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Winter Arrives Here Officially

Winter officially arrived at 1:35 a.m. Tuesday, but that was of little comfort to those already fed up with icy blasts, cars stuck in snow and more pre-season shoveling than usual.

Another inch of snow which fell overnight brightened some old deposits, and the total on the ground today was 5½ inches.

Driver Listed Serious After 2-Car Crash

Peter Vermeulen, 63, of 1296 Graafschap Rd., injured in a two-car collision Saturday north of Saugatuck, was listed in serious condition Monday at Holland Hospital's intensive care unit with a fractured pelvis, broken ribs and possible internal injuries.

Allegan county sheriff's deputies said the Vermeulen car and one operated by Paula Martinez, 19, of route 3, Fennville, collided along the Blue Star Highway at the I-196 interchange north of Saugatuck Saturday at 6:50 p.m.

Eight of 11 persons riding in the Martinez auto were treated for minor injuries, Vermeulen was taken first to Douglas Community Hospital and then transferred to Holland Hospital.

Deputies said Vermeulen was entering Blue Star Highway from the I-196 exit ramp while the Martinez car was westbound on Blue Star. The Martinez car skidded 48 feet before colliding with the Vermeulen auto and then continued over a snowbank where it came to rest.

The mishap remained under investigation.

Deputies said those riding in the Martinez car ranged in age from 11 months to 43 years. All were from route 3, Fennville.

Hits Car Ahead

A car driven by William Roltsch, 35, of 172 Glendale, struck the rear of a car ahead driven by Robert D. Waste Plant Bids Rejected In Muskegon

MUSKEGON — Dismayed county officials rejected two bids Tuesday for the construction of the area's waste water treatment project and said work on the project would be set back three to six months.

Two bids received for the estimated \$15 million engineering work on the project were termed "way out of the ball park" by county officials.

Lowest bid was for \$38,260, 584 from Halloway Construction Co. of Wixom. The other was for \$54,996,443 from Morrison - Knudsen Co. of Darien, Conn. The county's Department of Public Works committee met in executive session for 30 minutes and rejected both bids.

County Board Chairman F. Charles Raap estimated construction would be set back several months. Construction was originally slated to begin Dec. 31. Dr. William Bauer of Bauer Engineering said a breaking up of the jobs in a different way would be considered so that smaller construction firms would participate in bids.

It is expected county engineers will redraft the engineering specifications.

County Administrator Ray S. Wells said the next step would be a meeting with the Michigan Water Resources Commission to retine the schedule of the project. Officials also plan meetings with the two bidders on disparity of bids.

3 Charged In Beating Of Deputy

ALLEGAN — Three young Allegan men were arraigned Monday in Circuit Court here on charges of assault with intent to do great bodily harm in connection with the beating of an Allegan County Sheriff's Department deputy earlier this month.

The three—Gordon Green, 24, Russell Well, 21, and his brother, David, 27,—stood mute and a plea of not guilty was entered on their behalf. The \$1,000 cash bond which was ordered when they were charged Dec. 15 was continued, but no trial date was set.

They were arrested Dec. 4 after they allegedly attacked Deputy Steve Myers, 27, when he and auxiliary deputy Robert Weaver had gone to a rural home to check on the possibility of a runaway juvenile being there.

While Weaver was chasing a fleeing man, the three allegedly attacked Myers. Police said the attack was halted when Weaver returned and drew his revolver.

Myers was treated at the Allegan Health Center for bruises on the face, neck, arms and legs. He said he was kicked, beaten and struck with bottles.

The three had been charged with assault with intent to commit murder, but that charge was reduced Dec. 15 when they appeared before District Judge Elizabeth Ramsey.

Chix Down Icy Shooting West Ottawa

Zeeland's Chix had the firepower.

West Ottawa's basketball team was colder than yesterday's potatoes.

That was about it as the Chix rolled to a 77-48 triumph here Tuesday night in the Panthers' gym before a large crowd.

Zeeland shot a respectable 39 per cent in the first half while the Panthers were able to only hit an icy 27 per cent of their shots.

West Ottawa managed to finish the evening with 15 field goals on 49 attempts for a cool 31 per cent average. Zeeland netted 27 of 68 shots for 40 per cent.

The Panthers took their only lead of the contest on the very first shot of the game by forward Denny Oosterbaan, 2-0.

Behind the scoring of Terry Hop, John Beyer and Dennis Schepel and the playmaking of Jef Flaherty, the Chix took complete command of the situation, as they took an 18-10 first period margin.

Eighteen was the magic number once again for the Chix in the second stanza while the Panthers hit only two field goals and six free throws for 10 points, as Zeeland increased its lead to 36-20 at the half.

The quick moving Hop led all scorers at the half with 12 counters while center Jim Bagladi of West Ottawa drilled in seven of 10 free throws to lead his team with seven points.

Zeeland's aggressive defense forced the Panthers into 20 turnovers while West Ottawa could only get the Chix to commit 13 miscues and only one in the entire third quarter.

Reserve Rene Rios swished a 40-foot shot at the end of the third period buzzer to give the Chix a commanding 54-35 advantage.

Even though the Panthers were way behind on the scoreboard, their fans never gave up, as they cheered like mad after each basket.

With the reserves playing most of the final quarter for both teams, Zeeland continued to pile up the points as they netted 23 counters to only 13 for the Panthers to take a 77-48 decision.

Zeeland outbounded the taller Panthers, 47-29, as center Schepel enjoyed one of his finer games on the boards for the Chix.

"They just wanted it more than us," said a disappointed Coach Joe Lauch of West Ottawa. "I hate to think of playing Holland in our next game."

The loss was the fifth of the season for West Ottawa in six games while the Chix are 3-3 overall.

Hop led both teams in scoring with 15 markers while Schepel followed with 12 and Beyer added 10 for Zeeland, as 11 of the 12 players that played for the Chix scored.

Bagladi paced the Panthers with 11 counters while forward Mike Gorman chipped in with 10.

