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Cappon Builds Strong Club At Princeton

Franklin C. (Cappy) Cappon, basketball coach at Princeton University and former all-around athlete at Holland High School and the University of Michigan, is trying for his second straight Ivy League title this season.

Never before has a Princeton team won two straight league basketball crowns. Last season, Cappon's Tigers copped the Ivy League and are favorites to win again this season.

According to information sent to The Sentinel from Dr. F. F. (Fritz) Yonkman of Summit, N.J., a former outstanding athlete at Holland High and Hope College:

Cappon has four regulars back from last season's team.

In four games this season, Princeton has scored three victories. They stopped Temple, 74-6; Navy, 85-72 and Rutgers, 94-92. They lost to Villanova, 75-46 and will be playing in the Queen City tournament Dec. 31-Jan. 2.

Cappon feels his team is ahead of last year's at this juncture, largely because of the surplus of experienced hands, the Princeton Alumni Weekly states.

Capt. Don Swan plays one forward, and Andy Higgins is the other. Sophomore Art Hyland, who scored 29 against Rutgers, is one guard and Pete Campbell is the other while Al Kaemmerlen, 6'4", the team's tallest man, is the center.

Cappon is in his 28th year of coaching. He has won 335 games and dropped 235 for a .581 mark. Cappon coached at Michigan from 1931 to 1938 and then went to Princeton. He was named to the Helms College Basketball Hall of Fame in 1957.

Dr. Yonkman is vice president in charge of research at the CIBA Pharmaceutical Products, Inc., in Summit, N.J.

Furniture Field Notes Optimism

GRAND RAPIDS — The December furniture industry bulletin reported that at least half of the plants included in the wood furniture field survey may equal or better 1959 volume this year.

Increases in new orders and backlogs of unfilled orders last month accounted for the optimism.

The monthly wood household furniture report said new orders were 4 per cent better in November than those taken in October, which reversed a trend dating back to 1948. Also, for the first time in 14 years, the backlog of unfilled orders increased by 2 per cent in November.

However, in a comparison of November, 1960, with the same month a year ago, orders were down 11 per cent, shipments off 12 per cent, unfilled orders off 23 per cent and dollar pay rolls down 4 per cent.

The Chix had to battle from behind all the way, as they trailed 13-8 at the first quarter's end and 29-27 at the half. The Tigers retained a 49-45 edge in the third quarter but finally succumbed to Zolman's sharpshooting and the Zeeland fast break.

The lead changed hands several times throughout the game, and the clincher for Zeeland came at the free throw line. Zolman, Ron Visser and Dan Zuverink each stepped to the line in the closing minutes and calmly dumped in two points each.

Zeeland got a slow start in the game, playing the first quarter without the services of center John Roe. Roe twisted an ankle in the pre-game warmup, but joined his team in the second quarter and accounted for 12 points. Klinger also netted 12 for the Chix.

Pacing the Allegan attack was Watson with 15, followed by Harris with 12 and Iehl and Dullin with 11 each.

Zeeland's fortunes changed with a switch to the fast break at the beginning of the second half. With Klinger working the end of the fast break, the Chix jumped their field goal average from 39 per cent for the first half to 48 per cent in the second half. The Chix hit on 50 per cent in the final frame.

Allegan finished with a field goal average of 32 per cent, which was consistent throughout the game. Zeeland wound up with 16 of 30 free throws for 53 per cent, and the Tigers hit nine of 13 for 69 per cent.

Visser Hits 18; Christian Now Has 4-2 Mark

GRAND RAPIDS—Grand Rapids Christian used a tight defense and superb shooting here Tuesday night to stop Holland Christian's Maroons, 61-56 on the Civic auditorium court. The locals now have a 4-2 season mark, while the winning Eagles are 5-1.

A homecoming crowd of 4,300 fans saw a tight ball game throughout with the exception of three minutes in the first half when the winners scored nine straight points. The Hollanders never again gained control of the game, although the contest was evened up for the remaining minutes.

