Bell Telephone Expansion Set

Michigan Bell Telephone Co. said Wednesday that it will spend \$420,000 next year to expand and improve telephone service in Holland.

Kenneth J. Whalen, Michigan Bell president, said in Detroit that the expenditure is part of the company's record \$260,245,000 construction program for 1970. It tops this year's by some \$26,000,000 and marks the first time the company-wide outlay will exceed the quarter-billion-dollar figure.

"The size of next year's construction program reflects not only the company's confidence in the future of Michigan, but also our determination to provide the amount and quality of communication services necessary to serve the public," Whalen said.

"We have been able to maintain good service and keep pace with the sharply rising demands on our facilities," he said. "But recently we have had to raise our sights to make sure

our construction plans are in line with changing customer needs."

Whalen disclosed that part of the 1970 program will be financed through the sale of a \$150,000,000 debenture issue, largest in the company's history. Directors of Michigan Bell already have authorized the sale and, if all regulatory approvals are obtained, bids are expected to be opened next February.

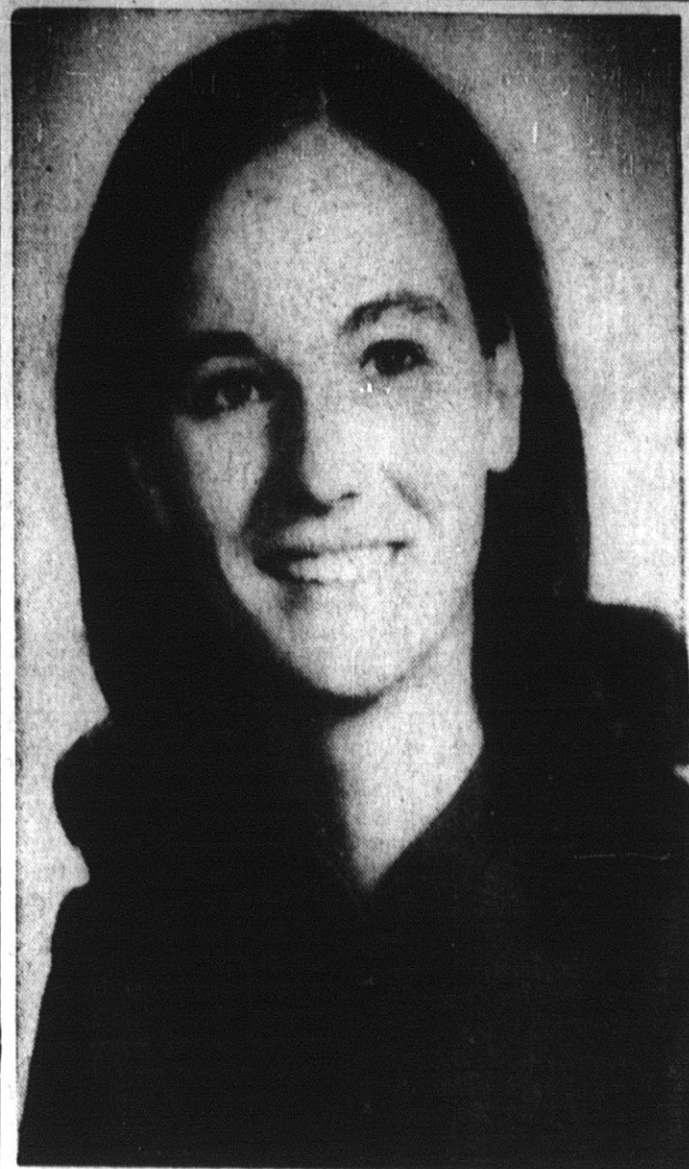
Carl J. Marcus, Michigan Bell manager here, said next year's total expenditure for Holland will be alloted as follows: Outside plant facilities, \$125,000; telephone equipment in homes and offices, \$125,000 and central office equipment, \$170,000.

Statewide, the 1970 program calls for the start of two new buildings and 17 large building additions. Nine new buildings and 14 additions, started last year, also will be completed.

Included in the program is Michigan Bell's largest single building project in history, the \$35 million corporate headquarters building now being erected in downtown Detroit. The 17-story structure is scheduled to be finished in 1972.

Michigan Bell expects to add 200,000 telephones next year, and anticipates serving about 4.5 million telephones by the end of 1970. The company expects to handle more than 5 billion local and long distance calls next year.

To handle the new orders for phone service and to fill increased requests for better grade of service such as private lines, the company plans to install about 13 billion conductor feet of exchange cable.

Rites Held Here For Slain Coed

Sermon Quotes Poem Victim Had Written In High School Days

"I live for God,
"I exist for a reason."

Thus began the fourth stanza of a poem written during her Holland High School days by Betsy Aardsma, 22-year-old graduate student who was fatally stabbed late Friday afternoon in the library of Pennsylvania State University.

The poem entitled "Why Do I Live?" served as the basis for the message of the Rev. Gordon Van Oostenburg at funeral services for Miss Aardsma Wednesday afternoon in Trinity Reformed Church, the coed's home church.

"This poem was found among Betsy's effects after her death and was dated in 1965," Rev. Van Oostenburg said. The first two stanzas of seven lines each, written in free verse, spoke of living for one's self and the latter two about living for God.

The poem which appeared in a student publication concluded: "I am living in preparation for death/What I live for will last/And increase in the face of eternity/Time is my friend/Time is my beginning."

Rev. Van Oostenburg chose his text from I Corinthians 15:55-58 emphasizing "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? ... Thanks be to God which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

He chose the theme after talking with one of Betsy's close friends, a senior at the University of Michigan, who requested an Easter theme if anything should happen to her in Ann Arbor where several coeds had been murdered.

Burial was in Pilgrim Home cemetery in Holland.

Meanwhile, authorities in Pennsylvania sifted through clues in the hunt for the killer. State police in University Park, Pa., said they had received more than 75 phone calls from persons volunteering information about the death of Miss Aardsma but added it was "difficult to tell at this time" whether the calls contained pertinent information.

Some of those who called had been in the huge Pattee Library last Friday when the coed was stabbed in the chest. Lt. William Kimmel said. She cried once for help and died within minutes.

Kimmel said police had no clues to the identity of the slayer or a motive. He declined to say if the death weapon had been located.

Two unidentified men seen near the student while she lay wounded "have not come forward," Kimmel said. The two men spoke with an unidentified girl student who answered the victim's call for help and then they quickly left the scene.

"They seemed to be in a hurry to get away from the area," Kimmel said.

The slaying took place between seven-foot-high book shelves on the second level of six-level stacks in a wing of the library which was "almost deserted," police said. It was thought about 90 students were scattered throughout the sprawling building at the time of the murder.

Miss Aardsma, a graduate of the University of Michigan, was studying English and art at Penn State. She had talked with her family here on Thanksgiving Day, the day before she was killed, and told them "everything is fine."

Five more full-time men have been assigned to the case which brings the total to 23 full-time investigators on campus. Many others are working on fragmentary leads off campus.

Suit Establishes Property Value

GRAND HAVEN — Another dispute over the value of property in Zeeland township, sought by the State Highway Department for the proposed extension of I-196 from Grandville to Holland south of the present M-21 highway, was settled in Ottawa Circuit Court after a two-day trial Tuesday.

The state had offered Lester Mulder, Zeeland, \$22,100 and a jury gave a verdict late Tuesday of \$28,500 for property in the township, owned by Mulder. The jury was out 40 minutes.

Olive Resident Dies in Crash

Ottawa county marked its 35th traffic fatality of the year Friday afternoon with the death of John Arens, 76, route 2, Holland, who was fatally injured in a two-car crash at 2:56 p.m. at 112th Ave. and Port Sheldon Rd., a mile east of Crisp in Olive township. The Arens home is on the southwest corner of the intersection where the crash occurred.