Zeeland's fine reserve team ran its record to 5-1 by stopping the Panthers, 69-62 in the pre-lim contest.

The Panthers rallied in the second half, as they outscored the winners, 41-35 but the huge deficit was too much for West Ottawa to overcome.

Steve Bassett led the scoring parade for both teams with 24 points while teammate Kurt Bennett added 13. Craig Klompars, Doug Vork, Fred Guss,

Firemen Rescue Woman Found On Apartment Floor

Holland firemen rescued a woman found unconscious on the floor of her smoke filled apartment Wednesday and put out a smoldering fire in a sofa.

Mrs. Mary Rowan, 56, of 375 Central Ave., was admitted to Holland Hospital where her condition was listed as good. She was suffering from smoke inhalation.

Firemen said fire damage was confined to the sofa in the ground floor apartment at the rear of the building. Occupants of the front apartment were away at the time and tenants upstairs were evacuated without incident.

Firemen said the upstairs tenants smelled smoke and called the building owner, David Webster, of West Olive. Webster notified firemen.

Fire officials said damage to the sofa was estimated at \$100 and added there was some smoke damage to the interior of the apartment. Firemen believe a cigarette may have caused the fire.

Mrs. Rowan was found on the floor near the sofa and carried outside where she was revived and then taken to the hospital, firemen said.

A ready mix cement truck, carrying a load of cement, overturned in a ditch and a semi-trailer truck jackknifed in a mishap at 10:02 a.m. Wednesday along James St., four-tenths of a mile west of U.S.-31. No injuries were reported.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies said the empty semi-trailer truck, eastbound on James and driven by Billy Underwood, 46, of 565 Lake Dr., jackknifed on icy pavement while slowing for a vehicle ahead.

The cement truck, driven by Carl Bunce, 44, of 40 West 23rd St., and coming from the opposite direction, veered to the right side to avoid the semi-truck. The trucks did not collide, deputies said.

The cab of the semi-truck and the cement truck came to rest in the ditch along the north side of James St. where the cement truck overturned.

The truck trailer came to rest in the ditch about one hour.

Bethany and Maranatha Churches Hit

Safes Chisled Open In Similar Manner; Recall 1964 Thefts

Thieves broke into stand up safes in two churches about five blocks from each other along south Central Ave. Sunday night or early Monday and fled with about \$500 in cash and checks from one church, Holland police detectives said.

Police said safes at the Maranatha Christian Reformed Church, 918 Central Ave., and Bethany Christian Reformed Church, 11 East 32nd St., were opened by similar methods.

It was six years to the day, Dec. 21, 1964 — that thieves broke into safes in eight area churches and fled with an estimated \$4,500 to \$5,000. Bethany church was entered then but not Maranatha.

Detectives said in each of the safecracking under study Monday the safes were chisled open. They believed the same person or persons were responsible in both churches.

Detectives said nothing appeared missing from the safe at the Maranatha church where the safe was located in the consistory room adjoining the pastor's office.

The Rev. Gerald Postma said a filing cabinet in the office was ransacked and that two flashlights were missing from the church auditorium. He said collection from the evening service had been deposited in the bank.

At the Bethany church, thieves ransacked the offices and library taking money from the opened safe and drawers and cabinets in the other rooms. Some of the missing money and checks represented collections from the evening service.

Detectives said no tools believed used in the safe jobs were found.

GVSC Plans To Open 3rd College

ALLENDALE — The Grand Valley State College Board of Control met Tuesday on campus and accepted a College III Planning Task Force report directing the administration to proceed with plans toward the opening of William James College in fall, 1971.

Named to honor the great 19th century American psychologist, philosopher and educator, the third college will join GVSC's present College of Arts and Sciences and Thomas Jefferson College of General Studies.

Tentative plans for the new college include a synoptic program for all students, consisting of lecture series by distinguished visiting professionals, augmented by faculty - led discussions; transdisciplinary thematic courses; specialized courses and elected concentration programs. Administrative guidance for further development of the college programs will be led by Arthur C. Hills, dean of administration and acting academic dean.

