## May Defer Taxes On Land Sales

If you've sold land this year you have to report the sale. But you won't have to pay taxes on the financial gain money — at least for awhile, according to Larry Stebbins, Ottawa County Extension director.

Leonard Kyle, Michigan State University agricultural economist, cites a specific example to show how this works. In the example, the highway took four acres from the corner of an Ottawa County farm for an interchange.

"When land is sold under condemnation proceedings or threat of such proceedings, the income from this involuntary sale should be reported on schedule D of your income tax form. But you can elect to delay recognition of a taxable gain if you buy similar property within two years from the end of the taxable years in which the property was sold. If you intend to buy replacement property, you do not have to report any gains in the year they occurred. But you should report the pertinent data about the transaction and inform IRS what you intend to do. If replacement property is not purchased within the specified time, you must file an amended return for the year of the sale and pay taxes that are due from the transaction."

Kyle recommends that you consult an experienced tax consultant to make sure the entire transaction is handled properly.

Sheep producers are reminded that a special shortcourse will be held beginning Jan. 5, according to Larry Stebbins, Ottawa County Extension Director. This shortcourse is in sheep management, breeding, feeding, disease and parasite control, and equipment. It will begin at 7:30 p.m. at the Martin Public School on Wednesday, Jan. 5. It will meet for five consecutive weeks for 2½ hours each week. Instructors will include specialists from the Animal Husbandry Department and Veterinary College at Michigan State University; William Brown, Allegan and Marvin Heft, Allegan County Extension Agricultural Agent.

All sheep raisers and anyone else interested in learning more about sheep husbandry are invited. A nominal charge will be made to cover cost of a special notebook and refreshments.

## Lake Search Continues For Missing Fisherman

PORT SHELTON—A presumed drowning victim off the Port Sheldon outlet in Lake Michigan around 8:30 a.m. today was tentatively identified this noon as Dr. Robert L. Melka, 39, assistant professor of history at Hope College in Holland since 1970.

This information came from Vern Bowen, constable of Port Sheldon township, who was assisting Ottawa sheriff's officers and U.S. Coast Guardsmen in the search for the body.

According to witnesses, the victim was fishing in about four feet of water about 100 feet offshore when he was swept off his feet by an undertow. The report was made to sheriff's officers in Grand Haven at 8:36 a.m. The others attempted to go to his aid but were unable to

reach him.

An air search by Coast Guard planes and a water search by personnel in wet suits failed to locate the victim. Rough seas cancelled search by Coast Guard boats, but men and equipment remained on shore awaiting a break in the weather.

Two lines of buoys had been installed in Lake Michigan at the warm water outlet as a safety measure, but it was believed the victim was unable to reach these lines when he was swamped.

Dr. Melka came to Hope College in 1970 from Oshkosh, Wis., where he had been teaching history at Wisconsin State University. He and his family of three children were living at 91 East 15th St.

Kievit was listed in "fairly good" condition in Holland Hospital today where he was under treatment for smoke inhalation. Strong winds fanned the flames that broke through the roof of the story and one-half wooden structure. Winds blew helmets off firemen battling the flames on the roof and nearly swept a fireman or two off the roof.

Neighbors Robert Cates, 29, of 274 East Ninth St., and Rudolph Quintero, 38, of 283 East Ninth St., realized Kievit was at home after seeing a car in his garage.

Quintero had been forced out of the house by smoke and flames in earlier attempts to reach Kievit in his ground-floor bedroom.

Finally Cates went to the bedroom window on the east side of the house and saw Kievit in the room. Cates called for assistance and Quintero responded. The two removed an outside screen and Cates crawled into the room, found Kievit and pulled him toward the window where Quintero helped pull Kievit outside. Kievit was taken to Holland Hospital.

Firemen believe the fire started in the area of the front living room and was of electrical nature. Kievit's bedroom was in a room adjoining the living room.

Firemen said the upper portion of the house was extensively damaged by flames while considerable smoke and water damage was reported to the lower leveled rooms. Firemen were at the scene about two hours.

## Tommies Down Dutchmen, 80-74

ALLEDALE — Free throws cost Hope College another basketball game here Wednesday evening.

Both the Flying Dutchmen and Aquinas tied in field goals at 29 but the Tommies sank 22 free throws to only 16 for Hope to take the second game of the Grand Valley State College Invitational, 80-74.

The Dutchmen used a new shuffle offense that seemed to catch the Tommies by surprise in the sea-saw affair.

Hope ended the night with only 10 turnovers while Aquinas had 13 in the well played contest.

Big Tom Wolters of Hope, had a great game in rebounding against the taller Tommies. The 6'5" ex-Fennville flash hauled down 18 caroms while 6'6" Charles Mathews had 15 for the winners.

Aquinas had one of the biggest front lines the Dutchmen will see all season. Besides Mathews, the Tommies had 6'6" Dennis Spaulding and 6'7" Mark Simons at the forward spots.

Spaulding, who ran into earlier foul trouble led the balanced Tommies in scoring with 18 points. Reserve Steve Krynock followed with 15.

Dan Shinabarger and Marty Snoap paced the Dutchmen with 22 and 21 counters in that order. Dave Harmelink and Lorenza Howard chipped in with 13 and 10.

The first half ended with the score tied at 39-all. Both teams netted 14 field goals in the even seven contest. They both made 11 of 14 free throw attempts.

Hope finished the evening with a 39 per cent average (29 of 73) while the Tommies also had 29 fielders but threw up two less shots (71) to finish with a 41 per cent mark.

The Dutchmen had two players foul out and three others with four infractions. Shinabarger took an early leave when he was charged with his fifth foul and one can't recall when was the last time the flashy Hope cager was forced to leave the game early. Snoap, who played another strong tilt, also left with five fouls late in the game.

A cold spell cost the Dutch-

men the tilt. Hope only trailed by two points, 60-58 when the Tommies threw in seven straight points and held the Dutchmen to none with 6:43 to play. It was an uphill battle for Hope, as they couldn't quite overcome the Aquinas margin.

## Ordinances Updated for Holland

Up for final reading and passage at the Jan. 5 meeting of City Council is an ordinance which revises and recodifies all the ordinances of the city of Holland.

