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## Collision Of Two Cars Under Study

Two members of one family were treated at Holland Hospital and the driver of a second auto was admitted to the hospital following a two-car crash at 12:03 a.m. today along Lincoln Ave., 72 feet north of 38th St.

Doris Elhart, 37, of 260 West 32nd St., and her son, Timothy, 15, passengers in a car driven by her husband, Theodore, 41, were treated at the hospital and released. She was examined and her son was treated for scalp abrasions.

Police identified the driver of the other car as Daniel F. Barrett, 22, of 56th St., Hamilton. Holland Hospital said he was admitted to the intensive care unit in fair condition but he was not believed injured in the mishap.

Police indicated Barrett may have been drinking and said they found a knife in the car. Police said they are studying possible charges against Barrett.

Elhart told police he was heading north along Lincoln Ave. when his car was struck from behind. The accident remains under investigation.

## 2 Sentenced To Prison By Court

GRAND HAVEN—Two youths were sentenced to prison in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday by Judge Raymond L. Smith and five other men were placed on probation.

Daniel Paas, 22, Spring Lake, charged with safe robbery and breaking and entering at Spring Lake, was sentenced to two to 10 years at southern Michigan prison.

Lamar J. Craft, 22, Detroit, arrested for larceny of a color tv set from Holiday Inn, Spring Lake, in 1969, was sentenced to 18 months to 10 years. He was given 69 days credit for time spent in jail.

Elroy Junior Griggs, 17, and Tom Griggs, 19, both of Fennville, pleaded guilty to breaking and entering and were placed on probation for one year. They must also pay \$100 costs.

William Forbes, 22, Wyoming, Mich., charged with larceny from a building, was placed on probation for two years and must pay \$100 costs.

Leonard Allen Wilson, Sr., 43, Zeeland, charged with grand larceny, was placed on probation for one year and must pay costs of \$100.

James Maddox, 18, Jenison, charged with larceny from a Jenison school, was placed on probation for one year and must pay \$50 costs. Gregory Andrew Hoffman, 22, Grand Rapids, arrested for attempted breaking and entering, was placed on probation for three years. He must spend 90 days in jail.

There was one arraignment Monday. Marinus Ver Hoeven, 47, Grand Haven, charged with gross indecency, pleaded innocent.

## Passenger Train Makes Christmas Debut for Skiers

BOYNE CITY — The Boyne City railroad's first passenger train since 1931 made its debut Christmas weekend.

The train, consisting of the railroad's only locomotive "Lady Bug," pulled the "Schneewagen" for skiers and tourists between Boyne City and the Boyne Mountain Ski Lodge.

Der "Schneewagen" (translation snow car) is a refurbished combination coach and baggage car equipped with captain's chairs, brass lamps, wood stoves and ski racks.

Although skiers did not flock to the train, apparently not intent on skiing, families with children and rail buffs from as far away as Chicago did turn up to ride the 12-mile round trip.

The railroad expects to continue the experimental winter

runs on Saturdays and Sundays during January to determine if they can be made to pay. Meanwhile, other railroad employers are starting work on three English passenger cars which will be used on the summer runs behind an English steam locomotive due to be shipped from England to Boyne City in March.

## Dethmers Joins Muskegon Firm

LANSING — Justice John R. Dethmers, who this week is completing nearly a quarter century as Justice and Chief Justice of the Michigan Supreme Court, will continue in the practice of law as a partner in the Muskegon legal firm Parmenter, Forsythe & Rude, effective Jan. 1.

George A. Parmenter, senior partner of the Muskegon firm, and a fraternity brother of Dethmers during college days, said the name will be changed to Parmenter, Forsythe, Rude &

Dethmers. Justice Dethmers said he and his wife will seek housing accommodations in the Greater Muskegon area shortly after the first of the year.

Dethmers first practiced law in Zeeland and served as city attorney. In 1930 he was elected prosecuting attorney of Ottawa county and served four terms, moving his law office to Holland where he continued in practice through 1944. He was elected attorney general in 1944 and was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1947.

## Saugatuck Boat Missing Off Florida

SAUGATUCK — Word was awaited today concerning the fate of Mr. and Mrs. Waller L. Coburn, reported aboard a 60-foot houseboat overdue on the Gulf of Mexico enroute from New Orleans to Clearwater, Fla.

Friends here said the Coast Guard lost radio contact with the houseboat Tuesday afternoon when it was reported the boat was taking on water in calm seas. It was believed the craft was disabled.

Mrs. W. J. Wilson of Saugatuck said friends at Fort Lauderdale, Fla., reported the Coast Guard launched an air and sea search for the missing houseboat.

Police in Saugatuck said authorities in St. Petersburg, Fla., told them Wednesday that the search was still being conducted and that apparently nothing had been located.

The Coburns, who own and operate the Ship N' Shore Motel and Motel, reportedly left about three weeks ago on a water trip down the Mississippi River to the Gulf and locations in Florida.