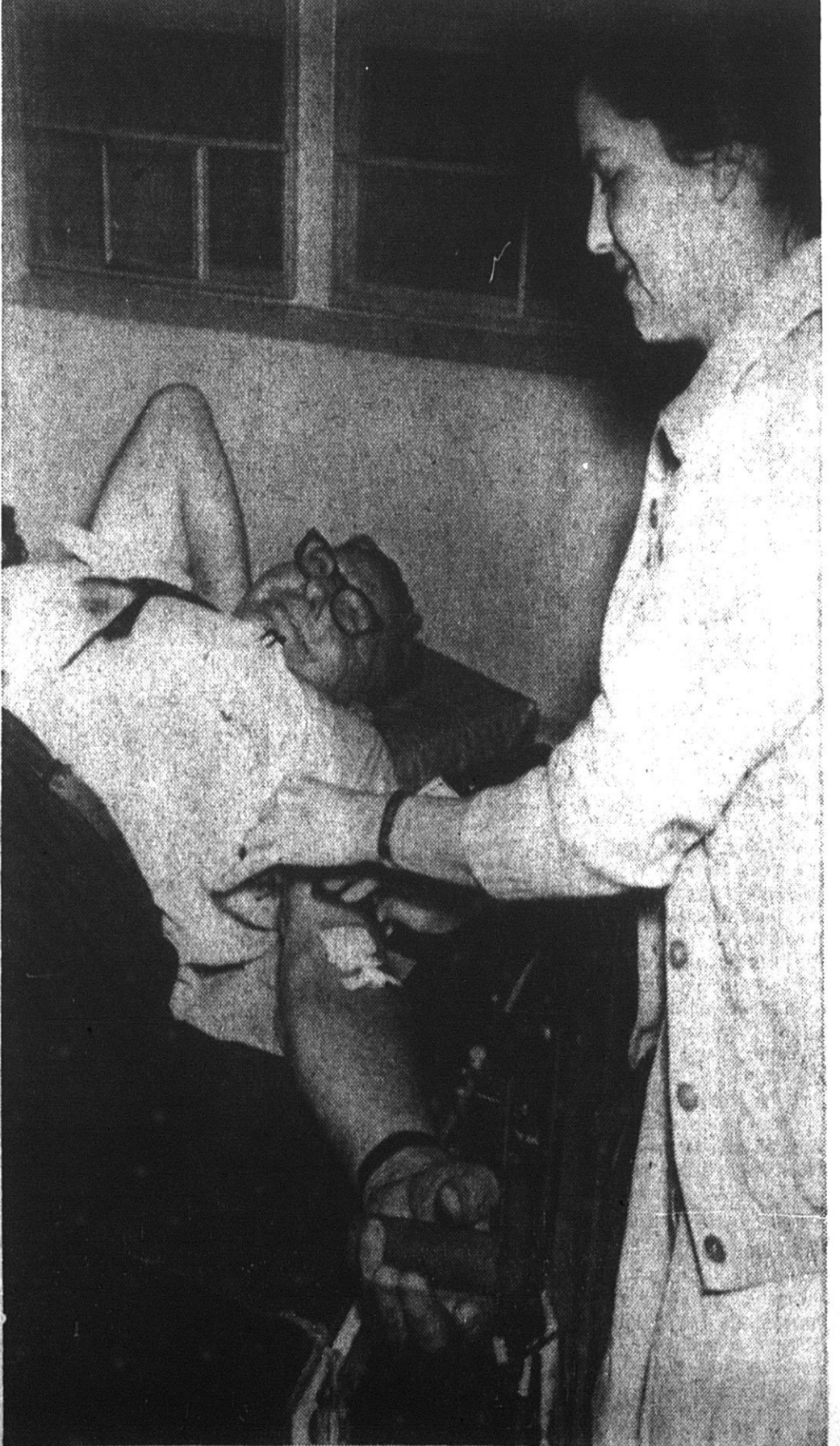

The late Mrs. Kistler of Grand Haven became one of the original members of the Board of Control in 1960 and remained a staunch supporter of the college until her death in November, 1967.

Terrill Wins In Recount

GRAND HAVEN — A recount of the vote Nov. 3 for district 2 Ottawa county commissioner from Grand Haven failed to change the totals and R. V. Terrill, who has been commissioner two years, has been declared the winner over Democrat Terrance McFadden, Grand Haven.

A recount by the county board of canvassers Wednesday showed that the tally in the absentee vote counting board, where the recount request was made, showed the total was correct, 62 for Terrill and 26 for McFadden.

The total in the district, precincts 4 to 7, in the city, still remains, 1,113 for Terrill and 1,100 for McFadden, a margin of only 13 votes.

Wayland Sewer System Program Gets Setback

ALLEGAN — Reacting to protest from Wayland city and Leighton township residents, the Allegan County Board of Commissioners by a 10-8 vote has rejected an amendment to a BPW contract with Wayland which would have provided for a half million dollar increase in the cost of a sewer system project.

Actual effect of the action probably will not be known until the Board of Public Works receives a legal opinion from Prosecutor George A. Greig, but Harry Beach, Otsego commissioner and chairman of the county BPW, believes the action did not nullify a contract approved last April 9 but that it denies the city of Wayland about \$200,000 in additional state and federal funds. Beach is an attorney.

Last April 9, the county board approved a contract with Wayland pledging the county's full faith and credit for a \$1.2 million bond issue to cover the city's share of a project estimated at \$1.62 million. But low bids Dec. 3 totaled \$2.11 million, an increase of nearly a half million over original estimates. Wayland City Council voted 6-1 Monday to increase the bond issue and this amendment was approved by the County BPW Tuesday, also by a 6-1 vote.

That afternoon when it came before the county board, the room was jammed with Wayland and Leighton township residents objecting to the project.

James Koster of Wayland, spokesman for the opposing group, said the proposal was twice defeated in elections and that with increased school taxes the project threatens to raise the city's total tax levy to 52 mills or more.

Theodore Dunn, Grand Rapids attorney who was retained by Leighton opponents, said the township would initiate legal action to stop construction in Leighton township were lagoons of the proposed sewage system would be located.

County Okays \$3 Million 1971 Budget

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa County Board of Commissioners adjourned their December meeting Tuesday and will meet again Jan. 11, after approving a proposed budget of \$3,242,949 for 1971 general operations.

The tax rate for county operations was approved at 4.5 mills, the same as this year's rate. The budget is not final as the employees and officers committee is still negotiating with three groups among the workers, the sheriff's deputies, the office workers and the nurses.

Commissioners voted to add \$2,000 each to the salaries of the three district judges in the county. Each is paid \$18,000 by the state so in 1971 they will be paid \$20,000.

The salary of the probate judge was also increased to \$20,000.

Women Voters Hear E. Goebel On Pollution

Edward E. Goebel, of Waukazoo, was the speaker at the general meeting of the League of Women Voters, Monday afternoon. Mrs. William Winter, chairman of the Environmental Quality Committee, introduced Mr. Goebel.

Mr. Goebel, startled and enlightened the membership with some pertinent statistics and facts concerning air and water pollution. He told how he had become involved in the subject of pollution.

As a plant manager for General Motors in Ohio, he had been called upon to solve a pollution problem that someone was complaining about. He did solve the problem for that plant and was then called on to solve others.

He was invited to join the foundation in Ann Arbor known as "The Fresh Water Society" and is its associate director. He said when he went to the University he found that the young people were so knowledgeable about the subject of pollution that he had to go back to school just to be able to talk to them.

He said we must begin to think positively about the subject. He quoted several different opinions by experts from Cornell and other universities. He believes the problem must be attacked by lay groups. The greatest problem now is the economic barrier. He pointed out that this is the finest field for young people, to use their creative abilities.