Ordinance 596 which has been under study since compilation was completed last April has updated some ordinances and rescinded others which have been preempted by state laws in the last decade. The recodified ordinances are under 39 chapters, compared with well over 50 in the old compilation.

Eliminated from the new ordinances are those on milk, meat, slaughterhouses, municipal court and communicable diseases. These subjects are now under state or county control.

One big change is the traffic section which now follows the

uniform traffic code of the state police, with modifications for local control.

Another big change is the requirement to connect to city sewers within three years of installation. This means all homes and buildings with waste disposal facilities currently in sewer service districts must connect by January, 1975. Subsequent installations also will carry the three-year mandatory hookup.

While people will be aware of the three-year policy, there are sal facilities currently in sewer come through in the future.

The original ordinance passed in 1960 had required a one-year mandatory hookup, but this had not been enforced, and City Hall had followed a more practical approach in letting residents use septic tanks so long

as they operated properly.

The zoning ordinance is unchanged in the updated ordinances. Zoning changes require public hearings.

The new ordinances have a provision for pro-rating license fees of over \$6. Previously the full fee had to be paid even if taken out the last day of the year which runs from May 1 to April 30. Now, the fee will be reduced 50 per cent after six months. The reduction will not affect fees under \$6.

The recodification was done by the Michie City Publications Co. of Charlottesville, Va., a firm which specializes in ordinance recodification. It was authorized by City Council in 1969 at a cost of some \$12,000 and a representative was in Holland for an editorial confer-

ence Aug. 21, 1970. The completed draft was received last April.

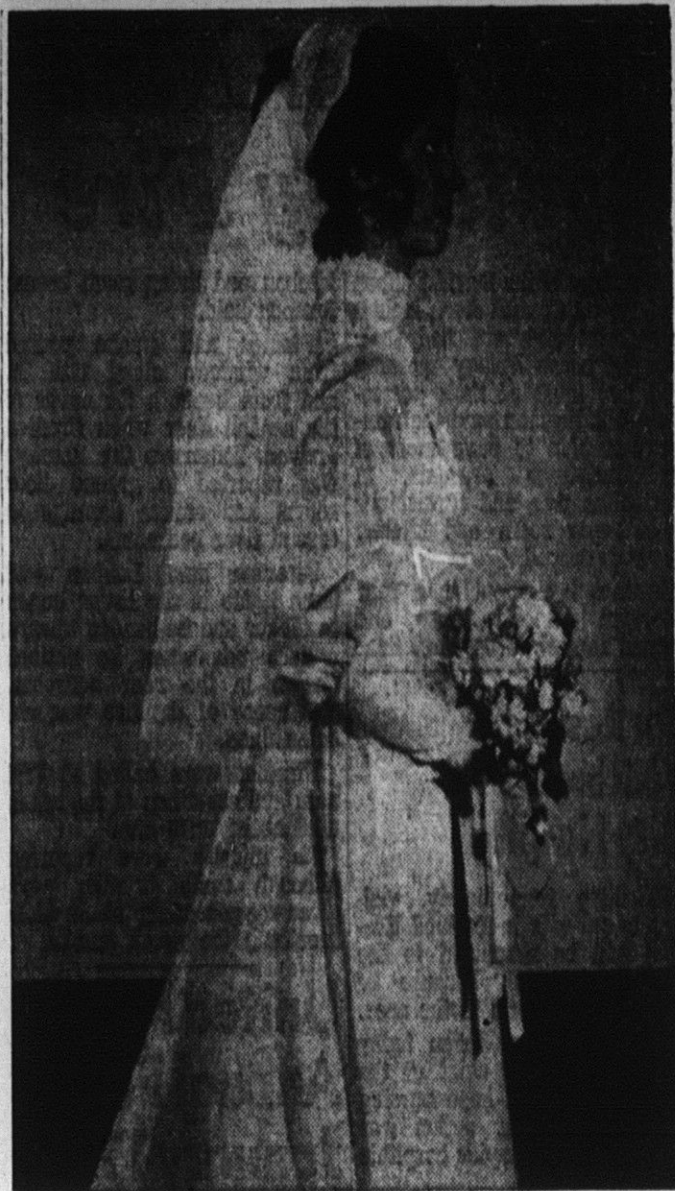
The Michie City firm has recodified ordinances for cities all over the nation. Cities listed in Michigan include Detroit, Flint, Harper Woods, New Buffalo, Ypsilanti and Zeeland.

Under the city charter of the early 1950s, ordinances are to be recodified every 10 years. George Sidwell, Lansing attorney who served as consultant to the Charter Study Commission, drew up the city's ordinances in 1955.

The Charlottesville firm includes 500 copies of the new ordinances of which 100 are in loose-leaf binders which will be available to citizens at a fee to be determined by City Council. The charter is included in the new compilation.

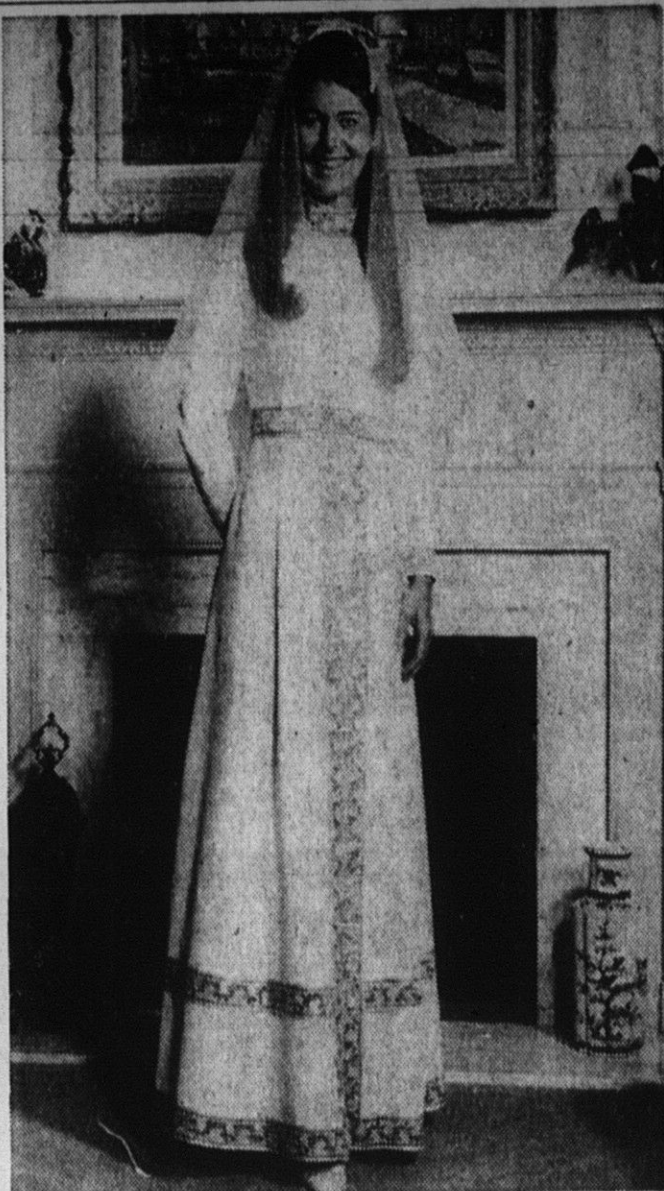
In similar attire were the bridesmaids Miss Muriel Koorndyk, Miss Kathy Dalman and Miss Sue Dalman.