Mrs. Wilson said members of the Coburn family in Michigan talked by telephone with the Coburns Monday or Tuesday from New Orleans as they prepared for the trip to Florida.

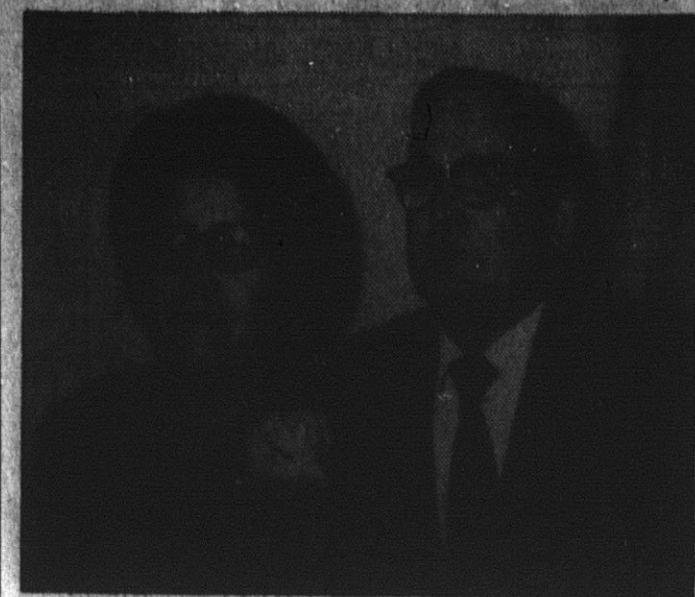

It was a chilly day on Christmas with temperatures in the teens and lower 20's.