Coach Wes Vryhof's Eagles used a tight sagging defense on the Maroon forward wall in an effort to keep the scoring of the big boys up front at a minimum as well as clog up the cutting lanes. In addition the Grand Rapids club, paced by 6'4" Gary Spoelhof, 6'3" Tom Vander Woude and 6'4" Richard Duisternars more than held their own rebounding against the Hollanders.

The winners topped it off with a great 49 per cent shooting average. They hit halves of 13-31 and 13-22 for a total of 26 shots in 53 attempts. Coach Art Tuls' Maroons meanwhile didn't fare nearly as well as they had halves of 9-29 and 11-33 for an overall 20 out of 62 or a 32 per cent mark.

Prosecutor Processes 147 Cases

GRAND HAVEN — James W. Bussard, prosecuting attorney for Ottawa county, today submitted his annual report for 1960 through Dec. 22.

The prosecutor arraigned 167 respondents in the Ottawa Circuit Court, 122 of whom pleaded guilty and 45 entered plea of not guilty. This figure compares with a total of 132 during 1959, 110 of whom pleaded guilty and 22 not guilty.

Bussard also appeared in Circuit Court in 15 cases involving restoration of drivers' licenses. This compares with eight cases in 1959.

He represented the attorney general's office in 147 cases where applications were made to the Appeal Board of the Secretary of State's office for driving privileges. In 1959 there were 60 applications.

One psychiatric hearing was held in the Ottawa Circuit Court to determine the subject was a criminal sexual psychopathic person. He was committed to an institution.

The prosecutor tried 17 jury cases, 13 of which resulted in guilty verdicts, three found not guilty, and in one case the jury failed to agree. In the latter case, a negligent homicide charge, the case was re-tried and the jury found the respondent guilty.

Orders for nolle prosequi were entered in five criminal cases, compared with six in 1959.

Two fathers were brought into Circuit Court under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act, to show cause why they should not support their children, who reside with their mothers in different states. One was ordered to pay \$28 a week for his three children and the other \$15 a week for his two children.

The prosecutor also tried one jury case in Circuit Court involving custody of minor children. As a result, the jury awarded custody of the three small children to the Ottawa Probate Court for one year.

In addition to the Circuit Court cases, the Prosecutor conducted 12 preliminary examinations, and ten trials, in the Grand Haven Municipal Court. Five of the trials were before a jury and five were heard by the Court, without a jury. With the exception of one, all the respondents were convicted. The one subject, found not guilty by the court, without a jury, was charged with drunk driving.

In the Holland Municipal Court the Prosecutor conducted 16 preliminary examinations; one jury trial and eight non-jury trials.

The Prosecuting Attorney already has ten subjects scheduled for arraignment in Circuit Court in January, seven to appear on January 5 and three on January 9, the opening day of the January term of the Ottawa Circuit Court.

Of the 147 cases processed, 33 were breaking and entering, 26 on morals, nine check cases, four adultery, four assault, four concealed weapons, 20 larceny, nine nonsupport, five drunk driving, 7 under motor vehicle laws, three forgeries, four malicious destruction of property, three officer impersonations, and one each of concealing stolen merchandise, embezzlement, false pretenses, fraud, inferior grade of meat, mortgage disposition, narcotics, negligent homicide and resisting an officer.

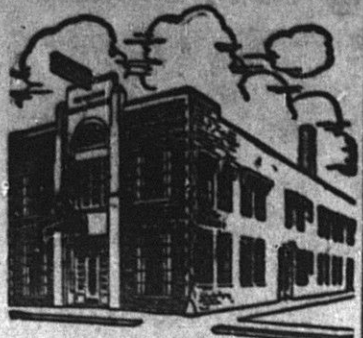

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, January 1
The Gospel of the Son of God
John 1:1-14; 20:30-31
By C. P. Dame

May you have a most blessed New Year. During the first quarter of this new year we will study the gospel according to John, the son of Zebedee, one of the twelve apostles, and a member of the inner circle of three. John never mentions himself in his gospel but he speaks of himself as "the disciple whom Jesus loved." John wrote not only a gospel but also three epistles and Revelation. His gospel differs from the other three. His purpose in writing is stated in 20:31, in the words, "that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through His name." In the gospel John summons witness after witness to testify to the deity of Jesus. John's gospel was written later than the other three gospels. Most scholars believe it was written towards the close of the first century.

