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White Christmas Expected in City

Michigan today had assurances from the weatherman of a white Christmas. The upper peninsula needed no assurances. It already had a heavy blanket of snow, particularly Houghton where 10 inches fell during the night, raising the total accumulation to 45 inches.

Forecasts for lower Michigan called for temperatures tonight of 16 to 24 and tomorrow 24 to 30, plus snow flurries.

A light snowfall this morning helped cover up dirty snow deposits and for a time caused some slick streets. Police Chief Jacob Van Hoff urged all motorists to use caution in an effort to eliminate accidents which could mar the joyous Christmas season.

Generally, roads were clear in the lower part of the lower peninsula, but icy and snow-covered in the upper peninsula and north of a line from Bay City to Ludington. Today's snowfall resulted in slippery sections for a time in Grand Rapids, Holland, Muskegon, Cadillac and Traverse City.

Some 2,500,000 cars are expected to be on Michigan highways during the holiday weekend, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan. Some of the increased traffic is due to two major airplane strikes. Grounded planes of American and Eastern Airlines normally would carry an estimated 4,000 persons a day in the 10-day holiday period.

Capital Airlines scheduled five extra flights into New York alone Tuesday and today. Trains and buses have been booked to near capacity, and standby equipment has been put into service to accommodate thousands involved in the annual movement from distant homes, colleges, Army camps and winter vacation spots.

While snow is predicted for Michigan on Christmas, many other sections of the country will have rain. Showers are expected in the southern portions of Texas and Florida as well as the Pacific Northwest. Partly cloudy skies will prevail across the gulf states while a band of sunny skies will be enjoyed from southern California across the nation's midsection.

Sunny but cold weather is forecast from the Texas Panhandle to the Ohio Valley, and traditional white Christmases are expected in the Rockies from Montana into Colorado, and across the Great Lakes into portions of Pennsylvania and New York state.

Police estimated the damage to Wolbert's 1953 model car at \$300.

The climax of the ceremonies will be the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass celebrated by the Pastor. Assisting in the Sanctuary will be the Rev. Vincent Burnell, O. S. A., while Rev. Edwin A. Thome directs the Choir. The Minor offices of the Mass will be ten of the seminarians of the parish who are studying for the Priesthood.

Masses on Christmas Morning will begin at 7 a.m. and will continue at 8, 9, 10, and 11 a.m. At 10 a.m. the Holy Sacrifice will also be celebrated in Our Lady's Chapel with a sermon in Spanish for the Spanish speaking of the parish. The regular Mixed Choir of the Chapel will render the traditional Christmas Hymns in Spanish.

The Christmas Season in the Church continues long after the Christmas Holidays. The Crib and decorations, along with the Festive Carols, will prolong the Christmas Spirit until after the Feast of the Epiphany. The actual Christmas Season lasts until Feb. 2, on which day is commemorated the presentation of the Child in the temple.



Holland Twp. Interested in Water Plan

Supervisor James G. Brower of Holland township has been appointed by the township board to represent it at meetings of the Kent-Ottawa Water Authority. The township is considering joining the authority which already lists as members several cities and townships in the two counties.

Earlier this month, the Kent-Ottawa Water Authority took the first concrete step toward acquiring Lake Michigan water when the board of directors voted to take an option on 40 acres of land on the lake front. The option was formerly held by the city of Grand Rapids. The site would be used for a filtration plant.

The board ordered a revision of the authority charter to eliminate townships from the financing plans under state act 233 and also ordered work to proceed on drawing up contracts for customers.

Under the reorganization, the member cities will issue the \$11,500,000 bond issue, while township members would purchase water under contract, their payments to the authority retiring the portion of the bond issue reflected by their share.

Cities in the water authority are Grandville, Wyoming, East Grand Rapids, Zeeland and Hudsonville. Townships include Georgetown in Ottawa county and Paris in Kent county, with Walker and Grand Rapids townships showing considerable interest that might result in joining later.

Changes in financing plans were necessitated when the State Supreme Court ruled in October that townships could not participate under act 4 as it would violate the 15-mil limitation contained in the constitution. Wyoming township's recent vote to incorporate gave the cities in the authority sufficient valuation to proceed under act 23, with the cities carrying the bond load.