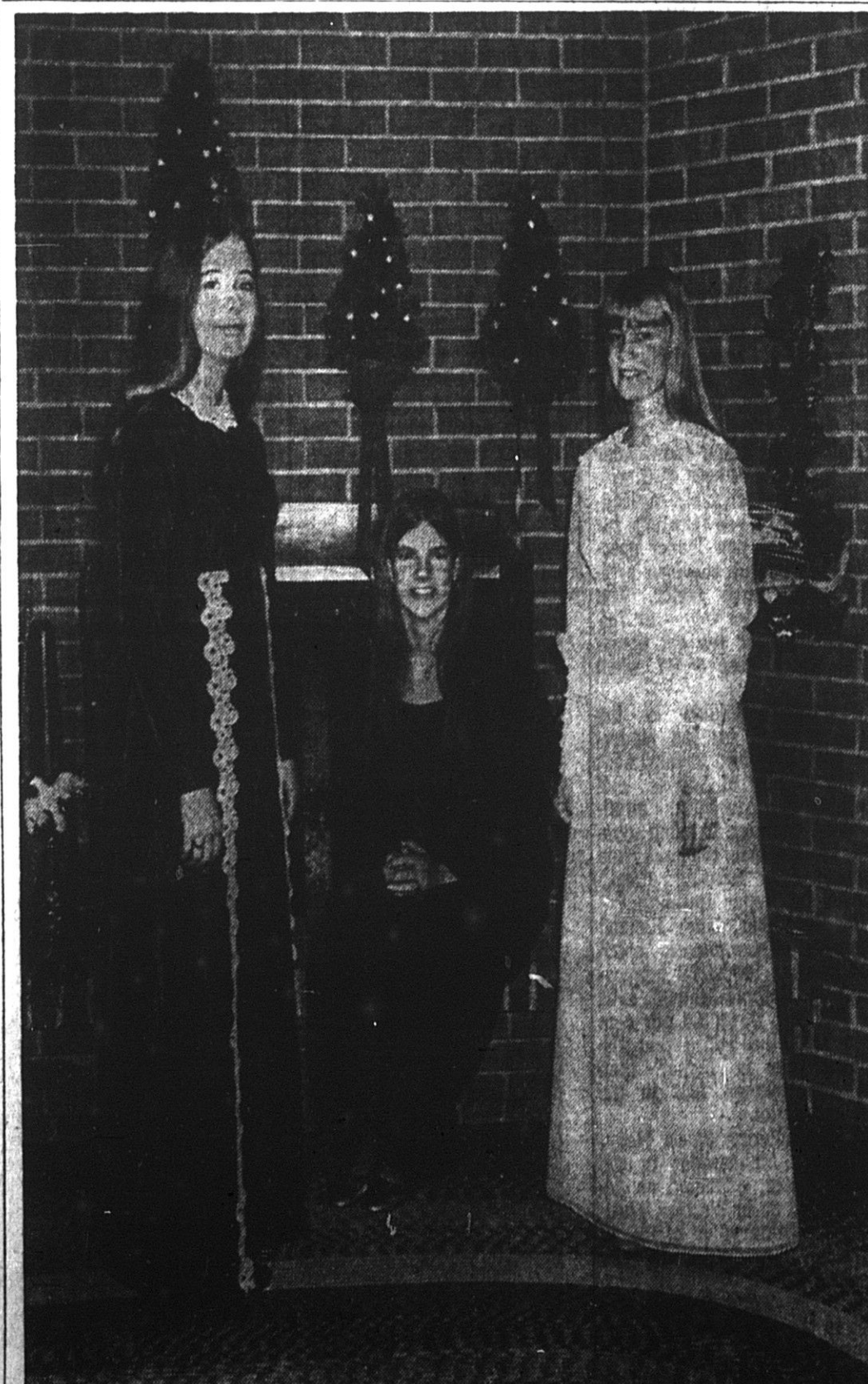

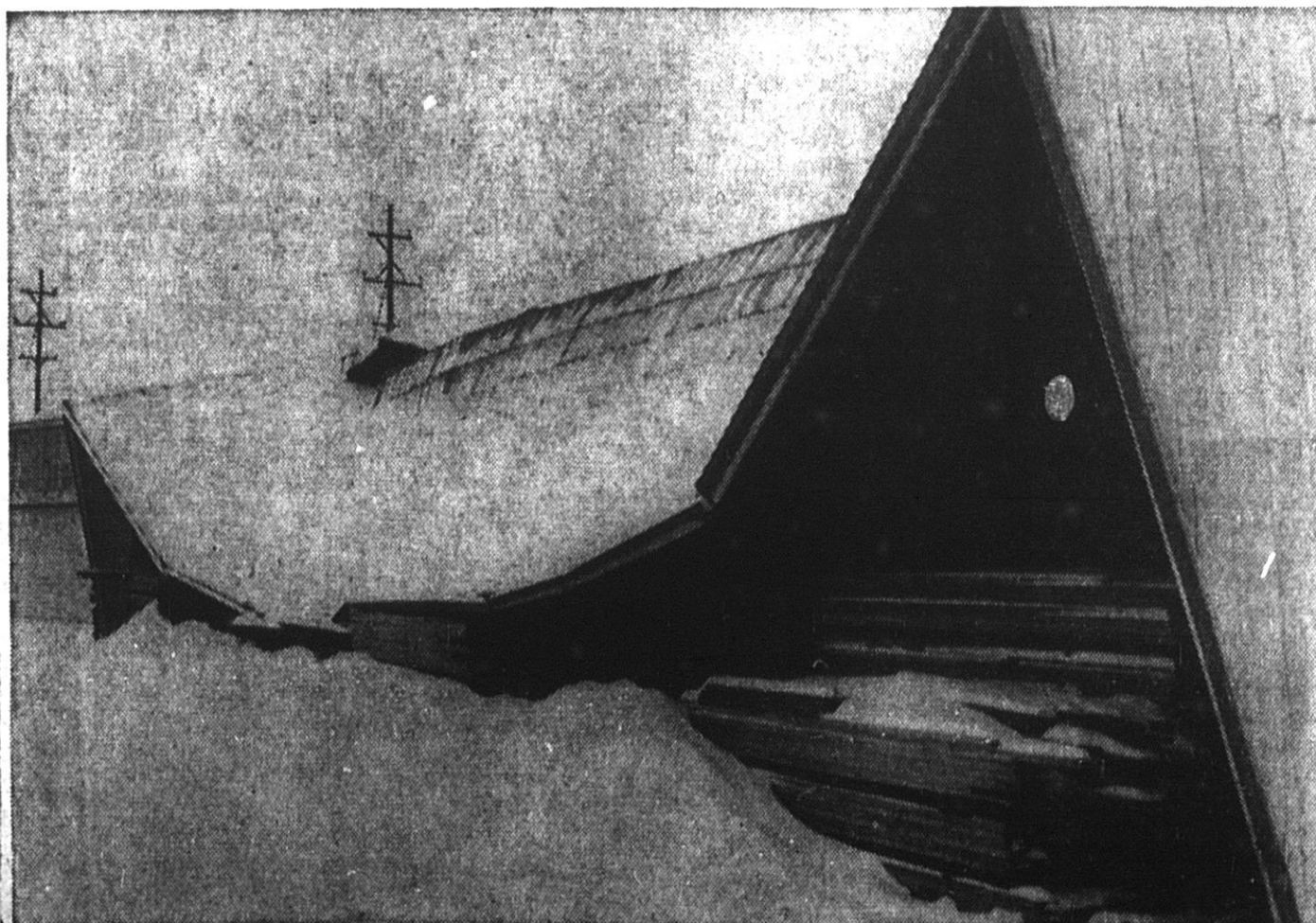

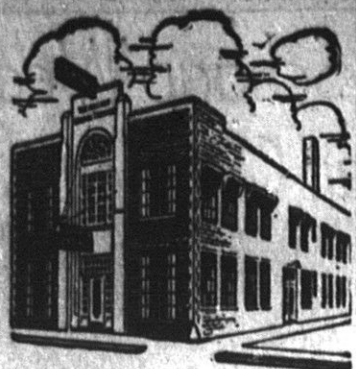

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Jan. 3, 1971  
Jesus' Use of Parables  
Matthew 13:10-17, 34-35

All who are interested in Sunday Schools hope and pray that during the new year the Sunday Schools of the nation may grow in spiritual power and influence. The nation needs Sunday Schools which teach the Word of God. During the first quarter of the new year we will study the parables of Jesus. This lesson tells us why Jesus used parables.