I. Christ came in order to reveal God. The words, "In the beginning" remind us of the first verse of Genesis. In the first verse of John there is one word that is used three times—the Word. Jesus is indeed the Word of God. We reveal ourselves through our words—they tell about our hopes, ambitions, aims, dreams, wills and ideas. We communicate with others through our words. So likewise God makes Himself known through Jesus Christ and tells us about Himself and His will for us. John mentions a number of things about Jesus. He says that He is pre-existent, or eternal which means that He is God. Jesus did the works of God in creating this universe. Our Lord is the source of all life—both the natural and the spiritual and He also maintains. John also informs us that Jesus is the source of all moral and spiritual light. Through the light which Jesus gives, people can distinguish what is true and what is false.

II. God sent John the Baptist. "There was a man sent from God." What a man sent from God? All four gospels tell about John the Baptist, the forerunner of Jesus. God sent him "to bear witness of the Light," that is of Jesus. It was the mission of John to prepare the people for the coming of Jesus. The gospel says that "John was not that Light" but he was sent to bear witness of the Light. John the Baptist is the first of a number of people whom the writer summons to witness. Every Christian has the job of witnessing. The words, "which lighted every man that cometh into the world" may refer to Christ or to every man. John tells us in these words that the Light, namely Jesus, was at that time coming into the world.

III. Jesus was not welcomed by all. Although Jesus came into this world to bring life to all wanted the kind of life Jesus offers. Jesus came into this world which He had made but the world knew Him not. Even His own people rejected Him for they too received Him not. However there were some, not many, who welcomed Him, and "to them gave He power to become the sons of God." We become children of God in the spiritual sense through the second birth. Neither heredity, nor environment, nor personal effort explain the Christian.

The Word became flesh—God became man—in order that He might atone for man's sin. The disciples saw the Lord's glory. Sacrifice and humiliation constitute divine glory and that is why we say that the cross of shame became the throne of glory. Jesus rules from a cross.

Ottawa County Farm News

Just a reminder of the Michigan State University Annual Farmers' week program to be held the first week in February beginning on Feb. 1 and running through Feb. 5. Programs designed to meet the needs of all Michigan farmers have been outlined by all departments at MSU. We feel this is an outstanding event and that all farmers in the state should spend a day or two on campus to see these new developments.

The annual Michigan DHIA report giving the number of cows and herds tested in the state has just been released. Ottawa County is presently testing 2,357 cows on two programs, the DHIA and Owner Sampler. This constitutes 13.5 per cent of the total number of cows in the county. There are counties in the state in which the total number, percentage wise, are considerably higher.

One of our neighboring counties, Barry, has a total of 3,334 cows on test making 27.9 per cent. The number of counties on 20 per cent bases are Berrien, Eaton, Lenewee, St. Joseph and Washtenaw. We are sure there are many more cows in this county that should be on test.

Another note — regarding milk production on farms in the U. S. For the first 31 states for which reports have been released there was a total of 760,000 farms from which milk or cream was sold during 1959 in contrast to 1,090,000 farms in 1954 — a reduction of about 30 per cent, or 6 per cent per year.

From 1949 to 1954 the reduction was nearly 25 per cent or 5 per cent per year. The increase in volume of milk marketed per farm is indicated by the fact that, from 1949 to 1959 the total sales of milk increased 15 per cent, with just a little over half as many farms selling milk as in the earlier year.

Milk production for 1960 as a whole will total about 125.5 billion pounds, about 1 billion pounds more than a year earlier compared with the previous record of 125.9 billion set in 1957. Census data has not been released at this time for Michigan, but from some of the county information received, it would indicate that reduction in dairy farm and cow numbers might be greater than the national figures with the state as a whole being somewhat similar.

