Republican statesman Elihu Root when he said: "There are no international controversies so serious that they cannot be peaceably settled, if both parties desire peaceable settlement; if either party really desires war, there are few causes of dispute so trifling that they cannot provoke it. The matters in dispute between nations are nothing; the spirit which deals with them is everything."

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 22
A Hallelujah Chorus
I John 1:1-4;
Revelation 15:3b, 4; 11:15b
By C. P. Dame
May the study of this Christmas Sunday school lesson help us to celebrate Christmas in a better and more meaningful way. The worldly spirit is so pronounced at the Christmas season that believers must put forth extra efforts in order to gain spiritual benefits from the observance of Christmas.

I. A personal experience of Christ is beneficial. This lesson text is from I John and from the book of Revelation. The first part of the lesson tells of the earthly life of Jesus, of His humanity; the other two parts tell of the final victory of God's kingdom, through Christ. The theme of the first part is the word of life, namely Christ.

The words, "That which was from the beginning" remind us of the prologue to John's gospel and of Genesis 1:1. Christ is eternal. We believe in His pre-existence. We also believe in the Christ of history. He came from heaven and took upon Himself human flesh and blood and lived a human life. John believed in the humanity of Jesus. He wrote from personal experience.

"We have heard" - so John wrote - heard His parables, teaching and prophecies. "We have seen with our eyes - saw Him heal, help, perform miracles. "We have looked upon Him - not casually but intently, searchingly. They even "touched him" with their hands. They were well qualified to write about Him so that others might have fellowship with the Father and the Son. And this fellowship leads to joy. Christian experience qualifies people to witness. The more experience we have of Jesus, the better we will witness.

II. God deserves our praise. In a vision John saw "what appeared to be a sea of glass mingled with fire." Victorious Christians stood beside the sea. Each one held a harp. They all sang, "the song of Moses, the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb. After the Israelites had crossed the Red Sea they sang - see Exodus 15:1-18b. The redeemed song of Jesus, the Lamb, who had delivered them from the beast (Revelation 15:2). The beast is the anti-Christ.

The redeemed praised God for His great works. The short song they sang is almost completely made up of phrases and words from the Psalms. Now we are duty-bound to praise God here. In heaven the redeemed will magnify Him forever. Some day all the nations shall come and worship God and recognize some unwillingly.

III. The Lord Christ will rule forever. "The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord, and of His Christ, and He shall reign for ever and ever. Nations come and go. Hitler planned that the German nation would last a thousand years. We know that the nations of this world will come to an end, but we also know that the kingdom of God is endless. Are we members of that kingdom?