The other car was driven by Steven Grassmid, 17, route 1, Zeeland, who was headed west on Port Sheldon. Ottawa sheriff's officers said Arens had pulled out of his driveway and was attempting to make a left turn into another driveway at his home.

Grassmid was passing the Arens car when the latter made a left turn, and was struck broadside by the Grassmid car. Arens was pinned in his car and it required two wreckers to pull the cars apart before Arens could be taken to Holland Hospital by ambulance. He died at 4:45 p.m. of chest injuries, according to Dr. Edward Helbing of Holland who served as medical examiner.

Grassmid sought his own treatment for chin lacerations. Sheriff's officers are continuing the investigation.

Mr. Arens was a member of South Olive Christian Reformed Church.

Surviving are his wife, Dena; two brothers, Jack and Dick of Holland; four sisters, Mrs. Harry (Jennie) Nienhuis, Mrs. Frank (Hattie) Brandens, Mrs. Henry (Grace) Dams of Holland and Mrs. John (Katherine) Rozema of Grand Rapids; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Richard Arens of Grand Rapids.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. in South Olive Christian Reformed Church with the Rev. Edward Tamminga officiating. Burial will be in Restlawn Memorial Gardens.

Relatives are asked to meet in the church basement at 1:15 p.m. Friends and relatives may meet the family at Notier-Ver Lee-Langeland Funeral Chapel Sunday from 2 to 4 and 8 to 9 p.m. and Monday from 7 to 9 p.m.

Two More Arrested On Drug Counts

An examination for Mario Hernandez, 25, of 148 East 17th St., charged with illegal sale of marijuana, was held in Holland District Court this morning and he was bound over to Ottawa Circuit Court to appear Dec. 22. The alleged offense occurred Oct. 8. Bond of \$10,000 was continued, not furnished.

GRAND HAVEN — Two 14-year-old boys were turned over to Ottawa County Juvenile Court Tuesday afternoon for allegedly smashing two windows in the John Yonker home in Spring Lake a week ago.

Sgt. Jack Rosema of the Ottawa sheriff department said ball bearings were used to smash the two windows, one a picture window and the other a bedroom window, valued at \$225.

Two weeks ago the pair allegedly smashed an ornamental ball on a white stand in the front yard of the Yonker home. This damage was estimated at \$22. Officers said the boys reside in the area of the Yonker home.

Area Woman Dies in Crash Of 2 Trucks

GRAND HAVEN — A 52-year-old Holland woman became Ottawa County's 36th traffic fatality of the year in a collision of two trucks at 1:29 p.m. Wednesday at US-31 and Buchanan St. in Grand Haven township about three miles south of Grand Haven.

The victim was Mrs. Gladys Walker, of 4205 56th Ave., Holland.

She was a passenger in a pickup truck driven by her husband, Earl Stanley Walker, 61, who is in critical condition with severe head injuries. He remained unconscious in North Ottawa Community Hospital in Grand Haven.

The other vehicle was a semi loaded with Christmas trees heading north on US-31, driven by Gary R. Broge, 46, Madison, Wis. Broge was turning right onto Buchanan when the Walker pickup crashed into the left rear of the truck trailer. The top of the Walker vehicle was sheared off as it went under the semi.

The truck driver and his companion, Nathan Burkhalter, 18, also of Madison, Wis., were not injured.

Ottawa sheriff's officers were assisted at the scene by the Tri-Cities rescue squad and state police.

Mrs. Walker is survived by the husband; a son, Donald Hatfield, serving with the U. S. Air Force; a stepdaughter, Bonnie Lee Walker at home; two brothers, Andrew Wagner of Muskegon and Charles T. Gleason of Lapeer and two sisters, Mrs. Grace Ream of Nunica and Miss Mary L. Gleason of Lapeer.

Mrs. Walker was a member of the Holland Salvation Army. The body was taken to Notier-Ver Lee - Langeland funeral home. Funeral arrangements are pending notification of the son in the Air Force and the condition of the husband injured in the crash.

City Council Approves Data Processing Plans

By a unanimous vote, City Council Wednesday night approved plans for an on-site, shared-time Data Processing Service Center for the city of Holland.

Approval comes after twenty months of investigation by a data processing study committee, appointed by Mayor Nelson Bosman April 1, 1968.

The committee employed the Alexander Grant Co. management advisory services to conduct a feasibility study for data processing in Holland.

Alexander Grant Co. recommended a General Electric 115 computer, to be located at Holland Hospital and shared by the Hospital, the Board of Public Works, Herrick Public Library, and the general city.

The resolution approved by Council establishes a permanent Computer Services Committee to serve as advisors to City Council, the city manager, and the board of the participating agencies.

The computer services committee is to be made up of four members, representing Holland

Two Public Hearings Pass Quickly

Two public hearings took but little time at a meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

One was an application of Tri-Cities Engineering Inc. for a fire district ordinance with respect to constructing an auto dealership building for Willard Motors at 1049 Washington Ave. The only restriction mentioned was one from the fire chief which provided no auto body work or spray painting is done within the building.

The other was an application of Ray Mossell for an addition to a restaurant at 855 Washington Ave. Both were approved.

Council also was informed that the Michigan Inspection Bureau has reviewed the proposed fire station location at 32nd St. and Waverly Rd. and find this location will provide adequate response distances to the industrial park and in combination with the existing fire station will provide mainly adequate response distances to the eastern portion of the city. The report was filed.

Council approved an application from the South Shore Car Wash for a permit to construct a metal accessory building between the existing pumps at 523 West 17th St.

Acting City Manager D. W. Schipper submitted a report from Adrian Koert, traffic consultant, on a communication from School Supt. Donald L. Ihrman on observations on signing and traffic marking at various schools in the city. Koert suggested consideration be given to establishing standards for school signs and Council concurred. Koert also commented on several other communications from local citizens on traffic matters.

Council decided to table a recommendation transferring \$2,200 from the contingency account for improvements in the office of the new city manager, William Bopf, who will arrive here Jan. 5, preferring to let the new manager make his own choices.

Council also authorized an additional \$50 a week for City Clerk Schipper during the period he is serving as acting city manager.

Councilman Robert Dykstra said complaints of downtown noise and squealing tires had been registered at a council meeting June 4 and he moved to remind the police chief. Council concurred.

The resolution also states that the staff of the Computer Services Center shall report administratively to the city manager, who will direct the department in meeting objectives set by the computer services committee and approved by Council.

Bell of the Board of Public Works, Frederick Burd of Holland Hospital and Frank Sherburne of Herrick Public Library expressed pleasure at the fine cooperation shown by the four city agencies working on the data processing proposal.

City Council discharged the Data Processing Study Committee of further duties.

Annexation Effective On Dec. 20

A part of Holland township known as Waverly Heights will become part of the city at 12:01 a.m. Dec. 20, City Council was informed at its regular meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

City Attorney Gordon Cunningham has appointed James Townsend as special counsel to evolve a settlement agreement with the township. It was indicated all city services such as police, fire, street plowing, library and environmental health will go into effect that day.

The area in question is 1/16 mile, a strip lying between US-31 bypass and Waverly Rd. running from Eighth to 16th Sts. The area has about 50 residences and three commercial properties. Residents in this area voted 54 to 22 to merge with the city in a special election last Oct. 21. The combined vote of that city plus the remainder of the township favored the move 2,024 to 854.

Council rejected bids for a 1970 model 25,000 GVS truck with a six-cylinder engine for the street department, pending greater circulation of bid notices to other International dealers in this area. Two bids had been received, one from International Harvester for \$8,965 and another from R. E. Barber for \$8,969.59 although the latter bid did not qualify since it was bidding on a V-8 engine. De Nooyer Chevrolet had indicated it was unable to bid due to specifications.