A reminder on the Beef Short Course mentioned in last week's column. This course, which will be held at Kalamazoo, will start on Jan. 3, on the following dates — Jan. 3, 10, 17 and Feb. 7 and 14. I have received one application for this course and would like to have more — at least a carload of men to go. This will be a real good informational course covering feeding, management and housing of beef cattle.

I have been asked to mention something on the neighboring outbreak of hog cholera. Cases of hog cholera have been found in two neighboring counties however, the epidemic is not widespread at the present time. We are suggesting that hog raisers be real careful that no infection is brought into their herds either through purchased animals or carried in by foot or car or some other way.

We would also suggest that if you are in doubt as to whether you should vaccinate, to whether you should use local veterinarian. Promiscuous use of vaccine by unskilled handlers can be dangerous. I'm sure this epidemic can run its course in time if adequate precautions are used.

GRAND RAPIDS — After four straight victories, Holland High's basketball team tumbled from the unbeaten ranks here Friday night as Grand Rapids South whipped the Dutch, 71-53 before 785 paid fans in the Burton Junior High gym.

Defensive rebounding in the second half coupled with some excellent free throw shooting made the difference in the contest which had been a close contest throughout the first half.

The Trojans made 17 of 21 free shots in the second half, including 10 of 13 by 6'2" junior Bill Curtis. He was the best player the Dutch have faced this season and his defensive rebounding prevented Holland from getting shots.

Buurma was consistent on his jump shots and pounded seven baskets and three free shots for 17 points. Jim De Vries had 13. Owens followed Curtis with 10. South now has a 3-1 record.