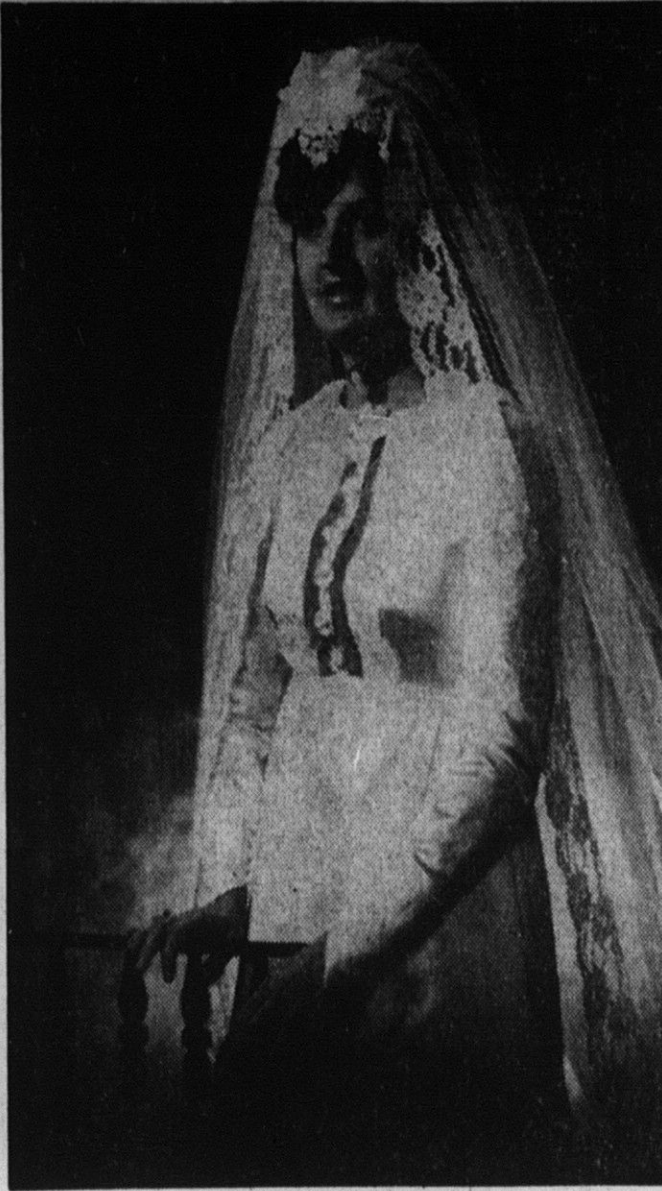
French ribbons. Winter white roses accented with pink sweetheart roses and princess pine formed her small nosegay.

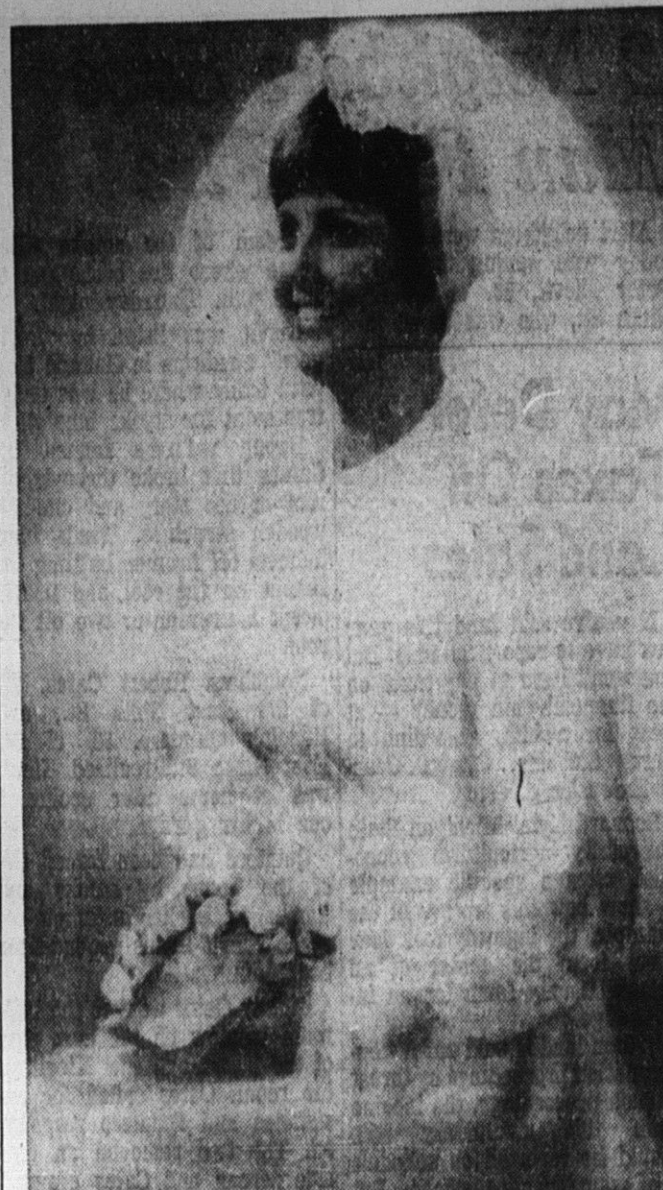

## Growth Trend In Business Continues

ALLEDALE — The index of business activity for Kent, Ottawa, and Muskegon Counties increased slightly in October to 115.7 from its revised August level of 115.5 according to statistics released by Marvin G. DeVries and William A. Peterson of the School of Business and Economics at Grand Valley State College.