I. Jesus used the parabolic method in His ministry. This method was not commonly used in those days and that is why the disciples asked, "Why speakest thou unto them in parables?" The disciples asked Jesus questions at various times—most likely more than are recorded in the Bible.

The word "parable" in the original Greek means "something throw alongside another"—it suggests a comparison. The familiar definition, "A parable is an earthly story with a heavenly meaning," is fine. In order to illustrate spiritual truths Jesus told stories about ordinary things with which people were familiar. Every teacher worth his salt ought to present truths in an interesting manner.

II. Jesus spoke to different kinds of hearers. On the one hand there were the disciples who had become familiar with Jesus and on the other hand there was the crowd. Note the words, "Because it is given unto you to know the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it is not given." The word "mysteries" refers to truths which come only through revelation. In order to grasp the teachings of Jesus it was necessary first to know Him. The people did not accept Jesus and hence refused to accept His teaching. Unwillingness may be followed by inability.

If we do not use what we have, we lose it. This is true in the natural world and in the spiritual also. Jesus referred to the days of Isaiah, his generation rejected his teaching, and the generation of Jesus is doing the same. To hear the gospel is a responsibility—to refuse it leads to spiritual insensibility.

III. Jesus told the disciples about their advantages. The prophets of the Old Testament times spoke of the things which the apostles saw. After Jesus went back to heaven the disciples thought upon their experiences with Jesus and marvelled. So often we do not realize how much we have received from the Lord, and then when we lose them we really value them highly. May this first lesson of the year call forth much discussion and learning for daily living.

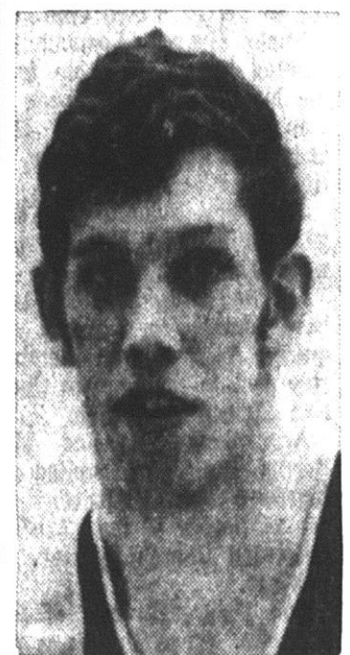

Schipper said he noticed the money and bag missing later in the afternoon and called police.

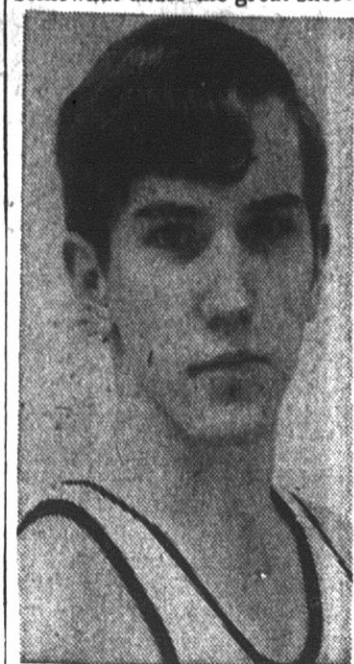
## Christian Commits Only 12 Turnovers

GRAND RAPIDS — Holland Christian's basketball team overwhelmed Grand Rapids Central Christian with a powerful offense in the first half as the Maroons easily downed the Eagles 80-56 before nearly 4,000 fans here in the Knollcrest Fieldhouse Tuesday night.

The Maroons were nearly perfect offensively in the opening half as they raced to a 50-34 halftime lead displaying a balanced attack that featured outstanding outcourt shooting and flawless fast breaks. Christian canned 22 field goals in 36 attempts and 12 of 19 in the second period to end the half shooting 61 per cent from the floor.

The Eagles also enjoyed a good first half as they hit on 16 of 32 shots for a fine 50 per cent.

Both team's defenses suffered somewhat under the great shoot-

ing of both clubs. However, the Maroons did force several turnovers as a result of a man-for-man press and converted them into easy baskets off the fast break.

The game started slow but the tempo soon picked up as the Maroon's Ron Scholten and Jerry De Groot combined for 14 points to give the Maroons a 21-17 first period edge. The score was knotted four times in the quarter before Holland pulled away late in the period.