Mr. Goebel took up several areas of pollution; the Great Lakes, the Mississippi River and the ocean, and the air we breathe. He told how Lake Superior is fast becoming very bad, and will be hard to correct. Lake Erie will become so bad it will be just a ship channel, but then they can go in and pump and clear it out and restore it.

The Mississippi is so polluted they have to move everything back from its banks, the touch of its waters is poison. It is in turn polluting the ocean near the Delta, where a manufacturing plant dumps into the ocean, "for there is no one below to complain," as Mr. Goebel said, no one but the plankton, which are being killed off. We depend on the plankton for a great deal of the oxygen we breathe, which shows the cycle of air and water pollution.

In Mr. Goebel's opinion the cost will be enormous, and the first and biggest problem is population. Some of the cost may be in sacrifice, 60 percent of the oxygen used is for internal combustion engines. "We will just have to stop us-

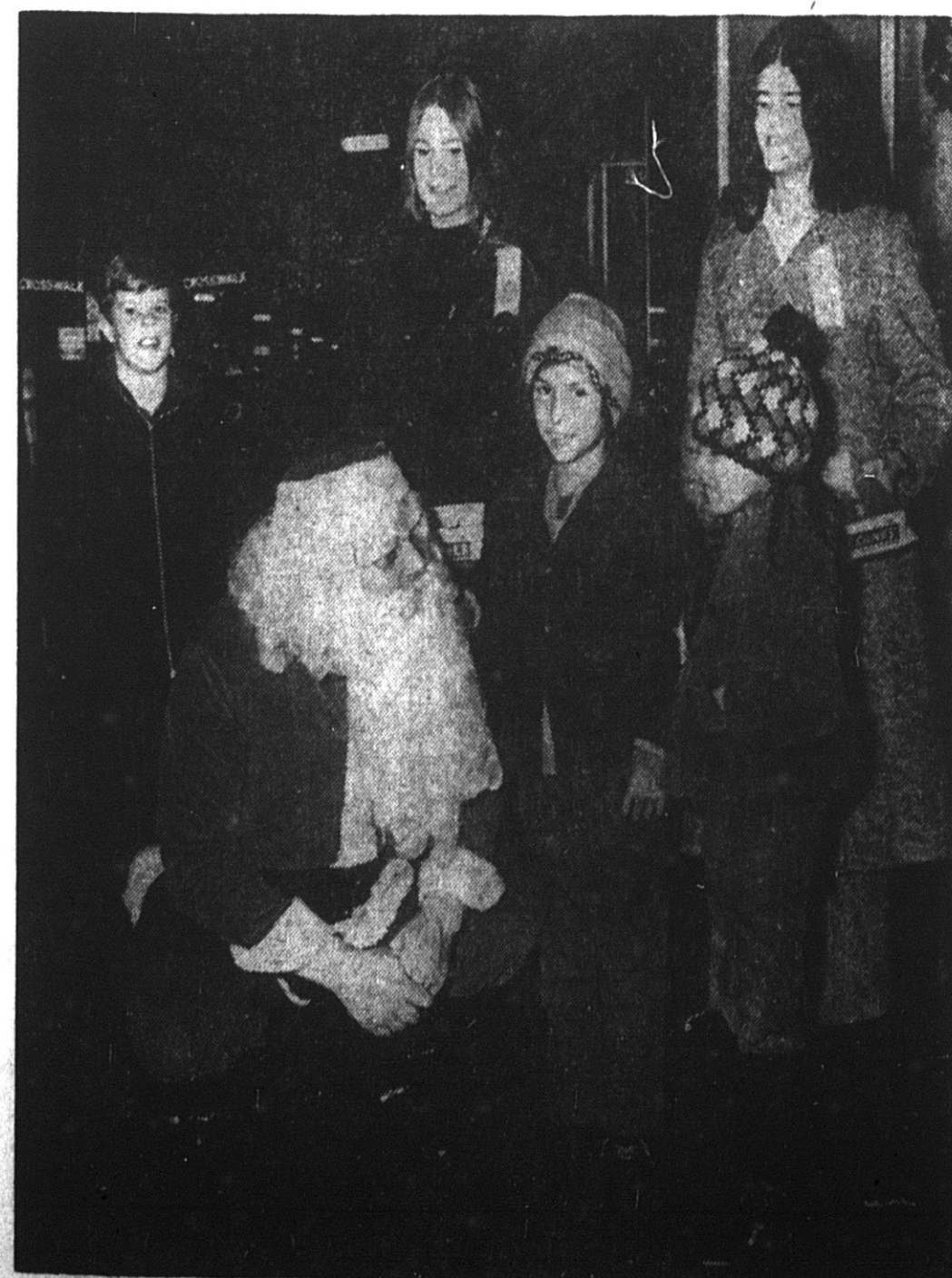

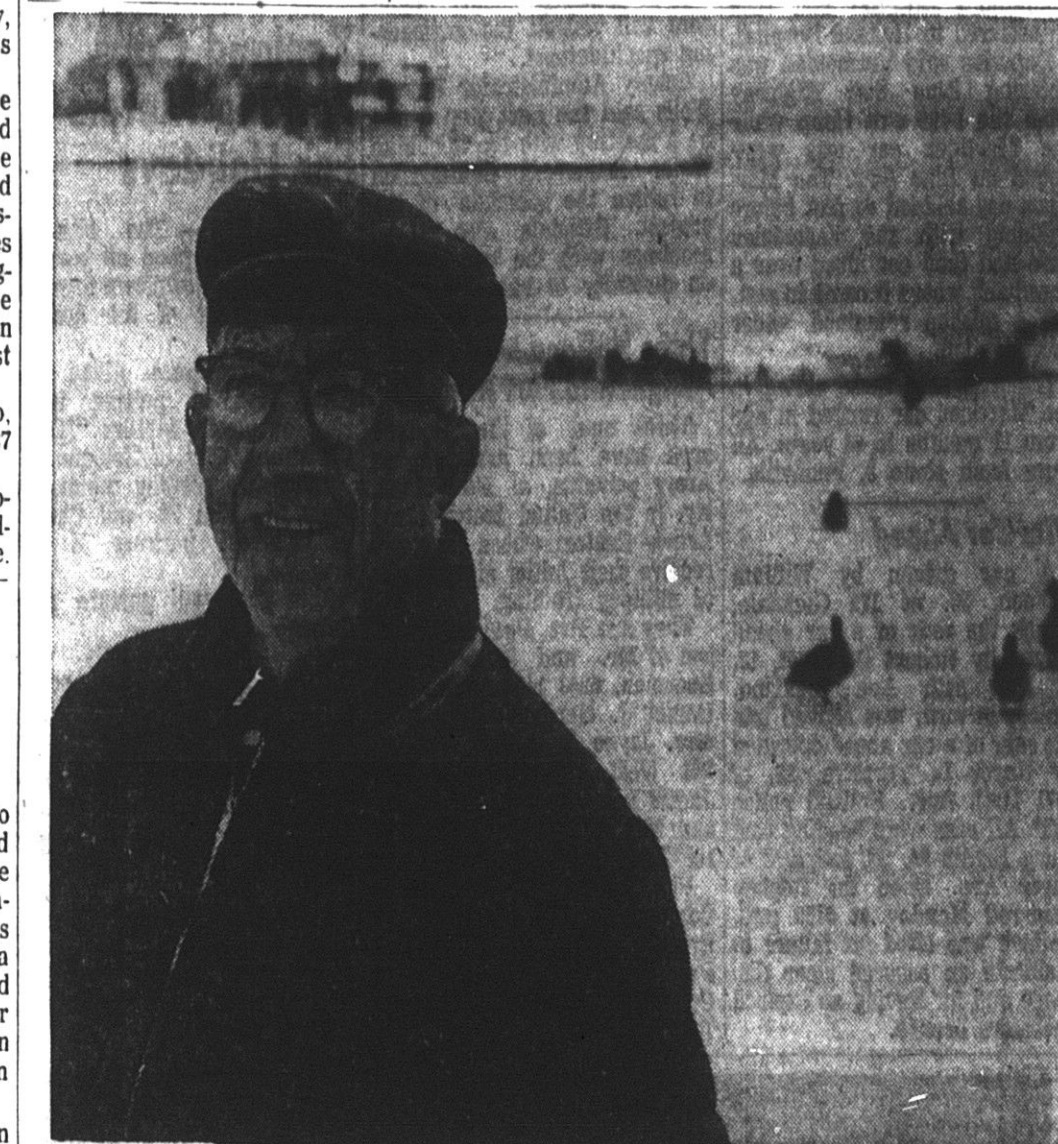

As a woman and her companion were leaving the plane that had just whizzed them across the nation, they talked of the food service on this non-dinner flight. "Why," said the woman with some indignation, "I wouldn't even call that a snack!"

The question that comes to mind is this: Why should even so much as a skimpy snack be provided "on the house" by an airline? Its business, after all, is that of transporting people swiftly and in reasonable comfort from place to place. Why food?

That may be a spoilsport question. It is asked seriously, though. If the airlines could just get over this notion that some gestures of hospitality must be made, perhaps they would settle down to the task of providing fast transportation at the lowest possible cost for those who want it without frills.

Drowning Ruled In Death Of West Olive Man

WEST OLIVE — Accidental drowning was ruled following an investigation into the death of Willis E. Kueken, 59, who was found in a drainage cistern by his 17-year-old son James, at 4:15 p.m. Saturday at the Kueken home at 12099 Buchanan St.

The autopsy also revealed Kueken may have suffered a seizure before falling head first into the four-foot drainage cistern. He was pronounced dead on the scene by Dr. Robert Gamble, Ottawa county medical examiner who ordered the autopsy.