This one-half per cent increase continues the general upward trend of the index begun in December, 1970.

Retail sales, residential and nonresidential construction activity, and durable goods employment increased slightly during the month. Bank debits and industrial power consumption decreased while employment other than durable goods held steady.

Since all components of the index are seasonally adjusted, any change in activity is not the result of calendar features. The index is also deflated to eliminate the artificial effects on business and economic activity from increases in the general price level.

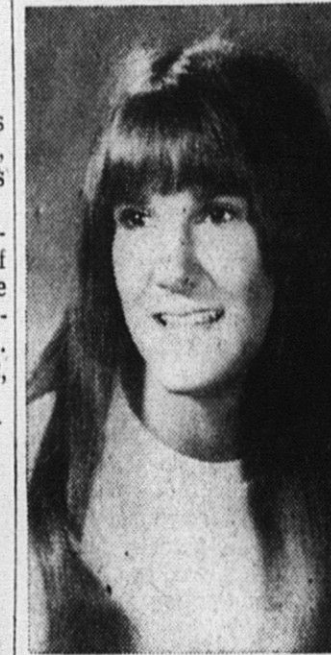

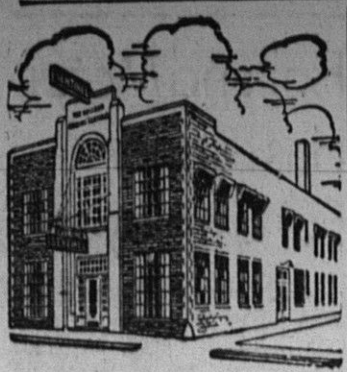

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## NEW TYPE OF TRAIN SERVICE

A news release recently called attention to the Auto-Train Corporation that had inaugurated a service whereby passengers and their cars can board a train at Washington, D.C., and ride the rails in comfort to Disney World in Florida. When they arrive they drive - off for a free - wheeling holiday, and can either drive back home when it's over or return the way they came.

The firm has an agreement with the railroad for special trains to carry the automobiles, non-stop service, and good catering to help make the trip pleasant.

The potential of this system seems almost unlimited. Cross country trips by auto are a staple of the American travel diet, but there must be many who would prefer on occasion to be whisked to some favored area on a comfortable train which will disgorge the family car upon arrival. Already there is talk of inaugurating such service on the West Coast—between Los Angeles and Seattle, say. This region seems like a natural for the innovation, as do others where auto traffic is unusually heavy and taxing.

The railroads are trying to improve their passenger service as they have lost a great number of people who are traveling by other methods. We think that the piggyback car - and - passenger service should help. Time will tell.

## Sunday School

### Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 2  
Jesus Teaches the  
Way of Love  
Luke 6:27-28  
By C. P. Dame

If anyone is looking for a challenge to live a life that calls for a constant battle, read the lesson text and think and pray and struggle for Christ-likeness.

I. Love is exacting and makes strong demands. The lesson text is from the Sermon on the Plain, (Luke 6:20-49) which Jesus preached as He "stood on a level place." The Sermon on the Mount is recorded in Matthew 5-7. Luke gives an abbreviated report of this sermon. Jesus preached after a night of prayer and then named the 12 apostles. No doubt all who heard the sermon were struck by the high demands of Jesus and by His authority. The Old Testament prophet said, "Thus saith the Lord," but Jesus said, "But I say unto you."

"Love your enemies. Do good to them which hate you." Jesus practiced what He preached. He prayed for those who crucified Him and died for sinners. To love does not mean to like. We may not like all our relatives, neighbors, fellow church members, and those who molest us, but we are commanded to love them—that implies doing good to them at all costs and ever seeking their temporal and eternal welfare. And this we should do on account of our faith.

II. To retaliate is sinful. "And unto him that smiteth thee on the one cheek offer also the other." "This is hard to do. Non-resistance applies to a Christian's personal relationship and not to his relationship as a citizen to the state. He who retaliates may get some satisfaction but he hurts himself. The person who restrains himself gives no place to anger, gives when it is not necessary, never puts himself and his rights first. We are however always to remember that Jesus does not condone lawlessness or excuse violence.

The golden rule of Jesus is positive and affirmative and strikes a personal, spiritual note not found in the teaching of other religious leaders. The diamond rule of Jesus: "I stand among you as he that serveth" is the best to put in practice all the time and everywhere.

III. Love expresses itself in compassion. Jesus demands that His followers show that they are superior people in character and in conduct. The complaint that Christians today are not different from any other people is often heard. If it is true then Christians are not living up to the high standards of Jesus and live too comfortably. God is the Christian's example for He is kind to the thankless and the bad, and His example summons all His children to do likewise. Today the word "compassion" deserves a lot of emphasis. Our world calls for Christian compassion.