Sparked by reserve guard Ray Schrottenboer, Christian quickly built an eight point lead and were never again in any trouble as they seemed to be able to score at will. The excellent out-

court shooting of Paul Zwier and Dave De Vries of Central kept the score relatively close. Schrottenboer had 10 points in the period while junior Dave Mulder tallied eight to give the Maroons the 14 point lead at halftime.

The floor play of the Maroons was almost perfect in the first half as they committed only four turnovers, with all of them coming late in the second period.

The second half started fast as the Eagles scored six straight points to cut the Maroon lead to 50-42 with two minutes gone in the period. Christian roared back outscoring the Eagles 15-4 to build their largest margin of the period, 65-46 with two minutes remaining. Substitutes played the rest of the quarter for Christian which ended 65-50.

The Maroons ripped off six straight points to open the final period to once again build a big lead at 71-50. The entire starting lineup was soon removed as Coach Elmer Ribbens cleared the bench with half the period gone. The Maroon substitutes continued to increase the lead in a somewhat sloppy final four minutes. Two baskets by Dan Plasman gave the Maroons their biggest lead of the night 80-53 before the Eagles scored three points to end the game.

The second half for both teams was a bit more deliberate as the defenses cooled off the offense. Holland's defense was especially effective as they stole numerous passes and converted them into easy baskets.

Once again the Maroons out-rebounded their taller opponent as they hauled down 40 rebounds to 29 for the Eagles.

Holland finished the game with only 12 turnovers, six coming in the final six minutes of play. Meanwhile, Central committed twice as many as the harassing defense of the Maroons kept them off balance.

Ron Scholten turned in his best offensive performance of the season scoring 22 points in only three quarters of action.

The Maroons will be seeking their seventh victory of the season against only one loss when they travel to face Hudsonville High next Tuesday.

The Maroon junior varsity dropped its third straight game Tuesday afternoon as they fell 73-60 to the Little Eagles. Christian fell behind at halftime 42-29 and could not catch up. Chuck Visser paced Holland with 16 points.

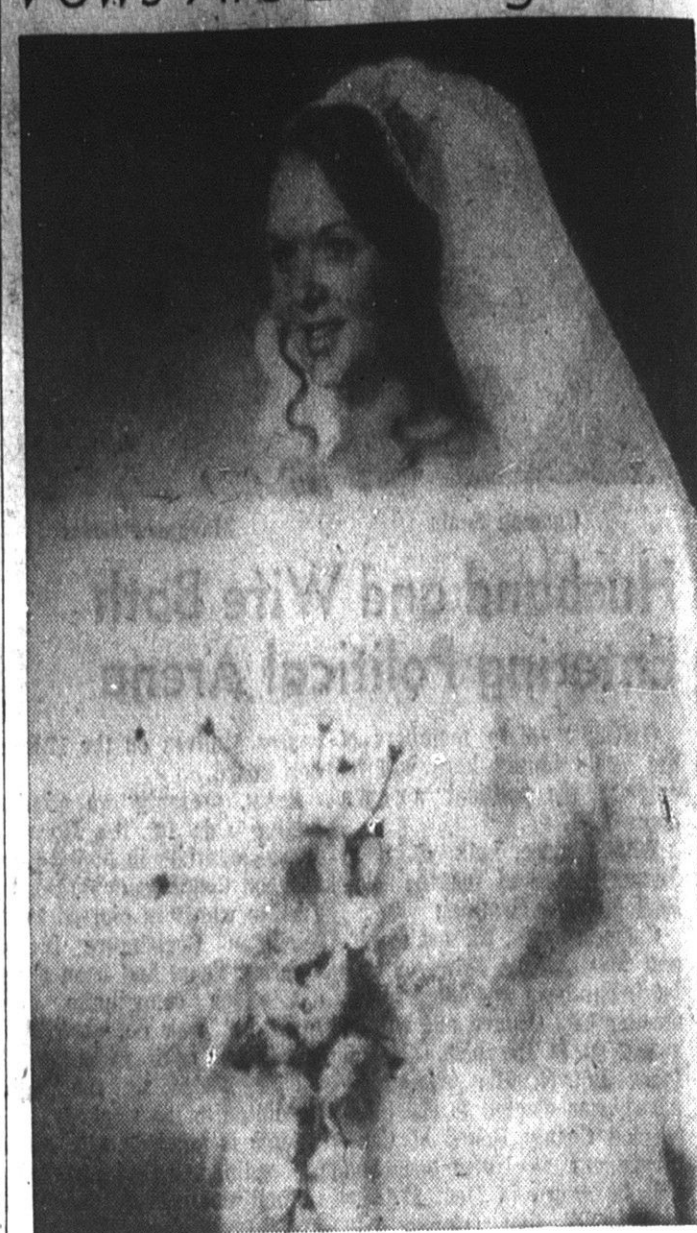

With four Holland High basketball players scoring in double figures here Tuesday night in the Fieldhouse, the Dutch got sweet revenge from county rival West Ottawa by taking a 75-41 decision.