Following the autopsy, Sgt. Jack Rosema of the Ottawa county sheriff's department, returned to the scene and discovered that the muffler on the under part of the tractor Kueken was using to plow snow was defective. The muffler had been wired together and rusted, and it was believed the victim had become groggy from fumes.

Kueken was born in Grand Haven township Oct. 13, 1912, and married Stella Zintex in 1952. He was a member of Immanuel Lutheran Church of Agnew and was employed by the Zelenka Nursery.

Surviving besides the wife and son are his mother, Mrs. Annie Kueken of West Olive; two sisters, Mrs. Richmond Reiley of College Park, Md., and Mrs. Marvin Behrens of Hudsonville.

Two Injured In Three-Car Crash

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 27
All of Life for Christ
Philippians 3: 7-16
By C. P. Dame

On the last Sunday of the year we will study the aim the apostle Paul had for himself. If we resolve on this last Sunday to make our aim for 1971 like to that which Paul had, and then strive for it throughout the year we will use the year wisely. Paul's aim was to know Jesus Christ more and serve Him better. Is this yours?

I, Christ is worth suffering for. Paul wrote his letter to the church in Philippi, which he loved much, while he was in jail. The church had sent him a gift which he appreciated a lot and he sent a letter expressing his thanks. In this letter Paul says some things about himself, his inner life, his devotion to Christ and his passion to know Him better. A reading of the text reveals the use of the personal pronoun "I" rather freely and the words "Him" and "His" also, both referring to Christ.

"But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ." Paul's conversion had made changes in his life, the prizes and honors he once rated didn't count at all any more, they became worthless in his opinion. If Christ is central in a person's life then all the worldly honors and prizes will fall in their proper places. Anything that keeps a person from Christ is worthless.

II. To know Christ is of supreme value. In verse 9 Paul makes a comparison between two kinds of righteousness. The one is of man; it is that of the law of God, which if a person kept wholly and perfectly would make him right in God's sight. The other is the righteousness of God, which we gain by faith in the redemptive work of Christ. Paul wanted to know Christ personally and the power of His resurrection by which Christ overcame death and the grave. A believer can share in that power and in the suffering of Christ by yielding himself wholly to Him.