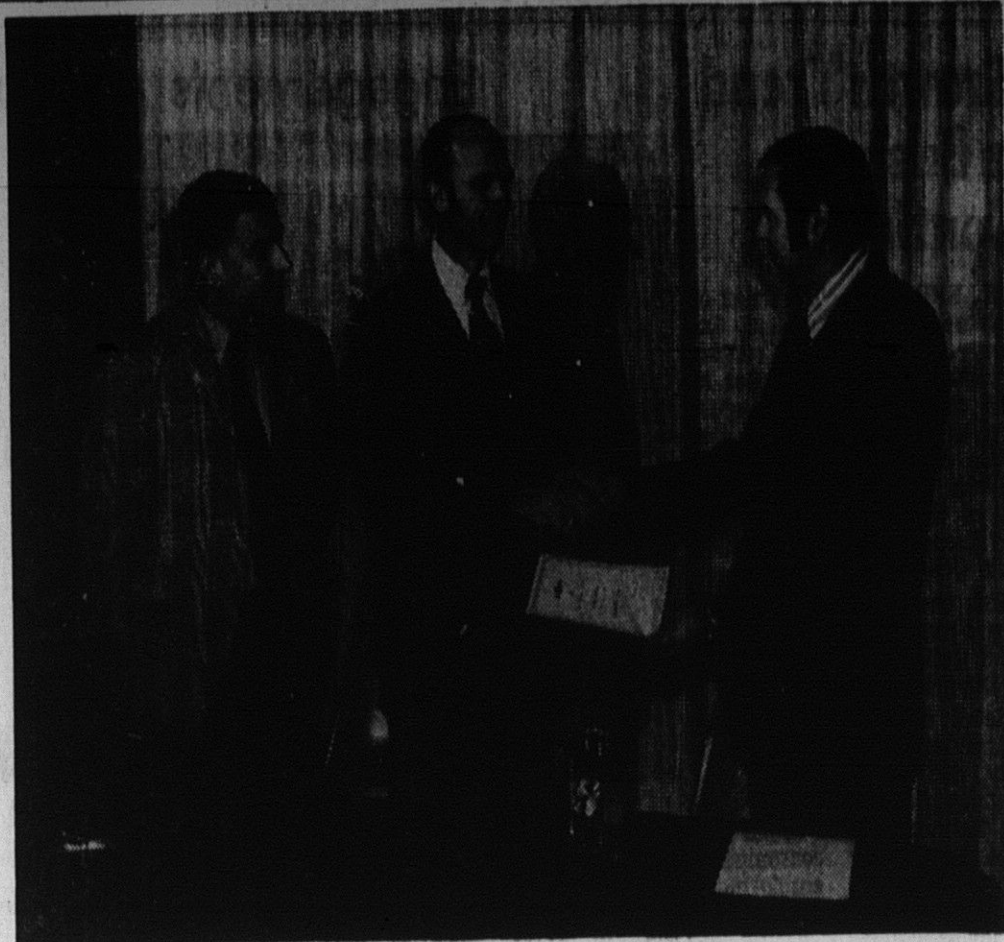

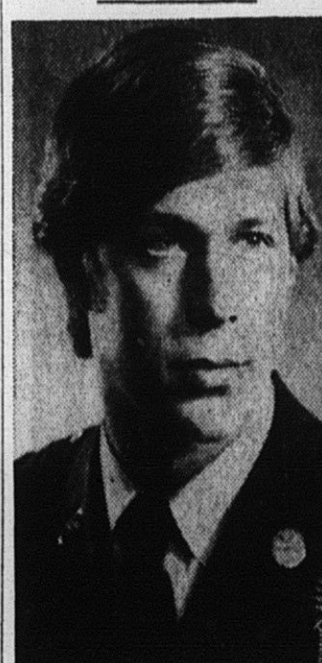

# Education Is Problem Of Latin American Areas

## Examples, Goals Add Incentives

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the first in a series of articles on the Latin American community in Holland.)

There are many problems facing the Latin American community in the city of Holland and one of the most important is the education of its children and adults. Several educators and school officials in the area have differing ideas on the needs of the people and the approaches to the problem, but all agree on some basic premises.

All agree, for example, that the drop-out rate among Latin Americans is decreasing as parents and children alike see the advantage that can be won through education, and as Latin Americans advance in the community providing an image and example for their young. Leaders in the Latin American community are pushing increased and extended education and Anglos are coming to realize that talent and ability, regardless of race, are things the community cannot afford to waste.

John Noe, principal at E. E. Fell Junior High School, and Peter Roon, assistant Superintendent of the West Ottawa Public Schools, agreed that intelligence is not determined by race and that Latin Americans are on an intellectual par with Anglos; however, both also agreed that lack of opportunity and parent interest can have adverse effects on the achievement of some Latin American students.

Some difficulties arise in determination of placement and of need with students newly arrived from another area of the country, Noe said, but pointed out that Latin American students who have been in the local public school system from the beginning of their education or for several years present no such problems.

Roon cited the lack of a continuing process of education as the culprit in some academic problems with Latin American students, particularly those whose parents are migrant workers or who have recently settled out of migrant labor.

The West Ottawa School System operates a federally-funded six-week summer program each year in cooperation with the plan to provide a continuing education for children of migrant parents. The program averaged 110 students daily last summer, Roon said, with ages ranging from 2½ to 12 years. Children participate in an eight-hour school day which includes, besides classes, breakfast, a hot noon meal, a light morning snack and a heavy afternoon snack.

Migrant children who move to the area with their parents in mid-March and stay until late October or early November spend over six months in the West Ottawa system, Roon said, adding to the continuation process necessary to education.

Communication problems arise with the very young children but students from about the third grade can communicate well. Most of the migrant children in the program are from Texas and have some English background, Roon pointed out.

The West Ottawa program has made such an impact on some of the migrant students that, even though there is no work early in March, many families come a little early because their children like the schools. Perhaps as a result of this desire, Roon feels, such children are cooperative, disciplined and motivated and often don't want to return to the Texas school systems.

Bi-lingual teachers and aides are in charge of the temporary Latin American students in the regular West Ottawa system and classes are held in the North Holland School where there is extra space.

Bi-lingual teachers are a rare commodity, according to Roon, who noted one in special education and one in the migrant education program at West Ottawa. Sometimes, he pointed out, teachers pick up some elementary, functional Spanish from their students and they encourage a knowledge of two languages with English second.

There are about 154 students with Spanish surnames in the regular West Ottawa System in grades kindergarten through 12, Roon said, adding that there is a general feeling of equality among administrators, faculty and students. The students are "comfortable" with each other and there is a large participation in extra curricular activities by Latin American students.

There are no specific courses on Latin culture, etc., in the school system, Roon observed, but information goes out with the decision to include it left up to the individual teacher. There is, however, a movement sponsored by the Michigan Ed-

ucation Association and the state for minority recognition in school curriculum.