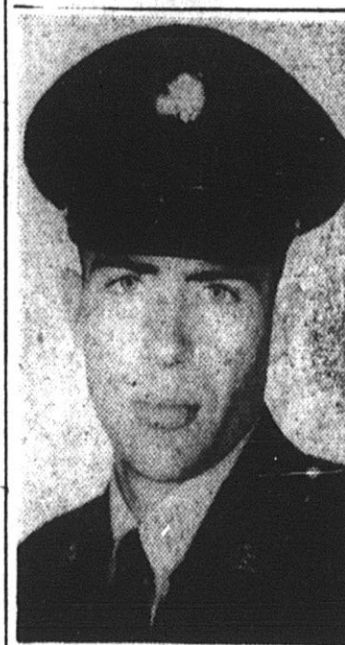

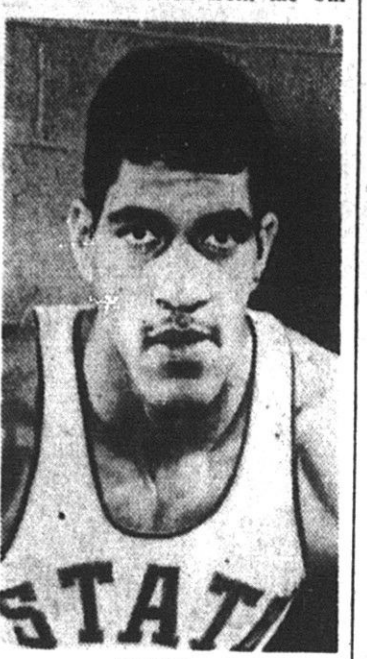
Gowens Bows Out as Oiler Monday Night

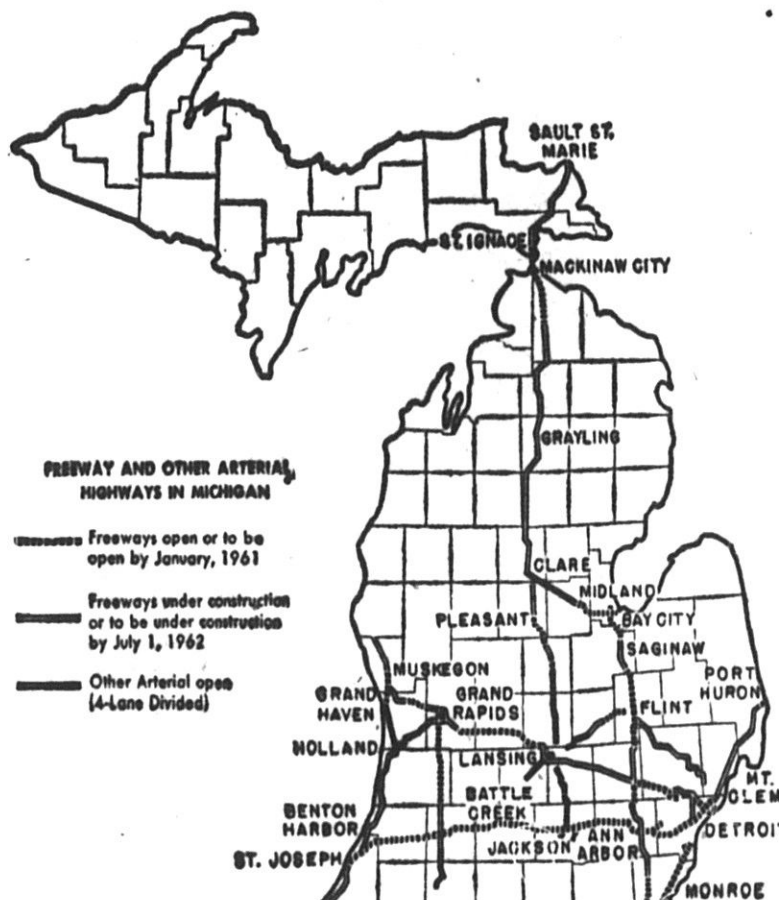

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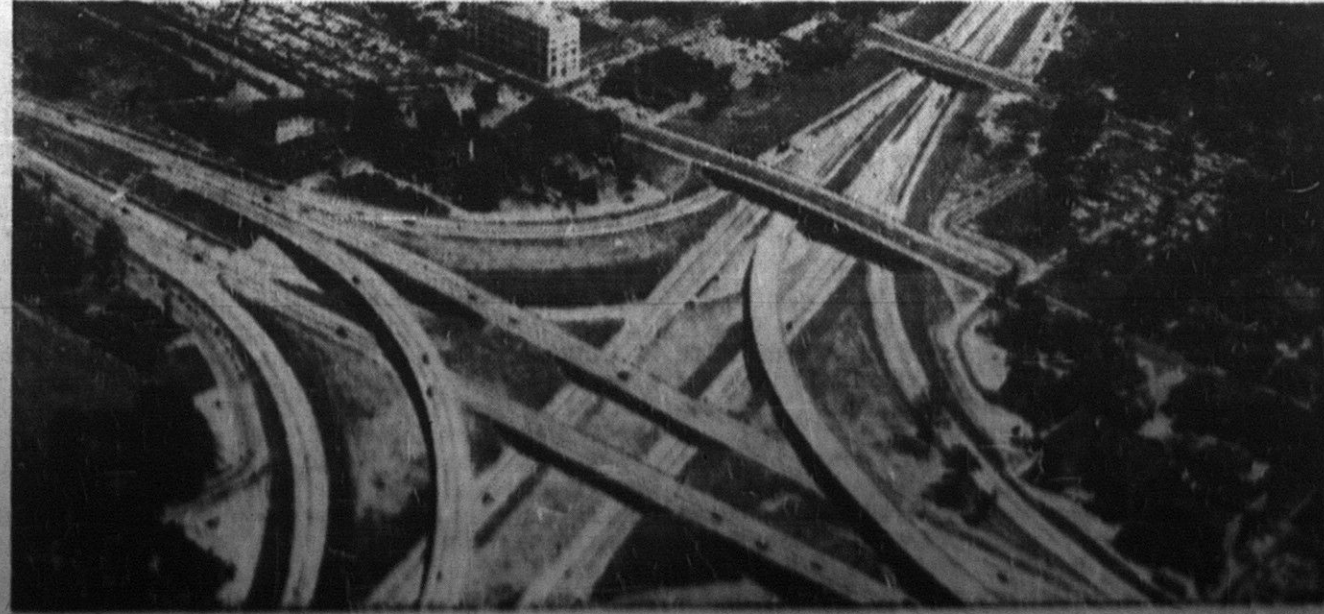