Councilman L. W. Lamb Jr. felt that writing specifications to a six-cylinder engine was in essence a hoax since only International could provide such a model. City Engineer Herold Derks explained that a six-cylinder engine works better on city streets which must be plowed at slow speeds or snow will be thrown into walks or on front porches. He said county plows can plow suburban areas with higher-powered engines but these trucks can hit higher speeds elsewhere to eliminate carbon deposits.

Derks said the same subject was discussed three or four years ago and a meeting was held with local dealers to discuss the rather unique problems of plowing equipment. He said failure to circulate specifications among more International dealers had been an error and he recommended rejecting all bids and re-advertising.

A Planning Commission recommendation to rezone approximately 1½ blocks bordered by 19th St. on the south, College Ave. on the west, Columbia Ave. on the east and midway between 17th and 18th Sts. on the north from A-2 one and two - family residential property to A-3 residential property. The matter was referred to the city attorney for drafting the necessary ordinance.

Council set Dec. 17 at 7:30 p.m. as date for a public hearing on an application from Breuker and Den Bleyker for a fire district variance for constructing a plumbing and heating business building at 540 East 24th St.

A petition for paving and curb and gutter in 37th St. from the end of the existing pavement to a point 350 feet east of Washington Ave. was referred to the acting city manager.

Council granted permission to Providence Christian Reformed Church to play Christmas music over a public address system in the church tower. Council also authorized the city manager to issue similar permits for Christmas music to other organiza-

tions.

Oaths of office were filed for Ralph Bouwman and A. James Prins as members of the City Board of Canvassers.

Council acknowledged two gifts reported by the Hospital Board, one a grant of \$800 from Weyth Laboratories and the other a Foreign Body Locator valued at \$900 from the Holland Lions Club.

Council approved low bid of three entered by Tarrant Manufacturing Co. for a new leaf loader at a cost of \$2,943.62. City Engineer Derks said the new loader will replace one in service 22 years.

A proposed resolution in connection with a permit for constructing a sanitary sewer in US-31 business route was approved by Council. This calls for 600 feet of eight-inch sanitary sewer together with manholes and service connections inside the east right-of-way of the business route on Washington Ave. from 40th St. south.

Certifications were confirmed for Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho Service, \$20.24; Councilman Lamb, Inc., \$293.40; Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolts Inc., \$63, and Councilman Smith, Wade Drug Co., \$70.64.

Mayor Nelson Bosman presided at the meeting which lasted 50 minutes. He welcomed a roomful of students from the E. E. Fell Junior High School government classes of Dorothy Bradish and Mrs. Carl Van Lente. All Councilmen were present except Elmer Wissink. The invocation was given by the Rev. Harvey Baas of Bethany Christian Reformed Church.

Remodeled House Levelled by Fire

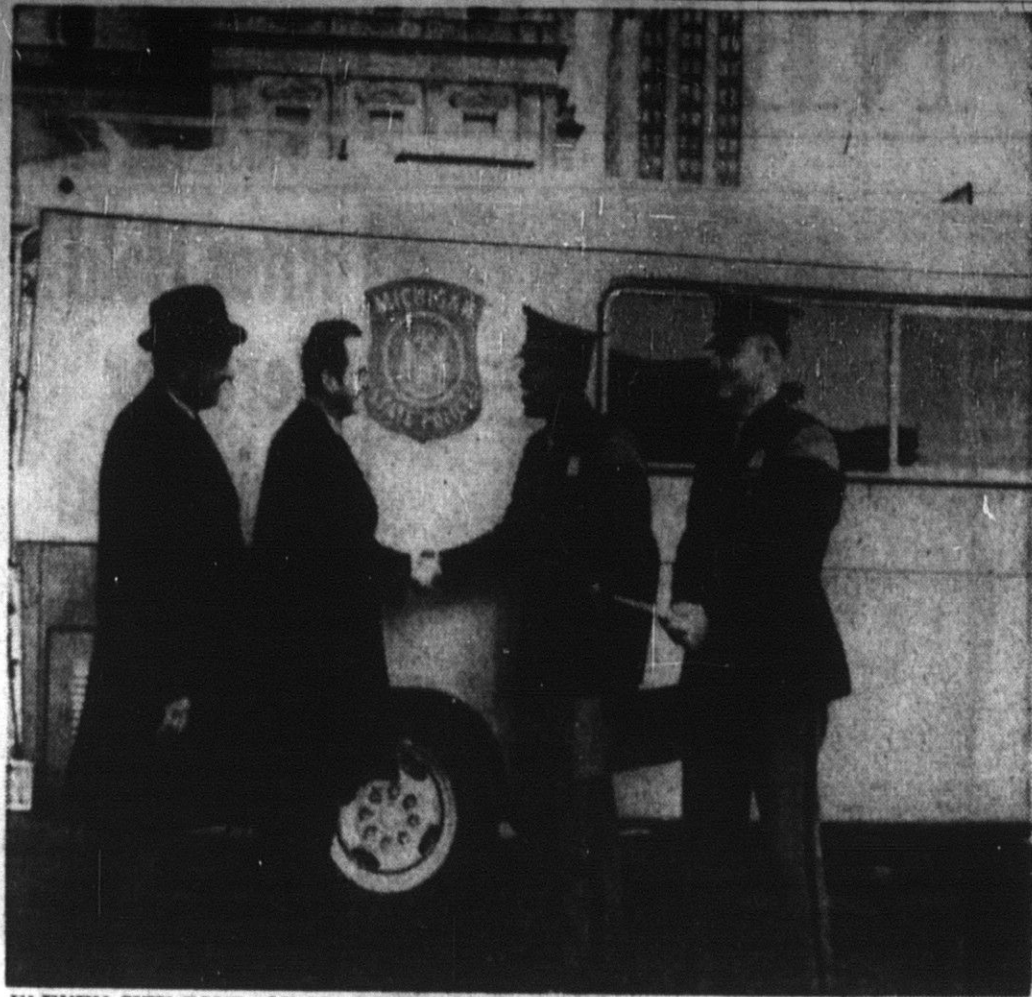
JAMESTOWN — A two-story frame house at 1915 40th Ave. which had just been completely remodeled was completely destroyed by fire early Tuesday.

State Police List Stops On Recruit Tour

The Michigan State Police recruiting van will visit Pontiac, Flint, Saginaw and Lansing during the period December 9-12 in the current campaign for trooper applicants from all races and walks of life, said Col. Frederick E. Davids, department director.

Manning the "recruitmobile" is Tpr. Jack Hall, the first Negro officer enlisted by the department who qualified for recruiting duty this fall. He joined the State Police in 1967, served first at Flint, then at Niles. He will work with other recruiters on the tour.

Pontiac — Tuesday, Dec. 9, Wide Track Drive at Saginaw.
Flint — Wednesday, Dec. 10, Saginaw at Stewart St.

Saginaw — Thursday, Dec. 11, Fort Saginaw Mall, Outer Drive at Holland.
Lansing — Friday, Dec. 12, Drop-In Center, Butler and Kalamazoo.

Eligible to apply for State Police trooper careers are men 21 to 30 years old inclusive, who are American citizens and who have been residents of Michigan at least a year.

They must have a high school education or the equivalent, be at least 5 feet 9 inches tall and weigh at least 150 but not more than 230 pounds, with weight in proportion to height.

Applicants must be in good physical condition and meet certain vision and hearing standards. They must be of good moral character and have no serious arrest record. They may be married or single.

Pay in the trooper rank begins at an annual rate of \$7,579 (or \$290.40 biweekly) and increase automatically in regular steps to a maximum of \$10,648 (or \$408 biweekly) beginning with the sixth year. Longevity pay is additional annually after six years.

Uniforms and equipment are furnished, fringe benefits include a chance to enroll in cost-shared insurance programs, and there is opportunity for promotion after five years. Advancement in rank also brings an increase in pay.