Looking back at the "Miss America" contest of some weeks ago, the first winner of such an event, now 53 years old, made a remark of deceptive simplicity that deserves to be classed among the "quotable quotes."

Mrs. Victor Cahill of Atlantic City, N. J., addressed her remark to all the thousands of aspirants for honors as "Miss America" or "Miss" anything else that the minds of the promoters of such contests can conceive. This is what she said:

"You'll be Miss America for only one short year, and then you'll be just be you all the rest of your life."

The Miss America winners, as well as the runners up and all those who made a desperate try without coming within shouting distance of the top spot, man answer: "Of course that's true. But any girl who never tries for such a thing will be minus that ambition for only one year and then she, too, will simply be she for the rest of her life. So what's the harm in making the attempt?"

No harm if the winning "Miss" does not let an artificial and factitious success to her head. Almost inevitably such a young lady cashing in on accidental physical curves — curves that at 40 or 50 will no longer give her the right to attention — will develop the feeling that people will give her honor for the rest of her life, that there's nothing more for her to do than cultivate those curves.

Male celebrities in the teenage class sometimes face the same hazard, enjoying an artificial distinction and then being compelled to be just themselves the rest of their lives. In our athletics-centered education that sometimes happens to boys, to their own later sorrow.

Unconsciously the youthful athletic heroes may get the impression that the world is their oyster and reverence for the rest of their days. As a result they may fail to prepare themselves adequately for the tough years ahead.

Ten years after their last athletic triumph they may be forgotten. If they have not rested on their laurels but have developed their minds as well as their bodies, as is the case with many, then the youthful distinction is to the good. In athletics it takes work and the development of skill, it is not quite the same as in the case of most of the "Miss" celebrities. If not, they are out of luck and have to become resigned just to be themselves the rest of their lives. The total harvest of heart-break for both female and male teenage celebrities probably can be bigger than can be realized.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 28
Jesus Acknowledged as the Christ
Mark 8:27-35
By C. P. Dame
(Based on copyrighted outlines produced by the Division of Christian Education, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. and used by permission.)

When Jesus was upon the earth he was asked a number of questions and he also asked people questions. In this lesson we are going to study the important question Jesus once asked his disciples. The answer to that question has influenced millions.

I. People have always differed about Jesus. The apostles had been with Jesus more than two years and his ministry was coming to a close. In about six months he would die. The Lord had been teaching his disciples and he had tried to reveal himself to them—did they learn? In the region of Caesarea Philippi, in the northern part of Palestine, Jesus and his apostles had a quiet time together. There Jesus asked them questions. The first question he asked was, "Whom do men say that I am?" People had varying opinions but all agreed that Jesus was an extraordinary person. Their answers also revealed that they had inadequate ideas about Jesus. Today there are many people who have wrong ideas about Jesus.

After the secondary question there came the more important and personal question: "But who do you say that I am?" Each person must give his own answer to that question. Peter gave the correct answer, "Thou art the Christ." He confessed that Jesus was the Messiah promised in the Old Testament. In making this confession Peter took a stand against the majority of the nation. Any one who today agrees with Peter separates himself from millions of others. Although Peter confessed Jesus as the Messiah he still had a lot to learn about the mission of the Messiah.

II. The cross of Jesus still gives offense. Jesus told Peter about his suffering and death on the cross. He tried to tell Peter what kind of a Messiah he was. The picture of Jesus differed much from the ideas of Peter and hence he tried to correct Jesus. Quickly and sharply Jesus rebuked Peter telling him that Satan was using him as a tool by presenting again the temptation in the wilderness to avoid the cross. The man who in one moment confessed Jesus as the Christ at the next moment was yielding himself to Satan. How quickly a Christian can fall from the heights to the depths! Today Satan is still using Christian people in various ways. Peter preferred his own ideas rather than the truth of Christ. We are troubled in the same way at times. Jesus told Peter that he did not think the things of God but of men. The things of God are his saving purposes which Christ came to fulfill.