Last year the Panthers nipped the Dutch, 57-55 in the first meeting ever between the two schools on the basketball court. But Holland's fine club wasn't about to let that happen again, as they breezed to its fifth straight victory compared to an opening setback to powerful Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills.

New Coach Joe Jauch's Panthers slipped to an overall record of 1-6.

Senior forward Jim Helmink led the scoring parade for both teams with 17 points in this rough and exciting contest. Tom De Vries, who has more moves on the court than a "cat," followed with 14 while Steve Shinabarger and Dave Brownson chipped in with 11 each. Doug Cook was the lone West Ottawa player to reach double figures with 13.

The Panthers were able to only hit 12 field goals out of 52 attempts for a cool 23 per cent while Holland made 27 of 64 shots for 42 per cent.

Holland did win the battle of turnovers, as they committed a season game high of 23 while West Ottawa was called for 22 infractions.

Helmink got the Dutch machine rolling at the outset of the tilt by putting in a layup. Brownson added a free throw and De Vries banked in a basket to increase the lead to 5-0 before Cook netted the first of his five consecutive charity throws in the quarter.

West Ottawa continued to play a fine first period even though they ended up on the short side of the ledger by a 20-11 score.

With the score 22-16 in favor of the Dutch, Mark Frego, who replaced Shinabarger in the starting lineup, canned two field goals, Shinabarger added a bucket and Helmink and De Vries both dropped in two free throws to give Holland a comfortable 32-16 advantage.

Jim Bagladi's two-pointer late in the half cut Holland's margin to 20 points at the half, 40-20.

West Ottawa managed to tally nine points in the third period while Holland was mustering 16, and 12 markers in the final quarter to 19 for the Dutch to make the final score 75-41 in favor of Holland.

"We were real happy to defeat the Panthers and I was especially pleased to see forward Ryan Woodall block those three shots late in the first half," said coach Don Piersma.

Holland's coach doesn't believe in running up the score, as he started to substitute in the second quarter. "I was glad that we got the opportunity to use everyone," he concluded.

The Dutch reserves stopped the Panthers, 73-50 in the prelude contest for their fourth win of the season in six games. West Ottawa dropped to a 3-4 mark.

Jed De Boer led Holland to the victory with 26 points while the Panthers' Con Zomermaand pumped in 23 for the losers.

Ron Israels followed De Boer with 17 marekrs while Steve Miller and Mike Windisch added 10 each for Holland. Doug Vork drilled in 10 points for West Ottawa.

West Ottawa will play at Kentwood on Jan. 8 while the Dutch will host St. Joseph on the same date.