An excellent pension system allows a State Police officer to retire at half pay after 25 years of service. This pension also protects the retired officer's wife in event of his death.

Young men unable to visit the "recruitmobile" may contact their nearest State Police post for trooper application information or write to the Michigan Civil Service Commission at Lansing.

Of the township taxes, \$21,572.29 will be drain taxes; \$9,110.14 special lighting district assessment and \$10,964.07 fire equipment fund.

Applications for homestead exemptions for veterans and retired persons totaling \$13,077.27 were filed with the state.

Residents may pay taxes weekdays through Feb. 14 at the Park Township Hall at 1464 Ottawa Beach Rd., from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Dog licenses may be obtained at that time.

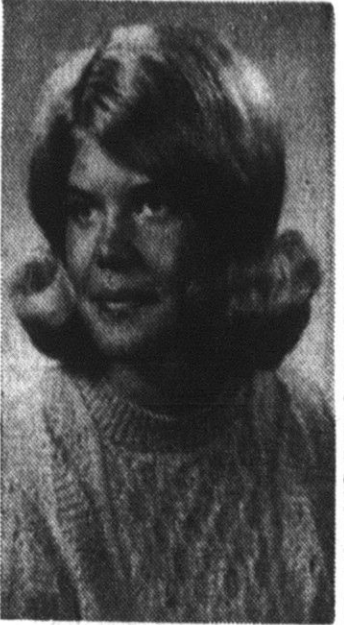

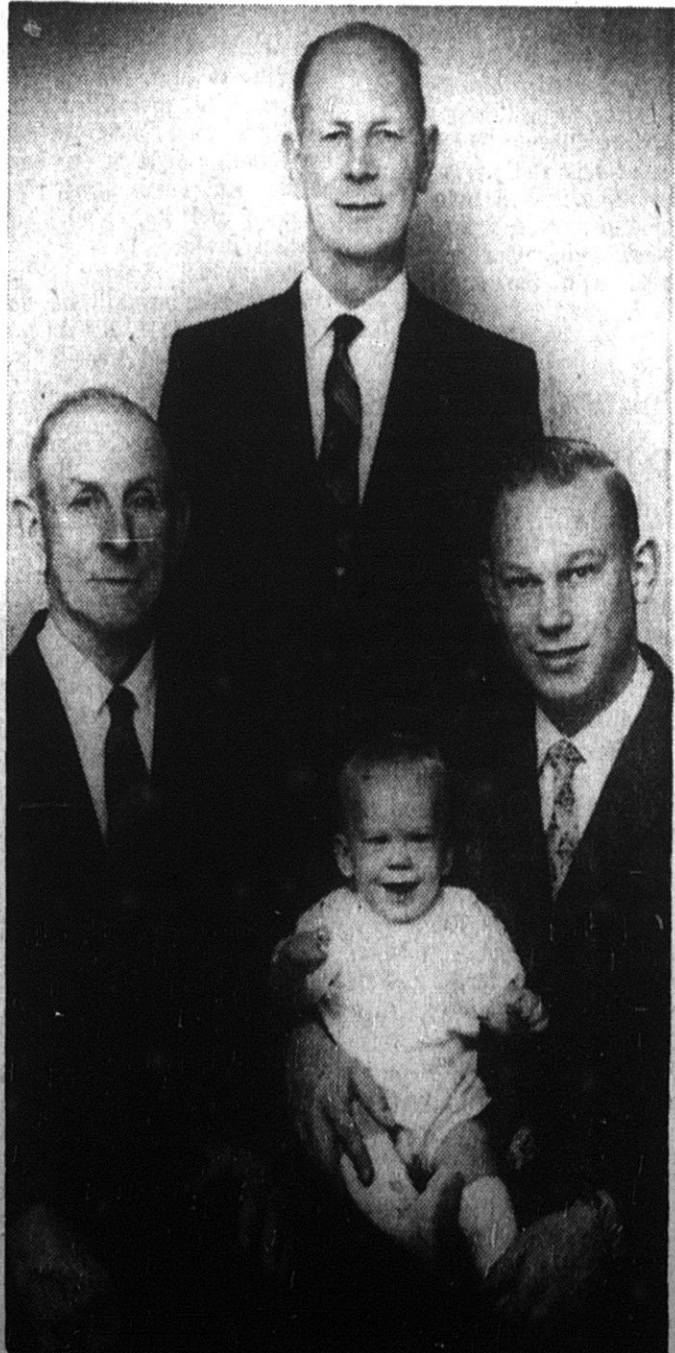

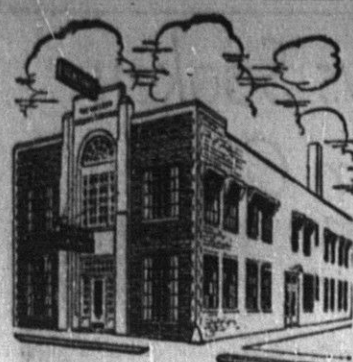

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FATE AND THE FISHBOWL

Monday the fate of about 850,000 young men between the ages of 19 and 26 was somewhat clarified by picking their numbers out of a fishbowl. What was settled is their eligibility for the draft. First 366 dates of the year, including February 29, were drawn and the order of drawing of these dates set the order of eligibility according to birthday.

Then the letters of the alphabet will be drawn to determine the order of call for a given date. It is a simple system, one that worked for us in 1917 and during World War II.

The effect of the system will be to shorten the time of suspense from seven years to one year. If a young man's number falls late in order of selection, he may not be called in that year and this means that his liability to call is past.

In this way he can plan his future without the constant threat of being interrupted by military service.

From a psychological point of view this is vastly superior to the system we have been using. The young man whose number is drawn can be deferred but he must serve his hitch when his deferment has expired. This should reduce complaints about unfairness. After Monday the young men in this country should feel better about their military obligations.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, Dec. 7

The Promise of the Messiah
Isaiah 52:13 through 53:6
By C. P. Dame

The Bible contains many promises. In the Old Testament there are numerous promises regarding the coming of the Messiah. Isaiah tells more about His coming and the purpose of it than any other prophet. This lesson portrays the Messiah, the Redeemer of man's sin.

I. Jesus is described as God's servant. Several hundred years before Christ came, Isaiah foretold His atoning death. "Behold, my servant"—thus begins our lesson text. Who is the servant Isaiah mentions? The question is answered variously. Some say that Israel the nation is meant. Others have the idea that the spiritual remnant of Israel is the servant. A number think that a great historical person is meant. Evangelical believers firmly hold the idea that Jesus is the Servant whom Isaiah describes.

Lately the word "servant" has become popular. In the Old Testament several men are called God's servants. Jesus spoke of Himself as a servant. Peter and Paul called themselves servants of the Lord. All Christians are servants. Every servant is bound to be of service to the Lord and to be submissive to His will.

In Isaiah 52:13 through 53:12 is recorded the last of four songs. In this last song the Lord promises that His servant will prosper, that is fulfill His mission, and as a reward God will highly exalt Him. The price however will be high for He will be so disfigured that He will seem like a man who has failed. When Jesus died some thought His life was a failure.

II. God's Servant was despised and rejected. For the most part the people who followed Him did so because of the benefits He gave; the leaders hated Him; His critics said He was a friend of publicans and sinners, a glutton and a winebibber and even said that He was in league with Beelzebub and they finally saw to it that He was crucified. Why such hatred to such a benefactor? Human wickedness is the answer.

What is the attitude of many people to Jesus today? Many ignore Him, multitudes are so busy with their pleasures and activities that they have no time for Him and some reject Him and His teaching which they label as impractical. There are also some who take a patronizing attitude to Him. How do you treat Jesus?