Spanish surname teachers are at a definite premium in the West Ottawa Schools but the system does hire a number of interested Latin American students as aides in the summer and adult education programs.

Roon sees the hiring of Frank Zapeda as home-school liaison person for the Holland Public School System as a "real step forward" and feels there is a definite need for effective communication between home and school.

The West Ottawa Adult Education Program is about 70 per cent Latin American, Roon said, and primarily teachers communication skills such as reading, writing and speaking. The program is individualized to find what each person needs and has been generally successful. For example, the program teaches a kind of economics in learning to read labels, saving for taxes and putting forth the idea of planning ahead rather than living from day to day.

The school system also has an Adult High School Completion Program which results in a diploma or equivalency certificate and at least three of its students have gone on to college, Roon said. The most serious problem lies in that there are varying opinions on the real needs of Latin American adults and even the leaders cannot decide.

E.E. Fell Junior High School has 1,251 students in five buildings with about 10.8 per cent Latin Americans, according to Noe, who can see a definite change in Latin American parental attitude toward education with parents attending parent-teacher conferences and showing a decided interest in the growth and education of their children.

There is, however, more pressure on the male as a wage-earner among Latin Americans, Noe feels, with the result that after a whole school decreases in importance and gives way to the importance of holding a job. Students will do well in the seventh and eighth grades but drop off in succeeding grades as employment grows in desirability. This "machismo" idea is greatest during the 10th and 11th grades, Noe said, con-

flicting with the long preparation for later life.

There are two bi-lingual teachers at E.E. Fell, which has seven sections of Spanish this year and also offers linguistics for students who need help. Latin Americans also hold jobs with the school.

There is no definite teaching of Spanish culture at the junior high, Noe said, adding that many Latin American youngsters are ready to be assimilated into the American, but not necessarily, the Dutch-American, culture.

Noe also sees a growing involvement of Latin American students in such school activities as ball teams, cheerleading, bands and orchestras and says the percentage of participation is growing.

Tom Carey, director of counseling at Holland High School, feels that the Holland Public Schools are making a concerted effort to reach and help Latin American students and cited the various parent-teacher conferences conducted in Spanish and held since 1969 that have attracted as many as 125 Latin American parents.

Such items as educational opportunities, staying in school, continuing education and being involved in schools, government, etc., are discussed and Latin Americans from Michigan State University talked to the students in Spanish. Another meeting for parents and children drew participants from Zeeland, Fennville and Sagautuck as well as Holland, Carey said.

Latin American students at Holland High School are organized and are "tremendous young people," according to Carey. They meet on their own to discuss and attempt to solve problems and are always willing to lend a hand. "Cooperation" is a word that keeps popping into Carey's speech as he describes his work and relationships with Latin American youth.

Tours of college campuses are among the tools educators can use to sustain an interest in higher education for Latin American students and this year two busloads of Holland students went to the University of Michigan where they toured the campus, heard speakers and learned of opportunities in all phases of education.

Holland High's counselors keep track of graduating stu-

dents so that they know what each one is planning after graduation and thus have a record of what happens to Latin American students in the school system. In 1970, Carey said, 10 were graduated with eight entering colleges or trade schools, one marrying and one working. In 1971, seven Latin American students went on to college or trade school, two entered the service and one worked.

Carey was quick to point out that the school does not push four-year institutions, two-year institutions or terminal programs. Rather, each student, regardless of race, is counseled as to what he would probably be most successful with, problems he would face, advantages and disadvantages and is then left to make the final decision himself. Often there is financial or scholarship aid available for minority group students, Carey said.

The process of helping a Latin American student choose a school for further education can be especially frustrating, Carey pointed out, because there are those who say that a two-year institution degrades the student and others who are as sure that a four-year institution is too much for him. Ultimately, however, the student must weigh the arguments and make a personal decision.

Carey also sees a trend toward a reduced drop - out rate among Latin American students and adds that many drop - outs return to school after a while. Students are beginning to see the success of education and parents are becoming more involved, tending to lessen the frequency of dropping out, Carey said, adding that drop-out rates also decline during periods of tight labor markets such as the one now.

There are still many things to be done in helping to recognize and deal with the problems of Latin Americans, but a good groundwork is being laid. For example, Carey sees the need for Latin American counselors in the school systems and more home - school liaison workers. He also feels that the system must determine the real needs of the students, pointing out that adults and children quite often disagree on "real needs" and must work to meet them.

Carey is proud of the Latin American students in the Holland school system and sees them as a positive influence on themselves and others. He also feels that cooperation is the key and if people will hold down the criticism and work together, many problems will be resolved more quickly.

mon to age groups and backgrounds. Students from given families and in given situations have common problems regardless of skin pigmentation, and parental attitude often plays a major role in the students' behavior.

Giordano can remember no alterations involving Latin Americans and can remember only a few arguments with racial overtones. Over all, he feels the students relate quite well to each other and sees no real militancy among members of minority groups.

Noe, Roon and Carey all agree with Giordano that problems that arise among students are an "across the board" phenomenon and are "kid problems" rather than racial problems.

Hope for cooperation lies with the young, one of the officials feels, adding that resistance often comes from some parents who are afraid of anything different, including skin pigmentation, and that the young are generally more willing to accept difference.

Many Latin Americans are proud of their rich heritage and culture and have no desire to be completely swallowed up in the American culture, one educator pointed out; but many times skin pigmentation stands in the way of even a minor attempt to meld into the Anglo culture. Europeans who came to America were easily assimilated because they "matched" but the Latin American, like the Black and the Indian, faces the problem of a different skin color that is easily discernible from that of Anglos.

All of the men see great strides being made in the area of minority education in Holland and see no educational or disciplinary problems that can be blamed on race; and one educator remarked that if the primary problem arises from skin pigmentation, perhaps Anglos should look some other place than the Latin American community for the root of the problem.