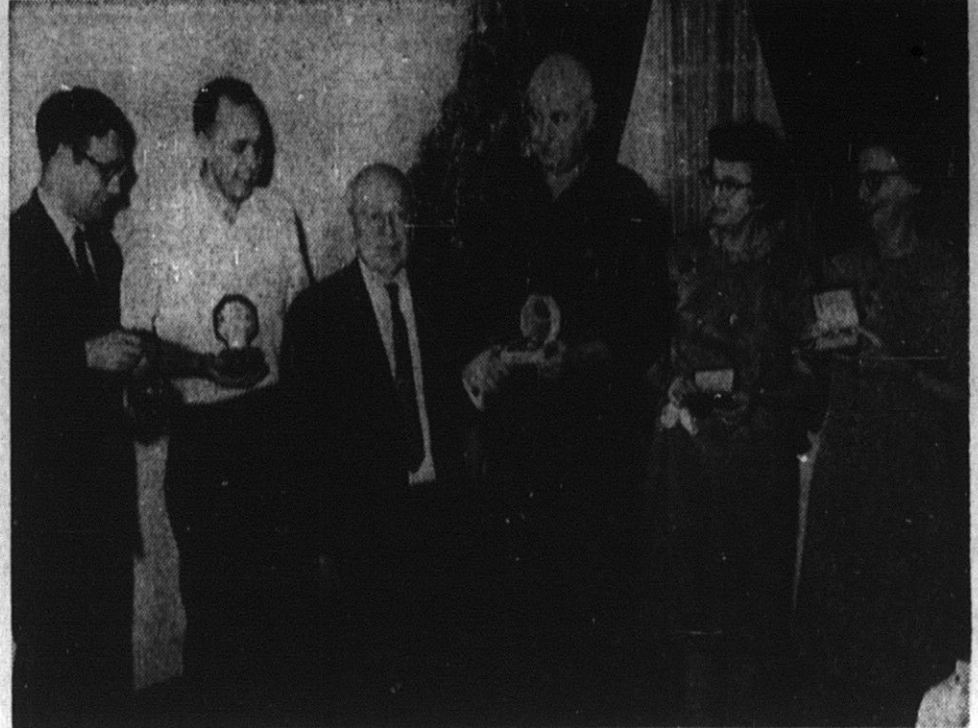

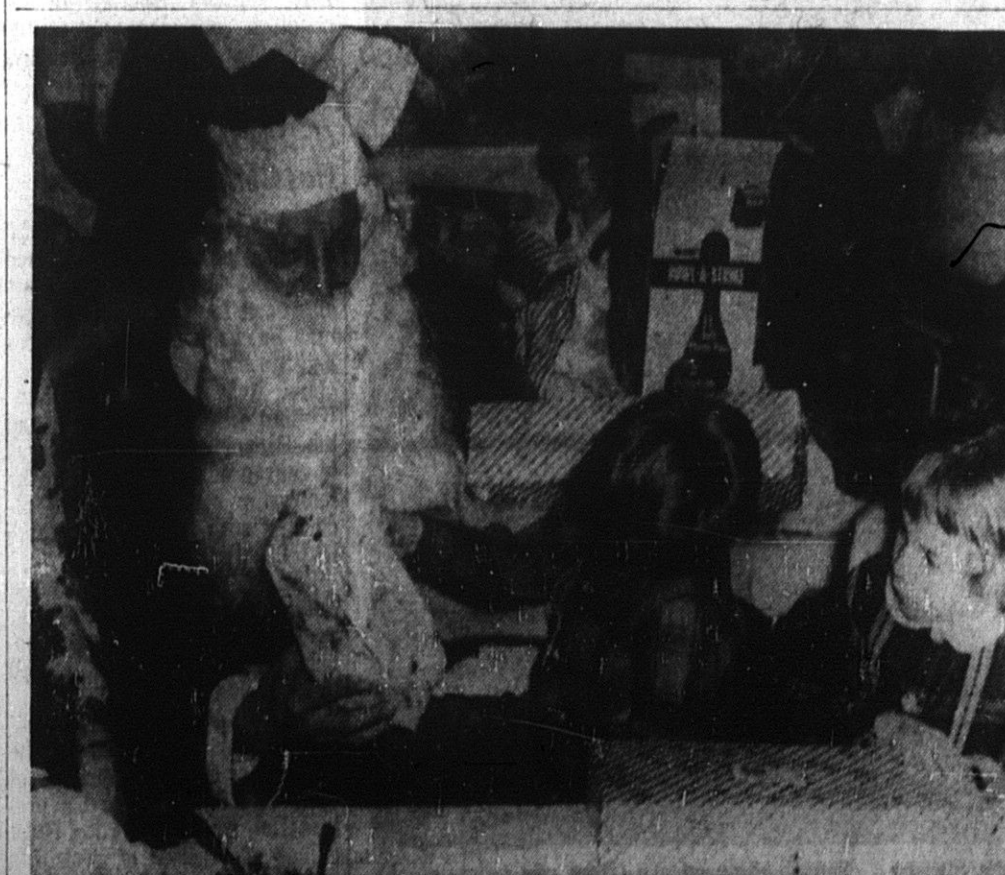

Silver Star Medal Awarded To Capt. James M. Stepp

FT. BELVOIR, Va. — Army Capt. James M. Stepp, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. James D. Stepp, 1792 South Shore Dr., received the Silver Star on Nov. 19 at Ft. Belvoir from Maj. Gen. George H. Walker, post commanding general.

Capt. Stepp received the award for heroism in action against enemy forces in Vietnam on June 30, 1968.

The citation accompanying the Silver Star read: "The Silver Star Medal is awarded to Capt. James M. Stepp in action on June 30, 1968 while serving with Company B, 65th Engineer Battalion in the Republic of Vietnam.

"While on a mine sweeping operation, his unit came under an intense enemy attack. Quickly organizing his men amid devastating enemy fire he led an assault of the hostile emplacement. After the bunkers were destroyed, and with complete disregard for his personal safety, he fought laterally across the fire swept field and gained a more advantageous position.

"At this time he was seriously wounded by a hostile sniper. Capt. Stepp's valorous actions, personal bravery, aggressiveness and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army."

Capt. Stepp, an instructor at the U. S. Army Engineer School, entered the Army in June 1966. He is a 1962 graduate of Huntington, W. Va., High School and received a B. S. degree in 1966 from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y.

He expects to arrive home in Holland Saturday for a Christmas holiday with his parents, a brother, Thomas and sister, Mary Beth, students at E. E. Fell Junior High School. His mother is a teacher in the Junior High. The family moved to Holland in 1965.