III. Christian living calls for constant striving. A growing Christian knows his shortcomings and he is dissatisfied with them. Paul set a fine example for all of us. He believed in concentration — "but this one thing I do." He also stressed "elimination" as the words, "forgetting those things which are behind" reveal. Sometimes it is hard to forget the past, both failures and successes. Expectancy also played a role in Paul's life. Note the words, "and reaching forth unto those things which are before."

Activity marked Paul's life. "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." The prizes won by the athletes faded soon but the prize Paul strove for was durable. It is the heavenly life with the redeemed—that is the prize. Are you looking forward to that prize?

Zeeland Bans Snowmobile Use on Roads

ZEELAND — City Council Monday night took action to severely limit use of snowmobiles with the city limits.

By unanimous action adopted an emergency ordinance outlawing use of snowmobiles on city streets, roads or public rights of way. The ordinance becomes effective Thursday.

The ordinance, which had been under discussion in recent weeks, requires written permission from property owners to use private property by snowmobiles.

City Clerk Leon Van Harn said the ordinance, unlike state codes, prohibits snowmobiles from crossing public streets while operating between land areas.

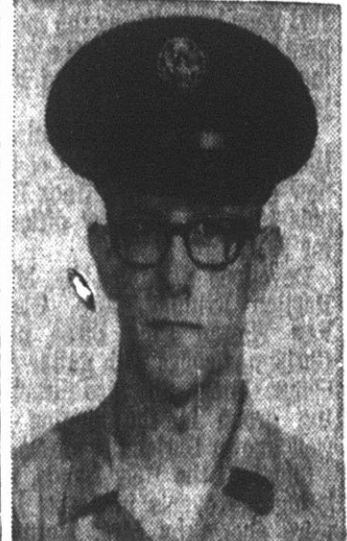
Council also adopted an ordinance licensing and regulating public gatherings of 1,000 persons or more. It is patterned after guidelines suggested by Gov. William Milliken in the wake of rock festivals.

Council decided to temporarily halt attempts to fill the vacancy created by the Sept. 30 death of Cal Faber, whose term expires in April. Van Harn said the decision was made in face of the closeness of the April elections and pending legislation which could move municipal elections to November.

Council reported on results of a survey of residents below the hospital west of State St. along M-21 concerning extension of sanitary sewers. The area recently was annexed to the city.

Of the 124 questionnaires sent out, 96 were returned and the result was three-to-one against the proposed sewer extensions.

