## Local News.

Mr. John Heald left with his family for Texas last Tuesday evening.

The horse disease is on the increase; for the past few days the horses in the country are being affected, which causes our streets to look deserted, and wood to be scarce.

**REMOVED.**—Mrs. C. M. Rogers has removed her Dress and Gloom making establishment to rooms over J. Albers' Jewelry store on Eighth street, where she may be found ready at all times to wait upon customers.

The socials and oyster suppers held for the few weeks past, to raise funds to purchase an organ for the Union School, have been well patronized by our citizens, and, both peculiarly and socially have been successful.

We stepped into the store of Werkman and Son, one day this week, and found all hands busy, emptying "pick-et-bags" and doing up packages of dry goods, groceries, etc., for their customers, who seemed well pleased with the bargains they had made.

We hear that the firemen are to give a Concert soon, some of our best musical talent has been engaged for the occasion, and we presume that everything will be done to make it a success. They are to use the hall in the new City Hotel.

**A DANCE.**—Cards of invitation are out for a Social Dance at Lawrence Hall, Wednesday evening next. A good time may be expected. Refreshments will be served by L. T. Kanters & Co., and will of course be gotten up in first-class style. We have not yet received either an invitation or complimentary ticket.

**DONATION.**—The friends of Rev. J. Rice Taylor, Rector of the Episcopal Church in this city, will meet him at the residence of Heber Walsh, Tuesday evening next, 26th inst. Mr. Taylor the past year, has labored hard in the interest of his church and the citizens of this place, and we hope the citizens will give substantial evidence that his works are properly appreciated. Immediately after the great fire Mr. Taylor made a tour through the other States for the purpose of collecting funds to rebuild a church in place of the one destroyed by the fire. He has succeeded so far as to induce the building of a much better one than was destroyed; one which will be an honor to the city and a monument to his energy. The amount raised by him to be applied on building here is \$3,500.00, do we appreciate his labors? we shall see.

**WINTER FLOWERS.**—To embellish the home and make it inviting to the children is one of the first requisites of the parent, and we know of nothing which will have a more pleasing tendency than winter flowers. The investment of two or three dollars in the purchase of winter flowering bulbs will brighten and perfume the parlor from December to May. There are bulbs for all seasons, temperaments and tastes, as well as all pockets; and from the cheap cat, flowers grow which are exquisitely beautiful. The opportunity for the display of taste is very large, ranging from cheap varieties costing only five cents to the strange new importations of the florist, with jaw-breaking names, at fabulous prices.

We notice that our friend, K. Schadelee, is, through *De Hollander*, having a little controversy with the editor of *De Grondwet*, wherein the editor is charged with not fulfilling the pledges made prior to his election as Alderman of the Fourth Ward. The editor in his last issue announces that he shall pay no more attention to communications that Mr. S. or any other man may write upon such subjects, evidently giving up beat. Although the contest is ended—unless the editor under a *nom de plume* continues it—the facts as they were will not be forgotten by the voters, and a full vindication of them could do no harm. But as it is their fight, we have nothing more to say than "fight your own battles."

**SIDE WALKS.**—During the snow storm of the last week, our side-walks have been entirely lost sight of, no attention has been paid to them, and they are almost impassable, being covered deeply with snow. We think there is an ordinance relative to cleaning the walks, but whether there is or is not, public enterprise should so far recover its energy as to demand that the side-walks be kept in a passable condition. A path in the snow is not a pleasant place for ladies to meet, both must turn aside in order to pass; gentlemen may wallow in the snow but they have no right to compel ladies to a like fate. Trade is dull; it will be duller unless they can get out to trade—keep the walks clean and business will prosper.

We understand that an unpleasant state of affairs exist at the Army street depot, Grand Rapids, growing out of a misunderstanding between Superintendents Bush and Wallin, of the Central and Indiana roads. It is reported that Mr. Bush, becoming dissatisfied with accommodations proposed to be furnished the officers of the Michigan Central road in the new Union depot, laid his grievance before Superintendent Wallin, which that gentleman failed to remedy. Consequently Mr. Bush adopted means to prevent trains of the Indiana road from using the tracks of the Central. Switches were spiked down and men placed on guard over them. Wednesday the yard engine of the Indiana road was not taken from its house, and the shipping freight was obstructed.

We have a College; an institution where the young men are privileged to study the sciences and graduate with honors, but where young ladies are never admitted, and the question has arisen; how shall we educate the girls? A young ladies' Seminary is essential, and such a project has received the sanction of the Council of Hope College, and we learn that arrangements are nearly perfected whereby a school for young ladies is to be opened in this city about the first of December. We are impressively informed however, and made to understand that the school for young ladies is to be separated from the College, in separate buildings, with a curriculum of study specially adapted for ladies. The idea of the sexes being educated in classes and studies together, can not be entertained at Hope College, such a system may answer for a Cornell or Michigan University, but it is too far in advance of the ideas entertained in this latitude. Gentlemen, reforms never go backward, and if you plant your system of education upon the old platform of separating the sexes you will soon have to re-organize or fail. From those Colleges where females have been admitted we hear the evidence favoring its continuance, and the advocates of females' rights are urging such a system upon all Colleges, and we hope the day is not far distant when every College in our land will throw wide open its doors to all who seek admittance. The Seminary as organized will be under the control of Hope College with Rev. W. B. Gilmore as principal, and Mrs. O. Van O'Land as assistant.

The Allegan Fire Department have received an invitation from their Muskegon friends to visit that town on Thanksgiving day, and participate in a grand Firemen's Ball in the evening. Quite a large deputation intend to avail themselves of the opportunity of keeping alive the friendly feeling already existing between the two departments. —*Allegan Democrat*.

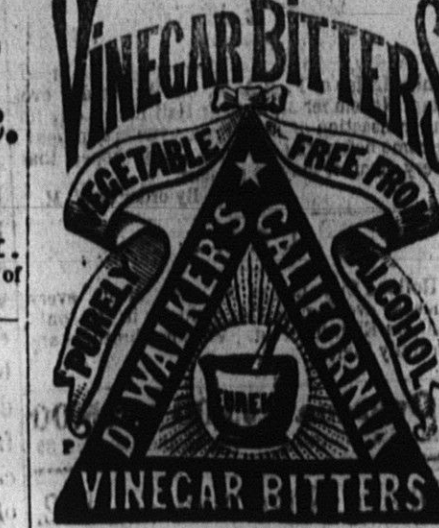