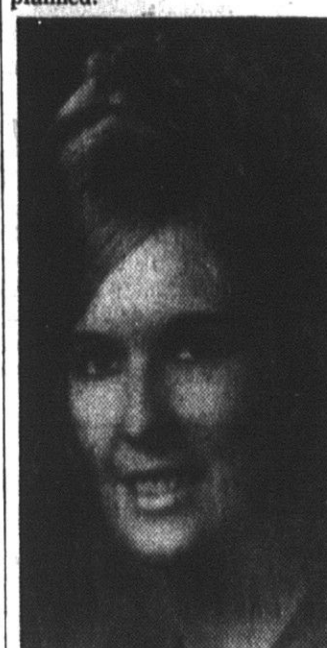

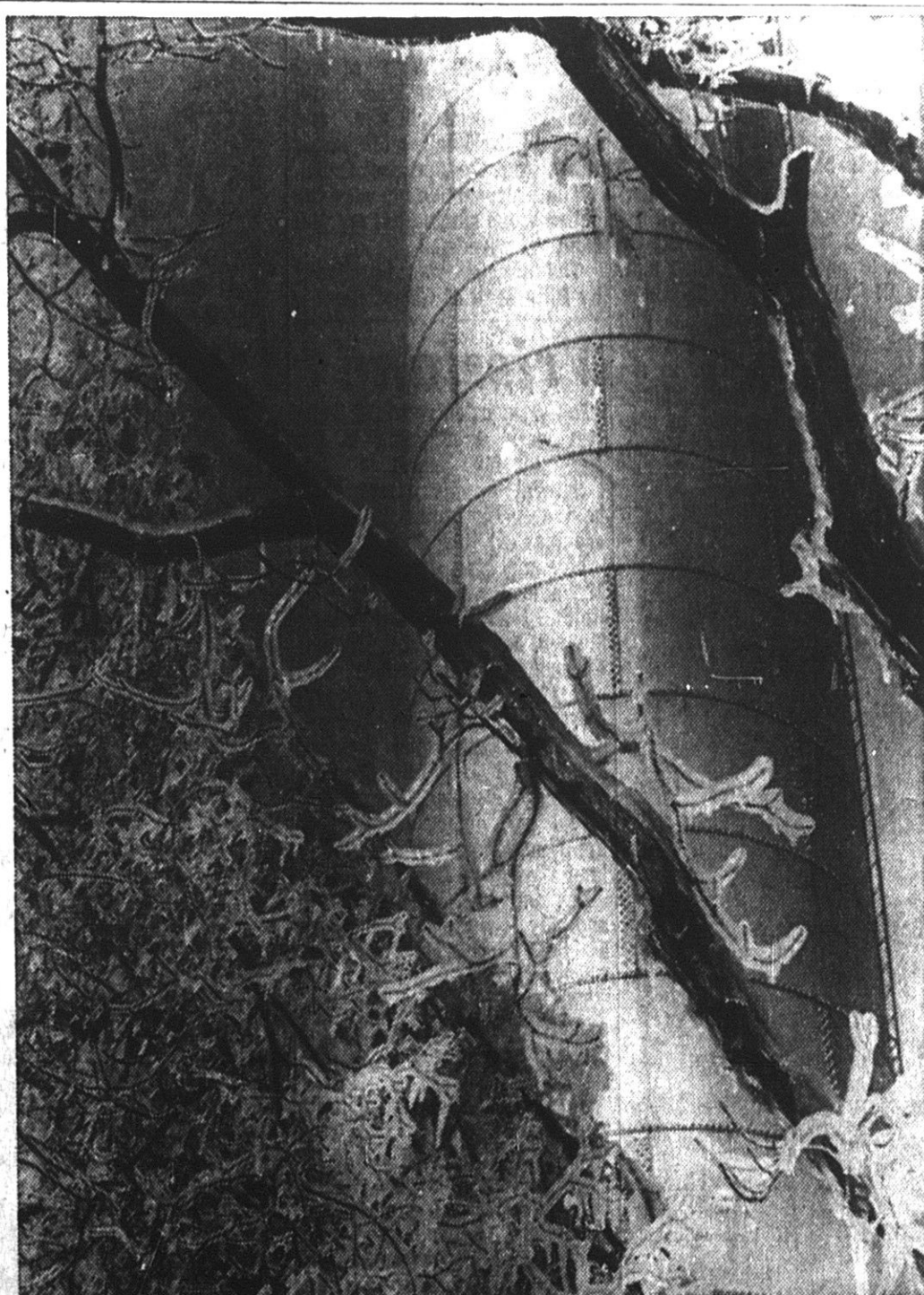

## Top Herds Are Listed In Community

High herds in DHIA Dairy Herd Improvement Association, for the month of October went to John Fraaza of Zeeland with 18,310 lbs. milk and 724 lbs. butterfat; John Goudzwaard of Byron Center with 17,801 lbs. milk and 704 lbs. butterfat; Gordon Schreur, Zeeland, with 17,457 lbs. milk and 646 lbs. butterfat; and Mast Bros. of Zeeland with 17,029 lbs. milk and 656 lbs. butterfat.

High herds for the month of November went to Albert Potgieter of Allendale with 19,126 lbs. milk and 730 lbs. butterfat; John Fraaza with 18,397 lbs. milk and 726 lbs. butterfat and John Goudzwaard with 17,613 lbs. milk and 699 lbs. butterfat.

One of the scientific papers at the American Society for Horticultural Science indicates that chemicals that prune woody plants by killing new growth, already in use by Ohio nurserymen, may be available to home gardeners within a year or two.

Dr. P. C. Kozel, researcher in the Dept. of Horticulture, Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center, Wooster, reported dramatic results in tests of a chemical agent that prunes by selectively killing only the young shoots. The results are well-branched plants with a minimum of manual labor. The chemical is marketed under the trade name of Off-Shoot-O.

Shortage of skilled hand labor to perform crucial pruning and weeding operations in the nursery industry has often resulted in less profit to the grower. The development of such chemical sprays can mean improved production efficiency and increased availability of planting stock for home owners and landscapers.

In their study in 1968 Ohio scientists sprayed leaves of rhododendron, azaleas, container, privet and other ornamental plants with Off-Shoot-O in the spring when new shoots were only about 1/2 inch long. Concentrations of 3 to 5 per cent killed the tips within 12 hours of application.

According to Dr. Kozel, Off-Shoot-O may be on the market in aerosol spray form within two years.

## County Approves Increase in Funds

ALLEGAN — The Allegan County Board of Commissioners Monday approved a \$500,000 increase in funds appropriated for a sanitary sewer system for the City of Wayland.

Wayland stood to lose \$500,000 in state and federal funds Dec. 31 if the board had withheld approval of the additional funds.

The board had approved a \$1.2 million bond issue April 9 to cover the city's share of the tax system, estimated to cost \$1.62 million. The low bid on the project was \$2.1 million, however, necessitating the extra appropriation.