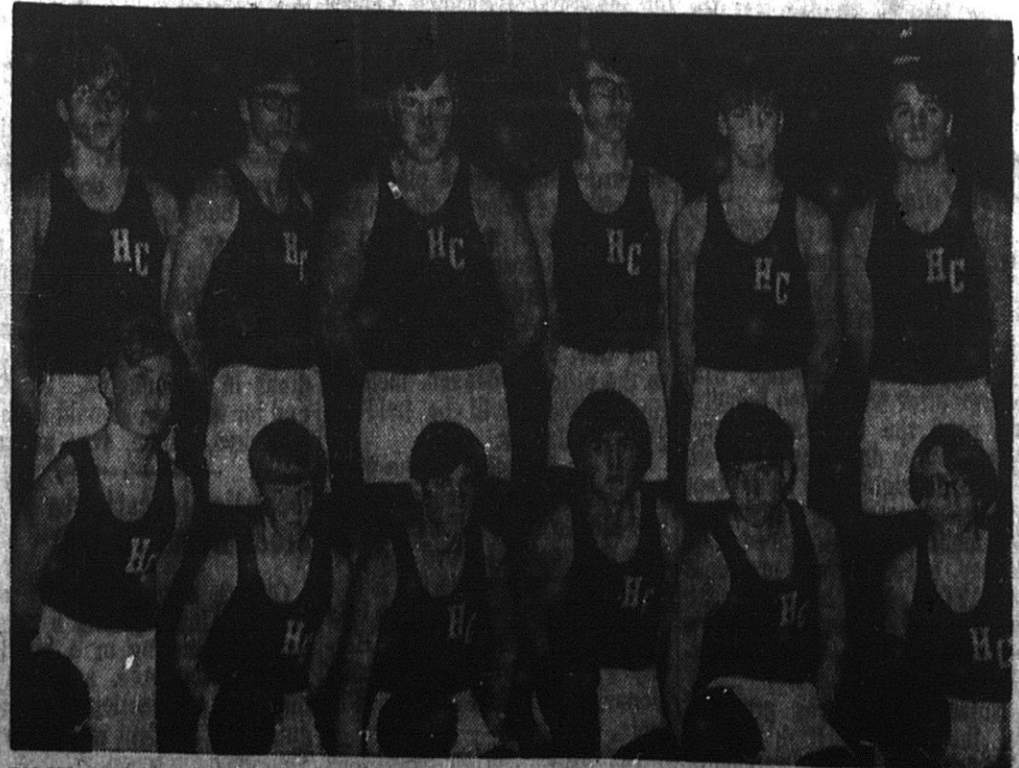

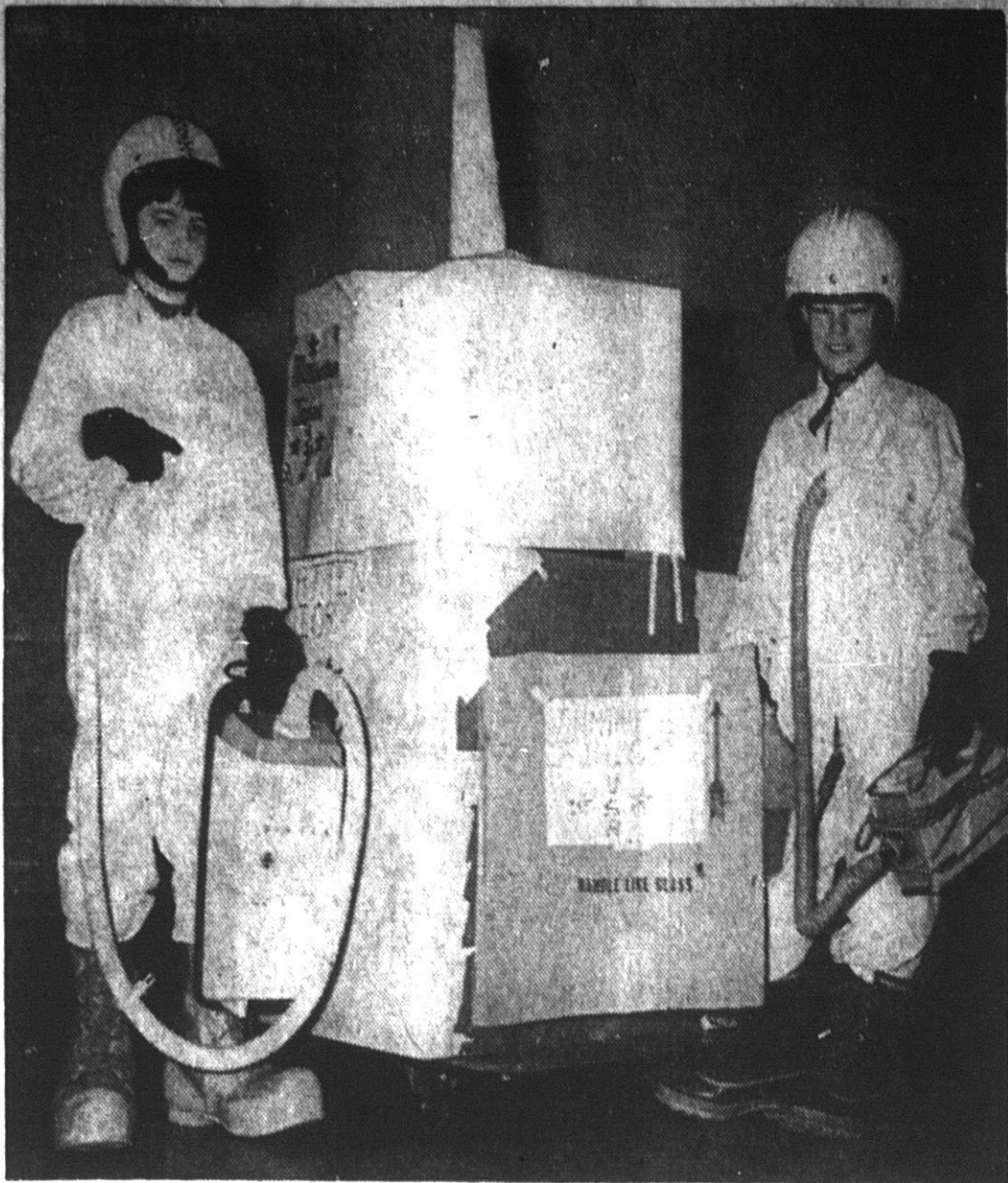

The Chix of Coach Max Dal-man mustered 100 points while Delton took the championship trophy by scoring 111 markers.

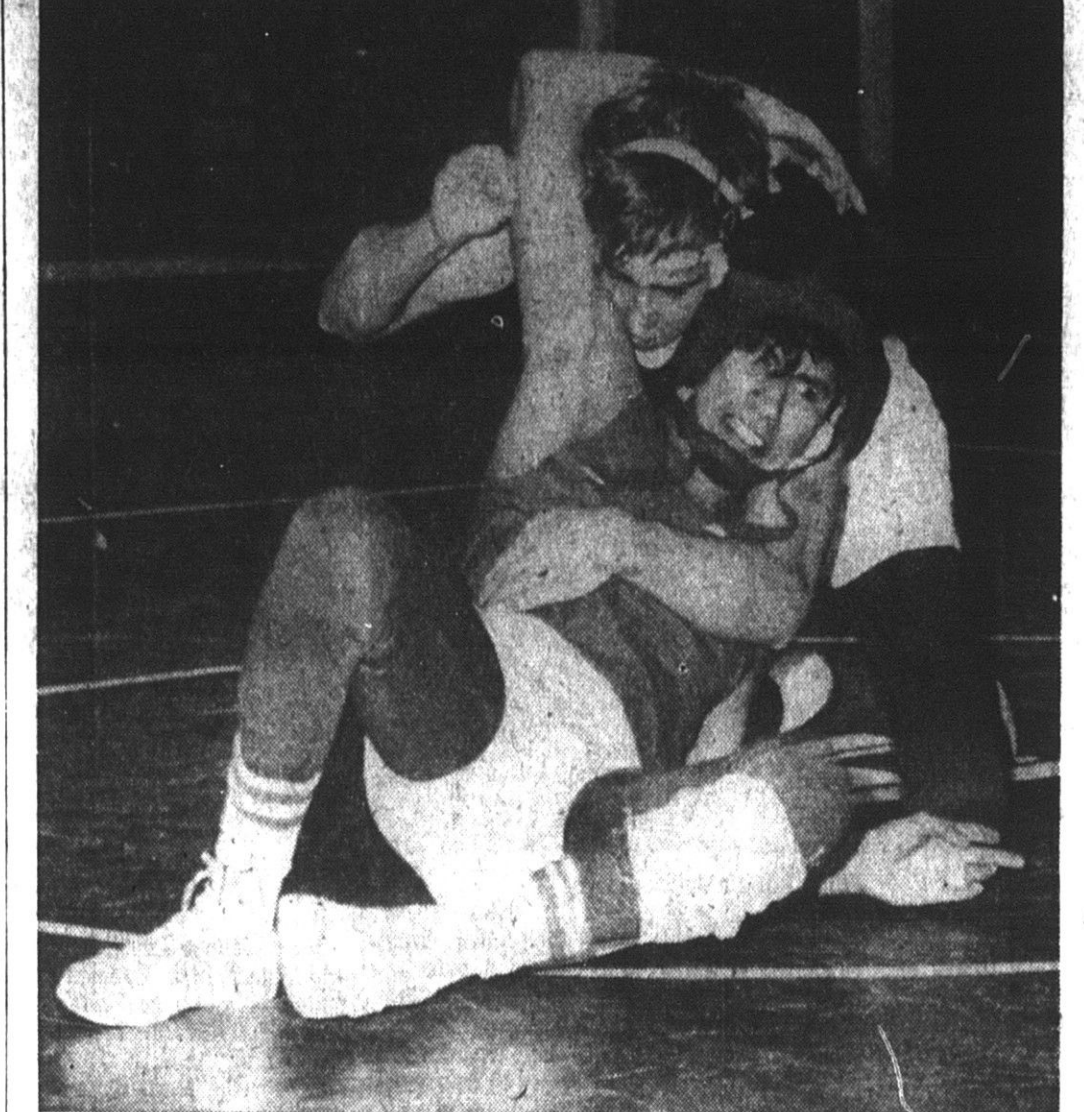
Host Allegan came in third with 75 points while Caledonia was fourth with 52 counters.