During his tour of duty in Vietnam, Capt. Stepp served with Company B, 65th Engineer Battalion of the 25th Infantry Division. He holds the Bronze Star Medal, the Air Medal, the Army Commendation Medal and the Purple Heart. He will return to Ft. Belvoir on Dec. 31.

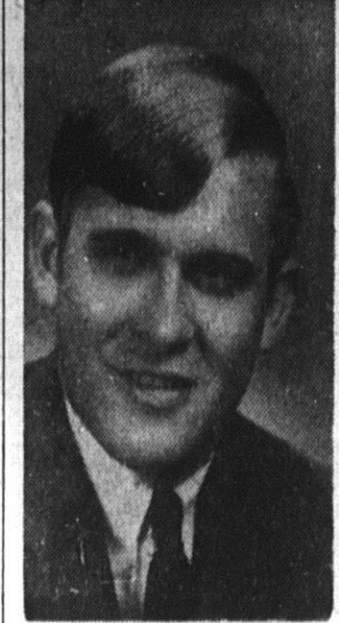

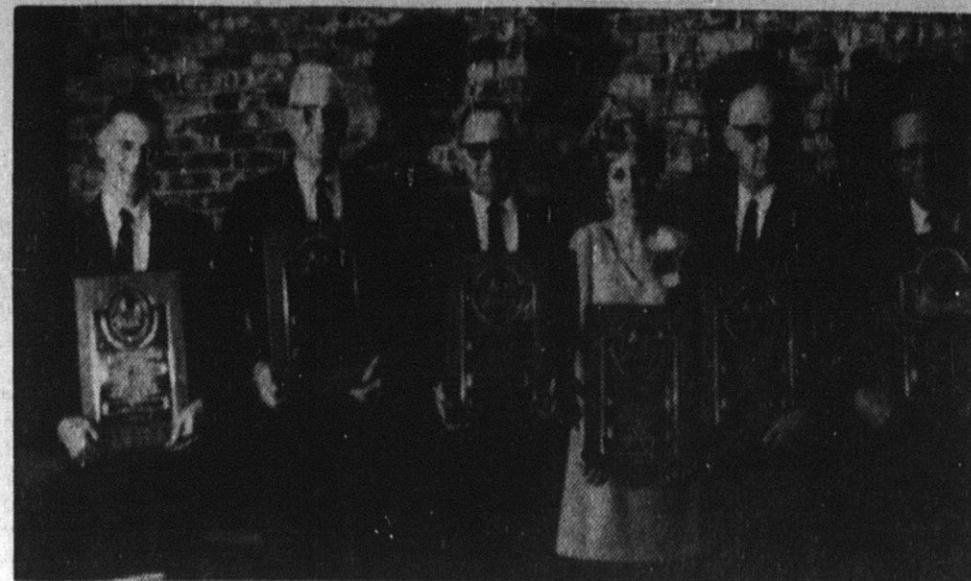

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1,500 Attend Father-Son Medical Forum Here

An estimated 1,500 fathers and sons attended a medical forum entitled "Boy to Man" Tuesday night at Civic Center, sponsored by the Ottawa County Medical Society and the Holland Area PTA Council.

Doctor Eugene Scholten, psychologist for the Holland Schools, who served as moderator, presented the panelists, Dr. Vernon Boersma, Dr. Donald De Witt and Dr. Bernard Meeuwse.

The film "Boy to Man" dealing with the physical development of boys during the adolescent period of their life, emphasized also the emotional and mental changes which occur and stressed that the process of maturing is time consuming and involves a most important

and impressionable area of their life.

Dr. Boersma discussed maturing differences and outlined the order of events which occur as a boy passes through his adolescent years.

Doctor De Witt discussed good health habits and stressed the need for body cleanliness, adequate diets, proper exercise, and adequate rest. He condemned a diet of Cokes and potato chips and encourages a well balanced diet to include adequate protein for the rapidly growing boy. He discussed the detrimental effects on the body caused by smoking, the drinking of alcoholic beverage, and the use of drugs.

Dr. Meeuwse spoke of the physical and emotional problems which are encountered during the adolescent years of a boy's life. He discussed subjects varying from developmental abnormalities to enuresis or bed wetting. Various suggestions were given to aid in overcoming those situations capable of upsetting a boy psychologically and emotionally.

Questions were submitted in writing. They ranged in scope from the subject of weight, drug abuse and sterility, to that of dating.

Dr. Scholten expressed the hope that the information given would serve as a stepping stone for further discussions between father and son in the privacy of their homes. It was thought that perhaps a broader avenue of communication between father and son might have been formed by the presentation of the evening.