III. Jesus died the just for the unjust. The death of Jesus is explained variously. Some think He died a martyr. Isaiah said that the Servant was "stricken, smitten by God and afflicted. But He was wounded for our transgressions. He was bruised for our iniquities." Jesus suffered the wrath of God—the wrath which should have come upon us. Jesus became a curse for us. The Lord of glory died voluntarily, sacrificially, as our substitute. Recall the words of the hymn, "for me the shameful cross He bore." Jesus knew why He was sent here and He fulfilled His mission—to die for our sins.

Ottawa County Clerk Harris Nieuwsma will conduct a special election Jan. 12 in Park township recalling its five township officers.

Nieuwsma has appointed Mrs. William Lokker, 698 South 160th Ave. (Virginia Park) and Mrs. Willard Haan as deputy clerks. Mrs. Lokker will handle registrations at her home and Mrs. Haan will be in the township office at 1464 Ottawa Beach Rd. Deadline for registration will be Dec. 12 at 8 p.m.

The ballot will have five proposals, one for each officer, and the question on each will be: "Shall (name of officer) be recalled from the office of (title of office)?"

Thus a "yes" vote will be in favor of recall while a "no" vote will be in support of the board members.

If the recall vote carries, present officers will be out as soon as the official canvass is completed. Another election to fill the offices would be held 45 days later. The governor would appoint persons to serve in this 45-day period.

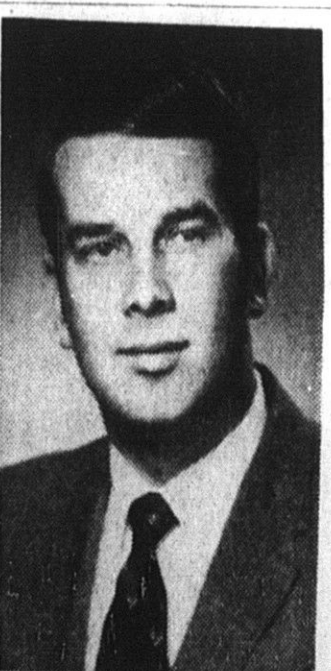

Final Football Data Published

It's that time of the year again when the final football statistics of the area high schools are compiled by The Sentinel's sports staff.

The Dutch of Holland finished the season in the Valley Coast Conference with a 4-1-1 mark and were 6-2-1 overall.

Grand Haven annexed its third VCC title in the five-year history of the league with a perfect 6-0 mark. Muskegon Heights was the first winner of the VCC in 1965 with a 5-0 mark while the Bucs captured the crown in 1966 and 1967.

Holland shared the championship with Mona Shores a year ago with identical 5-1 record.

Gary Constant, Grand Haven's junior halfback set a scoring record for VCC games only with 11 TDs and a two-point conversion for 68 points. The former record of 66 was held by Jeff Chase of Mona Shores in 1968.

Runnerup in scoring for 1969 was Holland's Larry Lamb who tallied 54 points. Kenny De Boer of the Dutch had 48 points while Steve Brems of Grand Haven 42.

Max Glupker, the talented quarterback of the Dutch broke the VCC passing mark by throwing 12 TD passes. The record surpassed Steve Walters of East, Grand Rapids who tossed nine touchdown passes in 1968.

Rick Geerling, Holland's strong power runner from his upback position and linebacker on defense had the longest run with a pass interception for 1969 by going 60 yards for the score.

The VCC again fared poorly outside the family with a 6-14 record. Grand Haven, Holland and Orchard View were 2-1 outside the loop. In the five years of the league, the count is 32-74-7.

De Boer led the Dutch in scoring with 56 points with Lamb second at 54. With Glupker at the controls the Dutch led the VCC in passing by gaining 135.6 yards per league game.

An interesting statistic points out that the Dutch in the five-year history in the VCC have given up the fewest points of any team. Coach Dave Kemper has always said, "good defense will beat good offense," most of the time and this sure proves it.

The Dutch have only given up 441 points in their five years in the loop compared to its nearest challenger, Grand Haven which has been denied for 469 points.

Holland tallied 175 points this season compared to the opposition's 85. In Kemper's five years as the coach of the Dutch, Holland has won 25 games, dropped 15 and tied five. Kemper's teams haven't had a losing season since his debut in 1965 which was considered a rebuilding year when they were 3-6.

Lamb was the big offensive gun in pass receiving for the Dutch this season as the senior end caught 28 passes of which eight went the TD route.

De Boer was the rushing leader and Glupker the passing leader. On defense the Dutch had many standouts with Doug Morse making most of the noise from his middle guard position. Morse has been called the finest interior lineman on defense by many scouts this season.

Coach Ron Wetherbee of West Ottawa had what he called his finest team ever at West Ottawa. Even though the Panthers failed to capture the O-K Red Division Football crown Wetherbee's team was in every game to the very end.

The Panthers started off the season by losing to Holland, 26-14 but then snapped back to smash Kentwood, 34-14 and were on their way to a very successful 6-3 overall mark.

West Ottawa picked up 110 first downs compared to 97 for the enemy. In the air the Panthers mustered 655 yards to 795 for the opposition. But on the ground the Panthers held a commanding margin. The Panthers ground out 1,974 yards to 1,332 for the other teams.

West Ottawa had a strong backfield and the statistics proved just that as four of the Panther backs rushed for more than 200 yards.

All-Conference and all-area tailback Greg Van Wieren led the team in rushing with 779 yards followed by Les Zomermaand who picked up 504 yards from his quarterback position and Jon Helder who played only part-time at tailback mustered 402 yards. Tom Kruihof noted for his defensive play also helped out on offense by rushing for 244 yards.

Kruihof led the Panthers in tackles with 67 solo jobs while also assisting on 33 others. Frank Silva, was second in tackles with 41 while Rod Berkompas and Rick Hamstra tied for third with 38 each.

Zomermaand led the Panthers in scoring with 70 points Kruihof second with 46 points and Van Wieren third with 30 points.

Barry Haltenhoff an off-

sive and defensive tackle was the mainstay of the interior line. Haltenhoff is called by Wetherbee, "one fine tackle."

The Hamilton Hawkeyes finished their season with a 3-5 record and Coach Wayne Tanis said, "We were probably the best 3-5 team in the state."

Tanis' team could have been very easily 6-2 or 5-3 for the year. The Hawks were in every game and in most cases out-gained their opponents statistically speaking.

The Hawkeyes had many fine players but four stood out among the rest. They were halfback Danny Knoff, center Arlan Zoet, fullback Dave Maatman and Randy Busscher a halfback.

Knoll rushed for over 800 yards for the Hawks and Zoet who never had a bad direct snap to the quarterback both made first team all-conference and all-area.

Busscher intercepted eight passes for the Hawks and was a hitter on defense. Tanis said, "Randy is one of the finest defensive backs that I have seen all season."

With Maatman, Knoll, Busscher and Cal Schrotenboer in the same backfield the Hawks had a balanced running and passing game.

Middleville again dominated the Expressway conference but the Hawks did score 32 points against them which was the first time anyone has scored that many against Middleville in the league since 1963.

The Zeeland Chix, under first year head coach Ken Postma finished the season with a fine 7-2 overall mark. The Chix were 5-1 in the loop which was good enough for a second place spot in the O-K Blue Division.

Powerful Northview captured the league title with a 6-0 mark but only defeated the Chix, 21-14 in the second ball game of the season. Zeeland suffered its second defeat of the year in the very last game against West Ottawa, 22-6.

The Chix had many outstanding players but quarterback Bob Lamer had to be rated at the top as he galloped for 723 yards and passed for additional 10 TDs and scored a team high 78 points.

Lamer was voted the MVP of the Chix and Postma said, "it sure was a shame Bob didn't make the first team all-conference because he sure deserved it. He was one of the finest boys that I have ever coached."

Roy DeVries who headed the all-area defensive backfield team led the Chix in pass interceptions with nine and also tied for the most fumble recoveries with Chuck De Pree at three each.