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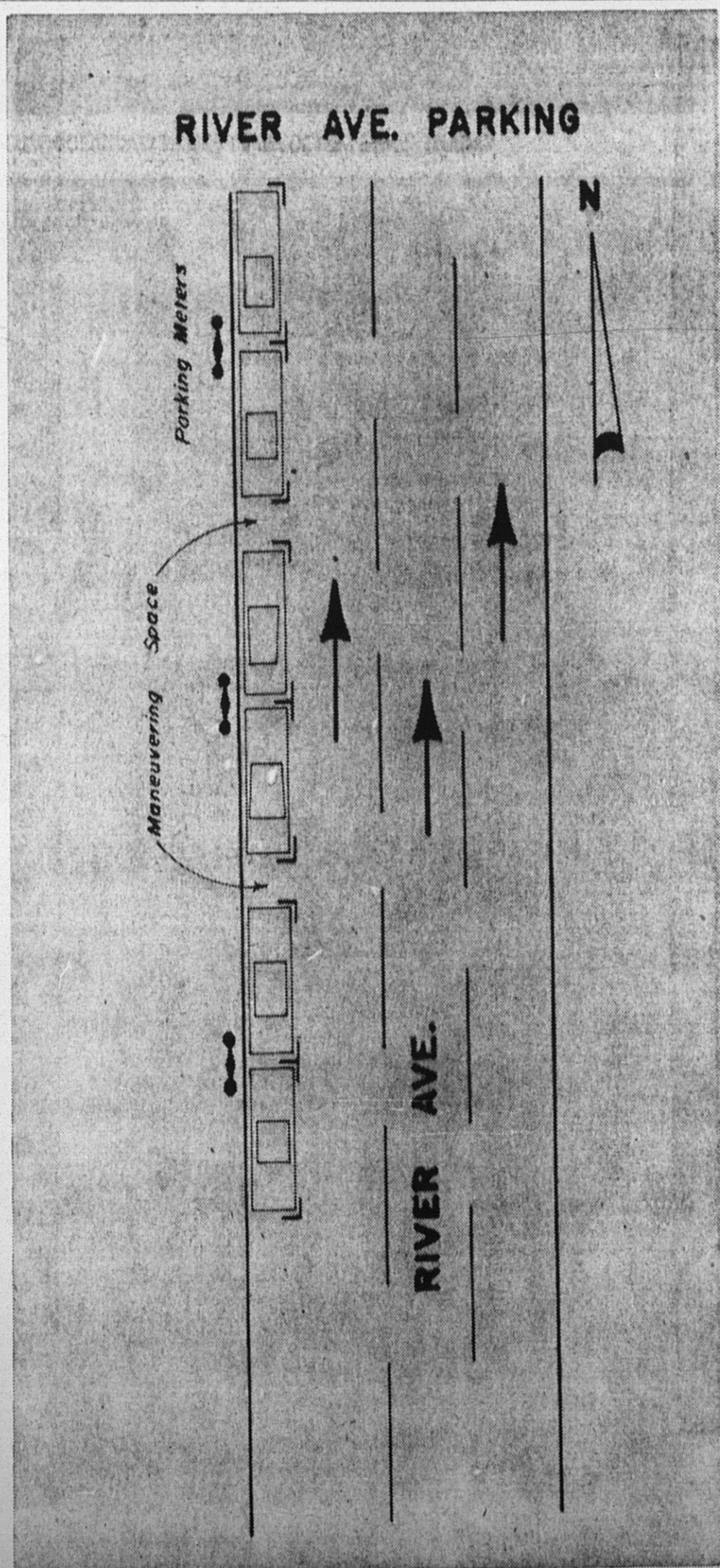