III. Christianity involves cross-bearing. It is one thing to wear a cross around the neck but it is another matter to bear the cross. Jesus told Peter and the apostles that they too had a cross to bear. Discipleship costs much. It involves self-denial. Most people like to indulge but dislike to deny themselves. Before a person can become a Christian he has to say "no" to himself and "yes" to Jesus — disown himself and acknowledge Jesus as his Lord. Perhaps it is in place to say what cross-bearing really is at this point — well it means to suffer, to give up something because of our relationship to Jesus.

Many people today are trying to save their lives and they do not succeed very well. By losing life we gain it—that is when we lose it for Jesus. Those who want to save their lives will lose them but those who lose their lives for Christ will gain their lives. We can make our choice.



Believe Stove Pipe Caused \$5,500 Blaze

A fire believed started by an overheated stove pipe early Sunday morning caused an estimated \$5,500 damage to the second story and roof at the home of Bert Brewer, on Butternut Dr. at Ransom St.

Firemen from the Park Township Fire Station No. 2, plus a tanker and six men from the Park Township No. 1 station, fought the blaze for three and a half hours, from 8 to 11:30 a.m.

Fire Chief Herm Windemuller said the Brewers discovered the fire earlier, but thought they had put it out themselves with water. While eating breakfast, however, the electricity was suddenly cut off, and the upstairs was found in flames.

When firemen arrived, Windemuller said, the entire second story was afire, with flames shooting through the roof. Firemen brought the fire under control within a few minutes, using high-pressure foam. But it took several hours to get all of the fire out between the walls, in the ceiling and under the shingles, according to Windemuller.

The fire was apparently started, Windemuller said, by a stove pipe passing through the first floor ceiling which became overheated.

Firemen were hampered in their work by the cold weather, which froze the water on the ground and roof, making the footing precarious. Neighbors helped firemen carry most of the second floor furnishings to safety.



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

Maroons Win 43-37; Snap Losing Streak

Holland Christian's cage squad snapped its three game losing streak on the Civic Center court Friday night by outlasting the Allegan High Tigers, 43-37.

A crowd of 1,700 fans watched the Maroons capture their second win in five starts and Allegan lost its third game against one win.

Coach Art Tuls' club held the upper hand throughout the contest, but were forced to rally in the closing minutes to nip a desperate bid by the Tigers. After leading by 11 points early in the third quarter, the Maroons faded to permit the Tigers close the gap to 39-35 with three minutes remaining. The Maroons regrouped themselves, however, and spurred to take the victory.

The inexperience of both clubs showed on several occasions, as each committed errors which more seasoned outfits wouldn't commit. Both coaches Art Tuls and George Van Wagoner substituted freely throughout the game with a good number of sophomores getting their chances under fire. Frank Visser, Maroon soph center, did a fine job for about half the game in a substitute role for Vern Wedeven. Meanwhile the Tigers also used a soph center in Chris Hale. Both boys show a great deal of promise for their respective clubs.

The tempo of the game was slow throughout with the Maroons concentrating on their set pattern for the most part. Allegan also employed the slow style with a tricky "screen and roll" type offense which has become characteristic of Van Wagoner's teams at Allegan in the last few years. While many of the Maroon baskets were of the layup variety, the bulk of the Tigers' scoring came from the foul line area with the one handed push shot.

Christian had almost complete control of the boards with their superior size, although the Allegan crew repeated tied up the Maroons for a held ball. Big guns on the boards for the Maroons were Wedeven, Hulst, Visser and Jack Bouman, a rugged junior forward, who started his first game for the Maroons.

Holland had a bad night at the foul line, making only three out of 13 tries. At one stage, the locals missed seven straight and failed to collect from the lane during the first half.

Allegan's only lead of the ball game came at the outset as guard Mike Foster hit on a layup. This started a scoring famine for the losers who managed only three more points in the period. Meanwhile the Maroons got balanced scoring from four boys to take a 10-5 lead at the quarter.

The second quarter was a slow, low scoring affair with the Maroons outscoring the Tigers, 8-7. Jim Hulst was the big gun for the Hollanders with six points, all coming from well outside the foul circle. After the Allegan crew had narrowed the count to 12-8, the Maroons scored three quick baskets, but failed to score in the last three and a half minutes of the period. At halftime Christian led 18-12.