Zeeland picked up an awesome 3,266 yards on the ground and in the air for the season compared to 1,600 for the opposition. The Chix held the upper-hand in first downs with 117 to 80 for the opposition.

Butch Wyngarden led the Chix in kickoff returns by picking up 1,047 yards in 25 attempts for an average of 41.8 which must be some kind of mark.

Mike Zylst, the fine end of the Chix hauled in 28 passes for 551 yards with eight of them going for touchdowns.

Any good football team must have an offensive and defensive line that is capable of opening holes and also capable of stopping the opposition. The Chix had one of the finest tackles in the area in big De Pree who did a standout job on both offense and defense.

Coach Mike Jones of Hudsonville finished the season with a 1-5 mark in the O-K Red Division and were 1-5-1 overall.

Jones had three fine players that received special recognition throughout the season. The Hudsonville standout was Rol Runge who started off the season as an end and switched to tailback and led the team in rushing with 533 yards in only five games.

Randy Vrugink, the Eagles fine quarterback tossed eight TD passes and ran for four himself. Vrugink also passed for over 800 yards and was one of the main reasons the Eagles had such an explosive offense.

Jones cited Morrie Pollman, the Eagles top flight guard as being a strong blocker.

Runge was named to the 1969 Sentinel team as a linebacker and to the O-K Red Loop as a halfback on the second team.

The Fennville Blackhawks finished the season with a 3-3 mark in the KVA standings which was good for a two-way tie for third place with Parchment. For all games Coach Gus Charles II was 5-3 and finished the season strong by taking their last three contests.

Gary Mc Cracken, the fine senior runner led the Blackhawks rushing with 670 yards and scored 76 points to lead all scorers for Fennville. Mc Cracken made the first team in the KVA and also was chosen for a first team birth in the area.

Another all-area selection for Fennville was Gary Thomann who was a strong linebacker on defense for the Blackhawks.

"We also had two other boys that did outstanding jobs to us

this season," Charles said. "They were fullback Bob Leslie and guard Dave Bolin," he continued.

Even though Saugatuck only had a 1-5-1 record for the season, Coach Jerry Kelly's teams record could have easily been just the opposite. The Indians dropped several games throughout the season by a few points and Kelly is looking for better things next season.

Saugatuck picked up 1,460 total yards to 1,699 for the opposition this season. The Indians had 79 first downs to 81 for the enemy.

The Indians placed two players on the 1969 Sentinel's honor team. Tackle Terry Klinge and defensive end and offensive fullback Jim Anderson were named to the squad.

Anderson paced the Indians in rushing with 575 yards on the ground and came in second in pass receiving on the team with 21.

John Bekken, the talented sophomore quarterback on the Indians threw 137 passes and completed 56 for 621 yards. Bekken was picked on the second team all-conference.

The Allendale Falcons found out that you can't compete against varsity competition when you have only freshmen and sophomores on the team.

Even though the Falcons only won one contest they displayed tremendous school spirit. Coach Bill Friberg said, "We only have four buses in the school system and three of them went to every away game."

Friberg was pleased with center Wayne Dyke, Steve Cook a halfback, John Scholten a quarterback and defensive tackle Jim Vanderploeg.

Scholten passed for 411 yards while Herrick led the team in rushing and according to Friberg, "did a real fine job."

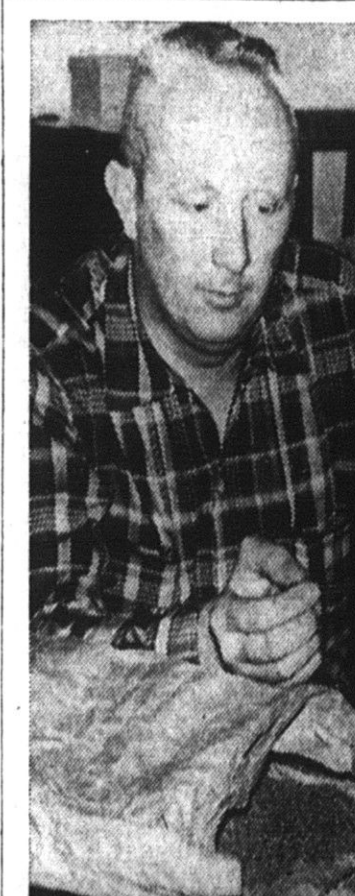

The Vikings maintained their lead during most of the third quarter as a result of fine ball handling by forward Jim Anderson.

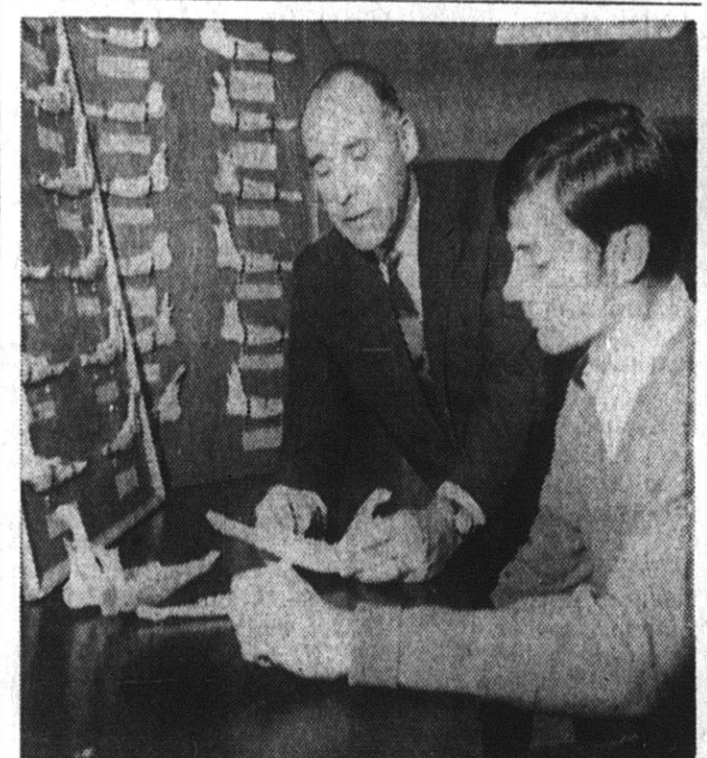
The third quarter ended 53-39 with the Blackhawks facing a 14 point deficit.

Fennville staged a comeback midway in the fourth quarter and were able to come within one point of Hopkins on some clutch shooting by Bob Lesley and Kupres.