Republican Cohorts Give Democrat Fond Farewell

ALLEGAN — "Rock-ribbed Republican" Allegan county said its official farewells last week to one of its best-loved and most respected public servants, Clem Rewa, of Dorr, retiring chair-man of the Board of County Commissioners, and the only Democrat on the board.

Rewa stepped down voluntar-ily this year as 9th district com-missioner after 21 years as a member of the "old" and the "new" board and a total of 27 years of public service. His district includes all of Dorr township which he served pre-viously as a member of the board of review and as treasur-er.

In 1950 he was named by the township board to fill the vacan-cy left by the death of Super-visor Joseph Bartz, Sr. At the time he agreed to serve for on-ly nine months left of Bartz's term, but Dorr residents pre-vailed on him to continue in the post for ten more terms.

His successor, Romuald Bel-ka, will share Rewa's distinc-tion as the only Democrat on Allegan county's 21-man board of commissioners.

Rewa is one of a very few supervisor-commissioners in the county's history to have served two terms as chairman of the board.

or of the county political scene, many supervisors served longer than Rewa, but none more effec-tively. His forte was concilia-tion. When tempers got hot, Rewa was busiest "cooling it."

During his board service the county established the "sinking fund" approach to financing special projects. Beginning with the new county building, the plan was used for construction of a new jail, juvenile detention home and medical care fac-ility. Each project was "paid in advance" with sinking funds.

Rewa also was the chief archi-tect of the special 1-mill bridge replacement levy on the county board. Under this program, more than 30 of the county's 120 major bridges considered in need of replacement already have been modernized.

In one other area he wasn't so successful. When the Dutch Elm disease hit the county he proposed a special levy to cover the cost of cutting down the dead trees along streets and roads, a proposal that was de-feated.

But his major disappointment as a supervisor came when the county board did not go along with the views of the late Harold Fox, of Wayland, and himself when it came time to replace the old court house. Rewa and Fox joined forces to promote construction of a new county building on a site just outside Allegan in order to leave the old 19th century court house and the surrounding public square intact as a combination park, museum and meeting place. Most county residents now share the views put forth at the time by Rewa and Fox.

Oscar Peterson who served as city clerk of Holland for 20 years until his retirement in 1947 was 90 years old Dec. 18.

At 90, Oscar admits he is slowing down a bit, but he remains active as a director of the Ottawa Savings and Loan the snow at his home at 403 Chippewa Dr. where he moved when he retired.

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Mayor Bosman Won't Run Again

Mayor Nelson Bosman, serving his 10th year as mayor of Holland, made it official Tuesday.

He is not seeking reelection. Serving as mayor for 10 years is only part of his public service in Holland. In 1945 he was elected to the Board of Public Works and served two five-year terms. In 1957 he was elected first ward Councilman and served for four years.

And in 1961 he ran for mayor, was elected to a two-year term and reelected later for four more terms.

In 1961 when his Council term ran out, he was not eligible for reelection since voting precincts had to be readjusted because of annexation, and he found him-

self in the second ward.

That makes 24 years of public service — a long record of service in any language.

When the mayor's term runs out in 1971, he will have served the longest consecutive term in Holland. The only other man to serve 10 years as mayor was Nicodemus Bosch, but his terms were not consecutive. He served in 1912-16, 1918-20 and 1932-36.

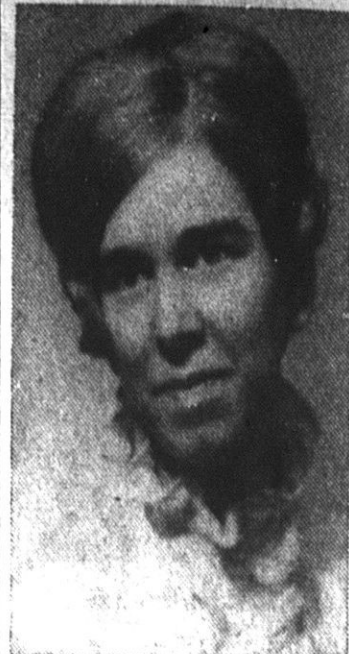

During January and February, Faculty Dames will meet in interest groups. The next regular meeting will be March 25 at 8 p.m. in Phelps Hall.

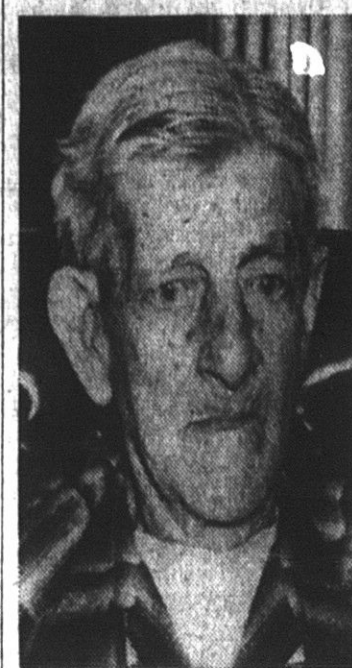