Both clubs had their biggest scoring quarter, right after the intermission. Christian looked sharp as they threatened to make a runaway of the tilt for a few minutes. Some fine shooting by Hulst again and Visser upped the Maroon lead to 12 points on several occasions during the period. Aided by six out of seven foul tries, the Tigers narrowed the count a bit to 35-26 going into the final period.

Christian moved out to an 11 point, 39-28 lead almost immediately and then sputtered badly almost disastrously. 

Bussard Still Waits for Hills

CHICAGO (Special) — Ottawa County Prosecutor James W. Bussard today was notified by Chicago police that Thomas Hills, 28, of Chicago, wanted in Holland for burglary, has been sentenced to Joliet Prison on local charges for a term of 1 to 2 years.





Dutch Record 57-54 Win; Avenge Losses

MUSKEGON HEIGHTS (Special)—Holland High is on the way.

That was the word expressed here Friday night and the Muskegon Heights Tigers, who have had lots of experience with Class A state champions and rankings, would be the first to agree following Holland's 57-53 victory over the Tigers before 1,500 fans in Bolt gymnasium.

For the Dutch it was their fourth straight victory and it was achieved with the best performance this season. They were strong on the boards, did a good job of controlling play, hit from the floor and at the foul line and above all kept their poise in the final minutes.

It was the first time in five years Holland has defeated a Muskegon Heights team and to make the victory more sweet, it was accomplished on the Tiger court. Coach Bob Connell beamed as he congratulated his players and called the victory a "fine team effort." Holland displayed team balance throughout and will be heard from this year.

It was a thriller right down to the final horn and the game was up for grabs all the way. Holland held a 44-40 third quarter advantage and kept a two to four-point spread for a couple minutes before the Tigers narrowed the count to one point, 48-47 on two free shots by sophomore center Don Calloway.

Glenn Van Wieren then drilled two free shots and Jim Overbeek added an outcourt basket to put the Dutch five points up, 52-47. But Art Oliver, the biggest thorn for the Dutch, popped two quick baskets and it was one point again with 2:15 to go.

The Tigers were eager for the ball and fouled and Van Wieren stepped to the line and sank a pair and soon after Overbeek added another foul loss for another four-point spread. Gene Young hit a jump shot with 45 seconds to go to draw to two points but Ed Loncki added a layup in the closing seconds for the four-point final.

The Tigers, with Oliver leading the way with four baskets, led at the end of the first quarter, 13-10. But in the second quarter the Dutch took over.

Ron Maat made two baskets and Overbeek and Ted Walters a basket each and spurred to a 17-13 lead and a final push near the end of the half gave Holland a 34-27 halftime lead. Loncki whipped in four baskets in the second quarter and Walters had three to pace the 24-point quarter. Holland did its best shooting in this period with 10 of 16.

Floyd Cook led the third period Tiger rally and with 3:15 to go in the quarter, Muskegon tied the score 33-31. The teams exchanged baskets for another two minutes later before Loncki and Jack Hulst dropped baskets to give Holland the 44-40 lead.

The work of Van Wieren and Loncki on the boards was tops and they succeeded in getting most of

the rebounds off the Dutch board and many from the Tigers. Van Wieren played his best game to date and made six baskets and six free shots, including two baskets and four charity tosses in the fourth quarter for 18 points.

Loncki, who is improving every game and proved a rugged iron man all the way, followed with 12 while Walters popped 11.

Maat did a good job of ball handling, despite a cracked bone in his hand, and intercepted several passes. Oliver led the Tigers with 23 points while Cook followed with 15.

Holland made 22 of 56 shots for 38 per cent while the Tigers sank 22 of 60 for 36 per cent. The Dutch had quarters of 4-13; 10-16; 4-14 and 4-13 while the Heights had 5-16; 6-16; 5-15 and 6-13.

The Dutch proved the importance of the free shots with 13 makes in 21 tries while the Tigers sank nine in 18 attempts, including three misses on one-and-one situations in the fourth period.

Muskegon Heights now has a 1-2 record and the days of cage glory may be over. Calloway, 6'6" resembles Chester Walker of Benton Harbor fame, but still is awkward but may come. He must still develop a shot and get rougher on the boards.




The Dutch held the Tigers scoreless in the second quarter while picking up a nine-point lead and were in command the rest of the contest.