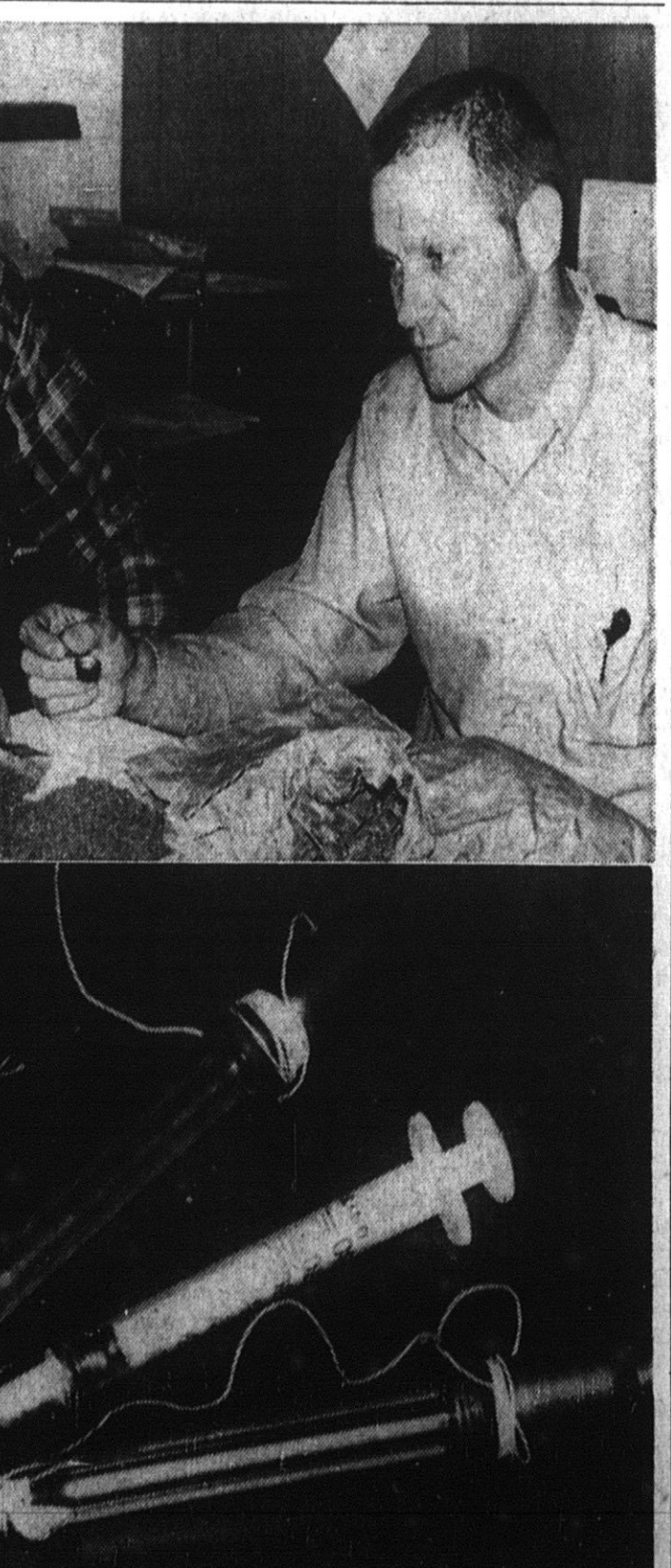

Time ran out on Fennville as the game ended 69-63.

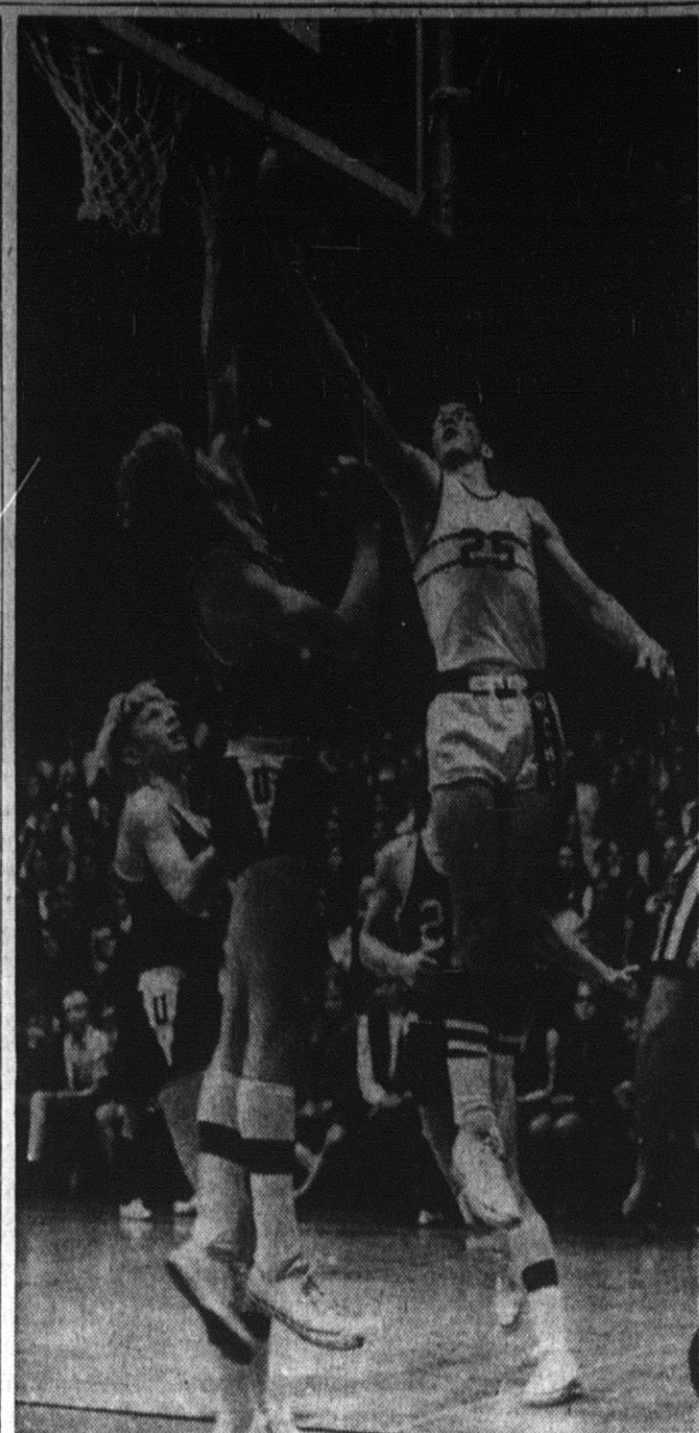

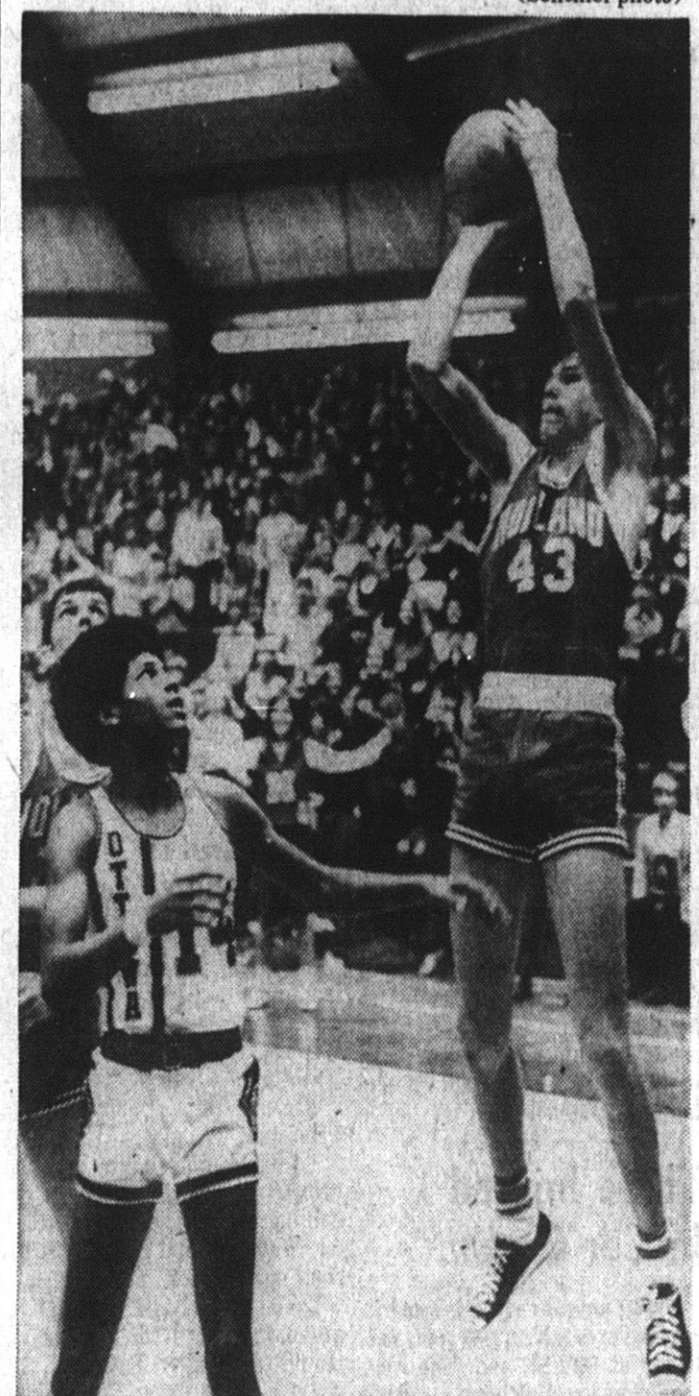

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Holland Roars Back To Triumph

Bring on UCLA, bring on Ohio State, bring on the New York Knicks, yelled the players of Holland after the Dutch pulled off the most stunning upset in recent history here Friday night by roaring from 15 points back to defeat last year's State Class A high school champion, Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills, 64-61 in the season's basketball opener for both schools.