## Century-Old Store Closes In Oakland

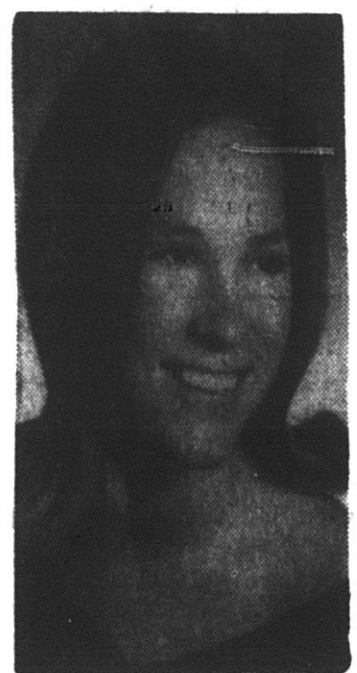
The little grocery store in Oakland, on route 1, Hamilton, closed Dec. 26 after more than 100 years of business.

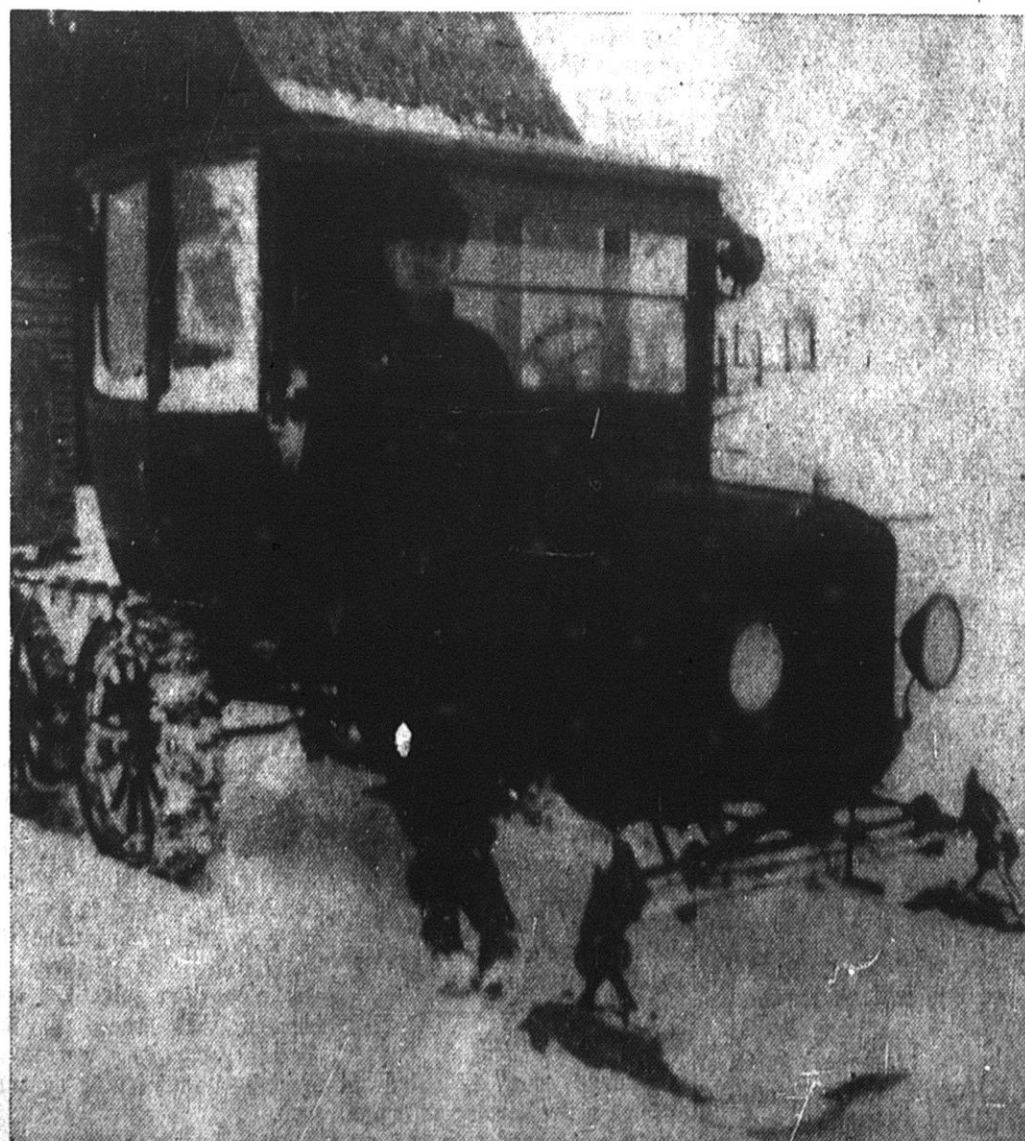