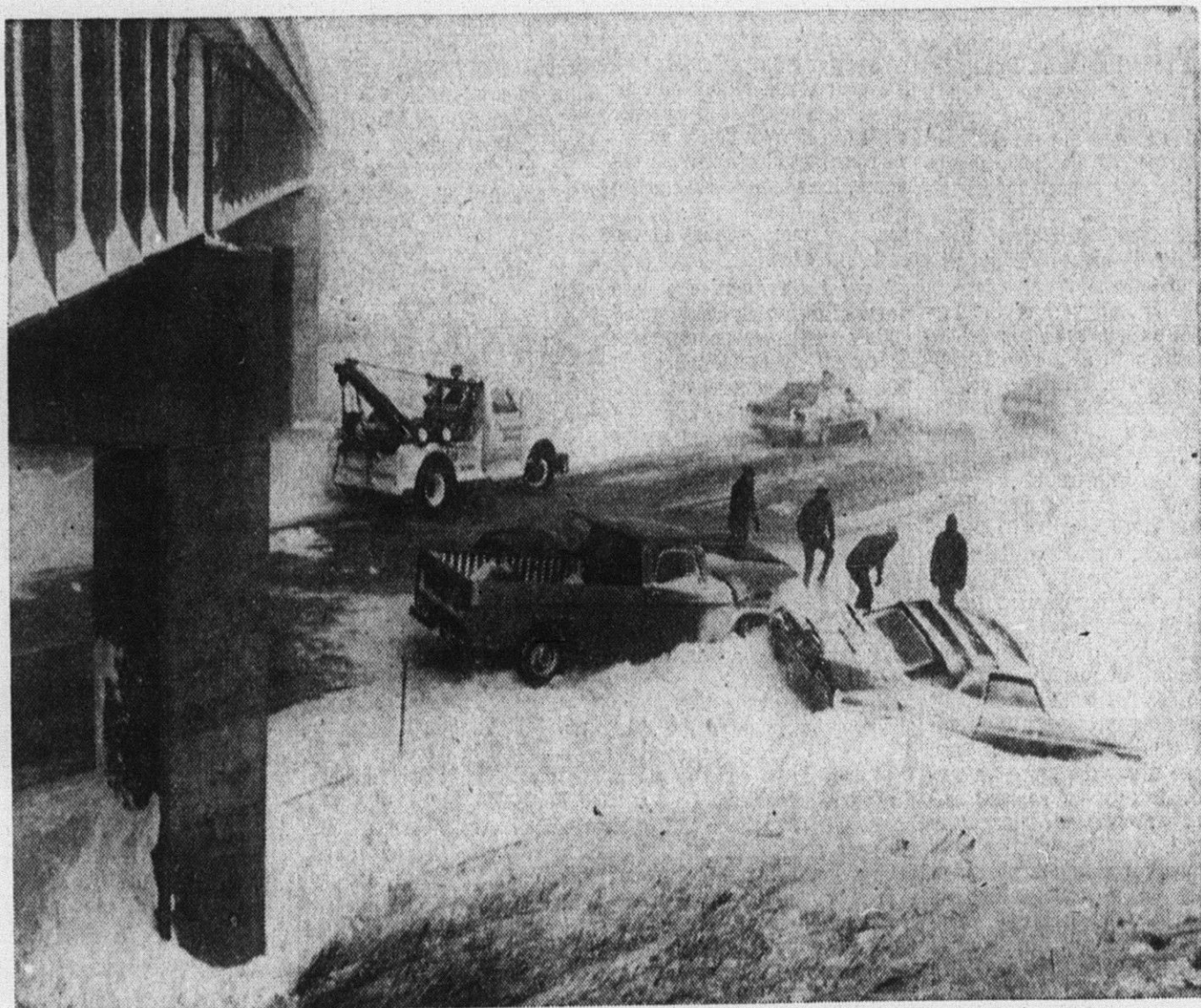

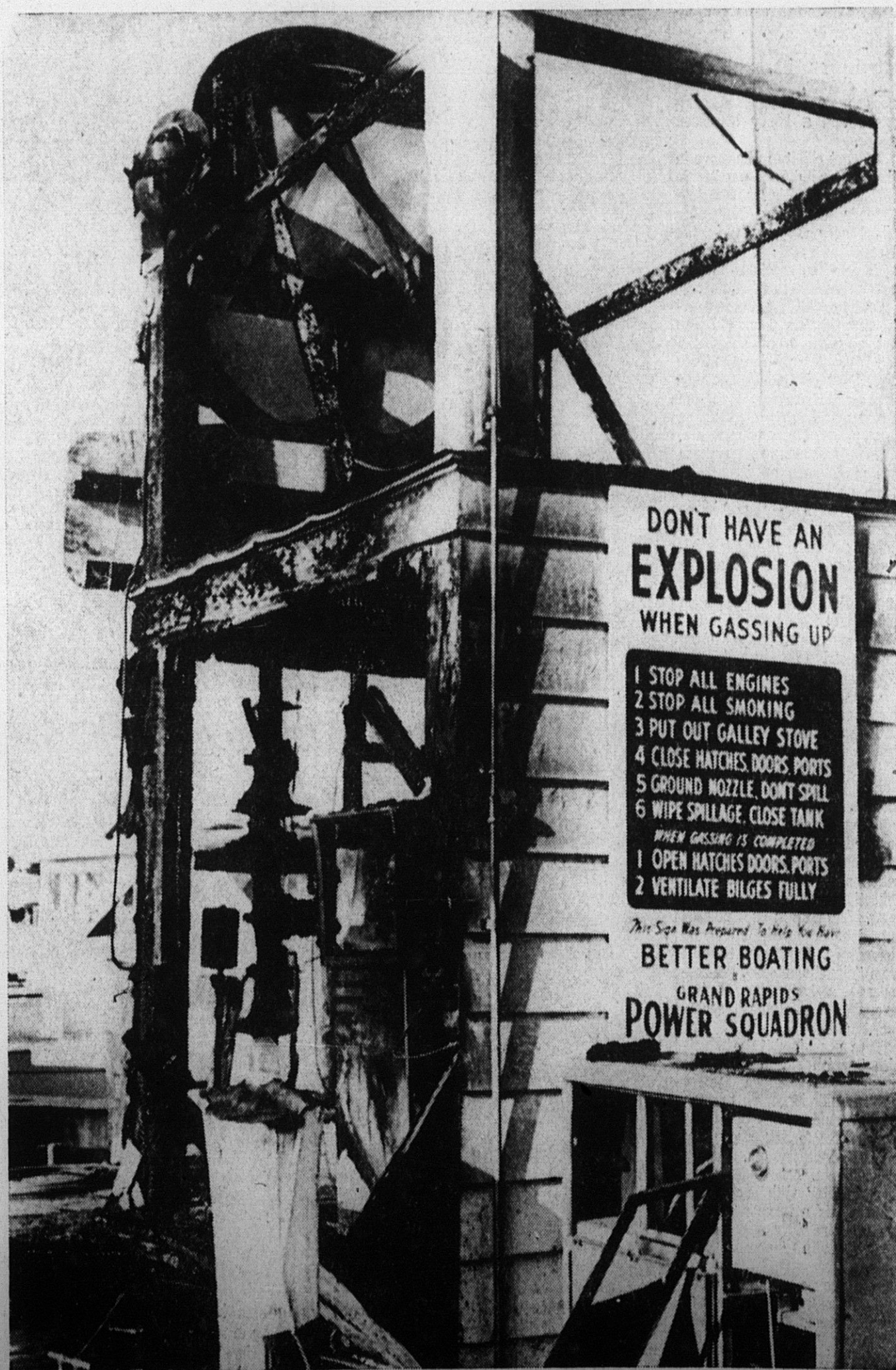

## Hope Grant To Study Spiders

Hope College has been awarded a \$19,000 grant by the National Science Foundation for renewed support of a spider research project being undertaken by Dr. Allen R. Brady, associate professor of biology.

Dr. Brady's project, entitled "Ecology, Distribution, and Behavior of Oxyopidae and Lycosidae," will include field studies in Mexico and Central America. The Oxyopidae or lynx spiders, composed of a relatively small and closely related group of species, possess important biological attributes from the viewpoint of systematics and zoogeography. Lynx spiders occur on every continent and many islands of the world.

The present study comprises the first stage in an attempt to elucidate the evolutionary relationships of the oxyopid faunas of various continents and islands. The ecology and behavior of selected species will be studied and correlated with morphological characters. Information should be provided as to the role of oxyopids in the control of insect populations. The primary objective of the study is to build a solid systematic framework of the oxyopids.

In addition to the practical taxonomic significance of the field work supported by this grant a more specific view of the factors influencing the distribution patterns of spiders in Mexico and Central America should be gained. This in turn should help to determine the processes and mechanisms affecting the distribution of terrestrial arthropods in the Nearctic and Neotropical Regions.