"It was a team effort all the way," jubilant Coach Don Piersma said of his team's performance. "The boys hustled all night and I'm just proud of the way they came back to pull out the victory. It had to be one of our greatest victories ever."

Not even Michigan's great upset over Ohio State can take the headlines away from the Dutch. They played as a unit and deserved to win.

Jim Helmink and Ray Munson were two of many Dutch heroes in the contest. With only 1:08 left in the game, and the Dutch trailing, 61-60 Helmink faked out his man and drove in for the winning basket. Munson iced the game with seven seconds left by swishing two clutch free throws. In the process Munson jumped five feet in the air with joy and he had good reason to.

Holland was down by 15 points, 58-43 midway through the fourth period when Piersma had the Dutch go into their full court press which eventually led to the victory, as they were forcing the Indians into many errors.

Ottawa Hills went into the contest billed again as the team to beat in the state but the Dutch proved otherwise with tremendous team play to pull out the game.

John Hill of the Indians and little but "mighty" Kenny De Boer led both teams in scoring with 18 points. De Boer was all over the place on defense besides doing outstanding on offense.

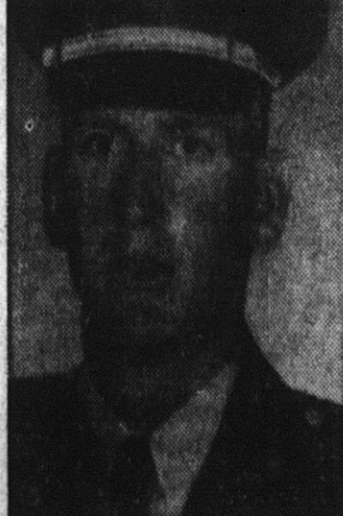

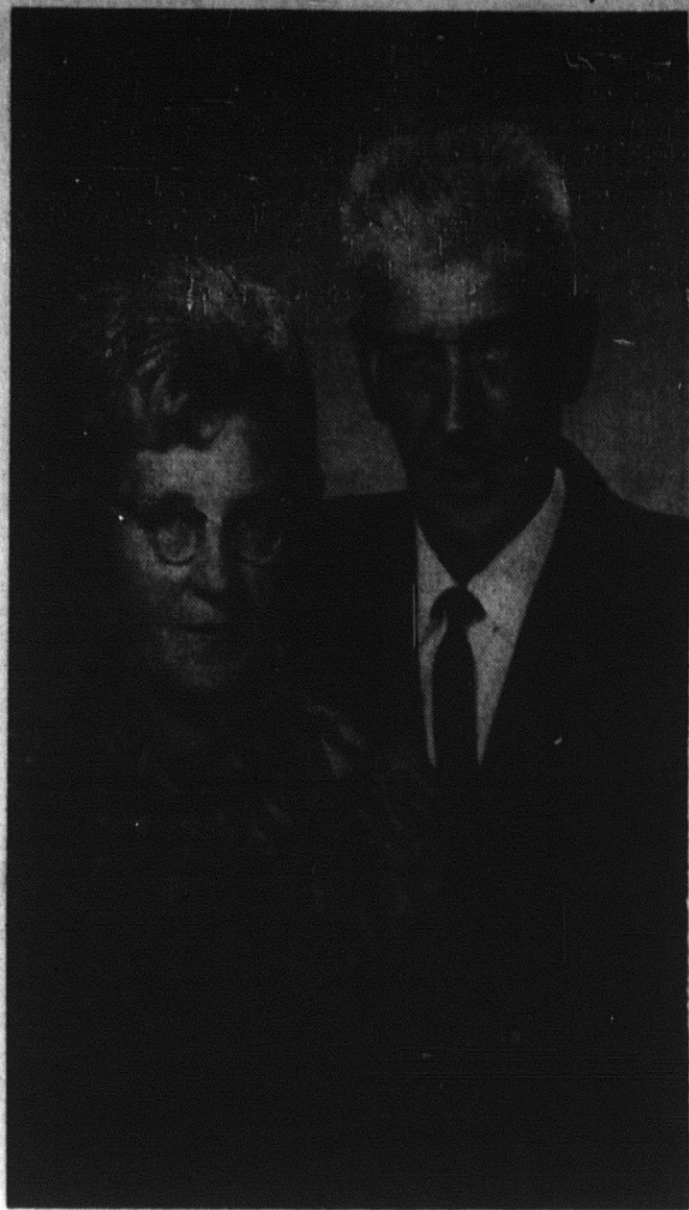

Mrs. Dykman also suffered chest injuries and a broken arm. Her husband was treated at the local hospital and is now in a walking cast.

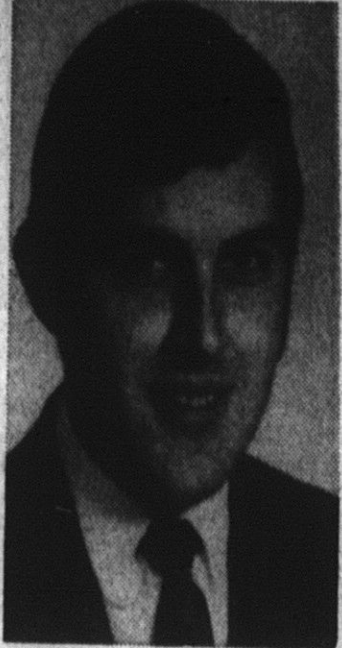

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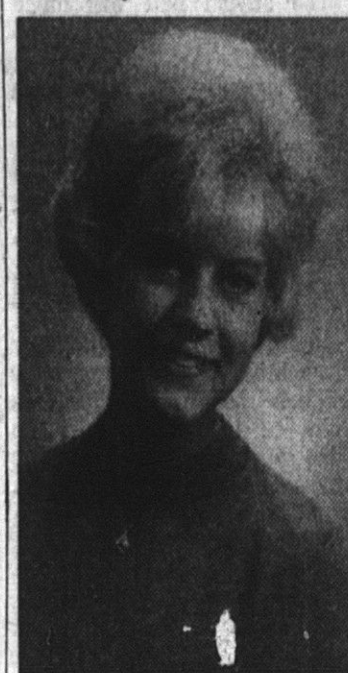

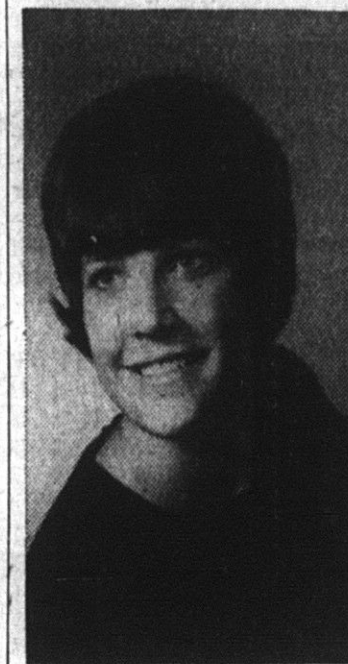
